
In addition to the awards being presented, the purpose of the evening was to show appreciation to the representatives for all of the

Since last week's **Mercury** went to press various solutions to our state's problems have been suggested by several astute observers of the mess we are in. One such observer is no less a pundit than James Dent, columnist for the Charleston **Gazette**. Dent's normally humorous column became semi-serious, and in fact, was reprinted in the competing **Parkersburg News**, as he suggested the classic answer to our problems with the legislature. "Throw the rascals out!"

Dent appears to have a following in his plan to not vote for any incumbent in the upcoming elections. Other suggestions noted both in state papers and in conversations on campus have various degrees of merit. One senior, whose wife is a GSC graduate, had returned to college specifically to teach in West Virginia schools. He now suggests that the last person leaving the state should please turn out the lights. Make no mistake, most native sons and daughters want very much to enjoy the obvious positive aspects of our state. Some of us have spent many years travelling around the country and the world. We want to come home and stay home. Since childhood we have heard the litany that higher education is necessary for assured success. Now we learn success is at the end of the rainbow....

I'm well aware that times have changed since I was a student at GSC but I don't lieve that respectability and good manners will ever go out of style. The Charleston Lions Club takes great pride in co-sponsoring with the WVAC an annual sports event that is touted as excellent family entertainment. We belive this tournament offers a wonderful opportunity for ople, young and old, from all over West Virginia to come together and enjoy spirited basketball competition among outstanding athletes, as well as visitation among school alumni and friends. I would say that some of the language coming from "our" cheering section was not family riented and instead made me personally ashamed of my old school.

I also expect there were faculty members either in the cheering section or in the Civic Center who could hear and were aware of what was happening. I think these teachers or others from the school administration could confront those fans who get out of line with their behavior. It certainly could serve as a good topic for discussion in an upcoming school assembly. (Do you still have these?)

Let me say that I am proud of Glenville, my hometown, and of Glenville State College, which I attended for the majority of my college education. Please help keep me and other GSC Alumni proud of our school. I challenge all of you who are associated with the school in any way to take stock of the adverse criticism we received at the recent tournament. Let's make the actions of our school supporters and fans in future years something we can be proud of - not ashamed of.



The Glenville State Pioneers met the Marietta Pioneers in the 16th annual Don Frail Memorial Relays at Don Drumm Field in Marietta. Glenville's men literally ran away with the meet, winning 81-19, while Marietta's women outscored Glenville's women 50-42.

Bubby Dent brought home Outstanding Male Athlete honors by winning the 1,500 meters, the steeple chase, in a new meet record time of 9:33.8, and ran on the winning 4 X 800 relay team. Dawn Farley was voted as being the Outstanding Female Athlete. Farley won the triple jump (32-1), finished second in high jump, the long jump, and the 400 hurdles, ran on six winning relay teams, and placed fourth in the shotput. All in all, Farley competed in 11 events.

Glenville's men will compete at the Indiana University of Pennsylvania Invitational this weekend, and the women will compete on April 8, at Rio Grande, Ohio.



For the second season in a row, sophomore Monique Johnson has been named to the WMAC women's All-Conference first team. Johnson, on a record setting pace, is already fifth on Glenvillet all-time scoring list with 990 points. Monique was second on this year's team in scoring with a 16.3 average, had 6.6 rebounds a game, and was third on the team with 2.1 assists per

Kim Creel and Tammy Pence both made the All-WMAC Second Team. Junior center, Kim Creel, led the team in scoring and rebounding with 16.8 points and 9.9 boards respectively per game. Kim led the league in field goal percentage with a 57.6 average. Tammy Pence averaged 13.8 points a game, and was second on the team with 8.5 rebounds per game.

COACH OF THE YEAR

Tim Carney has been selected as the 1987-88 WVAC Women's Baskerball Coach of the Year. Carney has coached the Lady Pioneers for nine years and has amassed an impressive overall record of 146-73. In his nine years as head coach, the Lady Pioneers have made it to the WMAC final four eight times. The year's squad finished 17-7 overall and placed second in the league's final



PAUL GRIER HONORED

Junior guard Paul Grier was named to the WVAC All-Conference Second Team. Grier, from Charlotte, North Carolina, led the Pioneers in scoring with 18.7 points a game and a 3.3 assist average. The three year starter surpassed the 1000-point mark this season hitting 40.9 percent from the three point line. Paul is

currently 22nd on Glenville's all-time scoring list.

David Hall and Clinton Hinton received Honorable Mention in the conference. David Hall averaged 17 points a game, and led the team in rebounds with 8.1 boards a game. Clinton Hinton averaged 15.6 points and 7.2 rebounds a game. Hinton led the feam with a 61.7 field goal percentage.

Project Funding Approved

An International market-ing project at Glenville State College has just received tentative funding approval from the Center for Education and Research with Industry for the next fiscal year beginning July 1, 1988.

The objective of the project is to implement a program to increase sales by West Virginia businesses to Canadian tourists along the I-79-US 19 route between Weston and Summersville in central West Virginia.

The central West Virginia area between Weston and Summersville along routes I-79 and US 19 is a major stopover point for Canadian tourists traveling to the Carolina beaches and Florida. The area is at the end of the first day's driving time for many Canadian travelers being approximately eight to twelve hours from the Toronto-Montreal

This past fall Glenville State College business students in Dr. Duke Talbott's International Marketing Class (Marketing 385) developed a project to evaluate the nature of the Canadian tourist trade in the Weston-Summersville area and to design a marketing plan to expand sales. As part of the project, students surveyed retail businesses along the route which were primarily oriented to serving the highway traffic to determine the impact of Canadian tourists and the attitudes of business operators toward improving sales to Cana-

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dians. The businesses surveyed included restaurants, motels, service stations, merchandise retailers, and factory outlets.

With the data from the survey in hand, a field trip was arranged for the students to visit the U.S. Travel and Tourism, U.S. Department of Commerce, Regional Office in Toronto to discuss the data and review the possibilities of developing and implementing a marketing plan to expand sales. The Travel and Tourism Office in Toronto was acutely aware of the situation in central West Virginia and the fact that Canadians were, in fact, stopping and staying, but not otherwise becoming active participants in the local economy.

This spring, students in the International Marketing class have enrolled in Marketing 386 (Export Marketing Research) to complete the project. As part of the class they will develop a marketing package designed to increase sales.

Recital

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


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
