Regents to Meet on Campus

The West Virginia Board of Regents, the statewide government agency responsible for managing West Virginia's public colleges and universities, is currently updating its Agenda for Action 1985-1990: *A Master Plan of Goals and Service for Public Higher Education in West Virginia*. The Board of Regents and Glenville State College cordially invite the public to a co-sponsored meeting to be held on October 21, at Glenville State

College, from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. The meeting will take place in the Ballroom of the Pioneer Student Center. The purpose of this meeting is to involve faculty, students, staff and citizens in this on-going planning for an improved higher education system.

The public is encouraged to join the discussion of the future of public higher education by attending the meeting and offering ideas and expectations.

Fellowship Program Provides Opportunities

The Judith A. Herndon Legislative Fellows Program is an internship sponsored by the West Virginia Legislature for full-time undergraduate students of all majors and disciplines. Students from both public and private institutions of higher learning in West Virginia are eligible to apply.

The Program provides an opportunity for a limited number of students to participate in a 16-week assignment with the Legislature, beginning in January. Fellows will receive a \$150 weekly stipend and earn academic credit.

The primary goal is to instruct selected students in the theory and operations of legislatures and legislative bodies in their multi-dimensional aspects and roles. Through work

assignments and a complementing academic program, students will have a unique opportunity to study in-depth the operation, role and functions of legislative bodies.

If you are interested in this program, contact Ms. Dolores Mysliwiec in the Social Science Division.

Prospective December graduates who wish to file credentials packets with the Office of Career Planning and Placement should stop by the office sometime within the next week. The Placement Office is located on the first floor of the Pioneer Center.

A resume must be on file before students can participate in on-campus interviews.

Enrollment Reaches New Record

The enrollment figures are in for 1987 at Glenville State College. There are 2096 students attending GSC, which is an increase of 1.6% from last year's enrollment of 2062. There are 1408 students registered as full time, an increase of 12.8% from last year's full time students of 1248.

There is an increase of 2.3% for in-state students and a decrease of 12% for out-of-state students.

The Full Time Equivalent figures (FTE) are up. The figure is used to determine how much money the college will receive from state funds. To determine the figure, the hours of all the full time students are added up then divided by the number 15, which are the hours that is determined to be necessary for full time enrollment by the state. This answer is the FTE. The figure for this year is 1686, an increase of 8.3% over last year's figure of 1557.

The main campus here at Glenville has an increase of 4.4%, the Nicholas County Center has an increase of 41%, and the Parkersburg Center has an even amount of FTE students.

The freshman class consists of approximately 494 students this year. It is the largest enrollment recorded since 1981 when the number of students was 620. There are approximately 294 students enrolled as sophomores, 265 enrolled as juniors, and 389 students enrolled as seniors. The males attending GSC have an increase of 4.9%, and the females have a decrease of .5%. Overall there are more females than males attending GSC.

Who's Who forms may be picked up in the *Mercury* office. Deadline for returning them is extended to Oct. 22.

Cleveland Plan House who has been associated with the NTD since its inception, both as an actor and director. Will toured with the NTD's Acting Company from 1967-1971 and directed *FAREWELL, MY LOVELY*, *A CHRISTMAS CAROL*, and the half-time show in *THE ILIAD*, *PLAY BY PLAY* and *Little Theatre of the Deaf* production. David Hays, Artistic Director of the NTD began the Company 29 years ago. Since then, the troupe has been dazzling thetregoers worldwide with a unique performance style which blends the magic of Sign Language with the splendor of the spoken word. The National Theatre of the Deaf recently became the first professional theatre company from the West ever invited to perform in China. The historic, five-city tour took place in the spring of

Flights of Fancy

Our take-off point this week is, to a large degree, in response to comments; written and verbal, expressed and implied, overt and subtle, concerning what is news. *The American Heritage Dictionary*, 1982 edition states that news is: 1. Recent events and happenings, especially those that are unusual or notable. 2. a. Information about recent events of general interest, especially as reported by newspapers, periodicals, radio, or television. b. A presentation or broadcast of such information. c. A newspaper. 3. New information about anything previously unknown.

