Enrollment Increases Again

Glenville State College has experienced its third straight year of growth with a fall 1988 enrollment of 2,204. This figure represents a four (4) percent increase over the fall 1987 enrollment. Compared to the fall 1985 enrollment, the college has experienced a nineteen (19) percent enrollment increase.

According to Dean of Records and Admissions Mack K. Samples, the increase can partly be

attributed to the growing of the Summersville Center, but growth has occurred at the main campus as well. "In fact, it is getting more difficult to separate the enrollment by campus locations. More and more students are taking one or two classes at Summersville and one or two classes on the main campus," said Samples.

"It also appears that more students are enrolled on a full time basis (taking 12

hours or more). This development increases the Full Time Equivalent (FTE) figure which determines the funding allocation from the Board of Regents. The FTE for the 1988-89 year is 1,733. This is the second highest FTE in the history of the college. Since the FTE determines the funding level this figure represents good news for the campus among the Maples on the Hill."

Interview With Simmons

Dr. William Simmons is the Chancellor for the Board of Regents and President of Glenville State College. In an interview with Dr. Simmons on Monday, Sept. 19, 1988 we gathered the following information about some of the things that he does for the board.

The Chancellor is the executive officer of the board of Regents and some of his duties are to carry out the policies of the board and the laws of the state of West Virginia in regards to higher education. Dr. Simmons works with a lot of groups, such as: college presidents, various councils, the board and others. He represents the board to external groups; such as: the Governor and the legislature of the State of West Virginia; with such things as: budgets, and legislative programs adopted by the board concerning education.

He has three primary goals this year; 1) Reorganization of the board within the next three months, 2) getting supplemental funding for

higher education to handle a budget shortfall, and 3) to bring the issuance of governance of our higher education system to a close.

Dr. Simmons says that he sees a very bright future for Glenville State College in the coming years; as enrollment continues to grow and he says that he feels that the new Fine Arts Building will help. He also feels that our teacher education program and our two year technical programs will continue to grow and prosper.

In regards to the Nicholas County Center in Summersville, Dr. Simmons says that it may be enlarged in the next few years to accommodate the growing enrollment there and he hopes to see between 2500 and 3000 students enrolled at Glenville State College.

As for the parking situation on campus, Dr. Simmons stated that they were trying to acquire another section of land to add more parking within the next year.

