Governor Moore to Participate in Groundbreaking BOR to Hold Meeting on GSC Campus

The West Virginia Board of Regents will hold its regular monthly meeting on the Glenville State College campus next Monday and Tuesday, April 6, 7.

On Monday at 4 p.m., Groundbreaking for the Art and Music Building will take place in front of the Robert F. Kidd Library, at the building site on Court and High Streets. The Honorable Governor Arch A. Moore will participate in the ceremonies along with Board of Regents president William E. Watson, President William K. Simmons, Chancellor Thomas W. Cole, Donald

McIntyre, architect with Hoblitzell, Daly, McIntyre and Danny Ray, SC president. Governor Moore, Dr. Simmons and Mr. Watson will speak.

The Glenville State Band, under the direction of Mr. John McKinney, will provide music for the occasion. McKinney's Percussion Ensemble will play at a private dinner for the Board. A full color rendition of the facility will be available at the groundbreaking. The entrance will feature the college seal set in tiles.

A formal conveyance of Rohrbough Field ownership

to Gilmer County Board of Education will be a feature of this program, also. The Board of Education will be represented by Mr. Rex Hardman, Gilmer County Superintendent of Schools, and Mrs. Jeanne Kennedy, president of the Board of Education.

A reception will be held at the Alumni House following the groundbreaking ceremony. Dr. Simmons said, "I hope students, faculty, staff and community will all attempt to be present. I consider this a historic event at Glenville. I look forward to the dedication as an

opportunity to express our appreciation to members of the Board of Regents governing board, especially to Mr. Watson and Governor Moore for their support of the building and of GSC. The Board recognizes the needs of the college and its benefits to central West Virginia." Dr. Simmons noted that the facility will meet the educational needs of central WV by providing culture and education to people involved in the future of the area. He calls the benefits incalculable as demonstrated by the need throughout the years.

The Board will meet with

the faculty, students and classified staff from 9:30 - 10:45 a.m. on Monday. Faculty will meet in the Verona Mapel Room; students in the Little Theatre; with the classified staff in the auditorium. At 10:45 a.m., Administrative Staff will meet in the Verona Mapel Room. A work session from 1:30 - 4 p.m. in Verona Mapel Room is open to the public.

Four or five of the Board's monthly meetings are held on college campuses. Its last meeting on Glenville campus was four years ago.

be around 9:30. There will be a D. J., Vern/Vernon, and a keg. Those attending the dance only will pay \$1; those who wish refreshments will pay \$2. I.D.'s will be required for the latter.

It is rumored that financial aid other than PELL, GSL, NDSL, SEOG, CWS, etc., is available! (See article elsewhere in this issue.)

Is this just a "scam" - or is it a legitimate option for those of us looking at a gloomy financial picture of college costs?

Because of structural changes, warnings of shortages were announced by GSC's Financial Aid Director August Kafer earlier this month. Last week he explained that, even though major cuts in federal funding might not be felt until 1988-89, we're already experiencing an approximate 27% drop in work study funds and a greatly restricted Guaranteed Student Loan program. Because of changes-GSL is now strictly need-based-many students applying for GSL's are finding their maximum loan eligibility greatly reduced.

If aid is available, preferably grants,

awards and scholarships that *don't* have to be repaid, I for one want to know about it! To quote the article, "Every year, over \$150 million in financial aid goes unused because no one applied." Can you believe that? Is there anyone on the GSC faculty who believes it?

I'm looking at possibly \$4,000 in loans that I'll have to begin repaying after graduation. That doesn't produce an anticipatory thrill to think about. I need all the help I can get.

If you are as concerned as I am over the financial aid reductions/changes, DO something. Write your congressmen; give them your status at GSC, your financial posture, and protest proposed major cuts in federal funding of financial aid. This time, don't wait for "George" to do it.

