1987 Alumnus of the Year Lanham to be Honored

Paul E. Lanham, receiver coach for the NFL Detroit Lions, has been chosen 1987 Alumnus of the Year. Selection of Mr. Lanham occurred during the February 7 meeting of the GSC Alumni Executive Council.

Lanham was born in Advent, Jackson County, WV.; attended Jackson County schools; and graduated with a B. A. in Mathematics from GSC in 1954. He completed a Masters in Educational Administration from the University of Delaware in 1961. Mrs. Lanham is the former Helen Holmes, a teacher, from Sissonville in Kanawha County, WV.

The Lanhams are the

parents of four children: Tamara, 26, a production assistant of Channel 9 TV in Washington, D.C.; Steve, 23, a student at Fresno State; Randy 21, a student at University of Delaware; and Gary, 16, still at home.

Paul Lanham began his professional career as a teacher/coach for 5 years at Ripley, WV. After completing his M. A. from the University of Delaware, he coached one year at the University of Dayton. After Dayton, Lanham served as the offensive coordinator for 8 years at Colorado State University. He moved from Colorado to a 2 year stint as the ends - special teams coach for the University of Arkansas.

Young to Receive the 1987 Alumni Service Award

G. Bayard Young, former research chemist and teacher, has been selected to receive the 1987 Alumni Service Award.

Mr. Young was born in Glenville, the son of Guy Bell and Lovie Fling Young. He is married to the former Mary Grace Mullen of Latrobe, PA. Mrs. Young was a cashier for a loan company. She now spends her days as a

housewife.

The Youngs have two children: Guy Bayard, II, 43, is an electronics engineer in Richmond, VA. Mary Judith, 37, lives in Martins Ferry and is a TV/radio, publicity, script, and children's book writer.

Bayard Young attended Glenville Normal, Teacher's State College from 1914-1932. He was a student through all but the last GSC name changes. He also earned diplomas and degrees from the Normal School, the Grade School, the Academic Course, and the teacher's school - graduating with an AB in science and math.

Young spent 1933-34 and 1936-37 studying graduate chemistry at WVU. He obtained his Pennsylvania teaching certificate during the summer of 1969 at Slippery Rock College.

Snow lay on the ground and a mixture of rain and snow was falling at 3 p.m. before the scheduled 4 p.m. ceremony. In addition, Governor Moore was detained in Charleston on state business. Young's employment history reads like the history of two different men one in industry and one in teaching. His industrial career includes wing shop woodworker for Fokker Aircraft (Glen Dale, WV); research chemist for American Cyanamid Co. (Latrobe, PA) and Stupakoff Ceramics (also Latrobe); and Chief chemist for Acme Die and Machine Co. (Latrobe).

The teaching career goes from Widen, West Virginia, grade school in 1932-33, to Troy, WV High School to New Castle High School, New Castle, PA to science and math at Gilmer County High School, retiring in Glenville in 1973.

From his 1973 retirement until summer of 1986, he was the Parkersburg News correspondant for Gilmer and Calhoun Counties.



FOR STATE FUNDING IN WEST VIRGINIA

To the Editor:

In reference to your article of April 1 (April Fool's Day), "Moola? Dinero?...Money!, I must agree that "there are billions of dollars - yes, billions - available in finanacial aid for prospective and enrolled college students." However, the bulk of this money is made up of federal and state financial aid (Pell, Supplemental Grant, National Direct Student Loan, State Grant, Guaranteed Student Loan and College Work-Study), which a student can apply for by using a financial aid form that can be obtained for free at the Financial Aid Office. And yes, there is approximately \$150,000,000 of aid that goes usused each year. \$150,000,000 consists mainly of students who should, but do not apply for Pell Grants.

I cannot disagree with the fact that some very restrictive scholarships go unused during the year. Probably a computer financial aid search program would be useful in finding which restrictive scholarships you might be eligible for, but would it be "cost effective" as they say in the last line of the article? Isn't it interesting that the article did not direct students to the local Financial Aid Office for information?

From my experiences with

these programs, a student from Nicholas County invested his hard earned money in one of these schemes. He was guaranteed a return of five programs he could apply for only to find out that these programs are the Pell Grant, State Grant, Supplemental Grant, National Direct Student Loan, Guaranteed Student Loan and College Work-Study. I have spoken with other students who have used these programs, and all have been dissatisfied with the amount of information they receive for the amount of dollars they have to invest. So, let the student beware!

The groundbreaking for the new Fine Arts Building was postponed indefinitely Monday. A major reason for the postponement was that Governor Moore was not available to participate in the ceremony. The governor is busy struggling with the legislature about the new budget. The budget outlook seems to be gloomy as the past week's weather.