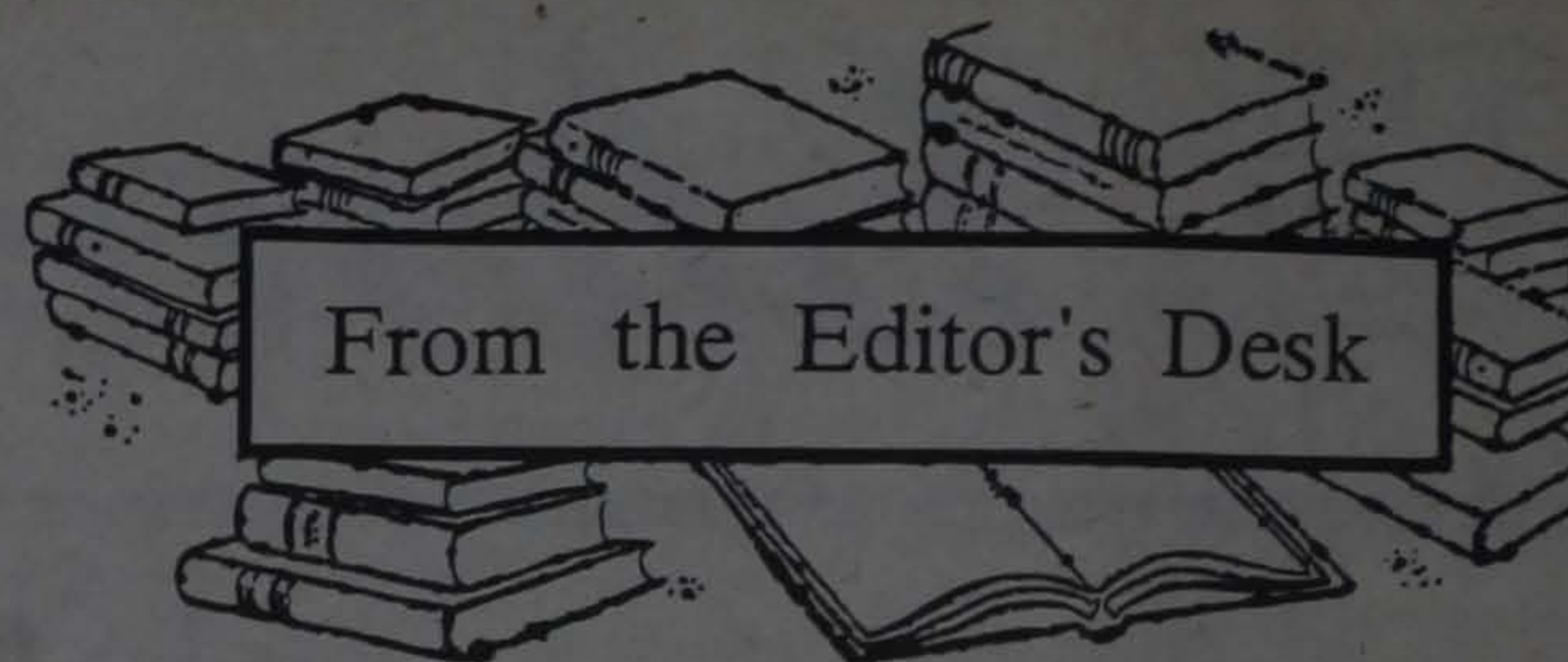

He cuts up a newspaper and miraculously folds it back together, he cuts up ropes, pulls the knots out of them, and through it all he keeps up a steady patter of puns, jokes, and light chatter. As my grandma would say, he tried to talk the stars from Heaven and he damn near succeeded.

TWELFTH NIGHT to be Staged

Glenville State College's theatre department will present Shakespeare's TWELFTH NIGHT October 5, 6, and 7 in the College auditorium. Showtime is 8:00 p.m. each night. GSC students are admitted with ID while there is a small admission fee for off-campus adults and students.

Shakespeare's TWELFTH NIGHT is probably his most compact, clear and easy to understand play. Its characters are easily recognizable from any gathering of people today: an old soldier who drinks too much, a young lady who delights in practical jokes, a man of character who delights in telling people when they are wrong...a lineup you could find in most towns today.

Shakespeare takes all of these characters and plays them off each other with perfect timing and complete

control. His style is clean, his dialogue crisp and to the point. This is the work of a master playwright at the height of his comic powers.

From the beginning of the piece to the end, these everyday characters are thrown together in ways that create nothing but comic confusion, mistaken identities and some of the best tricks and practical jokes in all of drama.

The story follows the adventures of identical twins, brother and sister, who are shipwrecked and washed up on the shores of Illyria. The girl arrives first, and in order to stay alive, dresses as her brother to keep herself alive. Her natural talents come out, and she quickly rises to favor in the Duke's court.

The Duke loves the Lady Olivia, but she doesn't love him. When the Duke employs the girl, dressed as a

boy, to court Olivia for him, the complications begin. Olivia's house includes some notable eccentrics--Sir Toby Belch, whose name describes his character; Sir Andrew Aguecheek, a notable coward and the perfect victim; Maria, Shakespeare's best female sidekick; and Malvolio, a man whose virtues allow very little room for human frailty--until his own frailty is pointed out.

Director Wemm also announced that the remaining parts have been filled. Mike Hanlin will portray Antonio and Ken Williams will act as Valentine.

As the slight drizzle turned into a steady rain, Glenville's special teams unit took the field against the Yellowjackets of West Virginia State to start the 1988 Pioneer Homecoming Game. After WV State returned the kickoff to their own twenty-five yard line, Coach Nocida's defense stopped the Yellowjackets on three plays.

Following the punt, Glenville began their first drive forty-seven yards from the goal line.

Although the field was already slippery, Gordon Stevens looked sharp on first down as he darted for a twenty-five yard gain. Following three running plays, Marc Ferris booted a thirty-nine yard field goal with 10:39 remaining in the first period to give Glenville an early 3-0 lead.

