### "Midsummer" Previewed

With movies such as **Fright Night**, the crime rate that doesn't seem to ever stop rising, and the ever present threat of nuclear holocaust, does it not seem strange that many young people would be afraid of an author that has been dead for almost 400 years? But, in the long and short of it, many students are afraid of William Shakespeare. They feel that the language is too hard to follow. For this reason, students avoid plays of William Shakespeare all together. Well, fear not brave students--**A Midsummer Night's Dream** is for you. The best way to enjoy any play is to see it, and the college will get that

chance on October 3, 4, and 5, with performances starting at 8 pm.

**A Midsummer Night's Dream** is one of Shakespeare's most presented and best remembered plays. It was written around 1595, most likely for the wedding ceremony of William Stanley, Earl of Derby, and Elizabeth Vere. A wedding reception is hardly the place for heavy drama, or even cerebral comedy. The lightness of the occasion warrants a play of happiness, magic and comedy--and all three abound, (with an accent on comedy).

## Money, Money Everywhere...

There are many students at Glenville State College who are active participants in the workshop and workstudy programs. This money, to many, is a vital part of their enrollment fees and personal expenses that are accrued during a usual semester while living on or off campus.

The federal government has allocated \$97,000 to GSC for workstudy programs, which is matched by 20% from Glenville State College, which brings the working total to around \$108,000. Although this amount is up \$30,000 from last year, many students are still without jobs; even though they were notified several weeks before the fall semester that they were eligible.

One of the reasons that many students are without jobs is that some students on the workstudy program are employed by more than one division. There is no set amount to how many jobs can be held when under workstudy. Although many students are in need of more money than others, and are entitled to extra work, is it fair to keep those who also need jobs from them because some students want extra money to spend on "extracurricular" activities?

Financial Aid realizes that there is a problem, but their hands are tied. More federal money would add jobs to the program, but that is a never-ending problem. The Financial Aid Office is open to any reasonable suggestions that could help solve this growing dilemma. But, until the problem is solved, many needy students will remain unemployed.

This William Shakespeare comedy will be produced October 3 - 5. Mr. Sindleddecker's exceptional skills are being highlighted in the elaborate set and beautiful costumes.

Sindleddecker's enthusiasm is not limited to GSC's campus theatre. He is also involved in civic and religious activities. In the past he has worked with youth in the church, from three-year-olds to teenagers.

A former native of Parkersburg, Sindleddecker attended Parkersburg Community College and West Virginia University, obtaining a B.A. degree in costuming. Next, he taught at PCC for five years. After that, he attended WVU to obtain an M.A. with an emphasis on acting and directing, and remained teaching there for two years. At WVU, Sindleddecker studied the Meisner Method of acting which consists of

repetition and reaction. He then, through the Arts and Humanities Council, worked at Magnolia High School where he taught theatre to high school students.

While in the graduate program at WVU he directed a production of Billie Ed Wheeler's **State Fall**. This show was the only one in recent history to be made a part of the University's regular theatre season.

As to GSC's theatre season, **The Shadow Box**, **Godspell** and **Pinocchio** are on the roster for the upcoming year.

Sindleddecker enjoys Glenville because he feels that the students are open to new ideas.

He is married to Cheryl Flagg of Morgantown, who is an Office Manager at WVU.

## Pioneers Lose To Rams, Fall to 1-2

Glenville State saw its record dip to 1-2 Saturday as they suffered a 42-6 loss at the hands of the Shepherd Rams. It was the first conference game for both schools.

It was a bad day from the beginning for the Pioneers as Shepherd raced to a 28-0 lead in the game's first 20 minutes and never looked back. Glenville's lone touchdown was scored by Tracy Haught, who rambled in from two yards out late in the fourth quarter.

Forrest Hall led the Glenville offense as he threw for 102 yards, while linebacker Todd

Layhew led the defense, amassing a total of 17 tackles. Haught led the Pioneer rushers, gaining 34 yards on 16 carries.

This week's game at West Virginia State will be a very important one for both teams. State is coming off a 38-13 thrashing to the Concord Mountain Lions. State's record is 1-2 overall and 0-1 in the conference, exactly the same as Glenville's.

