

It is a noted fact that 40% of rape cases are alcohol and/or drug related. Although alcohol and/or drugs are not a direct cause of rape, the mood-altering effect of these substances help to 'set the stage' by reducing men's inhibitions and helping them to excuse their abusive behavior. These substances also weaken a woman's ability to think rationally, assess dangerous situations, and also lessens her capacity to take effective steps to safeguard herself.

When a woman drinks or uses drugs this sometimes appears to others that she was an "accessory" or a "willing participant". Once again she is supposedly accountable, despite the fact that she probably was participating in the same drinking behavior as the man. A double standard is used when referring to the amount of alcohol consumed by a woman before the attack and the amount for the man. Men can drink with their friends and not worry about being victimized, but it is a constant possibility for women. An issue on selfdefense will be contained in next week's paper.

to teach and attend graduate school in Maryland," stated Kevin.



Glenville, which entered the game with three consecutive losses, gave up the first points of the contest when JR McVicker connected on a thirty-four yard field goal with nearly four minutes remaining in the first quarter.

However, on this day, the Pioneer offense had come to play. Arthur Drake's one yard touchdown run four minutes into the second quarter gave Glenville a 6-3 advantage.

The Tigers wasted no time in answering the Pioneers' first score. Fred Houston, Salem's signal caller, scored from one yard out with four and a half minutes remaining in the first half.

Coach Nocida's troops found themselves down 10-6 with possibly just one drive left in the half. Glenville certainly made it a good one, though, because Alan Baughman hit Lonnie Hosby for a ten yard touchdown pass just before the half ended. The extra point was blocked, but GSC owned a 12-10 lead at the intermission. their first half-time lead in three games.

Following a hard fought third quarter in which neither team scored, the final period opened with Glenville continuing another drive. One minute into the quarter Mark Ferris scored his first points of the afternoon, a twenty-seven yard field goal, widening the Pioneer lead to 15-10.

Salem now needed a touchdown if they were

The GSC football team going to win-this one. Behind backs, the Tigers were able to move to Glenville's nineteen yard line. Fred Houston then fired a touchdown strike to Joe Starkey coming out of the backfield. The two point conversion was also success. ful as Salem had moved ahead 18-15 with only five minutes remaining to be played.

After the kickoff return, GSC had seventy yards to march for a score. With hard running from backs Gordon Stevens, Arthur Drake, and Frank Myers, in addition to two clutch completions by Baughman, the Pioneen found themselves one yard away from a possible victory. Baughman then culminated the drive when he gained the final yard himself for the touchdown. Ferris added the extra point, as Glenville had come from behind to post 22-18 victory.

Offensively, the Pioneen gained 307 yards and seventeen first downs. Gordon Stevens gained eighty-nine yards rushing while teammates Arthur Drake and Frank Myen accounted for seventy-six and sixty-four, respectively. Alan Baughman completed ten sixteen attempts for out hundred yards and one touchdown.

Defensively, GSC limited the Tigers to only 220 yards. Glenville also held the Salen quarterback to two comple tions in sixteen attempts four of which were intercepted.

The Quartet is in residence at Virginia Polytechnic Institute State and University. The Audubon Quartet, founded in 1974, received international recognition when they won three major competitions within the first three years of their collaboration - the Portsmouth International String Competition with Yehudi Menuhin heading the jury, the International String Quartet Competition at the Festival Villa-Lobos, and the International String Competition in Evian, France.

Hailed by the NEW YORK TIMES for their "...Individual virtuosity and the ensemble polish, " the AUBUBON STRING QUARTET has been acclaimed for their performances throughout the United States, Europe, South America and China.

Each season the quartet tours throughout Europe and the United States, appearing on the most prestigious chamber music series, including Today's Artists Series in San Francisco, Friends of Chamber Music in

Vancouver, the Frick Collection in New York, and the Distinguished Artists Series in Philadelphia. In summer, they are in residence at the summer festivals of Mount Gretna in Pennsylvania and Chautauqua in New York. They were the first American quartet to tour the People's Republic of China, have played at the renowned Academy of Santa Cecilia in Rome, and at Wigmore Hall in London. In the spring of 1988 they returned to South America for a highly successful tour.

The Audubon Quartet has been privileged to perform many world premiers including Peter Schickele's AMERICAN DREAM and Ezra Laderman's QUARTET NO. 6 "THE AUDUBON". Their first recording for RCA, scheduled for release

soon, includes these two commissions. They have also recorded on the Orion and Opus One Labels. They have collaborated in concert with jazz violinist Joe Kennedy, pianist Leon Bates and flutist Harold Jones.

Members of the quartet are David Ehrlich, violin; David Salness, violin; Doris Lederer, viola; and Thomas Shaw, 'cello. As individual instrumentalists, they trained as such prestigious schools as the Curtis Institute Tel-Aviv University, the Israeli Conservatory, and with some of the world's finest teachers including, among others, David Cerone, Michael Tree, Shmuel Ashkenasi, Ilona Feher, and Aldo Parisot.

Although distinguished soloists in their own right, as chamber musicians they have joined together to form a quartet of remarkable virtuosity. Of a performance in New York, the NEW YORK TIMES music critic commented, "...the Audubon seems completely free of technical constraints. They listen to one another and adjust instinctively to produce a sound of a strikingly beautiful luminescent quality that invariably serves the music with grace, sophistication and vibrancy...a brilliant performance."

This program is being assisted by grants from the West Virginia Department of Culture and History and from the Mid Atlantic Arts Foundation.
