A new family physician, Dr. Judy J. Petersen, has begun her medical practice in the Glenville and Weston communities, according to an announcement by officials at the Stonewall Jackson Memorial Hospital (SJMH) in Weston. To serve both areas, Dr. Petersen will have offices at both the Gilmer County Medical Clinic in Glenville and Physician's Office Building II in Weston. She now becomes the sixth new physician to begin a medical practice with SJMH in the past six months.

A Mullens native, Dr. Petersen is a 1976 graduate of West Virginia Wesleyan College in Buckhannon where she received her Bachelor of Science in Biology. In 1980 Dr. Petersen began her physician training at the West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine in Lewisburg, where she was awarded her Doctor of Osteopathy degree in 1985. Dr. Petersen subsequently completed two years of medical internship and residency training at the Ohio Valley Medical Center in Wheeling prior to relocating to Lewis County.


BUNNER SELECTED

Deborah R. Bunner, a senior at GSC, has been selected to receive the Judith A. Herndon Legislative Fellows Program. The Program is a one semester internship sponsored by the West Virginia Legislature for fulltime undergraduate students of all majors and disciplines. It provides an opportunity for a few chosen students to participate in a 16-week assignment with the Legislature, beginning in January. Students receive a \$150 weekly stipend and earn academic credit. The primary goal of the Program is to instruct selected students in the theory and operations of legislatures and legislative bodies in their multidimensional aspects and roles. Students will be assigned either directly to a legislator or a legislative agency, performing research and various staff functions.

Those individuals or organizations wishing to enter the Ms. Kanawhachen competition may submit their names and \$10 fee to The Kanawhachen, 3 Clark Hall. The last day of entry is Friday, Feb. 5.

Elections will be held Feb. 10. 11. and 12 and the winner will be named at the Heart Dance on Wednesday Feb. 17.

FLIGHTS OF FANCY

An event has occurred in recent weeks which should give us all a chill. The U.S. Supreme Court has intimated in a 5 to 3 ruling that the Bill of Rights is stamped "adults only." In Hazelwood Scool District v. Kuhlmeir, the court ruled that a high school publication, the Spectrum, produced by students at Hazelwood East High School was subject to censorship, particularly from the school principal.

The Mercury acknowledges that student publications are of necessity subject to boundaries of good taste, legality, and fairness, particularly as they may represent the academic institution to the public. Previous guidelines from the court had acknowledged administration control over content "poorly written, inadequately researched, biased or prejudiced, vulgar or profane, or unsuitable for immature audiences" and common sense indicates guidance is necessary for journalists learning their profession; however censorship is a dirty word of its own kind.

The Mercury believes enlightened guidance does not require censorship and once the monster is allowed to escape its cage, perhaps the Washington Post has something to fear. We base our future on lessons from past experience and we should feel chilly.

Clinton Hinton amassed 23 points and 8 rebounds while Jr. guard Paul Grier netted 16 points and contributed 3 assists.


LADY PIONEERS BEAT SHEPHERD
