## Continuing Education Classes to Be Held

The Glenville State College Office of Continuing Education will be offering several classes in the coming weeks.

First, they will be offering a West Virginia Hunter Safety Program. The class will be held on Saturday, October 12, 1985 from 9 am to 12 noon in the Science Hall, Room 308, and at the Glenville State College Rifle Range on Sycamore Run Road. Participants will be instructed in basic hunting safety practices, such as transportation handling, loading, and unloading of arms. People attending the workshop should not bring firearms with them. The only special equipment one might wish to bring is a lawn chair. Minimum age for participation is 13.

A second session of both Beginners and Advanced French will

be held on Monday evenings beginning October 21 and extending through November 18. Advanced French will meet from 6-7 pm and Beginners French will meet from 7-7:45 pm, in the Science Hall, Room 308. Mrs. Janice Collins will be the instructor.

A second session of the Gymnastics classes will also be held. The Pre-School session will begin on October 22 and extend through November 19, from 4:30-5 pm. The Intermediate and Advanced session will begin on October 24 and extend through November 21, from 4:30-6 pm. Miss June Casto is the instructor for all classes.

A class entitled "An Introduction to Circular Curves" will be held on November 2 from 8 am-5 pm at Eberle Hall (the Forestry Building).

They will also offer the second session of "Movement for Health and Centering" beginning Wednesday evening, October 16, and extending through November 20. The six Wednesday evening classes will begin at 7:30 in the Little Gym of the Physical Education Building and end at 9:30. Ms. Jude Binder is the instructor. Students are led through a series of exercises designed to bring them to a heightened sensation of their LIFE within their own bodies. Work is done on breathing, relaxation, voice, and various styles of movement.

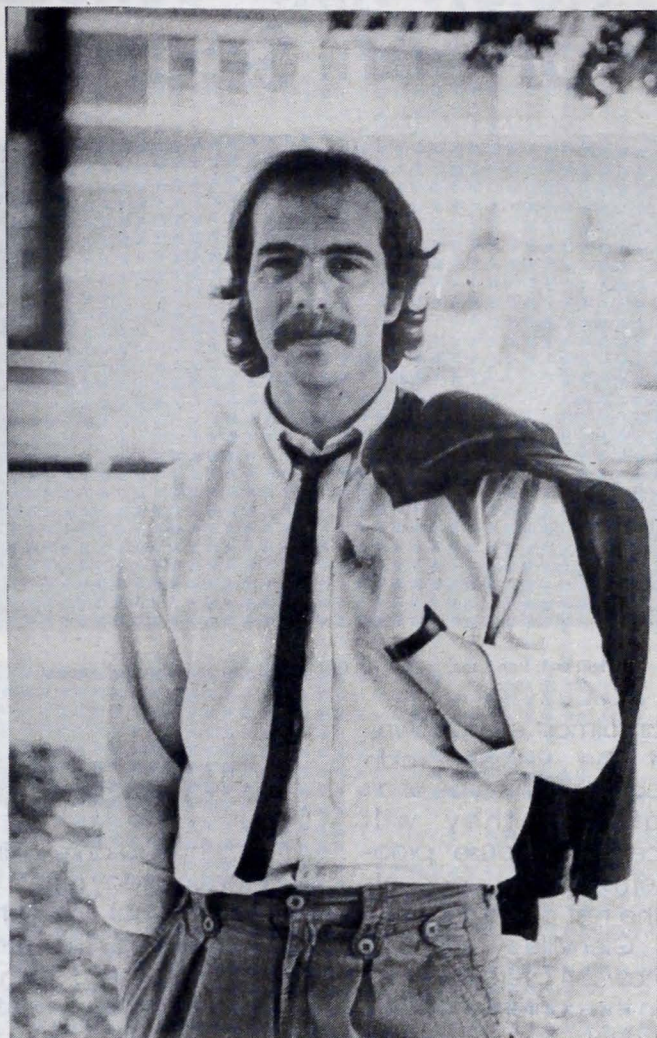
# Artist Exchanges Talents Through Teaching

Over coffee we talked of weather in the British Isles, of black pudding, politics, education, vacations in Greece, and a bit about music and theatre. David Webster's hearty laugh and Liverpool accent addicted my ears to the sounds of the conversation, causing me to stay somewhat longer than my loosely allotted hour for interviews.

For those of you who do not know, David Webster is a native of Southport, England, who has come to GSC with the Fullbright Teacher Exchange Program. Art teacher Charles Scott has taken up residence for the year in David's home in Southport. Webster is teaching color and design, photography, ceramics, and Teaching Art in Public Schools.

