## Coach

Nocida and the PIONEERS began their 1987 season in fine fashion with a $22-10$ victory over the Yellowjackets ; of WAYNESBURG Pa. The game was played on a slightly muddy surface due to over a day and a half of consistent rainfall. The damp conditions however
had no effect on the spirit of our athletes or the fans.
The game started out as a fairly even tussle and both teams appeared a little sluggish during certain parts of the first quarter. The Pioneers stuck in however, with some dogged defense, as was evident by Andy Pfefferkorn's sacking on the Yellowjacket Quarterback at the 2:13 mark, which was the
first in one of his two forced expulsions from the game. The first period ended with both teams jockeying for position with no points on the scoreboard.
The Yellowjackets began their second quarter with a bang, and a lapse in the Pioneer defense with 12:52 left, brought the Yellowjackets as close as 6 yds from the Pioneer goal line. The Yellowjackets however failed

to capitalize on this opportunity, but it wasn't too long before a bad punt allowed them to gain 46 yards to end in a touchdown at 7:27 left to go in the second quarter. The field goal conversion was good, and a majority of the crowd began having relapses of last year's heartbreaking loss. This was not to be however, because a series of events beginning with Eric Mitchell's 29 yard return on the kickoff at the 7:20 mark, followed by Richard Maxwell's spectacular tackle and Matt Snodgrass' recovery at the 5:08 mark, led to a touch down by Jeff Swisher with 4:10 left to go in the quarter. Mark Szklennik's kick was good and at the end of the first quarter the score was again even-at 7 each.

It was a different Pioneer team which emerged from the locker room. Whatever Coach Nocida said to the boys in blue had the effect of turning them into an aggressive pack, and they headed directly for the jugular of the team from Pa . The Waynesburg Quarterback had a real taste of 250 lb . $6^{\prime} 1^{\prime \prime}$ Defensive Tackle Brian Hill with 9:08 left in the third Quarter. Two sackings (on consecutive plays) of the quaterback by strong safety William Dunn and Linebacker Todd Layhew further intimidated the Yellowjacket quarterback resulting in a change in possesion at the $5: 40$ mark. With $3: 21$ left in the third quarter Pioneer Quarterback Chuck Wharton continued his fine game with a pass to Mike Cox. Just as he seemed to be running out of gas with the Waynesburg defender rapidly gaining ground, Lonnie Hosby materialized at the 10 yd line with the block, to result in a remarkable 74 yd run and touch down by Freshman fullback Mike Cox. This was a typical example of the teamplay which Coach Nocida's squad displayed the whole afternoon. The third quarter ended with Glenville up 14.7.

The Yellowjacket at tempted a comeback in the fourth quarter and were able to come up with a 31 yard field goal by kicker Dave Zatta with 14:51 left to go in the game. Aggressive defense as typified by Brian Hill's recovery at the $10: 27$ mark and Jeff Evan's deft catching led to a touchdown by Quarterback Chuck Wharton with $6: 13$ left. Wharton raln to score again for the two point conversion. If Waynesburg had ideas of making a last minute run at the Pioneers, William Dunn and Brian Hill's sackings of the quarterback at the $2: 55$ and the $2: 30$ mark, respectively, never let that materialize. The defense stuck to their task till the very end, and Eric Mitchell's interception at the $2: 10$ mark is a measure of the level of concentration.
Ty Clark, the head coach for the WAYNESBURG Yellowjackets, blamed the defeat "on the poor execution of his team and a good Glenville team." For the large part opinion was founded on the aggressive defense which led to at least five sackings of his quarterback (he eventually had to be carried off the field) and the exceptional balance and co-ordination shown by our running backs especially Mike Cox and Jeff Swisher.

The Pioneers journey to Shepherd this weekend to take on the RAMS. In last year's matchup the Pioneer's succumbed by alim 10-7 margin. Tight-end Kippy Todd, who had to be carried off the field at the $3: 12$ mark in the third quarter with what was initially feared to be a fracture, should be back in the line-up. Trainer Gerald Wessels reassured The Mercury that the injury was no worse than a strained lower leg.
Shepherd (7th ranked in the latest poll) went down to Millersville Pa. (an N.C.A.A. Division Two team) by a margin of $38-24$ on Friday night.

