

Without the buzzer students can not be notified if they have a telephone call or a visitor. Residents have to depend on office workers to take correct messages and get the messages to them, which may take anywhere from one minute to one day. Visitors have to rely on someone living in the dorm to locate the person they are after.

The Charleston-based company who installed the system did not leave an adequate blueprint of the system so the maintenance department could repair it. Consequently, whenever the system breaks down repairmen from Charleston are required to fix it.

Student Paintings Displayed

Three weeks ago a group of paintings were hung in room 309 of the Administration Building. For those familiar with the Art Department this was nothing unusual; artwork is often exhibited in the showcase in front of the Language Division. But the work hanging in room 309 was different; it was produced by two of GSC's own artists. Craig Drennen, a native of

Glenville and a senior at GSC, contributed several oil paintings and mixed media pieces to the show. He combines a yen for surrealism and the avant-garde with tremendous painting skills. His works range from the haunting beauty of Amy to the disturbing visual jolt of his Blade Pieces. The latter pieces are the final stage of Craig's study of the picture plane--the violation.

Pattie Chambers hails from Clarksburg, WV and is a junior at GSC. Her works are done in watercolor with the exception of a small color study done in tempra paint. Her style incorporates mysticism and whimsy over an undercoating of satireand is a step aside from usual watercolor subject matter. The aloof mystique of Wolf Theme Number One reflects her unshakeable passion for "canis lupus," while Parafin on Satin delights in the joy of small treasures.

The exhibit is intriguing and entertaining and well worth the walk to third floor. It also reflects two of the wide range of styles and talents that are hard at work in the Glenville State College Art Department.

Clinic Procedure Shown

Do you know how to care for yourself or a friend if they should fall ill? Do you know where to go if someone is injured in an accident? The Gilmer County Medical Center, located at 708 N. Mineral Road, is prepared to supply any student of Glenville State College with medical attention or a speedy reference to Stonewall Jackson Memorial Hospital.

Glenville College contracts the services of the clinic, which is an extension of the Stonewall Jackson Memorial Hospital, located in Weston. Most medical needs of a student are free except when the student is referred to the hospital. Such an incident would be if a student needed x-rays, then a trip to the hospital would be necessary. Blood work can be taken at the clinic and shipped to the hospital lab for results. Even pregnancy test is included.

The clinic is run by Nurse Betty Smith, R.N., and one office manager who attends the clinic Monday through Friday, from 8-4. Dr. William Daniels, M.D., attends the clinic on Mondays, Thursdays, and Fridays, from 8-4.

An appointment is expected, but the staff will see to any medical emergency that may arise. During a patients first visit a medical chart is started and kept completely confidential for the students needs. Previous medical records are not necessary.

The nurse gives a preliminary exam and obtains any information pertinent to the case. Then the doctor examines the patient and the proper medical course is followed.

The clinic estimates the students from Glenville College amount to one-half of their total patient list.

A professional medical program is essential for good health care. If you suspect you have a health problem, don't hesitate to be examined by the well-trained staff at the Gilmer Co. Medical Center. For an appointment call 462-5708.

Budget Process Begins

On Sept. 16, President Simmons met with the Board of Regents to start the process of acquiring school funding. A Budget Narrative is formulated for next year. It will be presented to the Board of Regents for approval.

The Narrative dealt with asking for the needed funding for improvements and special considerations over and above the budget items asked for as a system. The Board takes the requests and makes judgments based on student enrollment and amounts requested. Then the over-all budget is taken before the Governor and presented before the legislature. High on Glenville's budget request is needed funding for the summer school term of 1988, the amount requested is \$60,000. The second priority is additional funding for the Nicholas County Center, in the amount of \$107,000. This money would help in developing a library, adjunct faculty, equipment, a computer tie-in with the main-frame computer on

campus, and another

secretary. Last year the state's colleges, including Glenville, had to operate under a reduced budget. The outcome of next year's budget will depend on legislative approval. President Simmons felt that the requests were well received and that Glenville has a reputation for only asking for money that is really needed. The summer school and Nicholas County Center funding has already met with the Board of Regents' approval and will be a part of their funding request.

There is a toll-free number that anyone can call and ask their legislative representative to support more funding for education. The number is (800) 642-8650.

President Simmons also discussed plans that are in we works for more parking are to the main campus. Hopefully, 50 new spaces will be available before long. As for the new Fine Arts building, it is true that there will be some inconvenience in parking near Pickens Hall, but it will be kept as minimal as



Japanese Dignitary Visits

GSC was honored last week to host a visit with a distinguished member of the Japanese House of Councillors. Mr. Shoji Motooka, -whose position in Japanese government is equivalent to that of a United States senator, stopped on his wayto Europe to visit his son-Kinji. During his visit Mr Motooka spoke with President Simmons and various faculty and staff members. The Mercury was fortunate enough to speak with him for a few moments and learn several of his impressions. Suprisingly Mr. Motooka found similarities between the West Virginia and Japanese countryside, and both he and his wife expressed the wish to be here

for the Fall foilage change, a desire not possible due to his itinerary.

