


Pioneers After Third Straight Winning Season

The Pioneer Football Program posted a 12-5-1 record over the last two seasons. But now All-Americans Byron Brooks and Mike Payne are gone, and only four starters remain from last year's nationally ranked defense. As a result, sixth-year head coach Frank Vincent will be using a lot of new faces in an attempt to duplicate Glenville's recent success.

A quick glance at the Pioneer roster will show just how young the squad is, as 21 of the 48 players are freshmen. Vincent feels that this is a good crop of recruits, and that some will be making contributions to the fortunes of this year's team. He also went on to say that he has been pleased with the overall play of his veteran players in preseason practice.

Noseguard Mike Chadwick and Defensive Tackle Dave Darst will be two veterans relied on heavily by the coachina There two seniors were big reasons why the Glenville defense finished nationally ranked in rushing defense, scoring defense, and total defense. The tandem accounted for nearly 30 of the team's 50-plus sacks last year. Also back for his senior season is safety Mark Hash. Hash needs two interceptions this year to move into second place on Glenville's all-time list.

Offensively, there are several question marks and consequently, several jobs up for grabs. Fortunately, however, quarterback is not one of the question marks as Forrest Hall and Alan Fiddler are back after fine 1984 campaigns. The rest of

the backfield is uncertain at this point since fullback Larry Sutter is the only player with experience at the college level.

the college level. Despite the inexperience. Vincent does feel that there is a great deal of talent among his young backs. The Pioneer boss stated "We have some good voung backs, it's just a matter of getting them some experience."

Senior Tight Ends Ron Lane and John Trew along with Split End Jim Bird return to give the offense a very stable receiving corps. Bird has led Glenville in touchdown receptions each of the last two seasons.

On the offensive line, there are several spots open. Vincent said that "Tight end is the only spot on the line we are sure about at this point; everything else is a tossup." This could be a good sign since five of the offensive linemen on the Pioneer veteran roster have been starters at one time or another.

Glenville opens up this Saturday night with a

road game at WV Wesleyan. Last year, the Pioneers trounced Wesleyan by a score of 38-12. Buckhannon is only an hour away, and isn't a bad drive for those students who may wish to make the trip. Kickoff is at 7:30 pm.

Harriers Have Young Talent

Glenville's cross country team fell to sixth place in the conference last year after capturing three straight conference crowns. With a fine recruiting class on hand, the runners of Coach Butch Hays appear to be much stronger this season.

There are only three veteran runners on the Pioneer's roster. They are senior Berry Crutchfield. junior Jesse Skiles, and sophomore Jay Dawkins. After a spectacular high school career, Dawkins stepped in to be Glenville's number one runner last season. He finished 10th at the conference meet, and is an all-conference candidate this season.

Andy Jarrell of Braxton Co. and Chris Shockey of Parkersburg South were Hays' two top recruits in the off-season. Jarrell finished 5th in the 3200meter race at the state track meet. Shockey was the number two man on South's state champion cross country team.

Another welcome addition to the squad is freshman Phillip Anderson of Kingston, Jamaica. Anderson has shown good speed in the team's early workouts and could be one of the better runners in the conference once he aets some mileage under him. Rounding out the freshmen class is Bill Ramsey from Clarksburg-Liberty High School. Ramset was primarily an 800meter man in high school,; but should help the team r out once he adjusts to thet terrain and distance of t cross country running.

Hays' squad will open up Saturday morning at the Marshall Invitational. There will be several big schools there and the meet should to be a valuable experience for the young squad.

Golfers Finish 9th In Nation

Three weeks after the GSC students departed last spring, Coach Tim Carney and his West Virginia Conference-champion golf team ventured to Arizona and placed ninth at the NAIA national golf tournament. They were led by senior John Forrest, who earned AII-American honors.

There were 33 schools in the national tournament field. To put it in a broader perspective, consider that the Pioneer golfers were ninth out of over 270 NAIA schools that have golf programs.

Senior Scott Carney finished 35th in the tournament. Carney missed All-American status by a mere eight strokes. He was named, however, to the NAIA Academic All-American golf team two weeks after the tournament. Sophomore Mike Dynda finished just behind Carney in 40th place. Senior John Oplinger and freshman Danny Wassick were the other two team members who made the trip. They had fine tournaments as well.

This was Coach Carney's seventh conference title in 17 years as the Pioneer golf coach. He has also coached eight teams to second place finishes. This was, however, the best showing nationally by the Pioneer golfers ever.