## Runners Show Their Mettle

While our gridders were busying themselves with WAYNESBURG our crosscountry team journeyed to Pa. on Saturday to take part in the California State, Pa. Invitational. The competition over the 5.1 mile course was fierce, and ninety-two runners from fourteen different teams, managed to cross the finish-line.

The fourteen team roster was led by Pitt University (an N.C.A.A. Division One College), Slippery Rock in second position, and our own Glenville State crush crew in third position. Two other teams from our conference were present. They were Fairmont State and Davis \& Elkins, who finished 10th and 14 th respectively.
For the Pioneers Andy Jarrell was first over the finish line with a time of $28: 33$ and in 10th position overall. Jay Dawkins was his usual consistant self, coming in 12 th with a time of $28: 47$. Other finishers for Glenville included Bubby Dent (17th 28:57), Tom Clark (21st 29:20), Tony Ross (30th 29:51) and Mickey Grass (34th - 30:07).

This week's course was a little longer, and a lot hillier than last week's course. It is worth noting that all of our runners finished in the top third of the field. Our distance runners have built a dynasty in Glenville, and we should appreciate that success of that kind is typical of a lot of hard work and dedication. In next week's issue we will attempt to put you through a typical Pioneer distance runner's day. Our Women's team was unable to compete in this meet, having failed to meet the basic requirement of five starters.

This weekend we play host to four visiting teams for the Glenville Invitational to be run-off at Cedar Creek. The teams expected are Frostburg, Md.; Marietta, Ohio: West Virginia Wesleyan and West Virginia Tech.

The women's race will commence at $10: 00 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. and the men's at 10:45 a.m. According to Coach Skiles, the toughest competition is expected to come from Frostburg, in Saturday's meet.

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# HYMES VISITS JORDAN 

Dr. John Hymes, a History professor at GSC, was awarded a Malone fellowship to study in Jordan for four and a half weeks this past summer.

The Malone fellowship, named for its benefactor, Joseph J. Malone, this year was awarded to several professors of American colleges and universities. Its purpose is to acquaint college and university professors with Mid-Eastern culture and also to allow ArabAmerican professors a chance to find out more about their roots.

Dr. Hymes was chosen along with four other professors from West Virginia colleges and universities. They were part of a group of thirteen professors from across the United States who went to Jordan on the Malone Fellows Program.

While in Jordan, Dr. Hymes was a guest of the king and queen. He was treated very kindly.

In regards to information about the county of Jordan, Dr. Hymes mentioned that

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while Jordan has modern cities it is a poor country, it is a monarchy, there is no oil (unlike the other MiddleEastén nations), and it has been at war with Israel for years which takes up much of its a vailable resources. It is also fairly small in area, and contains about 2.5 million people.

When asked about Jordanian food, Dr. Hymes quoted, "Excellent. I never ate such healthy food." He said that he and his colleagues sampled a variety of excellent dishes during their stay.
Regarding music, Dr. Hymes said that some people listen to traditional music and some people listen to rock-and-roll. He also stated that the Jordanian people have equivalents to many of our famous rock stars.
As for sporta, Dr. Hymes commented that soccer is the most popular sport in Jordan, although wrestling and team handball are also gaining in popularity.

In regards to communications, Dr. Hymes stated that there are two TV stations and newspapers in Jordan.

When asked about the Jordanian-Israeli combat situation, Dr. Hymes said that there are no problems concerning the safety of tourists as long as they stay within the national boundaries. He also commented that the Jordanians are ready to "talk peace" with Irrael.
In addition to the above information, Dr. Hymes also said that there are well over five hundred Americans residing in Jordan and they have full government protection.

Dr. Hymes will be giving a series of lectures on MiddleEastern culture to participating West Virginia high school teachers sometime in the near future.