Early in the legislative session Governor Moore promised to make this year a 'year of education' in West Virginia. So far, education has been the topic of quite a bit of news this year. However, the news has not been of increased teacher salaries and great improvements in education in the state. Instead, there are numerous school systems within the state laying off teachers and cutting programs in a desperate effort to make ends meet.

I feel this situation is totally unacceptable.

The governor and the legislature should look at the current budget proposals and do what

is necessary to make this a true 'year of education' in this state. It's time they look to the future when planning the budget, instead of scraping together a budget at the last minute in order to keep things running at the present.

Education is vitally important to the future of this state. By not meeting the needs of education, the politicians are not only hurting the state at present, they are condemning the state to more of the same problems for years to come.

I hope Governor Moore will keep his promise to make this a 'year of education' in W. Va. and that the legislature will co-operate in the effort. If this means raising taxes, it should be done now rather than waiting for the problem to grow worse.

By the way...I wonder how much the legislature's extended session will cost the state's taxpayers and if it will be worth what it costs.

Golfers Finish 2nd of 15 at Marietta

Glenville's golf team participated in two tournaments last week and received some solid play from several people, especially in Friday's snowy round in Marietta, where the Pioneers placed second in a field of fifteen schools.

In both of last week's tournaments, play was cut to only one round due to snow. Both tournaments allowed the team standings to remain as if it was a one-day event.

At the Fairmont tournament in Morgantown, the Pioneers finished fourth out of thirteen schools even though the scores were not that impressive. Bob Sowards was the Pioneers' top man with an 83. He was followed by Mike Dynda (85), Mike Sowards (86), Jeff

Bennett (88), and Jeff Wine (91). The top four scores were counted to figure the team scoring. Coach Tim Carney commented on the low scores by saying, "The scores were not that impressive, but then again everybody else brought in similar scores." The low score for the day was 79.

Glenville followed this up with an impressive performance at Marietta. The Pioneers ended up second in a field of fifteen, and Jeff Wine was medalist with a super round. Despite the winds and the driving snow, Wine turned in an incredible 69. He was followed by Mike Dynda (76), Bob Sowards (79), Jeff Bennett (82), Bill Forrest (84), and Parker Long (87). It was a "six-take-five" tournament, and the

Pioneers tallied a team total of 390. "We played very well, especially against the horrendous conditions," Carney said.

Mike Dynda has tasted success and the thrills of national competition. Back in 1985 he was a member of the Glenville golf team that ended up ninth in the nation. He now wants a return trip to nationals, and he feels that Glenville has the personnel that can get the job done this year.

Dynda's rise to prominence has been an interesting story and is one that should inspire young athletes everywhere. Mike began playing golf at age 14, a relatively young age as far as golfers go. Success was not easy early on for Mike, and his scores remained on the upper side of 100. He failed to make his high school varsity team as freshman (at St. Marys High School in Pennsylvania). He did manage to get into a match though, and shot a notso-handsome 123.

Improvement came between his freshman and sophomore seasons. That summer, his scores plummeted from the 100+ range to the mid-80's. From there his career blossomed; he was St.

Mary's number one during his junior and senior years, and was also a starting defensive back and kicker for the school football team.

After high school, Dynda granted Glenville a recruiting visit, but was not sold on the idea of becoming a Pioneer golfer. He chose Lock Haven University (PA) instead, since it was closer to home. As a freshman, he was Lock Haven's number one man and shot consistently in the 70's.

Dynda then decided to go ahead and give Glenville a shot and made the transfer. He arrived on GSC's campus back in the fall of 1984. At that time, Dynda sported a very long curly mane that extended to his shoulders, quite unlike the clean-cut look that he now possesses.

The 1985 season proved to be a memorable one for Dynda as well as the Pioneers. Glenville captured the conference title, and then proceeded to the strong showing at the NAIA National Tournament that was held in Arizona that year.

Dynda himself was the number four man on that squad, and ended up as the 38th individual in the nation.

He missed being an All-American by only 10 strokes (an average of 2½ per round).

Even though the Pioneers slipped to third in the league last season, Dynda continued to excel individually. He earned all-conference honors and finished as the number four individual in the league.

Now Dynda is a senior, and once again the Glenville team is loaded with talent. He

Dent Achieves Stardom, Despite Personal Tragedies

Life has never been easy for Bubby Dent. His twenty years on this earth have been marked by one tragedy after another, yet he has fought back hard. Dent has been one of West Virginia's best track athletes ever.

Bubby's saga began back in the fourth grade. It was then that he lost his mother ... as a victim to a drunk driver. Needless to say, he had to make a tough adjustment, and his father was there to help him along. By the time he was in the seventh grade, the youngster was getting his life back together again, but another event jolted his young life...that year his father was shot to death. Young Bubby was left saddened and lonely...and apparently with nowhere to turn.