The same source reveals that opinion is: 1. A belief or conclusion held with confidence, but not substantiated by positive knowledge or proof. 2. A judgment or estimation of the worth or value of a person or thing. 3. Opinion is applicable to any conclusion to which one adheres without ruling out the possibility of debate.

My concern is that there is confusion throughout our community about the relationship of these two words.

I feel strongly about both news and opinion. I hold opinions on many subjects; some public, some private. I also defend the right of any individual to hold diametrically

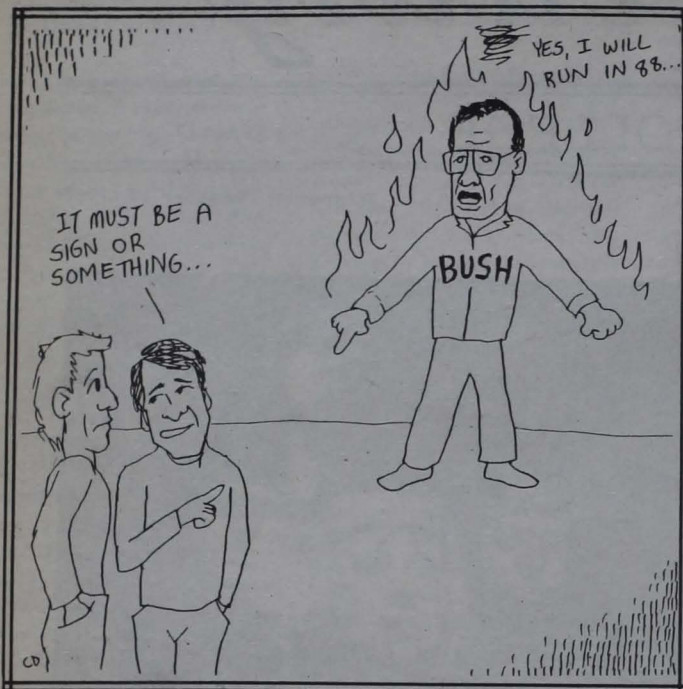
opposing views and have expressed the desire to see more campus opinion documented on these pages. I also feel that news is critical in forming an informed opinion and that facts are necessary to prevent imagination from running wild.

I have never considered and do not wish for the *Mercury* to be considered a so-called "house organ," solely an extension of campus public relations. Many of the staff are learning the craft of journalism as part of their curriculum, and this paper forms their view of the field for good. A realistic situation is vital: News is essential to a newspaper and we are a newspaper.

Therefore, it is my opinion that the *Mercury* staff will report the news as they find it and express their opinions as they see them. We encourage all of our readership to point out newsworthy items and to make their opinions known. Free debate of the issues is just one of the rights I spent many years defending and I will continue to do so long after my name is gone from the masthead.

Remember, when you're circling the wagons you can't see where you're going.

Dear Editor:

I am a 1986 graduate of Glenville State College. Since graduation I've found many educators around this state and many in neighboring states to be GSC grads. I've found state coaching records to be held by GSC grads. Coach Oldham of Parkersburg South High won 3 consecutive AAA state team wrestling titles, Coach Vincent of Charleston High won 3 consecutive AAA state football titles. Our own Lou Nocida took Sistersville High to a state record 7 consecutive state championship games, winning 5, and at one point had the winningest high school football teams of the 1980s in the nation. I'm proud of my degree, and proud to be part of a college with such a reputation for producing quality graduates.

