Board of Regents members viewed the presentation of design development drawings for the art and music center of the GSC

The original plan of the building has been revised somewhat to more realistically accomodate the financial situation of the State Board of Regents.

The building will contain a 500 seat theatre with a stage of 40' X 30' that can accomodate full symphonies and professional dance companies as well as any size theatre production. The stage will have full wing space and orches-

tra pit. The theatre section of the complex will house a scene workshop with


storage space, a costume workshop, a greenroom (gathering place for actors), office space, and men's and women's dressing rooms with showers.

The Art wing will feature a gallery off the main lobby, office space, a drawing/painting studio, and a print making studio.

The Music wing (two stories) will have six office/studios, piano lab, piano studio, twelve practice rooms, and instrumental rehearsal room, a choir/recital hall, a percussion room, a library and a large classroom.

Ground breaking could occur as early as this fall, with construction to commence early in 1987.

Borthwick Is New Dean of Teacher Ed.

A national search conducted by Glenville State College has resulted in the hiring of Dr. Paul D. Borthwick as Dean of Teacher Education. Borthwick heard of the teacher education program at GSC when he worked in Ohio and maintains that the reputation of the teacher education program at GSC was the main reason for applying for the position of Dean of Teacher Education.

Dr. Borthwick was hired in August of 1986 and came to Glenville in the same month. "I was impressed by the friendliness of the faculty, staff, and students here and their willingness to assist in smoothing the rapid transition to the area." stated Dr. Borthwick. He looks upon his new position as a professional advancement and an opportunity to expand his leadership ability in the field of teacher education.

Dr. Borthwick received his B.S. degree from Kent State University majoring in Recreation and Elementary His M.S. Education. degree in Elementary School Administration and his Ph.D. in Elementary Education were earned at the University of Akron. He has been published in numerous state and national educational journals and has conducted workshops in Ohio, Florida, Alabama,

and Mississippi. He has also been a speaker at national education conferences in 10 states.

Dr. Borthwick has 24 years of experience working in the education field. He worked from 1962 to 1967 as an

elementary school teacher. He moved into school administration as principal of the Charles Herberich Elementary School in Akron, Ohio, from 1967 to 1969. He served as an Assistant Professor of Education at Ashland College in Ashland, Ohio, from 1969 to 1973. He became Director and Associate Professor of the Reading Center in the Department of Curriculum and Instruction at the University of Southern Mississippi in Hattiesburg, Mississippi, in 1973. He served in that position until 1980 when he became Chairperson and Professor of Elementary Education in the Division of Curriculum, Instruction, Leadership, and

Research at Delta State University in Cleveland, Mississippi. He held that position until August of this year, when he accepted the position of Dean of Teacher Education at

Asked what he felt he would like to accomplish at GSC, Dr. Borthwick replied, "I want to maintain the quality program which exists and expand it in whatever areas possible."

"I am excited about the opportunity to provide leadership," he said, "and I am eager to represent Glenville State College locally, state-wide, and nationally in teacher education."


Pioneers Fall to Wesleyan in Opener, 10 - 2

Glenville's Pioneers opened their grid season Saturday night with a 10-2 loss to the WV Wesleyan Bobcats. The game featured 11 turnovers and 223 yards in penalties as the Pioneers lost their first opener in five years. It was the Bobcats' first victory in an opener in 19 years.

Wesleyan went up 3-0 at 2:45 of the first quarter on a 30-yard field goal by placekicker Dave Jaeger. Glenville countered soon after as Wesleyan punter Doug McMillen watched a snap sail over his head and out of the end zone for a two-point safety. Bobcat fullback Scott Mallison closed out the scoring in the fourth quarter with a one-yard plunge for a touchdown.

Glenville had four different opportunities to put points on the board in the second half, but came away empty handed. In the third quarter, the Pioneers materialized an impressive nine-play drive to inside the Bobcat 10, but the drive ended with a fumble. In the final period Wesleyan fumbled the ball away to Glenville three different times inside their own 30. An interception by Wesleyan and two missed field goals later, the game was all but over.

Statistically, the game was a little closer. Glenville held a 17-13 advantage in first downs, while Wesleyan slightly outgained the

With an impressive showing at a five-team meet in Marietta under their belts, the GSC cross country team now prepares to face West Virginia Conference competition for the initial time this season.

Glenville finished second in the Saturday meet at Marietta's Cisler Estates. Case Western Reserve, an NCAA Division III team, won with 21 points by placing six of the first eight runners. GSC's team score was 59, followed by Muskingum-61, Marietta-106, and Kenyon-120.

Sophomore Andy Jarrell led the Pioneer charge with a second place individual placing in 26:00 on the 4.6-mile course. Junior Jay Dawkins clocked 26:33 for fifth position. They were the only two runners to break up Case's stranglehold on the top eight spots.

Other GSC runners were: Tom Clark, 13th in 27:20; Chris Shockey, 19th in 27:56; Jeff Trippett, 26th in 28:22; Jim Kelly, 34th in 29:32, and Jesse Skiles, 35th in 30:03. A total of 48 runners began the race.

On the women's side, GSC frosh Lori Barker placed 10th out of 30 runners. Her time for the 3.3-mile course was 25:04.

Pioneer mentor Lou Geary was fairly satisfied with his team's performance. "I don't think we have the strength right now for a hilly course like at Marietta, but we'll be all right," he said. "We know where we are now and what work we need to do to get ready for the conference."

"I was especially surprised with the way Jeff Trippett ran. He had a good race," Geary continued. "All in all, I enjoyed my first cross country meet. You can go to a meet and get out of there in an hour and a half and not spend all day like with a track meet."

GSC runs against WVC schools in a meet sponsored by West Virginia Tech at Oak Hill Saturday.



You can always count on the Pioneer football team to possess a fine defense. Throughout the 1980's they have consistently fielded strong and physical defensive linemen. Despite Saturday's 10-2 loss to Wesleyan, it was once again a fine performance by the Glenville defense.

John Lipscomb is now in his fourth season as a GSC defensive tackle, and has been a major cog in some great Pioneer defensive machines. Last year John was named to the second team of the All-WVIAC team.

Lipscomb says there are several factors that have led to the success of the GSC defense as well as his own personal success. "We have always had a good defensive philosophy from our coaching staff since I've been here, and we have also had the players to make it work." Lipscomb said.

From an individual standpoint, the big

defensive tackle feels his success stems from past teammates: primarily former all-conference performers Mike Chadwick and Dave Darst. "Chad and Dave really helped me those first couple of years. I value a great deal what they have taught me," John stated.

Lipscomb and fellow senior Donr. Layhew have obviously continued the GSC tradition of outstanding defensive linemen, and Lipscomb foresees this tradition continuing in the years to come. "Bubba Hill comes from my high school (Clarksburg Liberty), and I am really expecting big things from him. He has been progressing well and I will always be pulling for him," Lipscomb said. Liberty High has certainly provided GSC with some talented linemen.

John has set several goals for the 1986 season. Team-wise, he wants to go out with a winning season. Individually, he hopes to accumulate 80 tackles and 10 sacks. Lipscomb commented on his lofty goal by saying "The team is the main thing. I know that if I can reach my personal goals, I will be helping our overall team defense."
