Acting Company Will Perform

The Acting Company, the nation's theater company, is proud to add to its current repertory, one of Shakespeare's most popular comedies, **As You Like It**. Playing at the Glenville State College theatre, this romantic comedy is sure to delight audiences with its beautiful language and hilarious situations. Now in its thirteenth year, the Acting Company, touring arm of the John F. Kennedy Center, will perform in Glenville on October 14, 1985, at 8 pm, in the GSC Theatre. This is the second program in the Cultural Affairs season.

As You Like It is an endearing play with satirical elements that sets love against a

pastoral backdrop. The play's story concerns two brothers, the Dukes Frederick and Senior. Frederick, a greedy usurper, banishes Duke Senior from his rightful place at court. But the exiled Duke Senior finds solace in the harmony of Arden Forest. Senior's spirited daughter, Rosalind, once welcomed as her uncle's ward, is suddenly turned out of court like her father before her and flees with Frederick's gentle daughter, Celia. The cousins, in order to discourage treachery, disguise themselves as country folk: Celia as the simple maid, Aliena; and Rosalind as her brother, Ganymede. Accompanied by their loyal court

jester, Touchstone, the pair settle in a country cottage complete with flocks and pastures.

Stricken by Rosalind at court, the estranged youth, Orlando, follows the trio into the forest where he is schooled in the art of love by none other than the disguised Rosalind.

As You Like It is sure to be a memorable evening of theatre combining this remarkable director and fifteen of the brightest young actors and actresses in America. A timeless classic filled with lyrical poetry, this play offers an extraordinary ensemble the chance to delight your family and friends.

The public is invited to attend. There is no admission charge.

Extension Proposed

Glenville State College President William K. Simmons announced that Monday, September 30, Gov. Arch A. Moore, Jr., had asked John McCuskey Commissioner of Finance and Administration, to evaluate the proposed building of a GSC Center in Nicholas County. In a letter dated September 24, Moore said, "I am requesting that he (McCuskey) send a letter of intent to the Nicholas County Building Commission, to express the intention of the State of West Virginia to enter into a lease for the facility we propose to build, once it is ready for occupancy."

Dr. Simmons said that he "... joined Nicholas County Building Commission and the people of Nicholas County in their enthusiasm for the GSC Center in Summersville." Simmons said he hopes to participate in ground-breaking in the near future.

Of particular interest to Dr. Simmons, was Gov. Moore's statement that he (Simmons) "Please continue to advise me of the progress on this foresighted endeavor. Please convey to the people of Nicholas County that I share their enthusiasm for the project. I hope that our support reaffirms to them our commitment to higher education."

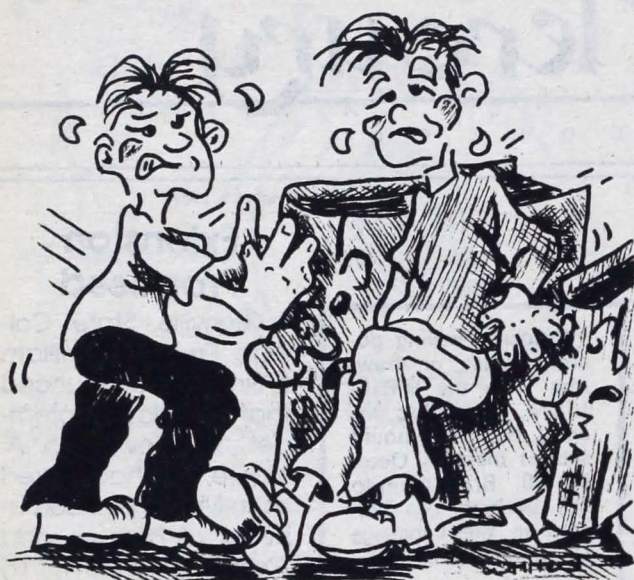
Enrollment Decreases

According to Mack Samples, Dean of Records and Admissions, enrollment at Glenville State College has decreased since the fall 1984 semester. Last fall's enrollment was 1,914 but this year it has dropped to 1,780, a decrease of 134 students or about seven percent. The decrease includes both on and off campus enrollment, however, there was a small increase in those attending GSC classes at the PCC campus.

