Summer Intensive English Planned

According to Dr. Duke Talbot, director of Community Services and Continuing Education, of Glenville State College, twelve Japanese students will study English on the GSC campus this summer.

The purpose of the college's 1988 Summer Intensive English Program is to provide an opportunity for international students with limited English-speaking proficiency to

(1) become familiar with commonly used English through a variety of instructional and exper-

imental situations appropriate for effective functioning in a collegiate atmosphere in the United States.

(2) gain an understanding of the practical aspects of going to college in a college residential environment, interacting with other students and making the most of the opportunity to develop the student's academic, linguistic, and social skills to the maximum.

(3) learn the particular cultural dynamics of American society which will permit them to function effectively as successful

Preregistration for fall term will be held Monday - Friday (April 25-29) in the Administration Building. Students should see their advisors and have registration forms signed before enrolling.

Pre-registration for the first Summer term will be the following week, May 2-6.

Nationally Known Group to Perform Thursday

The nationally renowned Waverly Consort will perform in concert at the Glenville State College auditorium on Thursday, April 21, at 8:00 pm.

The Waverly Consort celebrates its 22nd anniversary during the 1987-1988 season. One of the country's premiere ensembles, the group has spearheaded a new burgeoning revival of "early" musical styles through its tours of North and South America, appearances at major festivals, including the Casals Festival and the Madeira Bach Festival, and in its recordings, workshops, and television broad-

casts. The ensemble - six singers and four instrumentalists playing vocal, string and percussion instruments of the Medieval, Renaissance and Baroque periods - specializes in the repertoire of great music from the 12th through 18th centuries.

This program is made possible by a grant from the Mid Atlantic Arts Foundation in partnership with the Arts and Humanities Division, West Virginia Department of Culture and History. This project is supported by the National Endowment for the Arts, a federal agency.

The WVU Graduate Center at Jackson's Mill will hold a student advising session for upper-division students and faculty, on Thursday, April 28 in Room 202 at the Pioneer Center.

Anyone interested in enrolling in a graduate program at West Virginia University will have an opportunity to meet with representatives from WVU at this time. Several Master's degree programs are approved for completion in this Off-Campus Center. As you probably know, students who are within 12 hours of completion of their undergraduate degree may enroll in 300 level graduate courses and have them counted toward a graduate degree at WVU, providing

they have a 3.0 GPA, and get approval from the Office of Admissions at WVU prior to enrollment.

Michael Caruso, Certification Specialist at HRE, and representatives from different academic disciplines will be present to advise students regarding renewal and certification requirements necessary to validate teaching credentials and program completion requirements.

This will be an excellent time for graduate and prospective graduate students to meet with administrative and academic advisors in preparation for summer and fall enrollments. The Summer and Fall Schedules for On- and Off-Campus will be available at that time.

GOLFERS PLACE THIRD IN REGIONAL TOURNEY

Last week the GSC golf team finished in third place in the WVC Southern Regional behind first place Charleston and second place Fairmont State. Bob Sowards finished 4th overall totally 153 in two rounds.

This week the Pioneers are competing in the WVC Northern Regional Golf Tourney at Spidel Golf Course in Oglethorpe Park. At presstime, the Pioneer linksters were at second place with 336 behind Charleston with 333 strokes.

After one round, Mike Sowards was in first place with 78 strokes and Bob Sowards was among the frontrunners with 83 strokes. Danny Wassick had 86 strokes, while Walt Butler and Jason Sutton were tied at 88 strokes.

TRACKSTERS RUN AT CALIFORNIA

Both Pioneer track teams competed this past Saturday in the fourth annual California University Track and Field Invitational. The Pioneers placed in eight events, four of which were first place finishes, and finished fourth overall in a field of 10 teams. Bubby Dent competed in three events and took first place in all three. Dent won the 3000 meter Steeple Chase with a time of 9:22, the 800m Run in 1:57, and the 1500 meter Run in 4:02. The 1500 meter race was ran in memory of Paul Bryan. Bryan, from California U., died last year as he crossed the finish line. Dent was presented a trophy for his first place finish in the event. In the 10,000m Run the Pioneers took the top three spots. Andy Jervell placed first in 32:39, Jay Deskins second in 32:53 and Tony Rose third in a time of 33:30. Matt Korte placed second in the 400m Run with a time of 51.5. The 400m relay team with Gordon Stevens, Eric Mitchell, Lonnie Hudry and Bernie Rane placed fifth in the event with a time of 44.3. Bernie Rane also

placed 3rd in the Long Jump, jumping 20'7". Gordon Stevens finished the day by placing 4th in the Javelin by throwing it 161'11". The Lady Pioneers, coming off of their first track victory ever, had two placers in Dawn Farley and Beth Chapman. Farley placed fourth in the Long Jump with 15'6 1/4" and Chapman placed 6th in the 800 m run with a time of 2:34.

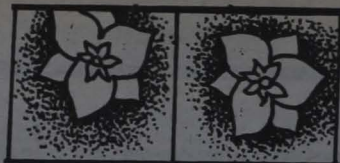
KAPPA DELTA PI

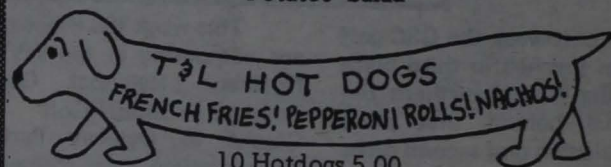
