Election Results Released

The results of the Student Congress elections have been posted. They are as follows: president-Kenny Pack; vice president-Bryan Parsons; secretary-Kelly Haynes; treasurer-Danny Ray; parliamentarian-Gary Petty; senior representative-Jane Kelley; junior representative-Melody Melrose; sophomore representative-Rhonda Simmons; and senators-at-large-Cheryl Curry, Jimmie Dean, Allison Miller, Tammy Miller, Beth Oppe and Marilyn Sutton.

Kenny Pack, the newly elected GSC Student Congress president, wanted to make the student body aware of his hopes and intentions for the next academic year. His main concern is for "energy on Student Congress to work together in order to have the most impact on student issues." He cited the continuation of the "lunch-bunch"

committee. Another issue of great concern for the new president is the lack of participation by the students. He hopes to promote more SC activities to enrich campus life. Kenny Pack also relayed that he hopes more problems will be made known to the student government.

Pack says he would like SC to get involved in community service projects. He feels that, "If we work more closely with the community there might be a better relationship."

Another priority of the new administration is to obtain a recess for Martin Luther King's birthday. Kenny feels that he gave us so much in the way of peace and with his inspirational, "I have a dream. . ." Pack has, "... high hopes that a good strong relationship will continue between the students and the administration."

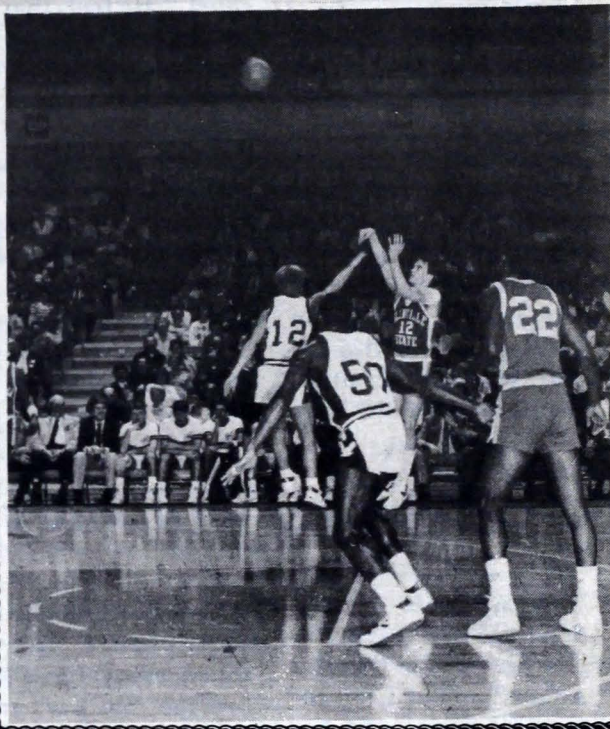
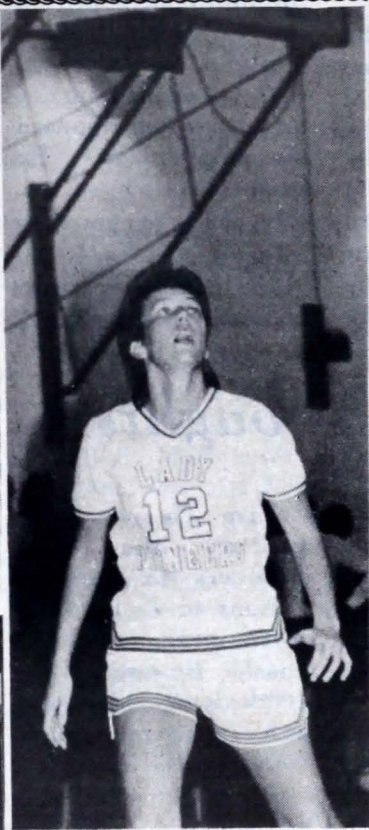

Nottingham Feels Pioneers Gained Respect at Tourney

The 1986 West Virginia Conference Tournament is now behind us, and it was certainly a memorable one for those of us from Pioneerland. Coach Gary Nottingham feels that the Pioneers gained a great deal of respect plus some overdue recognition last week in Charleston.

Even though Glenville lost both games in the final four, it didn't dampen Nottingham's satisfaction.

"Against Charleston, we were playing the number five team in the nation, and as far as the consolation game goes... well, I bet you there are ten other teams that would have

loved to have been playing against State on Saturday. We were the only team left that had to stay in a hotel," the young coach stated.

Nottingham went on to praise his players. He said, "I was very proud of the way our guys handled themselves both on and off the court." He feels that the tournament success was great for the players as well as the program.

