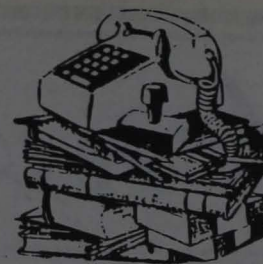

Adams holds the BFA and MA degrees from the University of Texas at Austin and is a candidate for the Ph. D. in American Studies at Emory University. She attended both the Duke University Creative Writing Summer Workshop and the Bread Loaf Writer's Conference as a scholarship student.

## 1988 Board of Advisors

Organization was the priority for the July 28 meeting of the Glenville State College Board of Advisors.

Board members for the 1988-89 academic year are Mrs. Anita Harold Ashley, Spencer; Dr. Jenny Bechtold, Parkersburg; Dr. Harry B. Heflin, Morgantown; Mrs. Reta Kight, Glenville; Dr. Espy W. Miller, Glenville; Mr. Harry Lynch, Summersville; Dr. James Shaver, Weston. From the GSC staff are Mrs. Linda McKown, classified; Dr. Gary Gillespie, faculty; Michelle Garrison, student; Mr. Mack Samples, administration.

Officers selected for the year are Anita Ashley, president for a second term, and James Shaver, vice president.

GSC Acting President Dr. James L. Peterson brought the Board up to date on the budget allocations and salary schedule funding produced by the special legislative sessions. The Business and Personnel offices must have new budgets computed by August 5. Salary adjustments will reflect the attempt to implement the existing faculty and classified salary schedules. There will be no across-the-board pay increases and no standard percent increase. Changes will reflect the movement of the present salaries toward where they should be on this salary schedules. Some salary adjustments will be sizable, others will be minimal depending on where the present salary is on the schedule. Administration will not receive increases.

Mr. Bruce Hathaway, Director of Physical Plant, reported that construction

work had begun on the new Art/Music Building. Repair on the Administration Building brick and roof is ahead of schedule. Because approximately 40 parking spaces will be lost to the Art/Music Building, it was moved and seconded to try to purchase the Bell property on Bell View Drive adjacent to the Administration Building for added parking.

Mack Samples, Dean of Records and Admissions, reported that fall enrollment looked like it would remain on a level with last year. In anticipation of 1990 admission requirements, the Board moved to consider adding a community college component to the college structure. Curriculum and administration are already existing. The label has just never been applied. This move deals with all the 2 year associate programs.

Dr. Peterson reported a large turn over in faculty positions. He was, however, extremely pleased with the quality of replacement applicants. He announced position openings for Director of Finance and Administration and Academic Vice President. Search to replace these positions has begun.

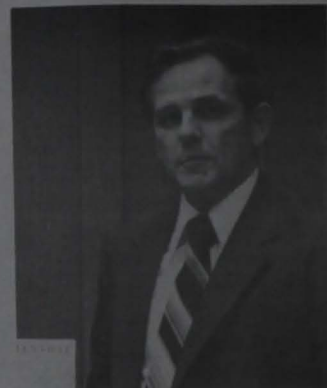
BOR Chancellor William Simmons was present and reported very positive GSC feedback from the visiting Carnegie Committee. This committee was initiated by the Governor to evaluate WV Higher Education. Recommendations from the committee are due November 15.

Mr. Bowers, before coming to GSC, was a car salesman for a dealership in Chesapeake, Va. Among his varied work



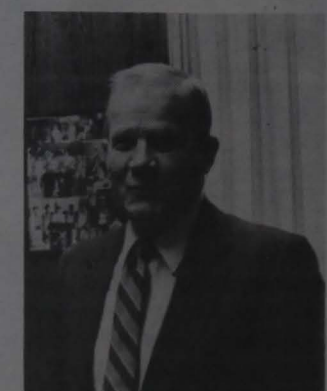
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## Jesse Lilly Named Parade Marshal

## SHEPHERD RAMS PIONEERS

Gordon Stevens' touchdown run

Before the Pioneers' first play in their home opener had even taken place, it was clear that Parent's Day would not be a day to remember. Glenville was given a delay of game penalty to start the rainy, afternoon contest against the Shepherd Rams. Following a touchback, Lou Nocida's offensive troops began at their own twenty yard line only to run three plays and punt. Shepherd quickly took advantage of the good field position as quarterback Skip Stasky found split end Chris Scaglione on two occasions, the second a twenty-six yard touchdown reception. Rich Poole added the extra point as the Rams took a 7-0 lead in three and a half minutes into the first quarter.

After the Ram defense halted the second Pioneer drive near Glenville's own thirty-five yard line, Chuck Wharton was forced to punt again giving Shepherd the ball on their own thirty-two yard line. However, this drive was short lived as Mark Swartzmiller recovered a fumble on the Shepherd thirty yard line.

Despite the excellent field position, Glenville was unable to score this time as

Frank Myers coughed up the ball on a fourth down play. Shepherd tailback Bill Adams' long run, together with two Scaglione receptions, enabled Rich Poole to connect on a forty-one yard field goal giving the Rams a 10-0 lead with nearly two minutes remaining in the first quarter.

