Swimming Classes To Be Offered

The Glenville State College Office of Continuing Education will be offering several American National Red Cross swimming and aquatic courses on Monday evenings, from 6:30-9:30 at the College pool. These Red Cross Aquatic Courses will be offered by John Hymes, who has over 20 years experience in teaching Red Cross swimming.

The ARC Water Safety Instructor Course will be offered on January 13 through May 5. Participants must be 17 years of age and have a current Advanced Lifesaving certificate. The 45 hour course will involve the teaching of the nine styles of swimming, current lifesaving-lifeguarding techniques, and the latest developments in water safety.

The ARC Basic Swimming Instructor Course will be offered to individuals 17 years of age and up who have basic swimming ability. The course will involve mastery of teaching the beginning elements of swimming as well as learning the nine styles

of swimming and the basic elements of water safety. The 20-hour course will begin January 13 and run through February 17.

This will be the last year the ARC will offer its Advanced Lifesaving Course since it will be replaced in August by a new Lifeguarding course. For those who wish to obtain the Advanced Lifesaving certificate, this 22-hour course will be taught from March 3 through May 5. Participants must be 15 years of age and have basic swimming abilities. Beginning February 24 and ending May 5 the newest ARC Lifeguard Training Course will be offered. Participants must be 16 years of age, have a current advanced lifesaving certificate and pass a precourse swim test on the first night of instruction. This course is geared to training people who wish to work as a lifeguard at a pool, lake, or a beach. In addition to lifeguarding skills, CPR, and basic

Brooks Remembered

On Friday, November 29, Sherman Brooks, a Glenville State College student, died as a result of a hunting accident. Below is a tribute to Brooks by one of his instructors and friends, David Sindle-decker.

"In the sweet by and by, . . ." Words that are recognized by many of us, and these words were the favorite text of Sherman Albert Brooks.

According to the Jeanette, Pennsylvania Police Department, Sherman died Friday, November 29 from self-inflicted wounds suffered in a hunting accident.

The passing of this young life is felt across this wintry campus. It sends a chill to the very soul of all who knew and loved Sherman. Brooks, as he was called by many of his friends, was a man of varied talents. He excelled in entertaining his friends, his classmates, and on-lookers at an air band concert. He gave himself freely to cheer up the dreariest atmosphere.

Sherman was a multi-faceted individual. A person who cared deeply about his fellow man. This is best exemplified by quoting a statement he wrote during one of our Thursday sessions. The quote goes like this: "My goal in life is to help others enjoy life, keeping mindful that the Lord is in my heart." That was Sherman Brooks.

I know that many GSC students saw Sherman as a "lady's man", a "BMOC", a "fun guy". He was all that; however, he was much more. He was a quiet young man searching for his place in this society of doers. He wanted to fit in, yet his desire was to be in front of a camera; as an actor, a newscaster, or a model. That was his dream. A dream that was beginning to take shape. Jesse Lilly had recently asked Sherman to audition as announcer for the GSC basketball games. As I talked to Sherman's brother, he said that Sherman had said how excited he was with the chance to entertain the supporters of GSC basketball.

As one instructor who was watching a young life mature, I will miss out Thursday sessions, I will miss his inspired speeches in class, and I will miss the snappy dresser leaning against a railing talking to an attractive GSC lady. I have known him for four months and I will remember Sherman Brooks as a loving person. I know he will watch out for future students who have dreams of a chance to be a success.

Did you know that Sherman's favorite movie was "My Favorite Year," or that his favorite holiday was Christmas, or his wish for mankind was "That there would be no more prejudices." It is true and more.

Sherman Albert Brooks died November 29, but he lives in the lives of everyone who knew him. I know "...we shall meet on that beautiful shore".

CHAIRPERSON SPOTLIGHT

This week's chairperson spotlight is A. Edwin Grafton. Mr. Grafton is the Chairman and Associate Professor of Forestry and Land Resources.

A native of Fayette County, Mr. Grafton received his M.S. degree from W.V.U. in 1963. He then taught at W.V.U. until he was selected to go establish a forest technician's school in Kenya, Africa. He remained in Kenya from 1965-1968.

Mr. Grafton then went to Iowa where he served as the extension forester. This involved meeting with farmers all over the state and aiding them with their problems. He came to Glenville in 1972. Except for a brief sojourn back to

Africa for the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations in 1982-83, he has been teaching here.

When asked what brought him to Glenville, Mr. Grafton revealed that he really enjoyed the smallness of the town, and the outdoors holds a great appeal for him.

Mr. Grafton takes his work home with him, too. He pays the forestry students if they help him plant his 10,000 Christmas trees annually. He also hires one student a year for summer help.

When asked what his future plans were, Mr. Grafton just smiled and said he was waiting for his next assignment.

Commuters Face Problems

Several times each semester voices of discontent with arrangements made for activities can be heard. The most frequently voiced discontentment points at the commuter's inability to make use of the activities offered by the college.

Many of the students, and faculty members have voiced the opinion that the commuters need a special representative on Student Congress. Any student may be elected to this organization.

As for activities being scheduled to fit the student or commuters individual schedules all of us know we can not be in two places at one time so we must decide our own priorities. This was the common thought of all who

were queried on the subject.

The third most stressed, issue, a place to study which would meet the many needs of the commuter was discussed at length by both Dr. Billips and President William Simmons.

