## **Chancellor's Column**

In a recent column, I described the ways in which higher education contributes to the West Virginia economy-by teaching skills, certifying graduates, and as an important industry itself. There are other ways in which higher education more directly serves business and industry.

Many industries develop and grow because they are located near colleges and universities. Students, faculty, and their families often develop businesses which arise out of their studies. The steady stream of educated graduates and students seeking part-time work help keep businesses going. And many businesses sell their services largely to colleges and universities. Higher education institutions also serve industry through consultation with businesses on their finances and technology. The consultation is done under contracts between the college or university and the business or, in some cases, between the business and faculty experts, themselves. Some industries also contract with colleges and universities to train their employees on specific subjects.

The Board of Regents and Marshall University sponsor the statewide Center for Education and Research in Industry to help arrange those connections.

Research originated and conducted by faculty also plays a role in the state's economy. The Stiller-Smith engine, which is being developed at WVU, may become a significant force for economic growth.

# Dunn Leads Pioneers Over State, 28-14

Sophomore Bill Dunn picked off three passes to lead Glenville State to a 28-14 victory over West Virginia State last Saturday at Institute. It was Glenville's third straight win over the Yellow Jackets.

Dunn made his first theft midway through the first auarter when he snared a State pass at the Glenville 40. Nine plays later freshman Tracy Haught rambled 30 yards for the game's first score. Todd Layhew's conversion made it 7-0, Glenville. Dunn's second interception came early in the second quarter, and in dramatic fashion; he arabbed a sideline toss by Yellow Jacket guarterback Bob Ashley and raced 28 vards for a Pioneer touchdown.

State cut the deficit to 14-7 early in the third quarter, capitalizing on a Pioneer fur ble. Glenville countced in the fourth quarter when Forrest Hall connected with fullback Andy Pfefferkorn for a 17 yard touchdown pass.

Following the Pioneer touchdown, the Yellow Jackets made one final rally. They marched in

for a score to cut the margin to 21-14, and then proceeded to stop the Pioneers. State regained possession of the ball following a Glenville punt with only seven minutes left to play. But the Jacket comeback ended abruptly as Dunn intercepted his third pass of the day at the State 45 and returned it nine yards. Just two minutes later Glenville clinched the game as Hall found tight end Ron Lane for a 12 yard touchdown pass.

He was 2 for 10 for 29 yards. Tracy Haught led the Glenville rushing attack as he picked up 83 yards on 22 carries.

Last year's matchup between these two squads was perhaps Glenville's most exciting game of the season, as the Pioneers won 23-17. The Hilltoppers are comina off a 30-3 defeat to the Shepherd Rams. The Pioneers are now 2-2 overall and 1-1 in the conference. The remainder of the schedule consists of conference opponents.

### Campus Construction Discussed

Through the State Legislation and the Board of Regents, Glenville State has obtained approximately one milion dollars in funding, according to Finance Administration Vice-President, Robert K. Gainer. This will be used to upgrade, construct and renovate the very heart of the campus and to refurbish the track and the tennis courts in the athletic complex.

New boilers have been installed in the Pioneer Center and in the Science Hall to provide hot water and heat for those buildings. The Robert F. Kidd Library, Science Hall, and the Auditorium in the Administration Building have been reroofed. Clark Hall and the Administration Building have had air conditioning installed in various sections. But perhaps the most noticeable renovations have occurred at the track and tennis courts and in and around the Robert F. Kidd Library, with the reconstruction of the Amphitheater.

The Amphitheater has been removed from behind the Robert F. Kidd Library and is being reconstructed on a higher elevation. New walkways around the library and a new parking lot behind it have been constructed These actions were necessitated by water seepage problems which were causing extensive damage to the library. Mr. Hathaway implied that the walkway between the Science Hall and the Administration Building, though not completed, should be usable for Homecoming, but construction on the Amphitheater area is not scheduled for completion until about Thanksgiving.

There are plans afoot to construct a new Fine Arts Building, refurbish the outside of the Administration Building, and to replace the bleachers on the Athletic Field when funds become available. These projects will cost about five million dollars, but it is felt they will improve the facility and provide a higher quality education for future students in Fine Arts.

During the 1983-84 season he was an artist-in-residence with the Virginia Opera Association. He was heralded for his performances as 'Oroveso" in Norma, "Simone" in Gianni Schicchi, "Monterone" in Rigoletto, and "Larkens/Ashby" in La Fancuilla del West.

Before performing with VOA, Mr. Givens made stage apperances with the lyric opera of Kansas City and with the West Virginia Opera Theatre (Charleston). He was a performer in residence at the University of Kansas for one year and has made guest artist appearances at Nassau Community College (Garden City, NY), Parkersburg Community College, and Washington and Jefferson College (Washington, PA). He toured Europe and the United Kingdom with the West Virginia University Colligium Musicum.

Hugh Givens is a 1977 graduate of Glenville State College. His October 9 apperance in Glenville will occur at 8 p.m. in the college auditorium. There is no admission charge.

## Nature Trail Highlighted

While the construction mid-campus has been obvious to anyone connected with Glenville State College on a daily basis, many may not be familiar with the construction going on in the woods behind Louis Bennett Hall. The construction involves work towards completion of an Outdoor Education Center for GSC.

The Outdoor Education Center, designed for extended classroom usage and exceptional learners, was initiated on the campus in the fall of 1983. The center is designed to inform the learner of and/or enable the learner to interpret the historical, geological, and biological significance of the area through simultaneous visual, auditory, and tactile perceptions or any of the three which the learner is capable of receiving and processing. This is true for learners who are psychologically restricted as well as the ones who have physical limitations.