Before his last 14 years of teaching, he attended a college affiliated with the

Liverpool University where he studied all aspects of art, particularly painting, drawing, and print making. He obtained his Certificate of Education and Certificate of Advanced Studies in Art and Design. Webster's mother and father were very supportive of his decision to make a career in art. His only sibling—a brother, John—also possesses an art degree.

When asked his view about the differences between the American and British schools he stated, "Now I can go back to England and stand back and be more objective about the British system." He said that he had noticed that Americans have a very positive attitude toward students; wanting to help them obtain success. GSC teachers are aware that the students help provide their jobs and they go out of their way to aid the students.

David is a fan of most sports, especially soccer. He would like to get some teams started in Glenville and teach those who do not know how to play what the game is all about. For those who do know the game, this prospect promises to be a vigorously fun way to hone all the skills that a good soccer player must possess. He urges students to watch out for his posters around campus and come and play- or at least watch- the soccer games.

As we listened to the Eagles in the background, Webster listed some of his other musical preferences. Ry Cooder, Stevie Ray Vaughn, Bix Binderbeck, and from Jackson Browne to Billie Holliday and 1920's blues are among his favorites. He enjoys theatre and is serving as one of GSC's theatre judges.

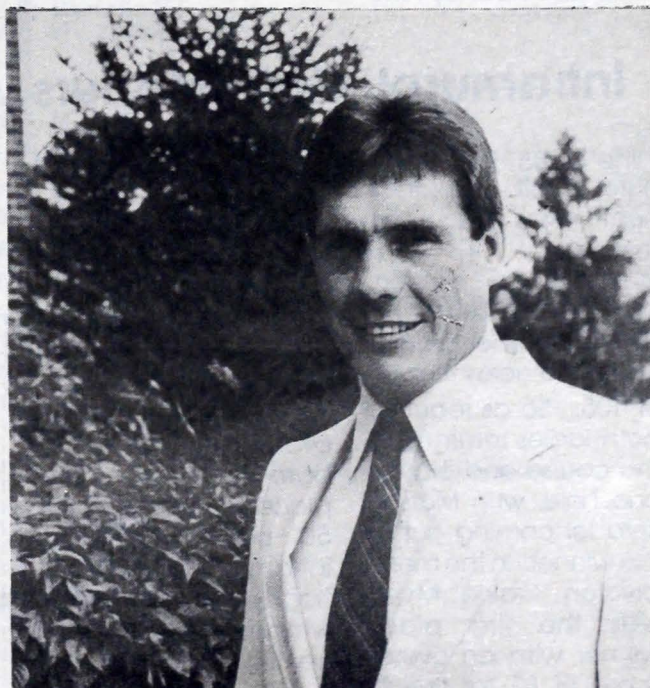
and an Ed. D. in 1984. While attending WVU Hunt taught several classes and later served as wrestling and assistant football coach at Central Preston High School.

## Salem Subdues Pioneer Scare, 42-20

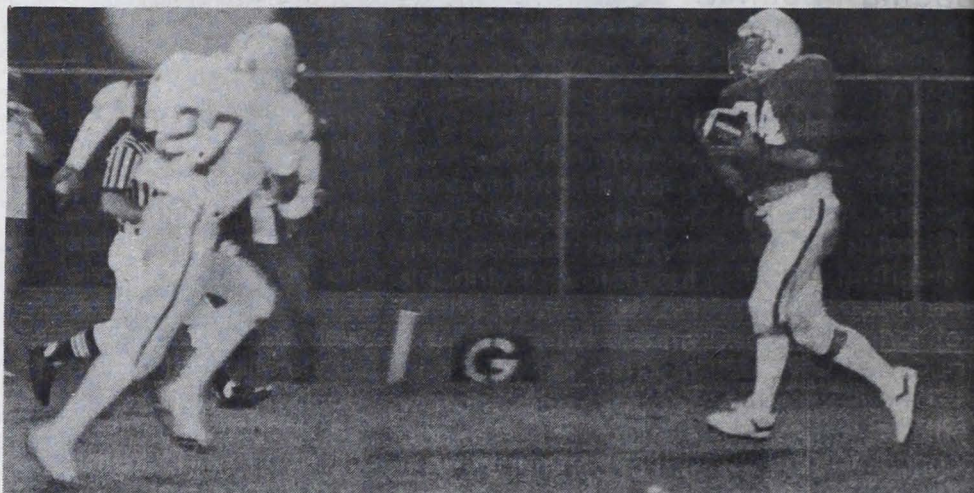
Glenville threw a scare into the nationally ranked Salem Tigers Saturday night by grabbing a 14-9 halftime lead. The surprising score did not last, though, as the Tigers subdued the Pioneers in the second half to win 42-20.