Dr. Richard Hoover, assistant superintendent of the Upshur County Schools, was the guest speaker at the March 2nd Student Education Association meeting. Dr. Hoover related to the group the concerns that school administrators have in the selection of personnel for the school system. Dress reflects the attitude a teacher candidate has toward himself and speech is representative of the candidate's ability to be a model of standard English. Overall grade point averages are significant, but most important is the student teaching grade. It is important for an employer to

know something about the attitude which the prospective teacher holds toward children, subject matter, and colleagues. School administrators will be making very cautious judgments about a candidate and his credentials, because, once employed, it is extremely difficult to get an undesirable teacher out of the system. Dr. Hoover was explicit and candid with the students concerning their futures and supported many of his contentions by sharing excerpts from the W.Va. School Law Code. The meeting was quite beneficial and enjoyable.

Foust Recital Held

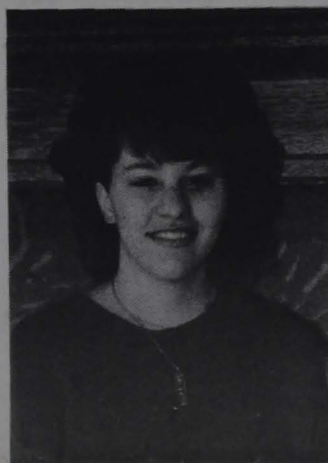

Golfers Take 4th in GSC Invitational

Glenville State's golf squad had a strong showing last week in their own invitational. The Pioneers finished fourth out of fifteen schools in the event which took place at the Oxbow Country Club in Ohio.

Highlighting Glenville's performance in the tournament was freshman Bob Sowards. He was the tournament's runner-up medalist with a 78-67-145 tourney. His second round score of 67 (four-under par) was a school record for one round, breaking the old record of 68 held by former Pioneer Terry Crislip.

Sowards was followed by solid performances from Mike Dynda (73-74-147), Jeff Wine (74-75-149), and Jeff Bennett (76-76-152). Rounding out the scoring was Danny Wassick (82-84-166), and Parker Long (84-83-167). Mike Sowards enjoyed a 72-78-150 tourney, and has apparently earned his way into the top five. If he had been included their last week, Glenville would have

won the tournament. Bill Forrest carded a 119 over 27 holes and Mark Wanstreet had a 133.

Pioneer coach Tim Carney is pleased with the squad's performance right now, and cites competitiveness within the team as a key to improvement. "Mike Dynda, Jeff Wine, and Jeff Bennett performed strong and consistently. Bob (Sowards) played super. He only had two bad holes in the entire tournament," Carney said.

This week the Pioneers will be participating in two tournaments. Monday and Tuesday they traveled to Fairmont and this Friday and Saturday at Marietta. Carney is planning to use some different combinations in these tournaments. His objective is to give everyone a chance to play and hopefully get a better feel of who his top six will be. Carney summed matters up by saying "we have some guys pushing each other, and that is what I'm looking for. We should have a pretty strong golf team."

Bullett Named All-American

Glenville's Matt Bullett continues to rake in the post-season accolades, and his last one may very well be his most fulfilling. Last week Bullett was named Second Team NAIA All-American. The honor climaxes what was a super senior season for the Martinsburg native.

Some players are truly spectacular, while others are noted to be consistent. This year, Bullett was "consistently spectacular," connecting inside as well as out in leading the Pioneers to another WVIAC Final Four appearance. Bullett finished the year as the league's scoring leader with a 31.7 average. He also cleaned the boards to the tune of 6.8 rebounds per game, dished out 58 assists, and exhibited a much improved defensive game.

Bullett said that he was "surprised" at the selection, but is very pleased. When asked about his pro prospects, Bullett replied

that he expects to get drafted but is unsure of his chances. He has begun a weight program in hopes that added strength will enhance his potential for the NBA or CBA.

Bullett finished 3rd on Glenville's all-time scoring list and 8th in rebounding. His dazzling array of moves

will be missed by Pioneer fans everywhere.

Since last week was a big week for our golf program (The GSC Invitational with a record-setting performance by freshman Bob Sowards), this would be a good time to look at the success of the Pioneer golf program. Tim Carney's tenure as coach has produced some glory years and indeed, the numbers are impressive. Over the last eighteen years the golfers have captured seven league titles, and have never finished lower than fourth. The 1985 team ended up 9th in the nation, which was the best WVIAC finish in this half of the century.

