## GSC Grad Injured

A well-known 1987 GSC graduate was a victim of West Virginia winter weather last Wednesday as she returned to her job at The
Parkersburg News. Shortly after noon January 27th Lisa McHenry, a Liberal Arts English graduate, was traveling West on Route 47 when her Oldsmobile skidded out of control, went over an embankment, and struck a large tree. Witnesses stated that Ms. McHenry was traveling at a reasonable rate of speed for the conditions when her front wheels contacted slush or a patch of ice causing the vehicle to spin around and exit the road backwards. The impact of striking the barrel-sized tree severly damaged the
passenger's compartment, leaving only the drivers area relatively unharmed.
Ms. MeHenry was removed from the vehicle by paramedics and transported to St. Joseph's Hospital in Parkersburg where she remains in Intensive Care at press time. Her condition is described as stable and responsive by family members. Though still unconscious, she is breathing unassisted and improving by degrees each day.

While at GSC, Lisa was active in theatrical productions and held several positions on the Mercury staff, including reporter, columnist, copy editor, and Arts editor.
