President Simmons Presents Governor's Order to Students

The term "standing room only" came to life in full color last Thursday, April 9, at 3 o'clock as approximately 500 GSC students filed into the auditorium to listen to what President Simmons and other administrative personnel would report concerning possible deletion of one week from the Spring class schedule and of summer school.

Danny Ray, Student Congress President, made his opening statements to a full house. Dr. Simmons stated that there were more students present than he'd ever known to attend a meeting before.

Dr. Simmons said that "we still have some serious economic problems" and gave some possible reasons for the state's economic dilemma. However, he reported that shortages would *not* prevent the building of the new Art and Music Building. This statement was greeted by a

round of applause, and Dr. Simmons added that the groundbreaking *may* take place on May 9.

Dr. Simmons then read an executive order from the office of Governor Moore which had been issued that day. In essence, the order rescinded the cost-cutting measures that the Board of

Regents had proposed implementing when they met here at GSC on Monday and Tuesday, April 6 and 7. The order meant that there would be no furloughing of faculty or staff, and further, that there *would* be summer school classes.

Dr. Flack announced that there would be two full terms

GSC Campus Reaction to Regents' Decision

On Tuesday, April 7, it was announced by the Board of Regents that colleges and universities all over the state, would be taking a five day break sometime before the end of the present spring semester, and the first term of summer school would be cancelled.

The reactions to this announcement were of wide variety. Most students were delighted with the news that they would be getting out of five days of books, professors and homework. "It will give me a chance to get a good start on my tan!" one student was heard saying. An extra week added to the summer vacation was o.k. with them.

But some were quite concerned with the cut. Because they had decided that the days would be taken from the end of the term, it was going to push finals up a week. This, in turn, would rush the plans of the professors and some lessons

would be cut short, or completely dropped.

Students staying in the dorms were concerned with getting back money they had already paid for room and board. "We could get back almost \$100...and I could use that right now!" a student commented.

And what about graduation? A rush order would have to be called in for caps and gowns (which was what every other college or university in the state was going to have to do) and graduation announcements would have to be changed. For many graduating seniors, there would have to be a major change in family plans.

Last week was a week full of mixed emotions. No one really knew what to think or how to react to it all. But, as announced last Thursday, no reaction is necessary, for the action by the Board of Regents was overruled by the governor.

On Saturday, April 11, eleven GSC students were recipients of Alumni Foundations awards. Both monetary awards and certificates were presented during the Alumni Banquet in the Pioneer Center Ballroom. Jack Stalnaker, Elizabeth Turner, Mary Bland Whiting, and Virginia West made the presentations.

Lisa Jan McHenry, a graduating senior, was the recipient of the Willa Brand English Award. This award, established in memory of Miss Willa Brand, is given to honor an outstanding English student.

Mark E. Jenkins, a junior, received the Toth Science and Math Award. This award, established in

memory of Frank L. Toth, is presented to the student who exhibits outstanding skills in science and mathematics.

The Ratliff Physical Award, named for Carlos Ratliff, teacher and coach at GSC from 1946 until his death in 1962, was presented to Steven L. Harold. Mr. Harold, a senior, received the award for outstanding achievements in physical education.

Kevin G. Cain, a senior, was awarded the Somerville Education Award for his achievements in the area of teacher education. This award was established by Dr. and Mrs. Delmer K. Somerville in memory of his mother, Christina Lockhart Somerville.

The Eberle Awards are

named in honor of Fred Eberle, who was instrumental in the establishment of the forestry technology programs at GSC. There are two awards in this area. James R. Skinner, a senior, was the recipient of the Eberle Land Surveying Award; and Berry Allen Crutchfield, a senior, received the Eberle Forestry Award.

Lee Robin Hood, a graduating senior, was the recipient of the Peterson Library Award for excellence in the field of library science. This award is named for Mrs. Dorothy Peterson who was assistant librarian at GSC at the time of her death in 1962.

The Wagner Science and Math Award went to Ronald

Dean Jones, senior, for excellence in science and mathematics. The Wagner Award was established in memory of John R. Wagner who taught science and math at GSC for 37 years.

Elizabeth Turner presented the Turner Science and Math Award to James Summers, a junior, in recognition of his scholarship in science and math. This award was established in honor of Dr. Byron Turner, who served as professor of chemistry at GSC from 1946 until his retirement in 1976.


Cleo Mary Morgan received the Whiting Art Award. Ms. Morgan, a senior, received the award for excellence in art. The Whiting Art Award, named

in honor of Charles S. Whiting, a 1912 graduate and an artist, is funded by Miss Mary Bland Whiting.

This award was established in the Fall of 1983 in honor of Miss Virginia West, who served as Professor of English and Chairwoman of the Language Division at GSC. These awards are made each year to honor outstanding students in their particular field of study.

"It Seems to me..."

