Higgins to Speak at Commencement

Robert E. Higgins will be the featured speaker at the 113th commencement ceremony at Glenville State College. The exercises are scheduled to begin at 11:15 a.m. on May 9, 1987, in the Physical Education building gymnasium, where 290 students will be assembled to receive their associate and bachelor degrees.

Dr. Higgins is a former Glenville State College dean of student affairs and professor of psychology. He began his career at GSC in January 1954 when he was appointed dean of men and instructor of psychology, and he became dean of student affairs and professor of psychology in 1959.

Dr. Higgins began his teaching profession in January of 1949 at Smithfield High School, Wetzel County, West Virginia. From 1950-1952 he was assistant professor of psychology and director of testing at Westminster College in Pennsylvania; and he taught at Indiana University from 1952 until August of 1954, just prior to coming to GSC.

In 1963, Dr. Higgins took a position with the University of Toledo. He became chairman of the Department of Guidance and Counselor Education at Toledo in 1965 and held the position until his retirement in August of

In addition to the A.B.

in social studies which Higgins received from Glenville State, he holds an Ed. D. from Indiana University in the field of educational psychology. He received this degree in 1955. He also holds an M.A. in guidance from George Peabody College.

Dr. Higgins holds memberships in the National Educational Association, the Ohio Education Association, Northwest Ohio Education Association, American Psychological Association, American Association for Counseling and Development, Ohio Association for Counseling and Development, Association for

Supervision, Ohio Association for Counselor Education and Supervision, Northwest Ohio Personnel and Guidance Association, and Phi Delta Kappa.

Higgins has co-authored several textbooks including Development and Management of Counseling Programs and Guidance Services, (Macmillan, 1983). He has published numerous journal articles, and he worked with research teams in developing studies such as: "The High School Dropout: Can He Succeed in College?" (Ford Foundation Study).

Born in Harrison County, West Virginia, Dr. Higgins is married to the former Lena Ruth Hauman and resides in


Thirty-three Students Graduate With Honors





Ballroom Dancing is Making A Comeback...

The elegance of ballroom dancing is making a comeback, according to Mary Ann Yeager, instructor of GSC's Continuing Ed class in ballroom dancing. She says that she has seen a definite resurgence of interest not just among older dancers, but that "younger people are becoming more interested in what they perceive as a more gracious way of life." She said that the "...people waltzing around America today are not only members of an older generation, trying to recapture its past, but also a younger generation with no previous experience in ballroom dancing."

According to Yeager, GSC is the first college in the state to offer classes in hallroom

dancing. The classes here at GSC, which will be ending April 29, had 20 participants, mostly people from out of Yeager expects to teach additional classes in ballroom dancing at GSC next Fall. At that time, previous class participants will build on skills to which they've been introduced, and newcomers will be provided the opportunity of learning first-hand the beauty of ballroom dances such as the waltz, fox trot, cha-cha, swing (also known as the jitterbug), the samba, rumba, tango and other Latin American dances. Yeager says that anyone can learn to dance, that it "sounds more complicated than it really is.

Tracksters Capture Second Straight Pioneer Invitational

For the second straight season, the host Glenville State Pioneers claimed victory in the Pioneer Invitational. Coach Lou Geary's squad fought off a strong Berea (KY.) squad, and won by 15 points.

It was a cool and windy day at Pioneer Stadium as four states were represented in the meet. Glenville's men scored in all but three events on the day.

Four Pioneers were event winners on the day. This total includes the distance tandem of Bubby Dent and Andy Jarrell who were each double winners. Dent won the 800 and 1500 meter runs and set meet records in each. His 800 effort was a new school record 1:56.6. Jarrell won the 5000 and 10,000 meter runs successfully defending his meet title in the former. His time in the 10,000 of 32:53 was a new school record. Seniors John Lipscomb and Lloyd Willis were the other event winners. Lipscomb won the shot put in 39'7" while Willis set a new meet record in the triple jump with 45'9" effort.

High-point man on the day though, was Glenville's Gordon Stevens, even though he didn't win an event. The versatile Stevens finished second in the 100 and 200 meter runs and the shot put. He also added a third in the discus and a fourth in the javelin.

Glenville's women's squad also turned in an impressive performance Saturday. They finished second out of five schools even though only four women competed for GSC.

Tammy Pence was again the star, earning high-point honors in the meet with 24 1/2 point. She scored in seven different events (100, 100-hurdles, 4x400 relay, triple jump, long jump, high jump, and javelin), winning the triple jump with a new school record of 33'2".

Lori Barker also turned in an impressive performance

on the day, scoring 13 1/2 points. Lori was undefeated on the day, winning the 800 and 3000 meter runs and running on Glenville's winning 4x400 meter relay team. Andrea Davisson and Diane Farley were the other Glenville women who scored in several events and played major roles in the squad's second place finish.

This week coach Geary's squads will be closing out the 1987 regular season by partcipating in the Twilight Invitational at Marshall. It will be the final regular season for several Glenville seniors. They are weightmen John Lipscomb and Jerry Burkhammer, sprinter Calvin Coleman, and Lloyd Willis who is both a sprinter and a participant in the jumping events.

The course will be offered on 6 consecutive days of morning, afternoon, and evening classes and will total 48 hours of guided instruction. The course will include the following: Principles of Water Chemicalization: Chemicalization Equipment

and its Maintenance; Pool Equipment, Maintenance and Troubleshooting; Safety Procedures; Proper Lifeguarding; In-Service Programs; Personnel Management; Activities Planning; Spring Clean-Up and Fall Winterization.

The course will be held in the Health and Physical Education Building. The course will hold three sessions a day and conclude with professional certification exams.

The course costs \$81.00. This covers tuition and course materials. Those wishing to attend should contact Dr. John Hymes, Jr. Participants must be preregistered by May 8.




