Student Committee Meets

The third meeting of the Nicholas County Center Student Committee got under way on Thursday, Sept. 24 at 5:00 p.m. with a somewhat better membership than the two previous ones held this semester.

Attending the meeting were as follows: Chairman, Keith Ingles, Cheryl Pittsenbarger, Julie Fowler, Tina Rapp, Pam Mollohan, Elizabeth Blake, Rosemary Jordan, Rob Hammons, Maude Simpson and Shelia Morrison.

Two major issues were discussed, one of utmost importance for the Center, the other of importance if the first project is to become reality. The most important and ambitious project to be undertaken by the student committee is that of getting a library at the Center. Without a library, no degrees can be approved from just the Center by the board of Regents on the basis that the Center does not have any research facilities. What this means to the students is that right now unless you are willing to help, by working with the student committee on this project, you could be facing a lot of commuting to the main campus at Glenville. For the library to become a reality, the committee must have more members. Each and every student needs to come to these meetings, whether you

are enrolled in one class or are full-time, freshman to senior, your help is needed. The committee realizes that the time set for these meetings is awkward for many; you must attend the meetings to change this. The meetings are arranged by majority vote. Chairman Keith Ingles stated that right now not enough members are attending to even vote for committee offices, set guidelines and develop a structure for the meetings. Some ideas for raising the needed funds for the library included, bake sales, flea markets, collecting pop cans, getting community support and again, more student involvement! Administrator Joe Hickman has generously given the student committee the use of some shelves for the library books as they come in. Chairman Ingles was very confident that by utilizing our ideas and with the support of the main campus faculty plus a lot of student involvement, that the library project will be successful. One way students may be of help is by donating literature, reference materials and periodicals to the project. Volunteers are needed to help sort books, help with the flea market and bake sales and to think of new ideas and ways of getting the money for this project.

Ms. Yvonne H. King serves as chairperson for the selection committee, which is composed of representatives

from the faculty, administration, and student body. Applications are due by Oct. 15, at the Journalism department in the basement of Clark Hall. Each nominee selected for the program receives an official personalized commemorative certificate attesting to the fact that they have been officially honored by the Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges, which entitles them to lifetime use of the reference service.

is the photography editor. He is majoring in Art Education (K-12).

