Chinese Scholar Visits

Last week, Glenville State College was honored to receive a visit from Ding Shulin, a professor from the Foreign Language Department at the Beijing Normal University in the People's Republic of China. He was invited by Dr. Como, Division of Language, and Dr. Hilgenberg, Division of Social Science to tour the campus and to watch the performance of The Butterfly Dream. While he was here, Professor Ding also lectured in two English classes, Introduction to Literature and Western World Literature.

Upon graduating from Beijing Foreign Languages Institute in 1973, Professor Ding taught Chinese Language and Literature to foreigners at Beijing Languages Institute. In 1981, he graduated from China Academy of Social Sciences with degrees in both English and American Literature. Since then he has been a lecturer, an Associate Professor, and a member of the Literature Faculty at the Foreign Languages Department at the Beijing Normal University. Among the courses he taught were Literary Criticism, Classical and Contemporary Chinese Poetry, Chinese Language,

Calligraphy, and the History of Chinese Drama.

Upon his arrival, the drama department honored him with a reception on Monday, January 25. On January 26, Professor Ding wsa invited to lecture in Dr. Tedford's English 202, and Dr. Orr's English 207 classes. His next appearance was to watch the practice session of The Butterfly Dream, of which there was a performance at 6:30 that night.

When asked how he felt about his visit he commented on the student's kindness, and that they were nice and friendly; however, he was displeased at some students who were not attentive during his lectures. He also commented on his appreciation for President Simmon's loaning his house for the reception, and that the Vice-President Dr. Flack was kind enough to show him how they handled the relation of educational theory and the teaching of the subject matter. But the problem is teaching it. His final comment was that Berolt has always been his influence of Chinese drama. Berolt, is the one who wrote Three Penny Opera which is going to be held on March 2-4 at 8:00 p.m.

Quintet to Perform

The Charleston Symphony Brass Quintet will perform in concert Monday, February 15, at 8:00 p.m. in the Glenville State College auditorium.

The Quintet was formed from the Charleston Symphony Orchestra to present to Charleston and the state of West Virginia another source of high quality musical entertainment, via chamber music, while in the process showcasing the quality musical talent that exists in Charleston. Another reason was to provide educational opportunities to public school students throughout the state by presenting school concerts and master classes.

The Quintet will be in concert in the evening. During the afternoon, however, clinics will be held on the GSC campus. Two 1½ hour clinics will be held. The first will be a group clinic. The second will be four sections, i.e. trumpet, trombone, etc. These clinics will be for public school as well as college musicians.

The Quintet is composed of the following performers: David Porter, first trumpet; Harry Rich, second trumpet; Marsha Palmer, french horn; John Mead, trombone; and Terry Roush, tuba.

Harry Rich is an Associate Professor of Music at Glenville State College. He is a graduate of the Univerity of Kentucky and has a Masters from Western Michigan University. He has performed in the Western Michigan University Faculty Brass Quintet; Ball State University Faculty Brass Quintet; Kalamazoo Symphony Orchestra and the Muncie Symphony Orchestra. He has been with the CSO since 1978.

FLIGHTS OF FANCY

At a time when education may be the only real answer to the economic woes of the state of West Virginia, a substantial number of the legislators and administrators most closely involved in the future of education in the state are making a political football of the Board of Regents.

To someone involved in the education process as a consumer it would appear that the colleges and universities of the state are operating almost exclusively in their own self interest, while our elected officials are more concerned with media exposure to improve their reelection prospects.

Various strongly politically - oriented media sources keep up a steady drumbeat of propaganda concerning Regents activity which begins to lead the discerning

observer to conclude that they are merely against the current state administration regardless of the merits of plans and programs.

The recent appointment of GSC President Dr. William K. Simmons has generated a new firestorm of publicity for self serving individuals and organizations, with State Senator Keith Burdette, chairman of the Senate Education committee, stating in The Chronicle of Higher Education Jan. 20, 1988 that "His involvement has touched quite a few nerves. It was carried off like a coup...

It appears to those hoping to receive an education and qualify for a decent job in this state, that what is needed is a lot less jockeying for position and media exposure, and more teaching. Then again, West Virginia is not famous for politics and common sense having more than nodding aquaintance



England Trip

Plans Announced

Buckingham Palace, Windsor Castle, and the tower of London await participants in Glenville State College's "Cultural Tour of England" this summer from June 27 - July 7.

The tour which is open to the public will include visits to a number of cultural and historic sites in London and other parts of England. Among these are Parliament, the Bristish Museum, Buckingham Palace, St. Paul's Cathedral, Westminister Abby, John Wesley's Chapel and Home, the Guild Hall of London, and the National Gallery of Art. In addition, there will be a Red Bus tour of the city.

Trips out of London are planned for Hampton Court Palace, home of Henry VIII and Elizabeth I, with a return to the city center by boat on the Thames River. Another trip out of the city will take the traveler to Windsor Castle, country home of the reigning British monarch.

One day will be devoted to traveling to Oxford University and to Stratford-on Avon, quaint country town and birthplace of William Shakespeare.

Evenings will be free with an opportunity to attend performances at the Royal Shakespeare Company, the National Theatre Company, and other theatres in London. One day will be open for participants to plan their own activity, such as shopping on Regents' Street, going to the beach at Brighton, or crossing the English Channel to Calais in France.

The fee for the cultural tour is \$985 which includes transportation from Glenville to London and return, lodging in University residence halls, breakfast and supper, scheduled side trips, and departure taxes. Three hours of credit are available in Fine Arts 399 or Social Science 399. 



Glenville vs. Fairmont

The Pioneers slipped to 8-11 overall and 7-4 in the conference with a defeat at the hands of the Fairmont State Falcons 66-61 at the Feaster Center in Fairmont.
Trailing by only three points at halftime, the Pioneers fell behind by ten points three times in the second half. Late in the game, Glenville closed to within four but could not put the game

Paul Grier was high scorer with 23 points. Clinton Hinton added 21 points and had eight rebounds.

Glenville vs. A-B

The A-B Battlers rolled into town and rolled away with a victory, beating the Pioneers 71-63. After two ties, the Battlers jumped to an early first half six point lead. With 4:29 left in the first half, Glenville caught A-B 20-20, but fell behind 28-20 for Glenville fought back to within two points on two occasions in the second half but failed to take the lead and fell to 8-12 averall and 7-5 in the conference.

If you said that Clinton Hinton was "the big man on campus" it could be taken literally. The 6'7" transfer student has already established himself as a quality player. His freshman year was spent at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte where he was named the Sun Belt Conference "Rookie of the Year." Last year he played at Oral Roberts University, averaging 11.5 points and 6.5 rebounds a gme. "They call me the 'Bread Truck' because I deliver," says Hinton.

Clinton likes Glenville State, but smiles and says "There's nothing to do but hunt, fish and study." Fishing does seem to be in his future. When asked what he wants to do ten years from now, Clinton says, "I want to buy some real estate, kick-back,

fish, and make money." He sounds easy - going until you talk about basketball. "When I take the court, everyone that is not wearing a Glenville uniform is my enemy!"

Nottingham, "He came here out of shape and it hurt him early in the season." Clinton has lost 25 pounds and now only weighs 252 pounds. When comparing the leagues he has played in Clinton says, "Guys are smaller and run faster here, it makes me work harder and it is easier to get fouls." Coach Nottingham says, "Clinton has good offensive skills, but needs to make a greater effort on defense. With his size and talent, he should dominate on both ends of the floor.
