



Financial Aid

If you as freshman are wondering how you are going to pay for your college tuition, then you should consider Financial Aid. A year of college is very expensive and there are ways to help get it paid for. If you need help in this area then you should check with the Financial Aid Office and see if you are elgible to receive any type of financial aid. Mr. August Kafer is director of Financial Aid here at Glenville State College and may be able to offer a solution to your problem.

There are different types of grants and loans available to students. They are based on the families income and demonstrated financial need. In order to receive them you must file an FAF form. If you have already done this you should make sure that all papers are returned as soon as possible and filled out correctly.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR RETIRES

Athletic Director at Glenville State College, Jesse Lilly will retire August 31. During his coaching career, Lilly has maintained positions of head coaches at Elkview High School in Kanawha County and at Glenville State College.

The Beckley native has been associated with GSC for 28 years as a coach, teacher, and administrator. While at GSC, Lilly has coached the Pioneers in football for 5 seasons, and directed the basketball team to the West Virginia Conference Tournament Championship in 1970 and 1972. At Glenville, his five

At Grenville, his live football teams had a 13-25 record and his basketball teams won 271 games out of 501. In 1972, Lilly was selected by the West Virginia Sports Writers Association as the West Virginia College

Coach of the year after the Pioneers won the state conference basketball tournament.

Lilly graduated from Glenville State in 1948, and during this time, he participated in football, basketball, and baseball. As a player he was the leading scorer and captain of the basketball team. He received his master's degree at West Virginia University.



A native of Nicholas County, Dr. Proctor received his Bachelor of Science degree in Biology from Glenville State College before earning his medical degree in 1986 from the West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine in Lewisburg. Over the last two years he completed an internship and residency in family practice at the Cuyahoga Falls General Hospital in Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio.

Dr. Proctor is a member both of the American Osteopathic Association and the American College of General Practioners as well as being the Diplomate of the National Board of

Osteopathic Examiners. He, his wife June, daughter April and son Jeremy now reside in Glenville, file at the Gilmer County Health Center to insure proper treatment.