Sowards' performance last weekend is a good indication that Pioneer dominance will continue for years to come. He is only a freshman, so it must be a pleasant thought for Carney to think that he will have this power hitter for three more years.

Men Tracksters 2nd at Marietta Quad; Women Third

Glenville State's track team performed well at Saturday's Frail Relays in Marietta, missing victory in the four-team event by a mere two points. Huntington College (Indiana) nosed out the Pioneers to successfully defend their victory from 1986.

Glenville's Bubby Dent was named the outstanding athlete for the meet with 18½ points. Dent won the 5000-meter run (16:11) and anchored the winning 4x1600 meter team.

Danny Stowers set the meet record in the steeplechase with a time of 9:37.8. Stowers, who went to nationals in that event last year, was followed by teammate Andy Jarrell at 9:38.2.

Glenville captured a total

of six event victories in the meet. They won the javelin with the trio of Scott Hardinger, John Lipscomb, and Gordon Stevens. Hardinger's winning throw

was 160 feet. GSC won both the long jump and triple jump as Lloyd Willis took individual honors in each. Glenville's other long jumpers included Shannon Parsons and Casey Hess, while the triple jumpers were Hess and Marcus Alcinder. The winning 4x1600 unit consisted of Andy Jarrell, Jim Kelly, Tom Clark, and Bubby Dent.

Glenville's women came in third with 21 points. They won three events in the meet, all of which came in the relays.

GSC women captured victories in the sprint medley, distance medley, and the 4x400. Only five girls made up these relay teams: Lori Barker, Diana Farley, Andrea Davisson, Monna Beamer, and Tammy Pence.

Knowledge of The Facts is a Defense Against Aids

Speaker Educates Public

On March 3, 1987, Tuesday evening, Mr. David Brangan was the guest speaker in the auditorium at GSC. He spoke on the subject of AIDS, hoping to inform and educate everyone about the life threatening disease.

Mr. Brangan is the AIDS coordinator for the W.V. Department of Health. He is originally from New Jersey, but has lived in W.V. for the last 15 years. He has a B.A. in Political Science and a Masters in Health Education from W.V.U..

Mr. Brangan became an educator for AIDS, basically because there are no known cures for the disease. A lot of research is being done to help find one, but until then he wants to inform people about the ways to prevent AIDS, and to help those who have contracted it.

AIDS...Acquired (not inherited), Immune Deficiency (a breakdown of the body's defense system, producing susceptibility to certain diseases) Syndrome (a spectrum of disorders and symptoms). You've been hearing more and more about it in the news -- and it concerns everyone. But if you have all of the facts, it's not really that dangerous.

AIDS is not an easy disease to get. There are no proven cases in which it has been transmitted by casual contact of any kind. Objects touched or handled by people with AIDS are not "contaminated" and need not be feared. There is no need for concern about the safety of swimming pools, whirlpools, saunas, etc...because of AIDS. AIDS is transmitted by intimate (sexual) contact and by exposure to contaminated blood, through transfusion or needle.

The total amount of AIDS cases reported in the U.S., are 31,036. Out of these cases, 16,000 have already died from the fatal disease. Since March, 1984, 22 persons in W.V. have contracted AIDS. So far, 16 of the 22 persons

with AIDS are known to have died. The age range was from 20-68 years old. The figure is expected to rise to nearly 180,000 in five years.

Where did AIDS come from? It is believed that monkeys from Africa, (who were infected with the disease) had been brought to the U.S.. The humans were then bitten and the process began. Some of the first cases were reported in 1979 in Haiti. It was then transferred from Haiti, to Miami, and then to San Francisco.

The largest group of people infected with AIDS, have no symptoms and are not presently ill. Since they have not symptoms, these people can only be identified by a blood test. All people with a positive blood test, must regard themselves as carriers of the AIDS virus; whether or not they have the symptoms, they can still transmit the infection and should take appropriate precautions to protect others. About 5-20% who test positive will eventually get AIDS.