Mr. Samples cited a smaller freshman class as the major reason for the smaller enrollment figures and also points out that last year was an excellent year for GSC in terms of enrollment. He explained that other central West Virginia colleges, which compete for students with GSC, have also experienced a drop in enrollment. He feels that an increased recruiting effort will help reverse this year's drop in enrollment in the future.

Pioneers Fall To West Liberty, 13-12

West Liberty's Hilltoppers put a damper on Glenville's Homecoming Saturday by downing the Pioneers 13-12. The Hilltoppers tallied the winning score with 13:46 remaining in the game.

Glenville opened the scoring early in the first quarter when Forrest Hall found split end Jim Bird in the end zone for a 25-yard touchdown pass. The Pioneers were unable to convert the point after as the center to holder exchange was muffed. West Liberty answered the Glenville touch-

down on the very next drive by marching 74 yards in 17 plays. The drive consumed nearly eight minutes. Glenville grabbed the lead back before halftime though, as tight end Ron Lane latched onto a 17-yarder from Hall. The two-point conversion failed, leaving the Pioneers with a 12-7 halftime lead.

West Liberty scored the winning touchdown early in the fourth quarter when Hilltopper quarterback Earl Hoffman found split end Dave Willinski in the corner of the endzone

from 14 yards out. Their conversion attempt failed leaving the score 13-12. Glenville managed to materialize an exciting drive in the game's final moments, but gave the ball up on downs at the West Liberty 35.

The loss drops the Pioneers to 2-3 overall and 1-2 in the conference. It was West Liberty's first win of the year.

This week the mighty Salem Tigers will be coming to town. The Tigers, under the direction of head coach Terry Bowden are 3-1 overall and 2-0 in the conference. They are coming off a thorough 32-7 victory over Shepherd.

Kickoff time is set for 7:30 Saturday night at Pioneer Stadium. This will be Glenville's only home night game of the year.

This is somewhat reminiscent of the 1982 team that lost 3-6-1, losing five games by less than a touchdown. Hopefully the Pioneers can pull off an upset or two in the upcoming weeks to turn things around. The toughest part of the schedule is now coming up (Salem, Fairmont, Concord, and WV Tech).

He is the victim of an NAIA rule which states that sacks count against the quarterback's rushing totals. If you add Hall's minus yardage from sacks, he would have 246 yards on 40 carries. Elsewhere on campus, there was not a great deal happening athletic wise. The cross country team did not run at Muskingum as previously planned, but will run this Wednesday at West Virginia Tech.

With a multitude of Homecoming activities and the play sending us into a "dream", a Pioneer victory would have fit the script perfectly. But there will be other Saturdays for the young Pioneers. There is still nearly half a season left, and the biggest games are still ahead.

Be sure to look for the averages of the golf team and the cross country team on next week's Sport's page. Fans are reminded that the football game this Saturday with Salem will have a 7:30 kick-off at the Pioneer Stadium.