After WV State returned the kickoff to the forty-eight yard line of Glenville, it appeared as if the Yellowjackets were ready to sting. However, WV State quarterback Ken Grier completed his third down toss to an unintended receiver when Glenville's Luther Toney intercepted the pass at the Pioneer thirty-eight yard line.

Unfortunately for Glenville, the second possession was short lived, because WV State linebacker Charles Clark intercepted Alan Baughman's pass and raced forty-one yards for the score. Although the conversion attempt failed, WV State led 6-3 with just over eight minutes remaining in the first quarter.

Following punts from both teams, Glenville started their next drive on their own twenty yard line. Stevens, together with Arthur Drake and Frank Myers all had key runs as the Pioneers gained two first downs to march to the forty-three yard line. On third and long, Baughman's second errant toss of the afternoon was picked off at Glenville's forty-eight yard line.

Despite good field position, WV State could not muster any offense as Glenville's hard-nosed

defense halted the Yellowjackets on three plays. Pioneer Mark Swartzmiller returned the punt to the Glenville fifteen yard line as the first quarter ended with WV State owning a slim 6-3 edge.

In an attempt to ignite the Pioneer offense, Coach Nocida replaced Baughman with backup quarterback Chuck Wharton when the second quarter began. Arthur Drake's seven yard burst on third down came up just short of the first down, thus forcing Wharton to punt.

Once again the stingy Pioneer defense stuffed the Yellowjackets on three plays. Glenville fielded the punt and began at their own seventeen yard line. On second and eight, Wharton's second pass of the game was intercepted by a WV State defender.

Following the fourth turnover of the contest, the Yellowjacket offense went to work at Glenville's thirty-five yard line. On fourth down and three, WV State faked a field goal and gained fifteen yards on a sweep. The Pioneer defense dug in and prevented a touchdown, forcing the Yellowjackets to

kick a twenty-eight yard field goal, which made it 9-3 five minutes into the second quarter.

The next two series for Glenville saw the Pioneers unable to establish any offense whatsoever as both possessions ended in punts. WV State took over at their own forty-three after Glenville's punt, with under two minutes remaining in the first half. WV State quarterback Ken Grier escaped the charging Pioneer rush enabling him to gain seven yards on first down. On second and three, Grier found Vincent Powell for a thirty-six yard touchdown pass. The Yellowjackets had capitalized on a weary Glenville defense which had spent so much time on the field in the first half. The conversion after the score failed, but WV State had widened its lead to 15-3 as the half concluded.

Turnovers, which plagued the Pioneers in the first half, continued in the second when the wet ball squirted loose from a Glenville runner on the first play from scrimmage. WV State recovered at Glenville's

The men's fall golf season began this past weekend when Glenville participated in the Cumberland College Invitational at London Country Club. Glenville won the seven school event with a twenty-seven hole total of 455, edging Lee College by fifteen strokes as the final eighteen holes were canceled due to rain. GSC's Mike Sowards was the medalist of the tournament by posting an impressive 107 total over the twenty-seven holes.

Although the spring is the major season for the golf team, the fall schedule gives Coach Tim Carney a chance to evaluate his squad, which consists of twelve players this season. Senior Mike Sowards and his brother Bob, a former All-American, return to lead the Pioneer linksters. Junior Andy Batten, together with Sophomores Jason Sutton

and John Buser also return from last season's squad which finished second in the state. These five will be joined by a talented group of transfers and freshmen giving Coach Carney much depth.

Freshmen Ben Moore of New Lexington High School, Ohio; Pat Pence of Hillsboro, Ohio; John Pack of Beckley, WV; and Brian Cooper of Oceana, WV are all proven performers. 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twenty-four yard line, and wasted no time scoring when Grier threw his second touchdown of the contest on second down. Terry Ponsugree kicked the extra point as Glenville suddenly found itself down 22-3.

The remainder of the rain soaked game was cluttered with turnovers and penalties, when the grass field turned to mud. In all, sixteen fumbles--eight of which were recovered by the other team, and eight interceptions, prevented both squads from additional scoring and led to a statistician's nightmare. In addition to the turnovers, twenty infractions for more than 200 yards were whistled against the two teams.