At this time, he turned to sports as an outlet, and things began to work out. As a ninth-grader he led DuPont Jr. High to an 8-0 record and the Kanawha County Championship. He also ran a 2:06 800-meters to establish a county mark. All of this was just a preview to what he would accomplish in high school.

As a sophomore, he won the state title at 800-meters in 1:57.3. He repeated this feat his junior year by running a 1:54.2, a state record in that event that still stands.

He won the 800 again his senior year (1:54.2), but also won the 1600 (4:19, only a second off the state record), and finished third in the 400 (49.9). He was anchor man for DuPont's state champion 4x800-meter unit, and was high point man in the state meet. For his efforts that year, he was named West Virginia Track Athlete of the Year, and was named to USA Today's All-American Team.

Dent was captain of Du Pont's football team as a senior, and the team very nearly made the playoffs... getting knocked out on the

season's last weekend. He was the Kanawha Valley's all-conference tight-end that season.

From there, Dent took his running prowess to the University of Charleston to perform for the Golden Eagles. He had an immediate impact as UC won the 1985 WVIAC cross country title and Bubby earned all-

conference honors. That winter he finished 13th in the nation at 800 meters at the NAIA Indoor Nationals. In track, he won WVIAC titles in the 800, 1500, and 5000 meter runs. His 3:53 time in the 1500 ranked him third in the nation and his 1:56 800 was a conference record.

Bubby came to Glenville after UC dropped the running programs. When asked why he chose Glenville, he replied, "There are several reasons why I chose Glenville. I wanted to be on a good team, and I really liked the guys up here. Training up here sure beats training in the heart of the city, and the track here is simply the best in the state. Coach Geary kept in touch all last summer and eventually convinced me that Glenville would be best for me."

Just last month, he represented GSC at the 1987 Indoor Nationals and missed being All-American by less than a second. He has already set the GSC 800 meter record and is really looking forward to next fall's cross country season. "We could be in the top 10 nationally," Dent commented.

Unfortunately, Bubby's life was again struck by tragedy over the winter. His best friend through childhood, Bobby Roach (also a teammate on Du Pont's state champion 4x800 team) was involved in a wreck and left paralyzed. Again, the accident was caused by a drunk driver. Dent spoke of Roach by saying, "Bobby had a similar childhood to me, and was just getting his life straight...it's just not right."

As a GSC Pioneer, Dent is continuing his superstar career. A career he says that is a dedication to his deceased father. Bubby concluded, "I know my dad would be proud of what all I have accomplished. I'm still working hard every day for him...I know he is up there watching down on me."

Monique Johnson Named All-WVIAC



Spring Football Nocida Looking for Commitment

This week I had planned to do a position-by-position look at the Pioneer gridders during spring football drills. First year coach Lou Nocida chose not to do it this way, though, primarily because he had not been able to work with the defense as of yet. He also cited the fact that he has only been with the program for five weeks.

What he did give me though is an interesting assessment of the Pioneer program as he views it at this point. "Right now Glenville is the septic tank of football. We are all a bunch of t---s floating around in that tank, and as coach, I am the biggest one. Some of our guys have been down in it for so long, that they have forgotten how bad they stink," Nocida said.

The "septic tank" he was referring to is a lack of commitment that he views as the reasoning behind Pioneer woes.



president of the WVU Phi Lambda Upsilon Chemical Fraternity, President of Gilmer County Historical Society, Latrobe Rotary Club, New Castle Engineers Club and PTA, and the First Baptist Church in Glenville.

Honors that Mr. Young is proud of include the 1985 Community Service award from the Gilmer County Farm Bureau. He was one of the Acme Die and Machine Co. munitions staff which earned the first Army-Navy "E" in 1942 for solving production problems with 20 mm detonators. Bayard developed fine explosive patents for American Cyanamid Co. He is extremely proud that the Gilmer County High School yearbook staff dedicated the 1973 Gilmaurora to him and Mrs. Rosalea Miller at their retirement

Between 1973-1986, Young had various historical and news articles published in The Parkersburg News and the Glenville Democrat many with photos.

While a student at GSC, Young was active as president and co-organizer of The Chemical Club, member of the college orchestra and various dance bands. He participated as performer and/or stage hand in many plays and musical programs, sang many solos and obtained permission from Mr. E. G. Rohrbough for the first dances on campus in 1925.

Young lists the following outstanding events in his life since graduating from GSC: Getting married in 1940; obtaining jobs in the difficult 1930's; photography - such notables as President F. D. and Mrs. Roosevelt, Amelia Earhart, Ruth Nicholas (early aviatrix), Jennings Randolph and many other political figures; organizing the collection, assembly and publication of the Gilmer County Bicentennial Biographies in 1976; and making a movie of the firing of 75,000 lbs. of dynamite in a Pennsylvania limestone quarry.

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