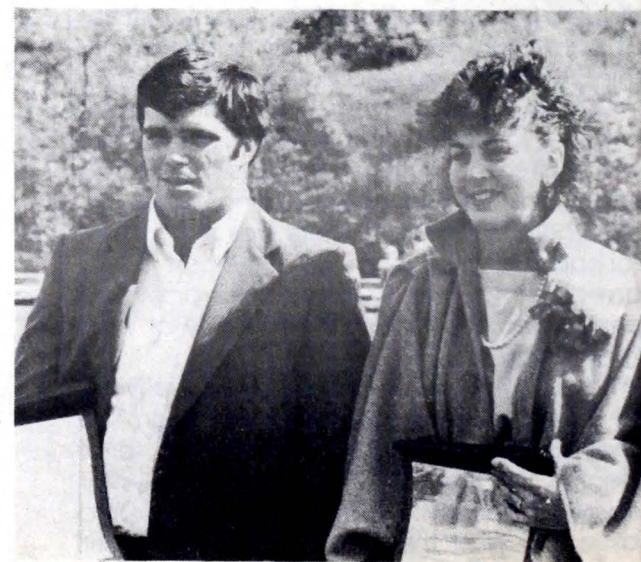

David Sindledacker's Homecoming production of *A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM* was marked by exuberance—from Puck (Dan Amendola) making flying and leaping entrances to Peter Quince's artisans presenting a hilarious *Pyramus and Thisbe* play. The goblin-like fairies indulged in comic grotesqueries, while the four lovers—Demetrius, Lysander, Helena, Hermia—wooed most vehemently. The lavender and silver set and the color coordinated costumes all helped to create a thoroughly enjoyable spectacle. Bubbles, fog, and special lighting effects also proved impressive. A lively procession at the beginning and a glorious tableau for curtain calls at the end showed the elaborate costumes and masks to advantage.

The central West Virginia cast, many of them neophytes in the theatre, certainly did their utmost to make Shakespeare entertaining. No fake British accents here! But rather the soft lilting cadences of Appalachian speech—very suitable, I thought. Oberon (Jesse Chapman), Theseus (Randy Harper), Bottom the Weaver (Tim Mace), Hermia (Paige Deitz), and Egeus (Leon Sylvester) were especially good in projecting their lines.

But others could be singled out for commendation too: John Curran was a convincing *Thisbe* as he tried to pitch his voice high enough to convey timorousness; Lion (Ronald Smith, Jr.) roared well and clawed daintily; Wall (Kevin Carr) provided a suitable and necessary prop; Moonshine (Kevin Miller) was most persistent in lighting *Pyramus'* way, and Peter Quince (William R. Murphy) appeared suitably frustrated with his cast of amateurs. *Pyramus* (Tim Mace) died very determinedly, encumbered as he was by drapery.

Helena (Debbie Bunner) played her inferiority feelings to the hilt but reformed into a lady at the end when she got her *Demetrius* back (Kenneth Webb). Hermia (Paige Deitz) offered good contrast to Helena and remained faithful to her Lysander (John Mark Walkup) despite great difficulties thrown in her way by the interfering fairies.

The fairies were costumed very imaginatively with glitter, feathers, paint, masks and wigs. Titania (Paula Jones), who was splendid in her blonde wig, marshalled her fairy forces well: Phyllis Parsons, Lisa McHenry, Mercy Finley, Michelle Garrison, Ariane Coatney, and little fairy children Meredith Drahnak, Jesse Anderson, Dylan deRosset, and Bo Hendershot.

Portraying the stately Queen of the Amazons, Hippolyta, was Tammy Miller, who made elegant exits and entrances with her consort Theseus. Theseus' Master of the Revels, Philostrate, was played capably by Duane Charnobay. And Theseus' henchmen (Jason Chapman, Dennis George, and John Farley) displayed banners and did their duke's bidding with alacrity.

Revelry and high spirits marked the entire production. I felt that the sound system and the lighting could have been better, and audience laughter sometimes drowned out the lines as fairies' contortions and other acrobatic high jinks dominated the action. But these were minor flaws compared with the impressive effect of the whole production. Hours of painting mantles, sewing on sequins, and stringing beads certainly paid off. Bottom's ass's head was designed very creatively and sported its flower garlands well.

Dozens of students, faculty, staff, and townspeople cooperated to help the amazing Mr. Sindledacker achieve a glorious result.

The production days of the play will be November 14, 15, and 17.

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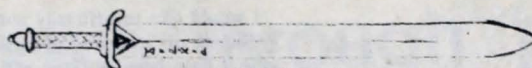
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