Quarterback Alan Fiddler was the big story for the Pioneers as he connected on 19 of 36 passes for 287 yards and three touchdowns in his first start of the season. Fiddler thrilled the fans at Pioneer Stadium as he hit Ron Lane and John Trew for first half touchdowns. It was the best game of Lane's career as he had eight receptions for 108 yards and two touchdowns.

Unfortunately for the Pioneers, the Tigers came alive in the second half. The running duo of Reggie Battle and Rodney Pitts

combined for 203 yards on 41 carries. Salem quarterback Jimbo Fisher also came alive in the second half as he ended up with 197 yards through the air.

In addition to Fiddler, there were several others who starred offensively as the Pioneers accumulated 318 total yards. Split end Jim Bird also enjoyed the best game of his career, catching six passes for a total of 116 yards. There was also the play of the offensive line which gave Fiddler very adequate pass protection throughout the evening. Even though they did allow five sacks, this is not bad considering that the Pioneers had 41 pass plays called by game's end. A few of the sacks came in the fourth quarter when the Pioneers were throwing

on almost every down. If the Pioneers can continue this type of air attack, they will certainly cause problems for their opponents the rest of the season.

Glenville's record is now 2-4 overall and 1-3 in the conference. They travel this week to Fairmont to take on a tough Falcon squad. Kickoff will be at 1:30 on the Fairmont campus.

## Jesse's Place

It was indeed an exciting evening at Pioneer Stadium Saturday night. The final score of 42-20 was simply not indicative of how well the Pioneers played. The game featured 891 yards of total offense, 533 of which came through the air. The fans certainly got their money's worth (or their student I.D.'s worth, if you will).

Glenville will be facing another tough opponent this week in the Fairmont Falcons. Fairmont is 3-2 overall and 2-1 in the conference. The Pioneers have defeated the Falcons each of the last two seasons.

The cross country team will be facing a tough West Liberty squad this Friday as they are gearing up for the conference meet. This dual meet will feature two of the favorites to win the conference. Davis & Elkins and the University of Charleston will also be challenging for the WVIAC crown.

With only one senior on the squad, the Pioneer harriers should continue to be very strong over the next few seasons. Guys like Jay Dawkins and Andy Jarrell are truly fabulous runners, and when ineligible transfer Danny Stowers joins the squad next season, three of the finest West Virginia high school runners of the 80's will be members of the Pioneer cross country team.

# Harriers Remain Unbeaten In Conference With Victory

The Glenville cross country team ran their conference record to 7-0 last Wednesday with a convincing 15-40 win over West Virginia Tech. The Pioneer's score of 15 was a perfect score and is the cross country equivalent to a shutout.

Freshman Andy Jarrell was once again Glenville's number one finisher, coasting through the five-mile course in a time of 31:07. The course, located in Oak Hill, is the same course where

the conference meet will be held in only three weeks.

Jarrell was followed by Phillip Anderson, who finished at 31:47; Jesse Skiles, in 31:58; Chris Shockey, in 34:15; and Berry Crutchfield, in 36:55. Glenville had the first five finishers, while Tech had the next five. Glenville did this without Jay Dawkins, who was on a field trip with the foresters, and Dave Antonik, who was ill.

Glenville will receive

a serious test this Friday when they travel to the northern panhandle to face West Liberty. The Hilltopper harriers have also been enjoying an extremely successful season. At a recent meet they defeated a tough University of Charleston team by 40 points.

Glenville is now 7-2 overall and 7-0 in the conference. They only have two meets remaining before the WVIAC meet on Nov. 1.

### JOINT SPRAINS AND/OR MUSCLE STRAINS

The Kyle Clinic reminds us that the proper therapy for strains and/or sprains uses the I.C.E. principal: Ice, Compression, and Elevation.

Ice, not heat, should be applied. Crush the ice and place it in a plastic bag. Apply to injury for 20 minutes every two hours, that's the Compression part - and you should use an elastic "ace" bandage to hold the ice pack in place, making it as tight as possible. Elevate the injured part above the level of the heart. This will decrease pain; aspirin or Tylenol may also be taken.

You should call/see a doctor if you are: unable to use the affected joint after ice treatment for 12 hours; in severe pain not relieved by aspirin or Tylenol despite ice treatment; at the time of original injury the affected part is greatly deformed; or if affected joint remains swollen after 12 hours of ice treatment.