Since graduation I've also met the negative side of being a GSC graduate. I talked with a WVU student, and said I attended Glenville, "Where's that?" he said with a smirk. A Virginia Tech graduate recently gave me a low down on how old and established his alma mater was, upon comparison of our class rings we found that GSC and VT were founded in the same year, 1872. He didn't have much to say after that. While reading a Clarksburg paper in August of this year it

stated, "Glenville's football team need not worry about finishing 9th in the conference, since Wesleyan had dropped out of the WVIAC Glenville was guaranteed the number 8 spot." This type of attitude and this kind of publicity toward Glenville State College makes my blood boil. Which brings me to the reason for my letter to the editor. As an Alumni dues paying graduate of GSC, a sports fan, loyal to GSC, the last place I want to read Negative statements about my alma mater is in the *Glenville Mercury*.

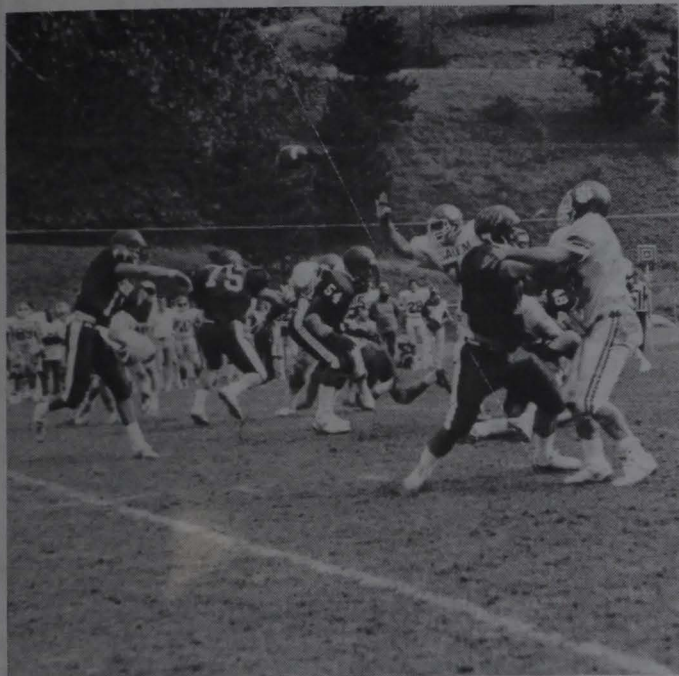
Our GSC footballers, who are composed of mostly freshmen and sophomores, are holding their own, against mostly Jr. and Sr. ball clubs, in the W.V. Conference, one of the tougher NAIA conferences in the Nation.

In the last *Mercury* (Wednesday Oct. 7, 1987) on page 4 the head line read, "Pioneers Humiliated," which upset me. By the time I'd finished reading the article I was furious. The sports editor said such things in reference to GSC, "humiliating trouncing", "Glenville was thrown deeper into the pit", "slick fumbling hands of his receivers", "Glenville's most embarrassing defeats", "a pathetic performance" and

Pioneers Hold Back The Tigers

The Tigers rolled into Pioneer Stadium on a beautiful Saturday to take on the Pioneers. The boys from Salem were yet to be beaten in conference competition and the Pioneers were at the bottom of the conference standings after two consecutive losses. Just like the mercury which had risen above the 70 degree mark for the first time in two weeks,

the Pioneers rose to the occasion to hand Salem their first conference loss for the season, and convincingly, too.

The boys in blue, coming out of what must have been an extremely trying two week period, came out of the locker room to begin the first quarter with renewed vigor. Their aggression paid dividends almost instantly when Scott Swisher

pounced on a fumble, on Richard Maxwell's tackle on the kickoff return, right in the end zone. Mark Szklennik drilled home the extra point, and Glenville was up 7-0 with only 8 seconds ticked off the game clock. The Pioneers had countless difficulties with the blitzing defense employed by the Tigers which was countered to a certain extent by the rotation of regular quarterback Chuck Wharton with the quicker, more devious Alan Baughman. The Tiger's defense, however, had the upper edge over the Pioneer defense and some remarkable punting by Charlie Kuptner, together with Scott Swisher's interception (his first of three), denied Salem good field position for the majority of the first quarter. Salem always looked close to equalizing the game, and when Jack Williams picked off a misdirected Baughman pass, everybody thought the time had come. However, Pioneer Gordon Stevens put an end to all thoughts of a touchdown when he outran Jack Williams and put an end to his 49 yard return right on the Pioneer 10 yard line. A dogged defense drove the Tigers away from the endzone, and when J.R. McVicker kicked his 20 yd. field goal there was only 55 seconds left to go in the quarter.