There is an experimental

drug being used, produced by Burroughs Wellcome Co., of Research Triangle Park, N.C.; called Azidothymidine (AZT). It is being used in several medical centers to treat AIDS. It is not effective on everyone and along with the drug there are some serious side effects. It is still waiting to be approved by the FDA.

What are the symptoms of AIDS? Many of the early symptoms of AIDS are similar to those of common minor illnesses, such as the "flu."

What distinguishes AIDS is the severity and duration of the symptoms: 1) persistent, excessive tiredness for no apparent reason 2) recurring fevers, chills, or night sweats 3) unexplained weight loss of more than 10 pounds 4) persistent enlargement of the lymph nodes (glands) in the neck, armpits, or groin 5) sore throat that does not go away, or white spots or patches in the mouth 6) a new persistent cough 7) easy bruising or unexplained bleeding from any part of the body 8) persistent diarrhea 9) pink or purple bumps or blotches on the skin.

Continuing Ed. Offers Classes

The Glenville State College Office of Continuing Education is offering several classes that begin the first week of April. A "Rocketry" class for children ages 8-12 will be taught by Joe and Kevin Evans in the Science Hall, Room 107. This class will meet on 3 Saturdays, April 4, April 11, and May 2 from 9:30-11:30. The first two class sessions will involve the construction of the rockets.

Newton's Laws of Motion and rocketry concepts will be discussed. The rockets will be launched on May 2. Students will use elevation instruments to determine the height achieved by the rocket. Angular and linear measurements will be made, and height calculations will be made via computer.

An adult class entitled, "Is A Will Important? What is the Probate Process in West

Virginia?" will be instructed by Phil Reale on Monday evening, April 6 from 6:30-9:00 p.m. in the Science Hall, Room 107. The purpose of this class is: 1. To provide insight as to the need and necessity of having a will; 2. To learn the basic elements of a will; 3. To give a basic outline of the probate process in West Virginia.

A "CPR Certification" course will be taught by

Gerald Wessels for three evenings in April. The class will meet in Room 208 of the Physical Education Building on April 6, 7, and 8 from 6:00-8:30 p.m. This course will emphasize basic life support techniques. Upon completion of the course, the student will receive a CPR card from the American Heart Association.

Teresa L. Wayman will instruct a class titled "The Kitchen Garden". The class will emphasize growing fresh vegetables for home use. Teresa writes a weekly column for the *Glenville Democrat* entitled, "The Kitchen Garden - Growing,

Preserving, and Preparing Food for the Table." Some of the topics that will be discussed are: Be a gardener - not a small-scale farmer, natural gardening practices, improving clay soils, compost piles explained, natural pest control, raised bed gardens, gardening in containers, extending the gardening season with cold frames and coverings, "intensive" gardening techniques, and growing gourmet vegetables. Participants should meet in the Science Hall, Room 205 for 5 Wednesdays, April 8 through May 6 from 7:00-8:00 p.m. This class will be geared for persons 13 years old through adult.

Moola? Dinero?...Money!

If you're concerned about having to sell the family homestead to pay for college expenses - stop shaking and read on. There are billions of dollars - yes, billions - available in financial aid for prospective and enrolled college students. All you need to know is where to look.

And you do not have to be a straight "A" student, a violin virtuoso or even an all-state defensive tackle to qualify for a scholarship award. There are literally thousands of scholarships offered yearly by churches, corporations, philanthropic and professional groups, etc. and every year, over \$150 million dollars in financial aid goes unused because no one applied.

Was great-great grand-daddy a confederate soldier? If so, there are colleges offering scholarships for which you might qualify. You can't find a confederate

flag in the closet? Well, were you ever a paperboy? Some newspapers offer as much as \$3,000 in scholarships to ex-paperboys. Or perhaps you were a part-time grocery store clerk? If so, you are a candidate for a grant from the National Association of Retail Grocers.

The list of available funds goes on and on. It includes \$5,000 awarded in national competition by General Motors to 11-20 year-old males for auto body designs and models. Or \$5,000 from Betty Crocker to its "All American Homemaker of Tomorrow" awardee. Other scholarships and financial awards relate to speaking or essay contests, to students of Armenian, Syrian and Lebanese descent, or to children of railroad employees. Sure, some of these are long-shots, but you will never know unless you apply.