The Board of Regents shocked everyone last week, when they announced that the current semester would be shortened by one week and that the first summer term would be eliminated. Many students were delighted with the prospect of an early vacation, while others were terrified by the idea of trying to get all their work done with one less week in the semester.
 Many students thought they should get a refund on their tuitions, dormitory rooms, and meal tickets for the week that was to be taken off the semester. The news also struck the faculty, staff, and administration who stood to lose a week's pay.
 Fortunately, Governor Moore issued an executive order on Thursday directing the Board of Regents to use the interest money earned on their accounts to continue the current semester and to have the first term of summer school as planned.
 At first glance, the sequence of the week's events makes the Board of Regents appear to be the villains and Governor Moore seem to be the hero of the people who would suffer from the Board's cuts.
 But if you look closely, you should realize that the Board was only taking the actions they felt necessary to meet the Governor's

demand for budget cuts. The Governor, by refusing to acknowledge warnings about revenue shortfalls, contributed to the problem by waiting until the last quarter of the fiscal year to announce the budget cuts.
 Apparently, the issue has been settled for now. However, there are some problems with the plan. First, is the state going to refund the money being used to keep the state's colleges and universities open to the Board of Regents' accounts? Second, if the governor can order the use of this money, will the legislature take this into consideration for next year's budget and decide to cut funding for higher education?
 Hopefully, the Governor and the Legislature will call a truce in their battle over the budget, where education is concerned. When the Legislature reconvenes to discuss the budget, the members need to consider the plight of higher education in this state. The budget for the next fiscal year should be sufficient to allow for the upgrading of higher education, including pay raises, and should refund the money taken from the Board of Regent's accounts to keep the schools open.



Tracksters Down Rio Grande 101-47; Women Bow 69-51



Freshman Tammy Pence is more than just a basketball player. She proved her overall athletic skill last Friday by breaking three GSC women's track records in a 69-51 loss to Rio Grande. In the men's division, Bubby Dent cracked two GSC records as the Pioneers cruised to a 101-47 victory.

There was gorgeous weather for a track meet Friday and the records fell like dominos at Pioneer Stadium. Pioneer Danny Stowers started things well for GSC by cruising to a victory in the 10,000 (6.2 miles) with a 33:27. It was a Pioneer sweep as Stowers was followed by Jay Dawkins and Mike Cutright in the event.

High-point man for the men was senior captain Lloyd Willis who raked in a total of 16½ points. Willis scored victories in the long jump, triple jump, 100, and anchored the winning 4x100 team. John Lipscomb tallied 13 points with victories in the shot put and javelin while taking second in the discus. Pioneer Gordon Stevens claimed victory in that event by edging out Lipscomb.

Dent set GSC records in the 800 and 1500 meter runs. His 1:57.4 clocking in the 800 broke Mark Price's old record of 1:59. He is also Glenville's indoor record holder in that event. His 3:59.9 1500 surpassed Larry Taylor's old record of 4:03. He ran anchor on Glenville's





winning 4x400 unit as well.

Glenville's other event victories came from the sprinters. Calvin Coleman won the 400 with a 52.06, while Shannon Parsons blazed the field in the 200 with a 23.2. Parsons also finished second in the long jump and 100.

Though not winning their events, Scott Hardinger and Andy Jarrell performed well. Hardinger winged the javelin 154 feet while Jarrell ran the 5000 (3.1 miles) in 15:28. Jay Dawkins' 34:58 put him easily in second in the 10,000.

In the women's division, it was the Tammy Pence show for Glenville. Pence won four events, setting school records in three. She set the javelin record with a throw of 99'5", the triple jump mark with a jump of 32'10½", and set a mark in the 100-meter

hurdles with a time of 16:14. Pence scored 25¼ of Glenville's 51 points.

Freshman Lori Barker dominated the distance events by winning the 800 and 1500. She edged out teammate Diane Farley in the 800 with a 2:35. She cruised to a win in the 1500 at 6:00.3. Glenville's other individual victory came in the 400 where Andrea Davisson ran a 1:04.2. Glenville's 4x400 team won in 4:28. The unit consists of Lori Barker, Diane Farley, Tammy Pence, and Andrea Davisson.

This week, the Pioneers will be traveling to California St. (PA) to run in their invitational. The meet will be Saturday, and is the final event before the Pioneer Invitational.

Golfers Win at WVIAC Southern Regional



Glenville State's golf team continued to enjoy success last week. The Pioneer linksters ventured to Wooster, Ohio and finished fourth out of twenty schools. The event was Wooster's 19th Annual Parlor Invitational.

Individually, the Pioneers turned in some stellar performances. Two Glenville golfers placed in the top 20 while senior Jeff Bennett materialized a hole-in-one in the tournament.

Senior Mike Dynda finished second in the 54-hole event by shooting an overall total of 231. This was just two shots off the pace set by Ohio Wesleyan's Scott Walker. Mike Sowards joined Dynda in the top 20 by shooting a 239 to come in 16th place.

Veteran Danny Wassick finished as Glenville's number three man with a 242. Wassick has had a rough

go of things early this season and maybe he will relocate his stroke in this tourney. Wassick was followed closely by freshman Bob Sowards with a 243. Rounding out the Glenville scoring were Parker Long at 249, and Jeff (Aceman) Bennett at 250.


The Black belt meeting will immediately follow. This tournament is designed to accommodate people of all ages and karateka of all ranks and styles.

New Seats Installed in Gymnasium

The GSC Maintenance Department recently spent \$54,649.00 for a set of Interkal sculptured seats for the gymnasium in the P.E. Building.