Following the Ram kickoff, Alan Baughman found tight end Rick Lewis all alone for a fifteen yard gain. A few plays later, Baughman hit Mike Cox coming out of the backfield for another first down. Gordon Stevens did the rest, as the workhorse tailback plunged over the goal from one yard out to cut the deficit to 10-6 just minutes into the second quarter.

The wet playing surface was evident on both teams' next possessions as neither squad could gain much yardage. After another Glenville punt, Skip Stasky's first errant toss of the day was intercepted by Pioneer safety Mark Swartzmiller.

However, the boys in blue could not hold the ball for long as another fumble gave the ball right back to Coach Monte Cater's players.

With 1:40 remaining in the

first half, Bill Adams culminated the Ram drive as he scored on a two yard run. Poole added the point after as Shepherd went ahead 17-6.

While the first half was twelve seconds away, Glenville was whistled for a very questionable roughing the punter call. Shepherd capitalized on the costly penalty when Poole hit a forty-two yard field goal to make it 20-6 at the half.

Unfortunately for Pioneer fans, the second half closely resembled the first as penalties, fumbles, and interceptions kept Glenville from scoring. Defensively, the Pioneers stopped several Ram drives as Swartzmiller recovered his second fumble of the afternoon and added another interception.

However, for Coach Nocida's men, it was just not their day. The Shepherd Rams would take this one by a 20-6 score.

Offensively, the Pioneers were led by Stevens' forty-three rushing yards, followed closely by Myers with forty-one. Alan Baughman completed seven passes for seventy-five yards, four to tight end Rick Lewis who gained forty yards on the catches.

Brian Hill led the defense with eighteen tackles and five assists. Luther Toney and Todd Layhew were also quite a force. Mark Swartzmiller had a rare performance with two fumble recoveries and two interceptions.

This Saturday Glenville will entertain W.V. State for the Pioneer Homecoming. Game time is scheduled for 1:30 at Pioneer Stadium.

## Harriers Place First and Second in Glenville Invitational

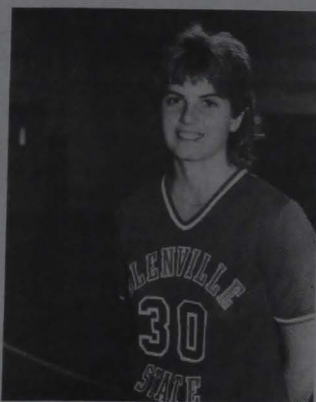

I am sure avid Mountaineer fans can remember the 1984 season in which WVU defeated Penn State 17-14 marking the first time in twenty-eight years the Nittany Lions were dealt a loss by the boys from Morgantown. Although this jinx seemed never ending at times, it was not the longest such streak between two schools. That honor belongs to the Rutgers-Princeton duals. After Princeton defeated Rutgers in 1870, the Scarlet Knights never beat Princeton again until 1938 an incredible sixty-eight year jinx.

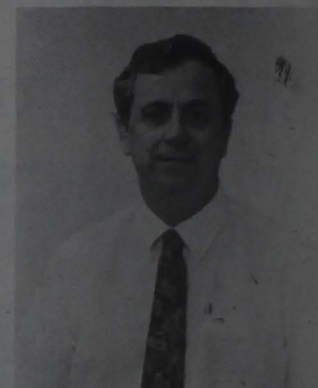
## Shepherd Named A.D.

Patti Kuhl, a senior accounting major from Glenville, has been on the cheerleading squad for 2



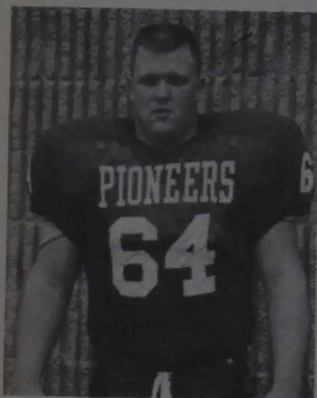

years. While attending GSC, she has been active in the Accounting Society and is currently a typist for the Mercury staff and a member of the Programming Board. Patti cites her hobbies as

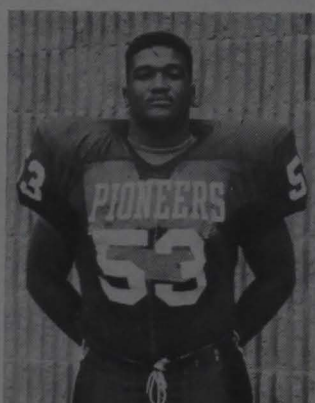
cheerleading, collecting china dolls and decorative fans, hunting, and water skiing.

This weekend promises much activity. Further information can be gained by calling the Alumni Center, 462-7361, ext. 123.

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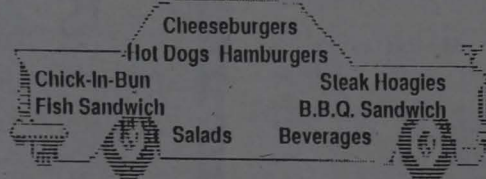