The Pioneers have defeated the Yellow Jackets rather soundly each of the last two seasons. They won 17-0 in 1983, and last year 35-14, in Glenville's Homecoming. So State

does have a bit of revenge when it comes to Frank Vincent's squad.

Glenville on the other hand, needs a win so they can square their record 2-2 going into Homecoming. This game could be the turning point in the season for the Pioneers if they could come out of Institute with a victory.

Kickoff time is set for 1:30 Saturday at Lakin Field on the campus of West Virginia State. Institute is located seven miles west of Charleston on I-64 for those fans making the trip.

## Harriers Take 3rd at Invitational

Glenville State's cross country team turned in another fine performance Saturday, finishing third out of six teams in the Pioneer Invitational. The Pioneers did, however, defeat the three other conference schools that competed.

The race took place entirely on the course of the Glenville Golf Club. The hilly, five-mile layout proved to be a challenge for the runners who ran the course under almost ideal weather conditions.

The meet was won by Marietta, who was followed closely by Frostburg, just 11 points behind. Glenville finished ahead of West Virginia State, the University of Charleston, and West Virginia Tech.

West Virginia Wesleyan also had two runners in the competition.

Freshman sensation Andy Jarrell again led the Pioneer harriers. Jarrell finished in 11th place in an excellent time of 27:59. The rest of the GSC runners finished as follows: Jay Dawkins, 17th in 28:59; Chris Shockey, 20th in 29:11; Jesse Skiles, 28th in 30:38; Phillip Anderson, 30th in 31:28; Berry Crutchfield, 37th in 34:52; and Bill Ramsey finished 38th with a time of 35:40.

Taking into consideration the total amount of teams that Glenville has faced in the season's first two meets, they have compiled an impressive 6-2 mark, and an even more impressive 6-0 mark

within the conference. The Pioneers have yet to face Davis & Elkins, Fairmont, or West Liberty though, so there are still a lot of questions left to be answered.

Pioneer boss Butch Hays is to be commended for putting on a fine meet. Hays was pleased with how the course turned out as well as the performance of his squad. He mentioned that he plans to use the course in some upcoming workouts for the Pioneers.

The Pioneers will be idle this week as they prepare for a busy October. Next month will include three meets plus a grueling half-marathon for the team.

## Darst Adds To Sack Record

It is an honor for any player to be a school's all-time leader in a statistical category. A record is always a fitting tribute to a successful career. It is even more of an honor to be an all-time leader with a full year remaining to play.

Dave Darst, a four-year starter on the Pioneer's defensive line is a man who holds this distinction. Entering the 1985 season, Darst was Glenville's all-time leader in quarterback sacks with a total of 32. He has since raised the record to 35.

The 6'3", 235-pound defensive tackle from Point Pleasant has led the Pioneer defense in sacks during each of his seasons in Glenville. As a freshman he tallied seven, as a sophomore

nine, and last season exploded for a whopping total of 16. He has also been among Glenville's tackle leaders each season he has played.

Darst attributes several factors to his sack record. He feels his quickness is a big asset and his desire to upend opposing quarterbacks. He says, "I would take a sack over a tackle any day." Darst also went on to say that being a member of some nationally ranked defenses has been a big help. He said, "the defense here has always been one of unity and pride, and this year is no different."

Darst has set his career goal at 50 sacks. This would give him an improvement on last

year's total and create an almost unbreakable record. No matter where his total ends up, Dave Darst can always be remembered as perhaps the greatest pass rusher in Glenville history. His record speaks for itself.

## Officiating Class Offered

National Federation Rules which govern high school basketball in West Virginia will be taught by Mr. Gary Smith.

### Volleyball Suspended

In last Thursday's meeting of the Athletic Committee, the decision was made to suspend the sport of women's volleyball for the 1985 season. The present plan calls for the sport to resume at GSC in 1986.

This decision came about because Coach Kay Chico's squad had dwindled to a mere six players—the minimum requirement for a team.

The committee simply felt that suspending the sport for this season would give the program time to get back on its feet. Hopefully, this course of action will pay off.