On Tuesday, March 24, a handful of students and faculty called together a meeting concerning the return of WGSC, the college radio station.

Mr. Dennis Wemm from the speech department, and Dr. Robert Como from the English department, offered their assistance in getting WGSC back on its feet again. Mr. Wemm also volunteered his service as advisor or co-advisor. Jackie Roth was chosen as chairperson.

A format of station positions that would be needed in order to begin operation was presented. These positions will be held by those students who are interested and can handle

the job. Such positions as station manager, program director, announcers, engineers, and sales managers are some of the offices that are needed to get a good organized beginning.

Mr. Ron Roth, who attended Glenville at the time the radio station was first aired, also attended the meeting. He was glad to see the interest in starting WGSC again and offered his assistance. After he looked through the broadcasting room and checked the equipment, he stated that "a little organization and a lot of cleaning is all that's needed."

It is also possible for students to earn as much as 3

credit hours by involving themselves in the broadcasting field. If there is enough interest in the reorganization of WGSC there will be classes offered next semester that will prepare those students who want to get involved.

The first half of the semester would be devoted to learning the basics of running a radio station. What it takes to fill such positions as station manager, production manager, or announcer, and the work and time it involves. The second half of the semester will involve the reopening of WGSC on the airways. Each student could get one hour of air time where the student will be announcing, disc-

jockeying or doing an interview or a show.

Mrs. King's Mass Media class will also be offered next semester. This class can be used for Speech 408 and Journalism 420. It, too, will offer hands-on experience not only in radio broadcasting but also audio-visual broadcasting.

Any students interested in the return of WGSC radio station or in a class in the broadcasting field are welcome and encouraged to attend the next meeting on Tuesday, April 7th at 7:00 p.m. in the Student Congress meeting room. More detail and information will be given out. A survey of what types of music the students

listen to and when they listen to the radio the most will be taken and the results reviewed at the meeting.

If you have any questions, helpful hints, or information, or are just interested, please contact Mr. Wemm, Dr. Como, Jackie Roth, or Danny Ray.

Please note: Due to the fact that the last meeting was called together only by word of mouth, some students who may have been interested did not know about the meeting. In this case, no station positions other than advisor and chairperson will be filled until a steady involvement from the student body is shown.

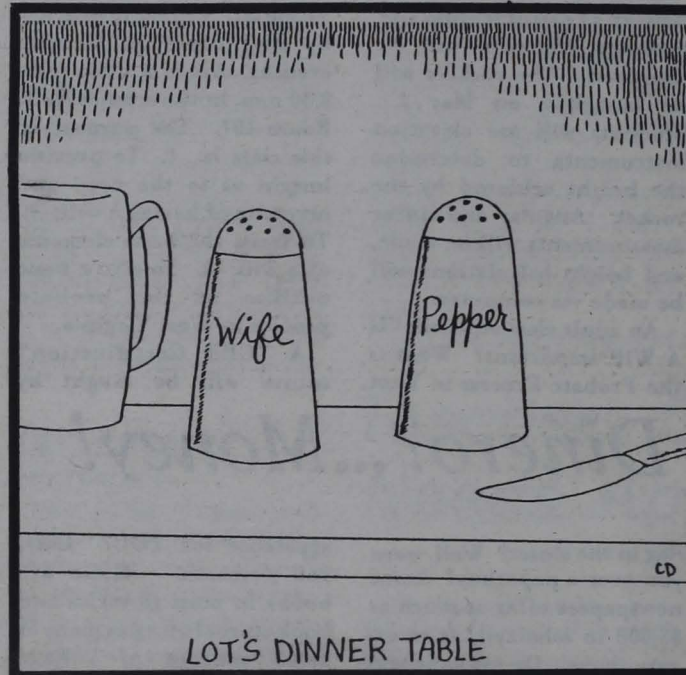
While gaining insight into problems and proposing solutions to fraternity