The second and third quarter saw a fierce struggle between the two teams with the defenses dominating. There were some moments of offensive brilliance, especially from Pioneer fullback Mike Cox and Salem's Scott Bolyard and Layton Jackson. The third quarter ended with Glenville holding a slim, but hard fought 7-3 lead in a pretty intense struggle thus far.

The Pioneers' rigorous practice sessions last week paid off in this war of attrition, when the defense was able to walk all over the Tiger's offensive line for two consecutive sacks of their Quarterback, and a loss of 17 yards early in the first quarter. The pressure was intensified as Scott Swisher was able to pick yet another Tigers pass for what was going to be an important Glenville possession. There were moments of panic when the hardworking Mike Cox fumbled a pass with 11:12 to go in the game, but there was 6'3" and 240 lbs. of Dave Walker on the recovery to dispel all fears of a Salem comeback. With 10:53 left to go, Frank Myers, coming off the bench, ran circles around the Salem defense for a 55 yard run and touchdown, on only his first carry. Szklennik's kick was good, and the Pioneers were up 14-3. Salem tried to make a last run at the Pioneers, and even

got as close as the Pioneer 6 yd line but a dogged defense kept them from scoring. The Pioneer concentrated defensive effort continued and when Darren Tom intercepted yet another Salem pass that must have really knocked the wind out of them. When Frank Myers took off on a 34 yd run for his second touchdown in the quarter, it looked like it was all over. Mark Szklennik drilled the extra point home and suddenly the Tigers had lost their growl with 1:59 to go and the score at 21-3.

Although Glenville only had 4 first downs (compared to Salem's 13) and 32 yards passing (compared to Salem's 211) they were able to hand out a convincing 21-3 beating of the conference leaders. The game was a hard fought one and the only reason Glenville was able to pull through was because of some extreme determination, and by committing considerably fewer errors than Salem, although Salem's total yardage was over 100 more than Glenville's. Our boys must be commended on the high level of concentration throughout the game, especially since coming from the comedy of errors that was Homecoming. The Pioneers' next game is against Fairmont State at Fairmont on Saturday. Fairmont squeezed past W.V. Tech 21-15 at Montgomery last Saturday.

Andy Jarrell came in 3rd with a time of 26:49. Bubby Dent was next in fourth place (26:59) and Tom Clark was

close behind in 6th position with a time of 27:17. John Fitzpatrick clinched the 8th place for the Harriers with a time of 27:33. Other finishers for the Harriers were the ever improving Tony Ross (11th - 28:07), Mickey Grass (12th - 28:12) and Jeff Kincaid (24th - 29:31).

The lady Harriers also ran well in the women's part of the Fairmont Invitational. Freshman Beth Chapman

was 6th to cross the finish line in a time of 18:02. Lori Barker came up in 15th place with a time of 19:06 over the 3 mile course.

The nearest team California (Pa) was 36 pts. behind Glenville and this was a truly impressive performance by over cross country athletes. The Harriers now move to 27-4 overall and are unbeaten in the conference.