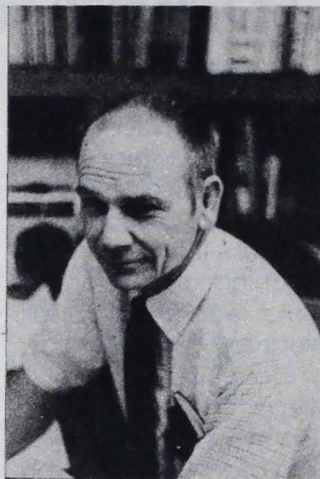

## GSC Alumnus Dies

Dr. Charles Lynch, 83, retired Exxon research chemist of the Stanton section, died Friday, August 30, at Hunterdon Medical Center in Raritan Township, New Jersey.

In 1966, he was chosen Alumnus of the Year by Glenville State College.

He taught in two West Virginia high schools and was head of the chemistry department at Salem Col-

lege in West Virginia. He was director of the analytical laboratory of the West Virginia State Department of Agriculture during the summer and fall of 1934. Later, that same year he joined Exxon Research and Engineering as a petroleum chemist, and was with Exxon until he retired in 1967. He holds 34 U.S. patents.

## Students Travel Abroad

Students in the new course on International Business will visit Britain, France, and the Netherlands over Spring Break, according to Dr. Duke Talbott, one of the instructors for the course. Students should register for the course during preregistration in November.

Additionally, Dr. Talbott states, "The European tour is open to all majors and to faculty members and others who wish to avail themselves of the opportunity. The fee for students is \$966 and for non-students \$1191." Dr. Talbott further stated, "This is an area which is of major interest in both business and social studies fields. It would be beneficial

as an elective in all majors."

Dr. Talbott invites all who are interested in the class to obtain a description of the class itinerary from either his office or the other instructor for the course, Mrs. Virginia Hays in the Division of Business. The itinerary takes the students to London, Canterbury, Dover, Calais, Paris, Amsterdam, and back to London. The trip is scheduled for March 19-31, 1986.

Those attending the class, taking the trip, and successfully writing a term paper on the subject will receive three credit hours on the elective in either business, economics, or geography.



## Futurists Contest Outlined

Honeywell will launch its fourth annual Futurist Awards Competition October 1 with an increased incentive for college students to enter—a \$10,000 grand prize.

This year's contest, which asks college students to write essays about technological advancements they foresee by the year 2010, will offer ten winners \$2,000 and the chance to work for Honeywell next summer. For the first time, one of these will be chosen top winner and will receive an additional \$8,000 for a total prize of \$10,000. Last year 600 students, representing 255 colleges and universities nationwide, entered the competition.

The contest is open to

all full-time students at any accredited college in the United States. Students are asked to leap ahead 25 years and write essays predicting developments in two of six technological areas: electronic communications, energy, aerospace, computer science, manufacturing automation or office automation. A third essay must address the social impact of the technological predictions. Each of the three essays should be 500 to 750 words long.

Completed essays must be postmarked no later than Dec. 31, 1985. In January, a panel of top Honeywell scientists and engineers will judge the essays on

the basis of creativity, feasibility, clarity of expression and legibility.

Winners will be announced in early February, and each of the ten winners will receive a two-day, all-expense-paid trip to Honeywell's headquarters in Minneapolis. The grand-prize winner will be announced at this event.

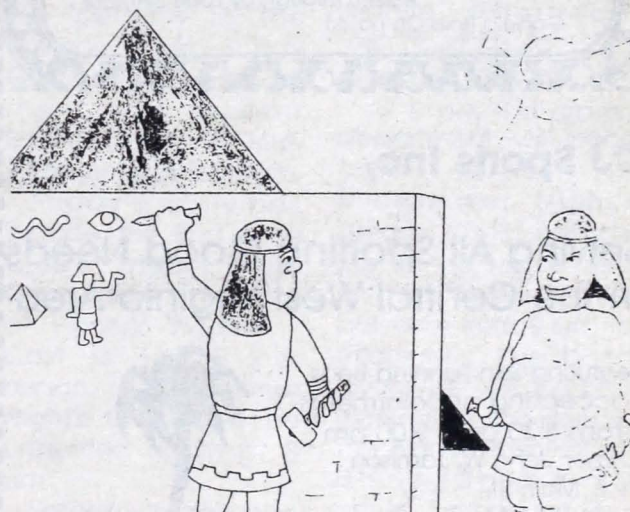
be photographed by a leading photographer, and a selection of merchandise prizes. All selections will be based upon photographic appeal.
