Choir Concert Scheduled

This year the music world celebrates the 300th anniversary of the birth of Johann Sebastian Bach and George Frederick Handel. Both of these men were born in 1685. The Glenville State College Concert Choir in its concert on Sunday night will highlight music of these two men. From Handel the Choir will sing "Hallelujah, Amen" from Judas Maccabaeus; and from Bach the Choir will sing "Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring" and his "Motet No. VI, Praise the Lord, all Ye Nations," a setting of Psalm 117.

Besides these three numbers, the Choir will sing "Awake! the Dawn

Day is Near" from Richard Wagner's Der Meistersinger von Nurnberg, and from The Sicilian Vespers by Giuseppi Verdi, "The Waltz Barcarolle."

Members of the class in Choral Conducting (Music 376) will be featured in the program. They will conduct: "Holiday Song" by William Schuman; "Sing Praises" by Lloyd Pfautsch, "Praise to the Lord, the Almighty" by Hugo Distler; "How Lovely Are the Messengers" by Felix Mendelssohn; and "Ye Followers of the Lamb," a Shaker Song arranged by Edwin Ferguson. of Regents and Chair-



This team will be on campus approximately two days and will meet with different representative groups on campus and discuss the perceptions these groups have on the way President Simmons is fulfilling the duties and responsibilities of President. These duties range from exercising effective leadership to developing a competent administrative organization and staff, as well as many others.

After the two day evaluation on campus, the team will hold an exit interview with President Simmons. They will submit their summary report to the President and allow him to correct and respond to the report. Afterwards, the President will have a scheduled meeting with the Board President and personal committee. President Simmons commented, "I will certainly share the results of this evaluation with the campus when they are complete, which will be in the Fall."

Students Face Decision

A question facing many GSC seniors, especially native West Virginians, is whether or not to stay in West Virginia to seek work after graduation. We wonder, should we stay in our home state and do our part to help revive one of the worst state economies in the nation, or should we follow our ambitions to employment beyond the state's borders where greater and more immediate material success is often possible?

Conservatives with strong family and/or social ties in West Virginia will, of course, argue that we, as the newest generation to enter the work force, owe our state a certain allegiance. They feel that we have an obligation to stay in West Virginia so that the state can benefit from, among other things, our tax money. In the 1984 elections, candidates pleaded with voters to help bring about incentives to keep our "new generation" of workers here. Citizens of West Virginia, then, are certainly feeling the recent push to try to influence us, as college graduates, to help our state bring about economic recovery by living and working in West Virginia.

Many of us, however, are looking for bigger and better opportunities than this state has to offer. States such as North Carolina, Florida, and Texas, to name a few, are in the process of rapid economic growth and thus are opening up more and higher paying jobs with better opportunities for advancement. Also, progressive attitudes in these states offer for many a much more attractive lifestyle than one can find amidst the often backwards attitudes held in much of West Virginia.

The choice, then, is up to the individual, based on his or her own personal needs and goals. To stay in West Virginia may be good for the state's economy, but how many of us can be satisfied with the limited opportunities available here? If "Mountaineer Pride" is enough to live on, then life in West Virginia can be very satisfying; but for those of us who are ready to expand our horizons, the rest of the world is opening up vast new opportunities and experiences for this year's college graduates to face.

Instructor Visits USSR

Dr. Mildred Disko was one of 28 participants in a college teachers'study tour of the Soviet Union. The delegation of 28 school administrators, mathematics teachers, and students was sponsored by St. Francis College in New York.

The trip which lasted from March 29 to April 13 included visits to Moscow, Baku, and Kiev. The group visited schools, palaces of culture, museums, and had interviews with trade union committee members.

In the school related visits, the group heard references to the educational reform that is to be in place by 1986. This reform includes stricter requirements for teachers, salary increases, a one year extension of compulsary education, and easier to read textbooks among other changes.

Football Squad Having Good Spring

Coach Frank Vincent's Pioneer football team has been enjoying a good spring so far, and will wind up its spring practices this week.

Coach Vincent is very pleased with the progress this spring of the 40 members of his team, noting that the squad is working extremely hard, the players' attitudes are good, and they are hitting as hard as ever.

After losing a good deal of his starters on both offense and defense, the coach is faced with the problem

of filling vacancies occupied last year by players with three or four years of experience. He particularly noted the loss of All-Americans Byron Brooks and Mike Payne, saying that "This year, we'll really feel the losses of our seniors, and we need to plug some holes on offense and defense, and our players are working hard to plug these gaps."

The coach also pointed out that he would like to see GSC produce another All-American player this year, as no West Virginia Conference school has ever had back-to-back All-Americans.

Because of the loss of so many of his regulars, Vincent has had to make some changes in much of his offense. He stated that the quarterbacks and running backs are playing very well, and the offensive line is blocking extremely well.

Vincent concluded by saying of his team that "We're having a good spring — we've still got a long way to go, but we're heading in the right direction."

Thinclads Readying For WVC Meet

The GSC track squad travelled to California, Pennsylvania, last Saturday to compete in the University of California, Pa., invitational. The meet was a non-scoring team meet, in which only individuals scored and no team points were awarded.

In field events, three Pioneers came away with points. Dave Darst fired the shot put 48 feet 11 inches to take third place in that event while

placing fifth in the discus. In the long jump, Shawn Miller hit a jump of 21 feet, 6 inches to take second. Miller also took third in the triple jump. Finally, Mark Alderidge took fourth place in the pole vault with a leap of 12 feet, 6 inches.

On the track, Shawn Shockey took fifth and John Harris took sixth place in the 400 meter intermediate hurdles, while Todd Raines placed seventh in the 5000 meter run. Harris also took points in the 400 meter run, pulling in third place. The Pioneer mile relay team scored a fifth place finish.

Among the schools competing at the meet were Pitt, Slippery Rock, Frostburg, and Indiana University of Pa. (IUP). The Pioneers will travel to IUP next Saturday in preparation for the West Virginia Conference meet, which will be held May 4 and 5 at Laidley Field in Charleston.

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
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
