Matt Bullett connected for 37 points Monday night to ead the Glenville State Pioneers to a 92-83 conquest of WVC foe Davis and Elkins in Elkins.

Glenville took a nine point ead in the first half and Davis and Elkins got no closer than four. The Pioneers led by four at the half with a 50-46 cushion. The hosts tied the score at 52-52 with 18:20 left. After eight lead changes, the Pioneers took the lead for good on a Paul Grier jumper to leave the score at 81-79 with 2:04 left.

Ruly Watts connected for 22 markers and snared a game high 10 rebounds. John Harris hit 6 for 7 from the field and two free throws to end with 14 markers. Paul Grier finished the game with

13 tallies and four assists.

### Fairmont 67 **Glenville** 62

The Pioneers went into the Feaster Center on the campus of Fairmont State College with revenge on their minds. It seemed they might gain their revenge as Glenville held a 32-30 halftime lead, although they were shooting poorly. The Pioneers were unable to get on track in the second half. however, and the Fairmont Falcons were able to capture a 67-62 victory.

The poor shooting from the field kept Glenville from taking advantage of 22 Falcon turnovers. Another factor was the Falcon defense which held Matt Bullett to a 16 point performance.

John Harris played well connecting for a game-high 20 points. Rudy Watts contributed 13 points, snagged 17 rebounds, and dished off six assists. Paul Grier netted eight markers and handed out six assists.

Glenville turned an early deficit into a 55-28 halftime lead as the Pioneers dominated the Tigers in Salem Saturday night. The big lead allowed Coach Nottingham to substitute players freely in the second half. The Pioneers went on to win 94-77 raising their record to 13-12 overall and 11-9 in conference play.

Matt Bullett paced the Pioneers with 38 points followed by Rudy Watts with 23 markers and six assists. Paul Grier and Todd Smith each connected for 10 tallies. John Harris hit the nets for six points and John Jividen had eight rebounds to go along with his four points. Mike Hughes and Tim Collins rounded out the scoring with two points and one point respectively.

### **Control Room Improved**





area at GSC. He feels that increased demand for teachers will lead to growth in the Education Department. He also cited increased interest in GSC's Forestry and Land Surveying programs as a factor in increased enrollment.

Another area for growth, pointed out by Dr. Simmons, is the Nicholas County Center. Currently, there is a lack of resources to greatly increase enrollment at the Center. However, Dr. Simmons feels that if funds were available to double the budget and the building space, enrollment at the Center could be doubled.