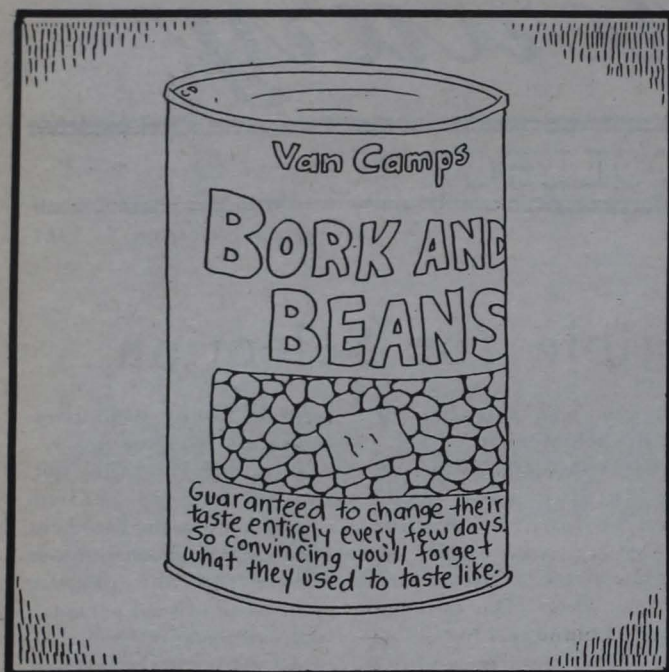

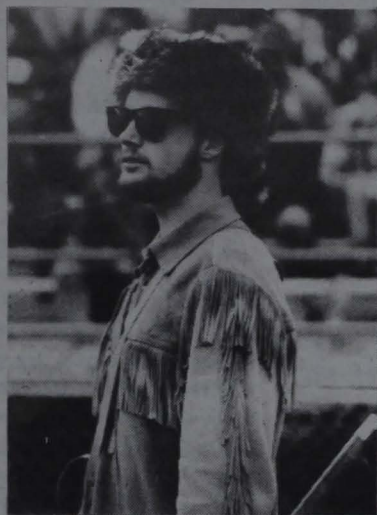

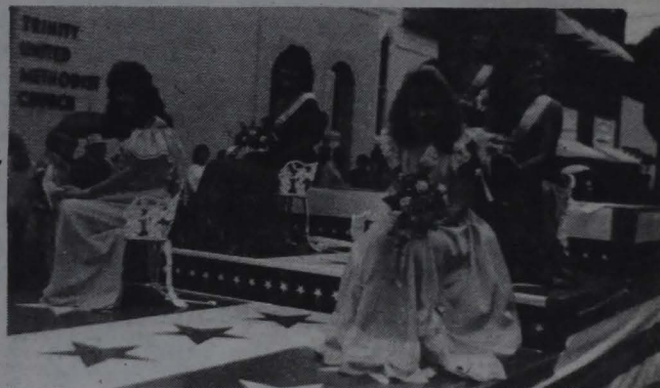

PIONEERS HUMILIATED ON HOME TURF

A number of alumni and visitors turned up in Glenville on Saturday for our Homecoming '87. Approximately 3,000 people crowded Pioneer Stadium to witness the kickoff against underdog West Liberty on a cold and

overcast day. The two teams started rather sluggishly and it wasn't until 2 minutes left to go in the first quarter that Hilltopper Quarterback, Doug Karas, perfected his aim and, threw a long pass to give the Hilltoppers' offense their best field position this far in the game, to end what looked like an even tussle for

position. That pass was the first look at what was going to be the death of the Pioneers in a humiliating trouncing. With 1:51 left to go in the quarter Hilltopper tight-end Todd Poe touched down on a 4 yd pass from Karas. Kicker Tim Mirandy was good on his conversion and Glenville was down 0-7 early in the game.

The second quarter saw the continuation of some steady passing by the Hilltopper Quarterback and with 9:26 left to go in the half Tim Mirandy kicked a perfect 40 yd field goal (notwithstanding the fact that there was a steady, brisk wind behind him) to put the Pioneers further in the red. The Pioneers plight would have been further aggravated had Eric Mitchell not recovered a West Liberty fumble on Glenville's one-yard line. The half ended with Glenville down only 10-0, and the majority of the crowd believing that there was a reasonable chance of making a comeback.

That thought was quickly dispelled though, when the teams took to the field for the second half with only 2 1/2 minutes gone in the

quarter, Karas consistent aim again paid dividends when Hilltopper Ed Edwards caught a 23 yard release from his quarterback right in Glenville's endzone. Tim Mirandy's kick for the extra point was good and the Pioneers were facing an uphill task (at best) with the score on 17-0. To add insult to injury Pioneer Quarterback, Chuck Wharton, who was having a difficult time passing the ball before the ever advancing Hilltopper defense, had one of his passes picked off, with 12:05 to go in the quarter. When the ever alert Eric Mitchell intercepted a Hilltopper pass with 10:23 to go in the quarter, the Pioneer fans thought they had something to sit out in the rain for. Their elation was short lived though when the referee nullified the interception due to an infraction before the play. Glenville was thrown deeper into the pit when Edwards walked untouched, through a demoralized Pioneer defense for his second touchdown of the quarter at the 9:03 mark.

The Pioneers kept on struggling throughout the rest of the quarter and were

able to save face a bit when a diving Lonnie Hosby caught a Jeff Swisher pass, with 3:45 left to go in the quarter to make it 23-6.

The Hilltoppers continued the excellent passing game in the fourth quarter and got another touchdown with 6:53 left to go in the game. Coach Nocida tried to negate the difference by introducing scrambling, freshman quarterback Alan Baughman in the final quarter. Baughman threw a number of impressive long passes but could only connect with the slick, fumbling hands of his receivers. When the final buzzer went only about 1/4 of the initial 3,000 crowd was on hand to witness the end of what might go down as one of Glenville's most embarrassing defeats. They were convincingly beaten in the air with the Hilltoppers registering a total of 280 passing yards as compared to a paltry 74 by Glenville.

The Pioneers take on Salem next weekend at the Pioneer Stadium. Glenville now joins West Liberty at the bottom of the conference with only 1 conference win and 2 losses.

Although our Homecoming celebration was tainted by the pathetic performance of our gridgers this weekend, there is no reason to give up hope on the team entirely. After what looked like a promising start we have now lost two consecutive games - and badly, too.

