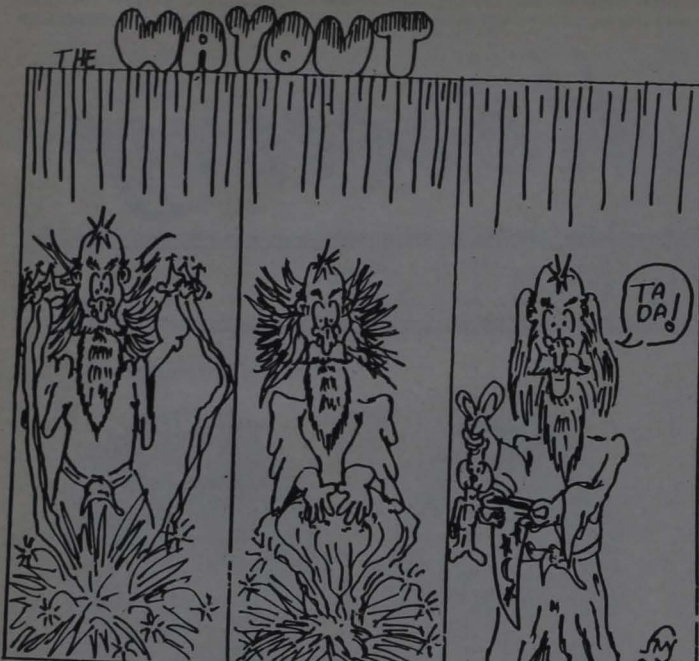

## Reflections

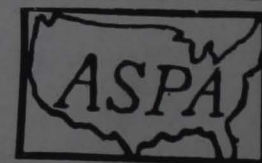
Was Jonah really swallowed by a big fish or is that just a big fish tale?

## Clogging Class Offered

Beginner and Beginner-Plus Clogging Classes will be offered this fall through the Glenville State College Office of Continuing Education. Both will meet in the Ballroom of the Pioneer Center for five Thursdays, starting September 22 and continuing through October 20. The Beginner-Plus class will meet from 6:00-7:30 and the Beginner class from 7:30-9:00. A fee will be charged for each course. Beginners will learn 8 basic movements of traditional clogging as well as some contemporary movements. Some dances will be taught through putting these beginning steps to music. The Beginner-Plus class is for anyone who has had some clogging instruction. A variety of steps, some line dances, and mixers will be taught. Participants will learn to count beats to steps and how to add flair to basic movements. Dance to Sawyer Brown, Hank Williams, Jr. Neil Young, and others.

The instructor for both classes is Mary Alltop, who has been instructing clogging for 3 years, including the State Clogging Convention in 1987 and 1988. She has attended numerous clogging workshops and is presently the choreographer and instructor for the Town Hill Cloggers from Sutton, WV.

## UGANDA FORESTER VISITS

Glenville, WV -- Francis Kahembwe, a forestry lecturer from Nyabyeya Forestry College in Entebbe, Uganda, has been visiting the Glenville State College campus.

Mr. Kahembwe met GSC Land Resources chairman Mr. Edwin A. Grafton at the recent forest educators international conference at Paul Smith's College in Paul Smiths, New York. The conference was titled "Educating Forest Technicians into the 21st Century." The conference was sponsored by Paul Smith's College and the U.S. Agency for International Development.

Kahembwe's visit is funded by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations out of Rome. He is touring exemplary college forest technology programs in the eastern United States for the purpose of re-establishing and upgrading the program at this school. His country is still rebuilding its forestry institution after the disarray suffered during the Idi Amin rule.

Glenville State College has the only Forest Technology (2 year) degree program in West Virginia higher education.

## PIONEERS STING YELLOWJACKETS

The Glenville State Pioneer football team opened the 1988 campaign in a convincing fashion with a 27-0 victory over the Yellowjackets of Waynesburg College.

After a scoreless first period, the Pioneers scored their first touchdown with nearly six minutes remaining before the half. Sophomore quarterback Alan Baughman connected with tight end Rick Lewis for a 34-yard score. Marc Ferris added the extra point as GSC increased its lead to 7-0. Twenty seconds later, Joel Wilson recovered a costly Waynesburg fumble giving the Pioneers excellent field position. Baughman quickly capitalized on the opponent's error as he found Ed Toman open for a 27-yard touchdown reception. After the two point conversion failed, the score stood at 13-0 at the half.

Midway through the third quarter, Glenville completed an impressive 78-yard drive as Frank Myers scored on a 15-yard touchdown run. Ferris added the extra point as GSC increased its lead to 20-0.

After the stingy Glenville defense halted yet another Waynesburg drive near the end of the third quarter, Coach Nocida's offensive

troops mounted another drive. This time Baughman kept the ball himself as he scored on a 15-yard run. Ferris was true on his third extra point of the afternoon, which made it 27-0.

Offensively, Glenville received strong efforts from many players. Alan Baughman completed 6 of 11 passes for 111 yards in addition to throwing two touchdowns and rushing for a third. Baughman had plenty of support, however, as his backfield ran for a whopping 256 yards. Gordon Stevens led all runners as he gained 107 yards on 19 carries.

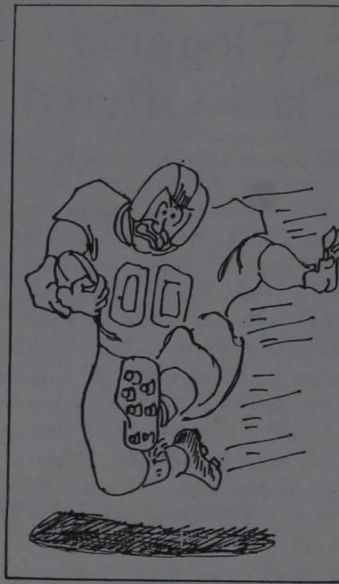
Although the Pioneer offense posted 27 points, Coach Nocida's defense was equally as impressive with its shut-out performance. Senior Todd Layhew led the way with thirteen tackles and nine assists. Brian Hill was also very active as he collected nine tackles and six assists.

This Saturday, Glenville will meet its first WV conference foe in Shepherd College. Coach Monte Cater's Rams enter the contest with an 0-2 record, but they barely lost last week to a very talented Millersville squad. Game time is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. at Pioneer Stadium.

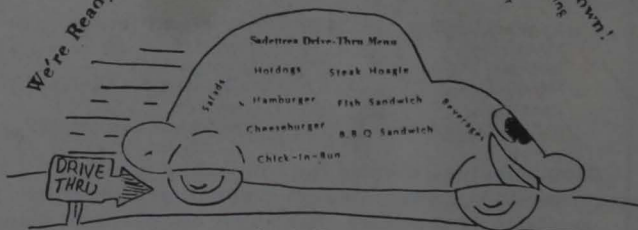