As a former elementary school teacher, Mr. Motooka found the American College system an excellent one, though different from the Japanese system. He particularly liked the access Americans have to higher education.

He was very interested in our system of State governments and their lack of subordination to the Federal system. In Japan local governments are subdivisions of a larger national system.

The Motookas' son Kinji, who acted as our interpretor, will graduate from GSC in the Spring and hopes to work on his father's staff.







Gridders Succumb To W.V.STATE

The Pioneers were in high spirits when they arrived at Lakin Field on Saturday to take on W.V. State's Yellow Jackets. The Pioneer defense led all WVC teams only allowing 31 yards a game. The team had just finished whipping W.V.C. champion Shepherd last weekend and had beaten State last season. They had every reason to be

The Pioneers began with a bang and with 9:55 left to play they were already up 6-0 by a 39 yd Frank Myers run. That was just a prologue though because before the quarter was over, Frank again touch-downed to make the score 12-0. Todd Layhew scored the two point conversion with a pass from Dave Rial and the Yellow Jackets were staring defeat straight in the face. The first quarter ended up with Glenville ahead with a commanding 14-0 lead.

When the boys in blue took to the field to begin the second quarter, nobody was ready for the comedy of errors that was to follow. Whatever it was (be it complacency, bigheadedness, or whatever,) a series of serious blunders allowed W.V. State to score with only 31/2 minutes ticked off the clock, and again with 7:18 left to go in the half, to equalize at 14 each.

Both teams emerged from the locker room on even terms and Glenville forged ahead with 11:30 left to go in the third quarter by a 39 yard Mark Szklennik field goal. The euphoria was shortlived though because W.V. State's Pat Clark was able to

touchdown on an intercepted Wharton pass, to begin Glenville's dramatic decline. When the Yellow Jacket coach, Clifton Moore, sent Bradley Robinson into the game late in the 3rd Quarter, that definitely spelled the end for the Pioneers. Robinson touched down with 3:43 left to go in the quarter and again with only one minute ticked off the clock in the final quarter to put the Yellow Jackets up a commanding 35-17. Frank Myers capped off an incredible performance with his 3rd touchdown at the 10:04 mark.

Although the offense looked much less ragged for the remainder of the game they never looked like scoring again. When the final buzzer went off Glenville lay succumbed by a 23-35. margin, a victim of their own deeds. The game wasn't as lopsided as the score indicated. The main difference between the teams was the number of fumbles (5 as compared to States 1) and interception (0 compared to State's 3). The defense hung tough though and allowed 208 yards in 58 attempts compared to our offense's 229 yard in 50 tries. They were

also tough in the air allowing 70 total passing yards which was 29 less than the offense managed. To sum up though, I don't think that we were beaten by State. I think that this was definitely one of the instances when the Pioneers beat themselves.

The Pioneers are now 3-1. This weekend is Homecoming Weekend and our gridders take on West Liberty at the Pioneer Staduim. In last year's encounter the Pioneers went down 9-17 after building a 9-0 first half lead.


David Lee Darst, Jr., the son of David and Judy Darst of Point Pleasant, is the recipient of the Montrose

She was just :08 seconds behind the first place finisher from West Liberty - Lori Kovach. Andy held five school records and was all-conference in his freshman year in high school. He is the only track athlete in the history of Braxton County High to score in the State Track Meet.

Andy has shown constant inprovement while here in Glenville. His all-conference performance last year was instrumental in the Harriers' winning the conference championships and being ranked 27th in the nation. Andy was one of the pillars on which Glenville built a formidable 34-4 season, and remained unbeaten in the

This year Andy, together with Senior Jay Dawkins, is co-captain of the Harriers' team. Andy's main goal is for the team to remain at the top of the conference table again this year and to improve their national ranking to the first 15. Andy hasn't set any personal goals for himself but is determined to "improve from meet to meet, and from year to year." With that is mind he sticks steadfastly to a rigorous training schedule. When the average Glenville student is just crawling out of bed in a morning Andy would have typically jogged five miles showered, had breakfast and reported to his 7:00 a.m. job at the College cafeteria. Afternoon naps are out of the question, as he covers another five miles in his

afternoon run. Add these activities to a normal college workload and you might just begin to imagine the amount of dedication it takes to excel in Andy's field of endeavor.

Looking back on his career thus far Andy cites Glenville's upset of the WV State Yellow-jackets in the West Virginia Conference's track and field Championship last year, as one of his most memorable moments. He scored 32 points in only his freshman year and had an all-conference performance in the 10,000 meter race. Andy currently holds school records in the 10,000 meter, and steeple chase and is a coholder of the 4x800 meter record.