In reference to the boisterous and in some respects controversial Pioneer fans, Nottingham had nothing but kind words. "I was very pleased with the enthusiasm of our fans. We had by far the best support among the

schools that had to travel," the coach said. "They did do a few things that were out of taste, but at least they were there, which is more than most of the schools could say. I hear things a lot worse than that from fans at some of our regular season road games," he stated.

Looking at the tournament overall, Nottingham feels that the tournament proved the Glenville season was no fluke. He also hopes that the tournament can be used as a springboard for next season. He summed it up by saying, "This year we got close enough to smell the roses; next year I want to taste the champagne."

Closing Tourney Thoughts

Glenville's guard Steve Morris was the recipient of the "Sparky Adams" award. He received the award for his outstanding play this season while having a severely injured shoulder.

Kenny Taylor joined the tournament 36-point club in Saturday night's consolation game. Taylor had 37 points against West Virginia State's Yellow Jackets. He also led the Pioneers in rebounding with 15, and in assists with 5. It was Taylor's last game as a Pioneer.

Tina Burkhamer had 109 points in the tournament for a 27.2 average. She was named to the All-Conference team. Janice Loughner, who tallied 59 rebounds in the tournament, was named second team All-Conference.

Gary Nottingham has led the Pioneers to two fourth place finishes in his three seasons as head coach. This year's squad finished with a 17-14 record giving Nottingham a 45-43 career mark.

Tim Carney has guided the Lady Pioneers to winning seasons in each of his seven years as head coach. He notched his 100th victory this season as his career record now stands at 114-53.

In the final regular season statistics the Pioneers placed two players in the top ten scoring leaders. Matt Bullett was in sixth place with 20.5 scoring average while Kenneth Taylor was tenth with an 18.9 average.

Men's Game Summaries

Here is the game-by-game summary of the men's 49th annual WVIAC Tournament for our Glenville State Pioneers.

GSC 74, Salem 58

Glenville blitzed the Tigers, 32-9, in the game's opening minutes and breezed from there. As usual, the Pioneers pulled off the victory with a strong defensive effort, and a strong game offensively from the men up front. Matt Bullett led the way with 24 points, while Kenny Taylor added 22 as the Pioneers coasted to a first-round victory.

GSC 58, Shepherd 55

Rudy Watts connected on a short jumper in the game's final seconds for the game-winning points. This hoop climaxed a tight see-saw battle. Shepherd darted out to a 32-25 lead early in the second half only to see the Pioneers bounce back to grab a 53-44 lead. The Rams, however, came back behind the long distance archery of David Green to tie it at 55-55. It was at this point that Watts hit his dramatic shot.

Matt Bullett led the Pioneers with 15 points and 11 rebounds while Kenny Taylor had 14 points and 10 boards. Rudy Watts and Paul Grier hit double figures with 10 points each.

UC 100, GSC 87

It was a gallant effort by the Pioneers, but they were unable to overthrow the nationally-ranked Golden Eagles. The Pioneers were down 40-35 at the half, but fell behind as many as 18 in the second stanza. Glenville did manage to cut the lead to eight at 88-80, but it was too late. Matt Bullett had 24 points, 12 of which came from four three-pointers. Rudy Watts collected seven rebounds.

WV State 117, GSC 99

Kenneth Taylor had an outstanding game in his final appearance as a Pioneer, but it was not enough to beat the Yellow Jackets. Taylor poured in 37 points and cleaned the boards with 15 rebounds, and also added five assists.

Unfortunately, Taylor's performance was overshadowed by State's James Washington who set a conference record by scoring 58 points. Despite the 18-point defeat, the Pioneers scored 67 points in the second half.

Will Record Books do Burkhamer Justice?

For me, it is really sad that I will never see Tina Burkhamer play again as a Lady Pioneer. For many of us, that near-flawless lefthanded jumpshot is a work of art that will linger in our memories for many years. Still, the end has come for Tina.

Sure, she set a Lady Pioneer record this year by averaging 24.5 points a game, and sure, she set a team record by scoring 638 points this season. But still, the record books do not tell the full story about Tina Burkhamer. After

Saturday's 33-point performance, she ended up with 1425 career points. This was 15 points shy of all-time leader Bunny Taylor.

Bunny Taylor was a great all-around player, but when it comes to sheer offense, I have to believe that this record belongs to Tina. Consider the following: Tina was not a starter for her first two seasons, depriving her of some valuable minutes. Tina just couldn't fit into the super talented lineup the Ladies had in those

years, so Coach Carney is certainly not to be chastised for this. Secondly, Tina missed out on two games this season because Bluefield, Virginia was unable to play their two scheduled games against the Lady Pioneers.

Tina said that she will really miss playing for Glenville State and would like to thank her mom and dad for attending every game. She is truly a fine young lady whom we will all miss.