We must remember, though that last year's team could only muster a total of two wins throughout their entire season - not that there is any guarantee of this year's team going past their 2 win total with their present level of performance. We must also remember that the coaches warned us, in their pre-season interview with the *Mercury*, that this season is going to be a rebuilding one

with the task to be placed almost entirely on the shoulders of inexperienced sophomores and freshman.

From my vantage point up in the Press Box it doesn't seem like we will do any better unless we allow our quarterbacks some more time with which to pass the ball. I don't profess to be any football scholar but it seems to me like the Hilltopper Quarterback had enough time to drink a cup of coffee and light up a cigarette before passing the ball whereas our Quarterbacks were swamped on, almost right at the snap. The definite deficiencies in our offensive line could mean more than losing a game. In the long run it could mean

the loss of a quarterback or running back (who incidentally have no where to run to when they receive the ball) through injury. It appears to me also that our receivers could well do with a refresher in the fine art of catching.

We still have 6 more games to go and I'm sure that our coaches have adequate time to tackle our deficiencies provided that wrestling is left to the capable hands of Rick Flair, Hulk Hogan etc., failing which the multitude of Glenville State's sport fans can still look forward to the conquests of our cross-country runners, golfers, and of late our volleyballers.

The women's volleyball team journeyed to Buckhannon last week where they engaged West Virginia Wesleyan and the University of Charleston at the W.V. Wesleyan Gym. Our netters made a sweep of the series defeating W.V. Wesleyan 2-1 and downing the University of Charleston by a similar margin.

Glenville took their first game against W.Va. Wesleyan 15-11, but lost the second 11-15. They came back in the third game however to blow away the opponents, a convincing 15-

5. For Glenville Debbie Bunner had 11 serving points, Robyn Stewart had 8, and Karen Wooters and Tammy Pence had 5 and 6 respectively. Kim Creel was the leading spiker with 7, followed closely by Tammy Pence with 6. Kim Fox continued setting with consistency and ended with 8 assists.

In their second match of the evening, against the University of Charleston, Glenville came up short 9-15 in their first game. They came back to win two hard and well fought games, 15-13, and 15-10. This time

Robyn Stewart led with 14 serving points, Niki Randolph 11, and Tammy Pence and Rhonda Felder each had 5 serving points. Pence led the spiking department with 12 kills, and Kim Creel had 8 thanks to the accurate setting of Kim Fox and Niki Randolph both of whom had 11 assists.

Our netters are now 4-4 overall and 4-2 in the conference, all in keeping with the coaches' pre-season prediction of a .500 season. This week they play host to U.C. and Salem at 6 p.m. on Tuesday night.

Golfers Find Going Rough

Last week Coach Carney and the Glenville State golf team journeyed to the Old Mill Country Club, in Laurel Fork, Virginia for the James Madison Invitational. The Pioneers finished 13th out of the 22 team field in the second tournament of the fall season.

All-American Bob Sowards was the low man for the Pioneers again, with rounds of 78-75 on the par-72 layout. Brother Mike Sowards was

second with rounds of 76-84, followed by freshman Brian Perdue who shot well for a two day total of 87-82. Jason Sutton and Andy Batten had scores of 99-84 and 89-96 respectively.

The team battled the elements (wind, rain and snow) and a field of eight opponents this weekend at the Malone College Invitational in Canton, Ohio. Although this was the most difficult tournament for the team this season, Glenville was still in with a chance of making it close after the 27th hole. The last 9 holes saw some dispirited play by the team which is yet to learn to play under all conditions. They however still managed to end up 6th out 8 team field. Low

scorer for the Pioneers was Mike Sowards with rounds of 74-81 for 155, followed by brother Bob Sowards (77-85 for 162). Jason Sutton and Brian Perdue followed with scores of 84-85 and 88-81 respectively for a total of 169 each over the two day event. Bill Forrest (83-87 for 170) was close behind, followed by John Buser with scores of 92-96 for 188.

Our last meet for the fall season is going to be held over Sunday and Monday October 11th and 12th in Pineville W.Va. The event - The Rhodendron Classic - is sponsored by the WVIAC and is intended to be an annual tournament. Ten teams are expected to participate in this weekend's classic.

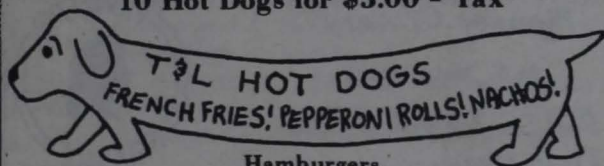