President Simmons said, "The problems facing commuter students are being addressed. They are the same

problems which have always faced the commuter. While it may be true there is no specific place a commuter can find which will meet all of his requirements, there are places which can meet the needs of the moment, whether it be a quiet place to study (the library), or food and companionship (the student union), or if the student

needs both food and a quieter place to study he may use one of the empty classrooms. "I was a commuter for four years," said President Simmons, "and I found places to study, to rest, and relax. We have placed lockers in the Pioneer Center especially for the commuters to use that they do not have to carry their books all day. This should help some."

Dr. Billips stated about the same theme. He also attended GSC as a commuter. He said everything was being done that can be done at this time. When the new Fine Arts Building is completed more space will be made available in the Pioneer Center and perhaps a 24 hour study lounge can be opened somewhere in the building.

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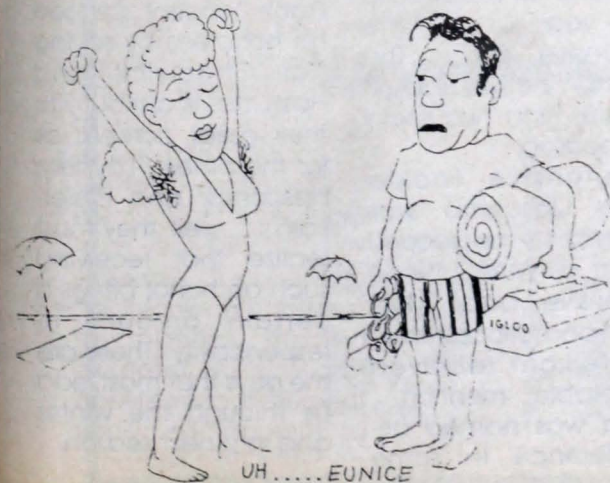


Campus Residents Sponsor Child

Pioneers Win Joe Manchin Tourney

For the first time in eight years, the hot Salem Tigers did not win the championship of the Joe Manchin Tournament. Back on November 22, the Pioneers of Glenville dethroned the Tigers in the tournament final by a score of 68-58.

Coach Gary Nottingham's squad opened the tournament by downing Union College 82-73 to set up the title game with Salem, a game in which the Pioneers avenged an earlier loss

to the Tigers in the Glenville End-Zone Club Tournament. Pioneer junior Matt Bullett continued his torrid early-season scoring spree, and was named MVP of the Joe Manchin Tourney. Teammate Rudy Watts joined Bullett on the All-Tournament team.

Nottingham, who is a strong advocate of strong defense, mentioned the squad's improved defensive play as a primary reason for their first two victories of the season. The Pioneers held both

opponents to around 40% shooting from the field, and the third-year coach called the Salem game his squad's best defensive effort of the year.

Nottingham went on to mention several positive aspects about his team's play. "I was very pleased with our guard play" he said, pointing out that Kirk Zellous played very well from the point. He also stated that the team shot much better, and there was a greater distribution in the scoring column.

Overall, the team showed a lot of character to bounce back from an 0-3 start. They will swing into the league schedule this week with a home game against WV Tech of Thursday and a road game at Concord on Saturday.

Chadwick and Layhew Named to All-WVIAC Defensive Squad

Defensive linemen Mike Chadwick and Donn Layhew have been named to the 1985 All-WVIAC defensive squad. It was Chadwick's third year that he has received this prestigious honor.

From his nose guard position, the 6-1, 211 pound Chadwick enjoyed a great career as a member of some excellent Pioneer defenses. He accumulated 228 career tackles and 17 career sacks. The native of Wayne, WV was the

Pioneers' leading tackler in 1984.

Layhew, on the other hand, achieved all-conference status in his first year as full-time defensive end. The Grafton native had 67 tackles and two sacks this season.

Defensive tackle John Lipscomb was named to the second team all-WVIAC, while defensive back Mark Hash and fullback Andy Pfefferkorn received honorable mention. Hash was named all-conference in some

capacity every season during his career as a Pioneer.

Pioneer head coach Frank Vincent praised his honorees by saying "for Chadwick and Hash, this is a tribute to their great careers; as for the others (Layhew, Lipscomb, and Pfefferkorn)... well, they must realize that receiving such an honor brings a certain amount of responsibility. These are the guys that must lead us through the winter and into next season."

Lady Pioneers Sputter To 1-3 Start

Tim Carney gained his 100th victory as coach of the Lady Pioneers over the break, but he was able to savor his achievement for only a short time as the squad lost their next three games. The team placed second in the Marietta Tournament and fourth in the Concord Tournament.

Rhonda Hicks pumped in 20 points and Janice Loughner pulled down 19 rebounds in the season opener as the Ladies defeated Washington and Jefferson 80-73. The squad played in spurts but led most of the way, leading by as much as twenty at one point. Marietta captured the tournament

championship the following night by downing the Ladies 83-73. Kim Creel led the Pioneers with 26 points and Tina Burkhamer contributed 19.

Just two days after the Marietta tourney, the squad travelled south to play in the Concord tournament. It was not a good trip as Bluefield downed Glenville 83-63 in the opener and West Virginia Tech defeated them 73-71 in the consolation game. The Tech game was particularly distressing because Glenville had a five-point lead and the ball with only a minute and a half left in the game.

Carney stated, "We

must cut down our turnovers and stay out of foul trouble." Foul trouble played an instrumental role in the Marietta and Tech losses, while the young team committed 57 turnovers in the Concord tournament.

One must remember that the team is very young, and it is still early in the season. Plus, as Carney notes, all three losses have been to tough teams. The Ladies resume action this week with three games; Tuesday night they host Concord, Thursday they will travel to West Virginia Wesleyan, and Saturday afternoon they will host Shepherd in a two o'clock contest.