Jesse's Place . . . at the WVIAC Tournament

In many ways, it was a special week in Charleston at the WVIAC Tournament. It was a week in which both of our teams reached the Final Four and for a few glorious days, saw our little town sharing the limelight of the Charleston media with the schools of the Kanawha Valley. This is a daily account of the week through the eyes of a Pioneer fan.

Tuesday, February 25-After Tuesday's final class, I headed down I-79 to catch the Lady Pioneers' first-round game which was to start at 6:30. Even though the West Virginia State campus is only a matter of minutes from the South Charleston Community Center, the crowd was almost entirely made up of Glenville fans.

Glenville came out smokin' and went up 24-2. They held on to down the Lady Jackets, 85-75, as all five starters hit double figures, led by Tina Burkhamer's 26.

After a quick trip to the Civic Center, we saw the Pioneers jump all over Salem's Tigers. The Glenville cheering section was extremely boisterous and, on occasion, a bit obscene. It was obvious Glenville was a better team, and it was also obvious that the Pioneer fans were the most supportive during first-round action.

Wednesday, February 26-Both Glenville teams were idle. During the Davis & Elkins-Shepherd game, Rudy Watts stopped by my seat and told me to pull for Shepherd because he wanted a rematch with the Rams. Shepherd won, 71-68. *The Charleston Daily Mail* had a quote that said, "The Glenville crowd was long in spirit, but short in vocabulary."

Thursday, February 27-This was a truly wonderful day. I arrived at the Civic Center around 12:30 and several Glenville fans had

already arrived. In *The Charleston Gazette*, Shepherd coach Bob Starkey commented on Glenville's fans yelling "We want Shepherd" at the end of the Salem game.

Somehow the officials failed to see that Glenville center Kenny Taylor was getting beat up inside. The game veered back and forth until Rudy Watts sank an eight-footer in the game's final seconds. Kenny Taylor added a free throw to ice the game as the Glenville crowd went berserk. That evening on the news, Watts and Coach Nottingham were interviewed.

That evening at the South Charleston Community Center, the Lady Pioneers put away Shepherd, 77-61. After the game, the voice of Glenville superfan, Eddie Mazzella, was all but gone. Besides UC, Glenville was the only school to put both teams in the Final Four.

Friday, February 28-I guess the fun had to end sometime. Our women fell to UC, 73-60, and our men were defeated, 100-87, by the Golden Eagles. As the Pioneers were leaving the court, I caught a glimpse of team manager, Ken Osborne, still sitting on the bench hanging his head. . . it pretty much told the story.

Saturday, March 1-Unfortunately, neither of Glenville's teams managed to win third place, yet it was quite an honor to see the Pioneers down there playing against the big boys on Friday and Saturday. Matt Bullett, Kenny Taylor and Tina Burkhamer were all named All-Tournament. Our teams made us proud.

Women's Game Summaries

GSC 85, State 75

Glenville sprinted to an early 24-2 lead and held on late to advance into the second round. The Lady Pioneers had a balanced attack as all five starters hit double figures, led by Tina Burkhamer's 26. Janice Loughner was a rebounding force, pulling down 24 caroms.

GSC 77, Shepherd 61

Tina Burkhamer continued to sizzle as the Lady Pioneers eliminated Shepherd's Lady Rams from tournament competition. Burkhamer tallied 27 points to lead Glenville

to a convincing 16-point conquest. Kim Creel had 17 rebounds and Niki Randolph had 10 assists.

UC 73, GSC 60

Glenville is now 0-22 versus UC in the history of our women's program. The Lady Pioneers jumped out to a 15-6 lead, but fell behind 27-22 at the half. They never caught up.

Tina Burkhamer had 23 points and Rhonda Hicks added 13. Janice Loughner added 12 rebounds.

Fairmont 80, GSC 74

The Ladies played a horrendous first half and were down 49-27 at the end of the half. They made a strong charge in the second half as Tina Burkhamer had 24 points in the period. Burkhamer had 33 in the game, and Janice Loughner added 16.

Lady Pioneer coach Tim Carney was pleased as his team reached the Final Four once again. Carney said after the UC game, "We really gave a good effort, but that's the way it goes." He stated in the *Charleston Daily Mail* that their (Glenville's) inability to contain Charleston's Regina Jeffries was the biggest factor in the defeat.

Carney also commented Saturday on the brilliant tournament performance of Tina Burkhamer. "What can I say about Tina. . . she has simply been outstanding all year," the Lady Pioneer mentor added.

The Ladies closed the season with a 15-11 overall record, fourth in the conference. Carney's career mark with the Lady Pioneers is now 114-53.
