Dr. D.Banks Wilburn. president of Glenville State College from 1964-1977, and later president emeritus, died, May 29 in a Huntington hospital.

Formerly dean of the Teachers' College at Marshall University, he was educated at Shepherd College, West Virginia University, and George Washington University.

Funeral services were held in Huntington on June 2 with interment in White Chapel Memorial Gardens, Barboursville. His wife, Vivian, two daughters, and a son survive.

As was evident by the emergency vehicles which were beckoned to the dorm, the alarm was


real, and not just a prank of some bored resident looking for a good laugh.

According to Ms. Laura Nauman, Pickens Hall House Director, the alarm was caused by a blown fuse on a transformer located across the street from Pickens Hall. The blown fuse caused a decrease in the power supply and burned an engine in either the air conditioning system or an elevator. The GSC and Glenville police were alerted, as well as the Gilmer County Fire

Young Pioneers to Open Saturday against Wesleyan


With a little more experience and much more depth, the Pioneer football team of Coach Frank Vincent appears ready to bounce back in '86. Glenville fell to 2-7 after going 12-5-1 the previous two years, but this year's squad is vastly improved in many areas.

This is in some ways a special season for Vincent himself, who is now the dean of WVIAC head coaches. With veteran coach Walter Barr now gone from Shepherd, Vincent is now the most experienced coach in the conference. This is his seventh season as the Pioneer mentor.

Vincent is hoping that an improved offense will be the sticket to improvement, since the Pioneers always seem to field a strong defense. The offensive line has some proven veterans in guards Tim Cugini and Jay Day, and tackle David Walker. Jeff Evans should also be a real plus at tight end.

Alan Fiddler will

probably be the quarterback behind this line. The junior out of Musselman High School saw part-time duty last season, and proved to be a productive passer. Vincent commented on the quarterback situation by saying, "I am really pleased with having a veteran like Alan, plus I feel confident with each of my freshman quarterbacks. It's really a good

Geary Assumes Cross Country Post

Lou Geary is out to rescue a sinking ship.

That sinking ship is the Glenville State College Cross Country team, of which Geary was hired to replace Robert "Butch" Hays at the Pioneers' helm right before the start of the new school term.

Hays left after two years as the GSC boss to accept a teaching position at a South Carolina high school. Enter Geary.

The 1979 graduate of Fairmont State College is faced with the task of returning GSC to Cross Country prominence after two lackluster years. The Pioneers ruled the West Virginia Conference with three consecutive team titles from 1981-83, but the past two years have seen finishes outside the top five.

Although Geary admits that he doesn't know much about distance running, he's no stranger to success. Last spring he led the GSC Track team to WVC Championship in his first year as coach. Geary earned "Coach of the Year" honors.

His list of individual accomplishments is long, too. While at Brooke High School, Geary was a state champion 167 pound wrestler. At Fairmont, he was a four-year letterman on the football squad, earning All-American honors at offensive guard his senior season.

Geary coached and taught at a Fort Lauderdale, FL school for two years, and he's currently beginning his fourth year as the Industrial Arts instructor at Gilmer County High School. He is the defensive coordinator for the GCHS football team.

"I'm excited to be taking over the Cross Country program," said Geary. "The sport goes hand in hand with track and we can consolidate the training, recruiting, etc."

This year's Cross Country squad will consist of eight runners. Also, two transfer runners who are ineligible for the current season will train with the team.

Jesse Skiles is the team's lone senior.
Juniors are Jay Dawkins, Danny
Stowers, and Tom Clark. Sophomores are Andy Jarrell and Chris Shockey. Freshmen are

Jim Kelly and Jeff Trippett. The two ineligible runners are Charles "Bubby" Dent, a talented transfer from the University of Charleston, and Ricky Harris, a transfer from West Virginia State College.

Skiles qualified for the NAIA National Marathon last year. Dawkins is coming off a highly successful summer of road racing. Stowers, who ran his first two yers at Park College (Mo.) and sat out last fall, won the WVC Steeplechase last spring. Clark competed for two years at Hagerstown (MD) Community College before transferring to GSC this fall.

Jarrell won the WVC 10-K track event to cap a successful spring season, and he was the Pioneers' top harrier last fall. Shockey performed well in the track middle distances in 1985. The two freshmen, Kelly (Berkley Springs) and Trippett (Parkersburg), come from strong track and cross country programs.

Glenville opens its season Saturday, Sept. 6 at Marietta. Other



Dr. and Mrs. Osbahr to Staff Kyle Clinic

With his wife Beth, a registered nurse, Dr. Al Osbahr took over the Kyle Clinic on August 1. He brings with him wellrounded training in family practice medicine, an abiding interest in sports and outdoor recreation, an active involvement in health-care policy making, and the one ingredient he says is most important of all-

caring.

Dr. Osbahr comes to Gilmer County as part of a novel Marshall University School of Medicine program which allows new doctors to combine actual medical practice with advanced medical education. Through the Combined Residency/ Practice Program, doctors practice for two years in a rural area,

complete a three-year residency program and earn a master's degree in community health.

Through this program, the Osbahrs will work closely with Dr. James Kyle and nurse administrator Diane Kyle, founders of the Kyle Clinic. addition, they will be able to call on the entire resources of Marshall University School of

Medicine's faculty and staff. Dr. Kyle, now a member of the Marshall faculty, said the Osbahrs are uniquely qualified to meet the health-care needs of Gilmer County residents.

In addition to caring for private patients at the Kyle Clinic, Dr. Osbahr will provide back-up for the Emergency Medical Service, work with the Gilmer County Health Department, care for Glenville State College Students, and serve as the team physician for Glenville State sports teams. "Wherever I'm needed, that's hopefully where I'll be," he said.

Dr. Osbahr said he especially looks forward to getting more experience in sports medicine and to working with "There athletes. certainly may be kids coming in with injuries and I've got to know how to treat them, and then how to rehabilitate them so they can get back to doing what they want to do, "he says.

Mrs. Osbahr will be doing "a little bit of everything" in keeping the practice going, she said. She added that she especially looks forward to working with patients who need detailed information on managing their health, and to working with college and community groups on preventing illness and injury.

Mrs. Osbahr brings to Glenville skills in working with many kinds of people and health problems: she has spent three years working with burn patients, and has also done private duty nursing and volunteer work with Hospice and the Red Cross.

"The clinic here in Glenville is available to so many people, and we're going to be involved in so many things, that working here is going to be very exciting and very challenging," she said.