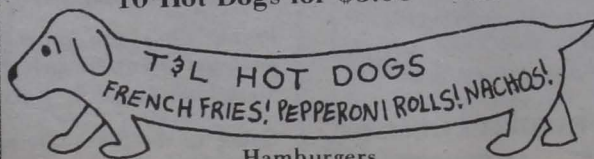

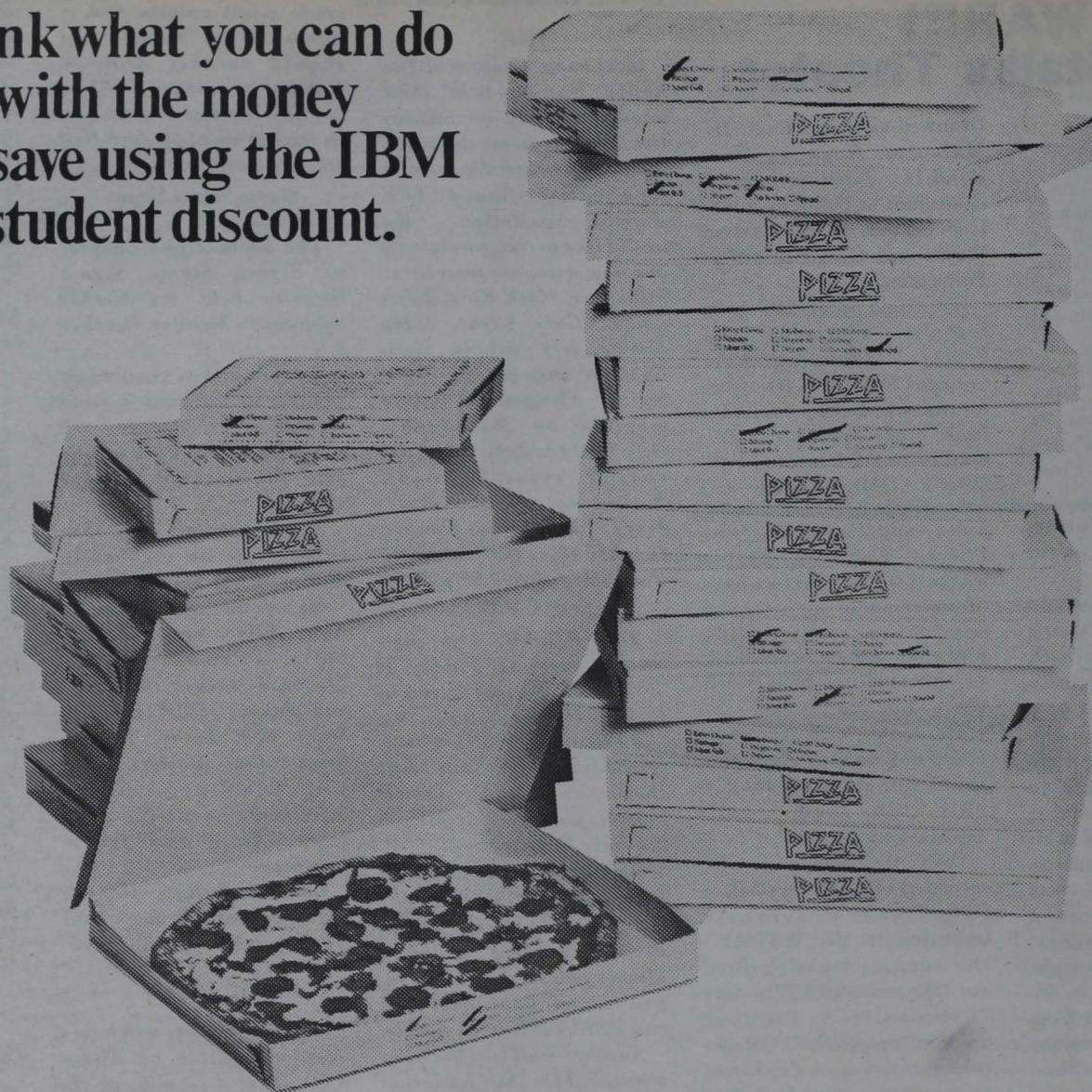
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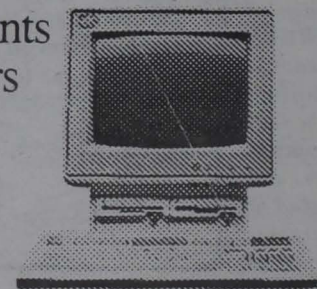
