Drug Store Opens Downtown

When Lori Plumber was growing up, she remembers going to the drug store for a soda on Friday and Saturday evenings. It was an exciting time of the week.

Now that she owns and operates her own pharmacy, the recently-opened Gil-Co Pharmacy on Main Street, Plumber says she "would eventually love to have a soda fountain" for her customers.

The November 3 opening of the new establishment was the culmination of a dream for the 32-year-old Keyser native. Plumber received a two-year associate degree at Potomac State in 1974, and

she completed a three-year pharmacy program with a B.S. degree from WVU in 1980.

"I've wanted to be a pharmacist for a long time," said Plumber, who was employed at Rite-Aid for the last six years before striking out on her own.

Plumber hopes to offer a more personalized service to the community and college students alike. Customers can sit and have a cup of coffee while waiting for their prescriptions to be filled.

Gil-Co will offer prescription drugs as well as a wide variety of merchandise out by Steve Keenan front. And, if something isn't in stock, Plumber will place orders. Also, she plans to offer delivery if needed in town and by mail if needed out of town.

Current hours for Gil-Co Pharmacy are 8:30 a.m.-5:30 p.m. from Monday through Friday and 8:30 a.m.-2:00 p.m. on Saturdays. The store is closed on Sundays. College students, faculty and staff are encouraged to check out the services.

If anything is needed after working hours, Plumber can be reached at her home phone, which is listed in the Glenville directory.



I would like to raise a question related to "enrollment fees" for GSC student teachers. Student teachers serve the elementary and secondary school of the state without charge; why are student teachers charged full-time enrollment fees?

Essentially, student teachers are not on-campus for their final semester; yet, they are assessed the maximum tuition and fees. The "student union and activity fees" are wholly unwarrented for student teachers and these fees should not be tied to the semester hour (12) course load for student teachers.

On the average, the supervising faculty conducts less than ten (10) clock hours of student teacher observation in the public schools; therefore, it is difficult to determine how and/or what the College is providing the student teachers. supervising teacher does receive some insignificant remuneration for exercising supervisory responsibility over the student teacher. Moreover, the travel and per diem costs for the GSC supervisors are probably closely managed and held to a minimum.

Last, I want to quote from the "philosophy" stated in the GSC Catalog: "A major focus of effort within the College long has been, and. continues to be, upon the preparation of teachers who serve in the elementary and secondary schools." Given the nation-wide criticism that has been directed toward public school teachers, the College's "focus" has become somewhat diffused.

Talented Pioneers Will Provide Excitement

Basketball season is just around the corner, and the 1986-87 edition of the Glenville State Pioneers is a talented and certainly an exciting team. Fourth-year coach Gary Nottingham calls this group his most talented squad yet.

Leading the way this season will be senior cocaptains Matt Bullett and Rudy Watts. They are both coming off strong junior seasons in which Bullett received second-team allconference honors and Watts received honorable mention. Both men have scored over 1000 career points and in all likelihood each will finish the season in top 15 career rebounders and scorers in Pioneer history.

Nottingham calls Bullett and Watts his "foundation" and says that each man could be among the top ten players in the league. Their role as team leaders will be counted upon heavily as the Pioneers progress through the season. They are the first two Pioneer performers to play their entire careers under Nottingham.

Joining these two on the front line will be junior John Harris. Harris is a player blessed with great athletic ability, and the team will be looking to him for a great deal of production. Nottingham spoke of Harris by saying, "John showed signs last season of unleashing his potential. If we can get some consistency out of him he could very well be the glue that pulls our team together."

In the back court, veterans Paul Grier and Joe Gandee will be handling the basketball. Grier started last season as a freshman in the twoguard position and played extremely well. He shot 52% from the floor and proved to be a poised performer. "Paul is so valuable to us because he does the little things so well, plus he provides strong defense," Nottingham said. He is looking for Grier to continue doing the little things and get him a little

more involved in the offense this year.