The site of the Outdoor Education Center is found on the terrain behind Louis Bennett Hall on the GSC campus. The trail, traversing the area, rises approximately 75 feet, while spanning a distance of 1000 feet. The trail is mulched with wood chips and the slope altered to a maximum grade of one in 12 for persons with ambulatory impairments.

Construction this spring and summer has been concentrated on a pond area and a small amphitheatre, which allows seating for 20 people. The pond area was designed with cooperation of Mr. John Vandevender, District Conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service. The area will allow introduction of flora and fauna, which currently does not exist in the area.

Upon completion, the Outdoor Education Center will feature restoration of the old Glenville Cemetary and various educational "stations" along the trail. The "stations" include the Tree Barn, which will outline information relating to tree growth and usefulness; and the Strata Station, which will delineate geographical formations and strata levels. In addition, there will be an instrument known as the Tree Finder, which will enable the observer to correctly identify the various tree types. These "stations," along with the amphitheatre, have been designed by Kent Woofter, a GSC student. The projects, originally envisioned by professors and members of the Science Division, Social Science Division and Continuing Education Division, are being supervised by Dr. Joe Evans and Mr. Joe Hickman. Also contributing this fall on the trail technically is Terry Forrester, also a GSC student. Many other GSC students have lent time, effort and interest to the trail's progress this past summer as well.

Until the spring of 1985, the Outdoor Education Center was provided with funds by the Southern West Virginia Dean's Grant Consortium; however, funding is no longer available. ### End Zone Club To Honor Hanlin

Former Glenville State Head Football Coach Bill Hanlin will be honored at Homecoming by the End Zone Club. He is the second winningest coach in the history of Pioneer football. Only the legendary Nate Rohrbough accumulated more wins than Hanlin.

Hanlin was born in Sistersville, WV, on July 10, 1930. He graduated from Glenville in 1953 with a degree in Physical Education, and received his Masters from the University of Maryland in 1956. After coaching stints in Tyler County and St. Marys High Schools, and Ashland High School in Ohio, Hanlin arrived in Glenville in 1967.

He coached the Pioneers through the 1974 season in what were eight of the most successful years in Pioneer football history. His career record at Glenville was 44-26-2. His winningest team was the 1973 team that finished as the NAIA national runner-up, losing in the championship game by only a touchdown.

Since leaving Glenville, he has been working for the West Virginia Secondary Schools Activities Commission. This is the governing body for high school athletics.

# Kendall and Lothes to Receive Montrose and Williams Awards

Spencer native Terry Kendall is the 1985 recipient of the Montrose Award, and Maria Lothes of Elkins is the recipient of this year's Williams Award. These two former GSC standout athletes will be honored at Saturday's Homecoming festivities.

Kendall was a fouryear starter at linebacker for the Pioneer defense. Twice during those four seasons, he finished as Glenville's leader in tackles. His best year was his senior

season of 1983 when he was the captain of an outstanding Pioneer defense. That year the Pioneers sported a super 6-2-1 record and finished with a nationally ranked defense. Kendall was once named WVIAC Player of the Week that season and was honored following that campaign by being named to the All-Conference team. He is now back at Spencer High School serving as a teacher and coach.

Lothes was also a four-year regular at GSC. She was the center for the Lady Pioneers during four very successful seasons. During her career at Glenville, the Lady Pioneers won 65 games while losing only 33. She was co-captain of last year's team and was named to the All-Tournament Team at the Pitt-Johnstown Tournament. She is now living in Marlinton and is employed by Pocahontas County High School.

# The Dream Is Coming True...

### Shakespeare's shimmering fantasy, A Midsummer Night's Dream, with its title's promise of moondrenched magic, will be presented on the Glenville State College Theatre stage for the three nights of October 3-5.

This is the comedy written by Shakespeare after he had achieved his first renown with the roval histories and with Romeo and Juliet, but while he was still young and overflowing with the rustic memories of his Stratford boyhood-the comedy he set in an enchanted wood inhabited by dancing fairies, sweethearts befuddled with love potions and a group of country bumpkins rehearsing a preposterous play.

In effect, his comedy is a picnic, all of a soft summer's night. With wit and incomparably lovely flights of poetry, the Bard interwove in this entertaining trifle four light-hearted stories. One deals with the quarrel of Oberon and Titania, the king and queen of the fairies; a second with the mixups of the four "mortals" resulting from mischievous Puck's having given a love potion to the wrong man; a third with the rehearsals of the immortal Bottom and his fellow-clowns of their mock tragedy; and the fourth with the wedding party of the Duke of Athens and his bride.

Tim Mace will be seen as the conceited Bottom; Jesse Chapman and Paula Jones as Oberon and Titania; Dan Amendola as the sprightly Puck, the Mr. Fix-It of the fairy world; Debbie Bunner, Paige Deitz, John Mark Walkup, and Kenny Webb (Helena, Hermia, Lysander, Demetrius) as the sweethearts discombobulated by a wrong dose of lovejuice: Randy Harper and Tammy Miller (Duke and Hippolyta) as the Duke and his bride; and William Murphy, Ronald Smith, John Curran, Kevin Carr and Kevin Miller (Quince, Snug, Flute, Snout, Starveling) as the loutish workmen comically intent on amateur theatricals. Others in the cast of, Dream will be Leon Sylvester, Lisa MeHenry, Phyllis Parsons, Stephanie Morris, and Michelle Garrison.

The comedy's total mood of lightsomeness and spontaneity is being attended to by Mr. David Sindledecker as the play's director and designer. Mr. Sindledecker is designing the costumes of the mortal visitors and the fairy dwellers of this woodland idyll, and has designed the background of the moonlit aisles of the enchanted forest and the Duke's palace where the revel ends.

Performances begin at 8 pm nightly. Tickets may be purchased at the door.