Joe Gandee will be on the point and his role appears to be pretty clearly defined. Nottingham says that he is not looking to Joe for points, but primarily to take care of the basketball and give the team some solid defense. The coach feels that last season's experience has given Gandee confidence and proved to him that he can play well on the college level.

Jon Ginn is the only other returnee from last season. He is a red-shirt freshman who still practiced with the team last season. Ginn has learned the system well and should benefit from this experience even though it is not game experience.

Several freshman will be playing some key roles off the bench, and Nottingham is very positive about the potential of the freshman crop. Some will be counted on to perform right away.

James Williams is one whom Nottingham is looking to for some immediate help. "James is very talented and comes to us from an excellent program. He is an aggressive type of player and has been impressive in both of our scrimmages," Nottingham said.

Van Darling and James Glover are two other freshman who could become valuable back court players as the season progresses. Nottingham praised each man's athletic ability and said that they could provide help once they adjust to the system. Darling has been slowed by an injury of late.

Dewayne "Duke" Austin, John Jividen, Mike Hughes, Drew Taylor, Todd Smith, and Tim Collins are the other freshman. Austin has some excellent inside ability according to Nottingham, and is a strong rebounder. His improvement during the season could warrant him more playing time says the coach.

Jividen is a player blessed with some offense skills. Nottingham calls him the purest shooter of the

newcomers, but he has been slowed by a nagging ankle injury.

Hughes is a local product from Wirt County. He has a fine shooting touch for a big man, and Nottingham says that he just needs to make the adjustment from Class A ball to play on the college level.

Taylor's major asset is his athletic ability. He runs well and jumps well. Smith will not be eligible until January. Nottingham feels that Todd could help when he becomes available. He is a good shooter and plays good defense.

In looking at the season as a general outlook,

Nottingham is very optimistic. Nottingham elaborated on the squad by saying, "so far this has really been a

good group of guys to work with. They are hard workers and believe in what we are doing. I would be very disappointed if these positive habits leave any during the season because I have confidence that they can continue with this good frame of mind."

Nottingham cites five points that are the keys to a successful season. They are:

1. Solid seasons out of Matt Bullett and Rudy Watts.

2. Steady improvement out of Paul Grier, John Harris, and Joe Gandee.

3. The freshman must be able to contribute for there to be any depth at all.

4. Togetherness.

5. Avoid the 3 D's: dissention, disqualification, desertion. The team will be opening play next week at Rio Grande. This will be followed by the Joe Manchin Tournament at Salem on the 19th and 20th.

Nottingham also says that the team should be exciting for the fans. "I feel that whether we win or lose, the fans will enjoy what they see," Nottingham said.

In Nottingham's threeyear career, he has guided the Pioneers to two fourth place finishes in the tough WVIAC. When asked about wins and losses this season, he simply replied, "All I ask is that the guys play hard and get better. I feel that if we can accomplish that, everything will take care of itself."

A Salute to Pioneer Veterans



Randy Rhoades Sophomore Alpha, OH HT - 6'3 WT - 200 PUNTING YDS. AVG.

Randy has been the Pioneer punter this season and has turned in some fine performances. He possesses a powerful leg.

He was recruited as a guard as well as a punter, but a broken ankle spoiled his freshman year. He first punted this year in the State game and got off a booming 61-yard boot. Last week against Tech he averaged 40.6 yards a kick.

Randy says "I am gaining more and more confidence each time out." At this point his hang time is consistently around 4.2 or 4.3 seconds, but he says he would like to get it near 4.5.

Jay Day Junior, Vienna, WV HT - 6'2 WT - 225

Jay Day is enjoying his first season as a regular on the Pioneer offensive line. The junior from Parkersburg Catholic was a key special teams performer during his





first two seasons. He is still

on the Pioneer punting and kickoff return teams. Jay says that this has been

an up and down season for him personally, but that he has improved of late. He is optimistic about how the line has come along. "With this year of experience behind everyone, we should have a very solid line next season," Day said.

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
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
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
