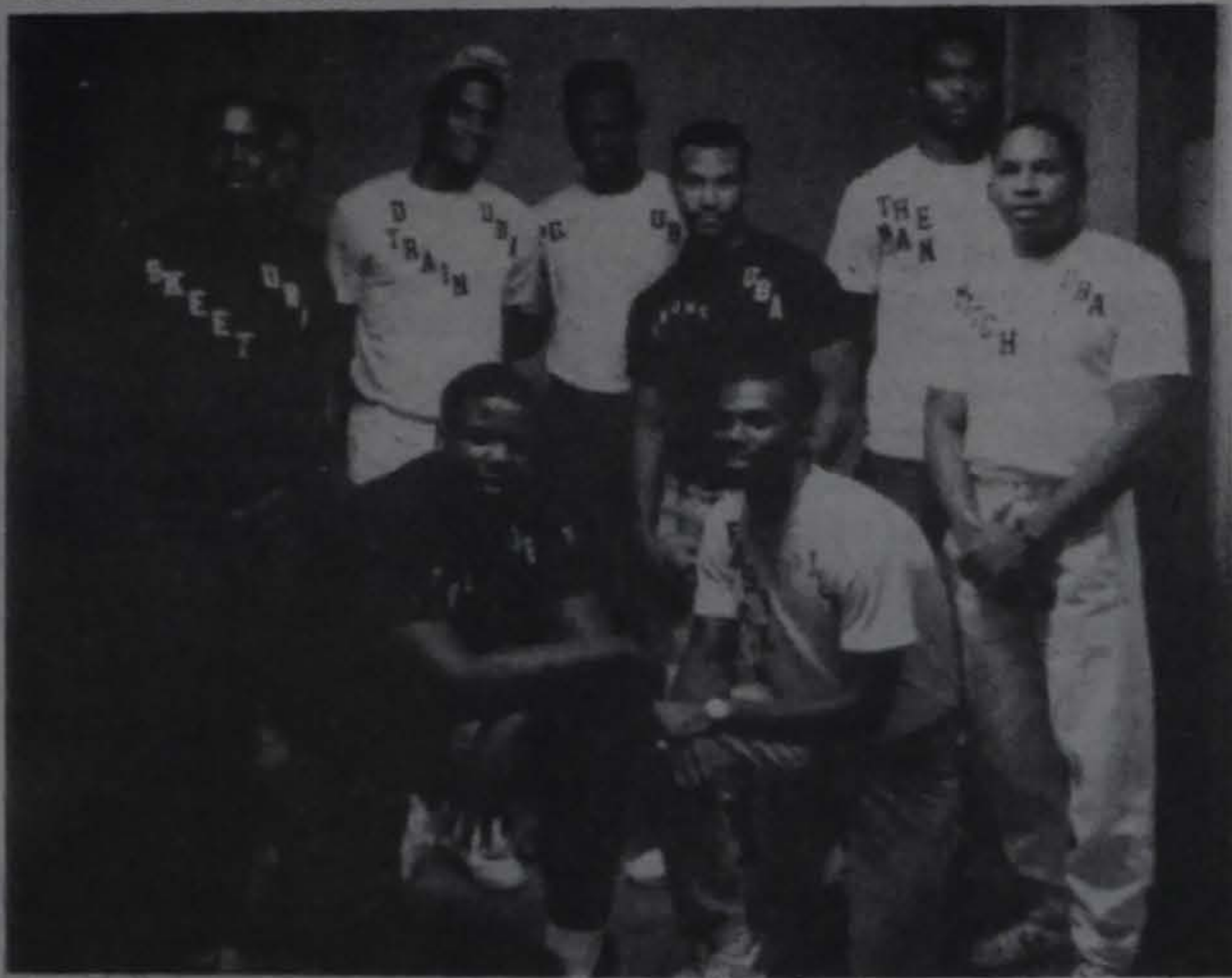

Surveyors Earn Scholarships

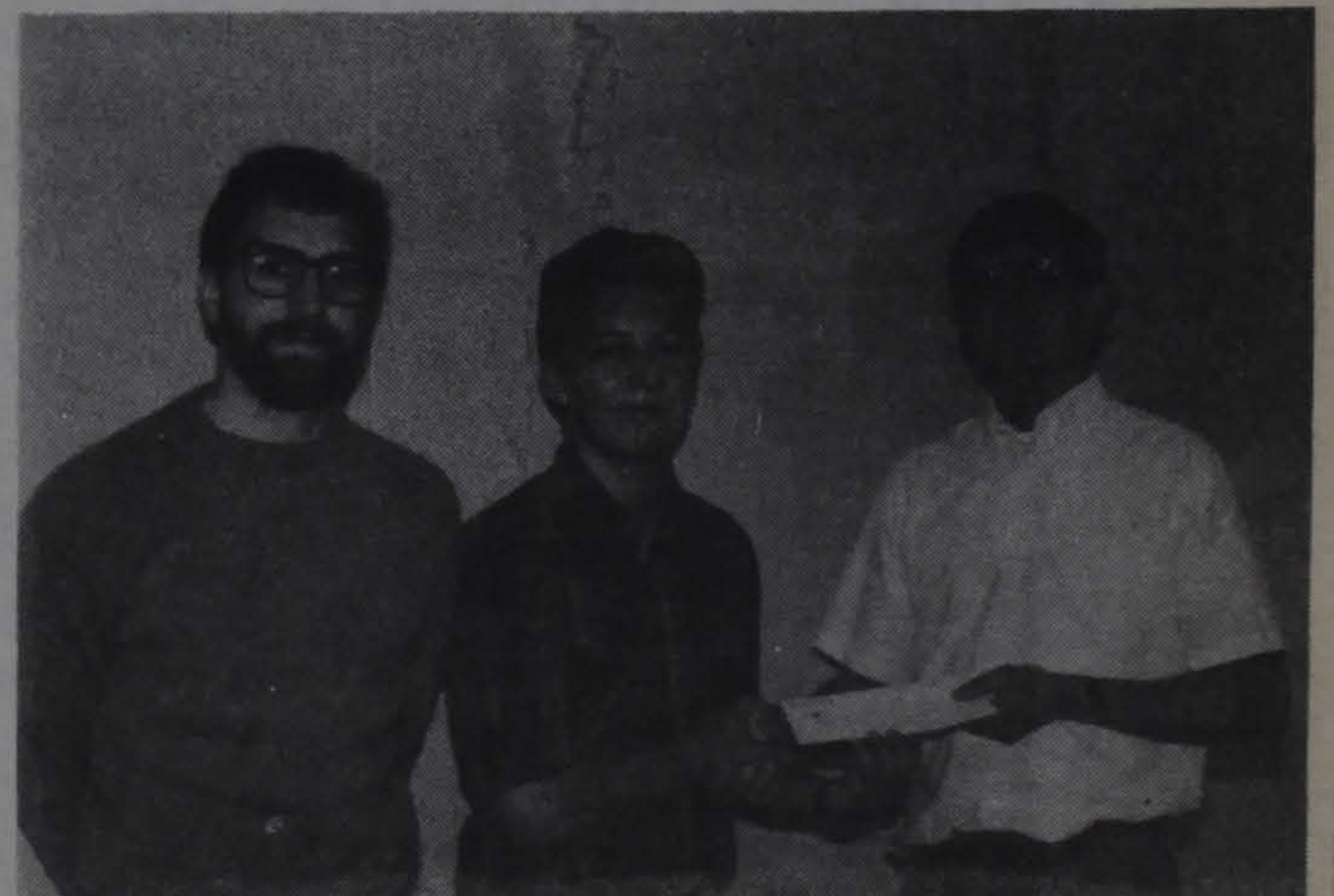

WGSC Makes Plans

During the fall of 1967, Buddy Griffin and four other students, along with a faculty advisor got together to form a Radio Club. "We came upon the idea," remarked Mr. Griffin, "because no other college had one. You couldn't pick up any radio stations here."

The students started out with a Heath Kit which didn't produce a strong reception. "With the help of Mr. Jones, a maintenance personnel," explained Mr. Griffin, "we wired the radio into the dormitory."

Ren Roth was the major force behind the money raising, while George Dudding was the technical wizard, and Buddy Griffin worked with production.

"The students received the idea of the station real well because then some of the students would stay in the dorm on weekends," remarked Mr. Griffin. "The faculty at first thought it was rebellious because it was new, but they finally accepted it." They raised the money by taking ads from the fraternities and sororities and by going door to door in Glenville asking for donations.

The station was on the air in time for the 1969 football season and did a remote broadcast from the State Basketball tournament. "For the music each one of the dee jays would bring his own records, and we would put them on the air," stated Mr. Griffin. "We were given the cable channel 13 in Glenville, and Mr. Hickman would read news over the cable channel."

Later, with the help of the college, the students acquired a Gates mixer and tape caster. They set up regular meeting times and wrote a constitution with

by-laws. WGSC, with the cooperation of the academic dean, was able to offer a course in radio taught as adjunct teacher. This was an attempt to try to get radio courses in the curriculum of the college. Unfortunately, the course was not continued after its first offering.

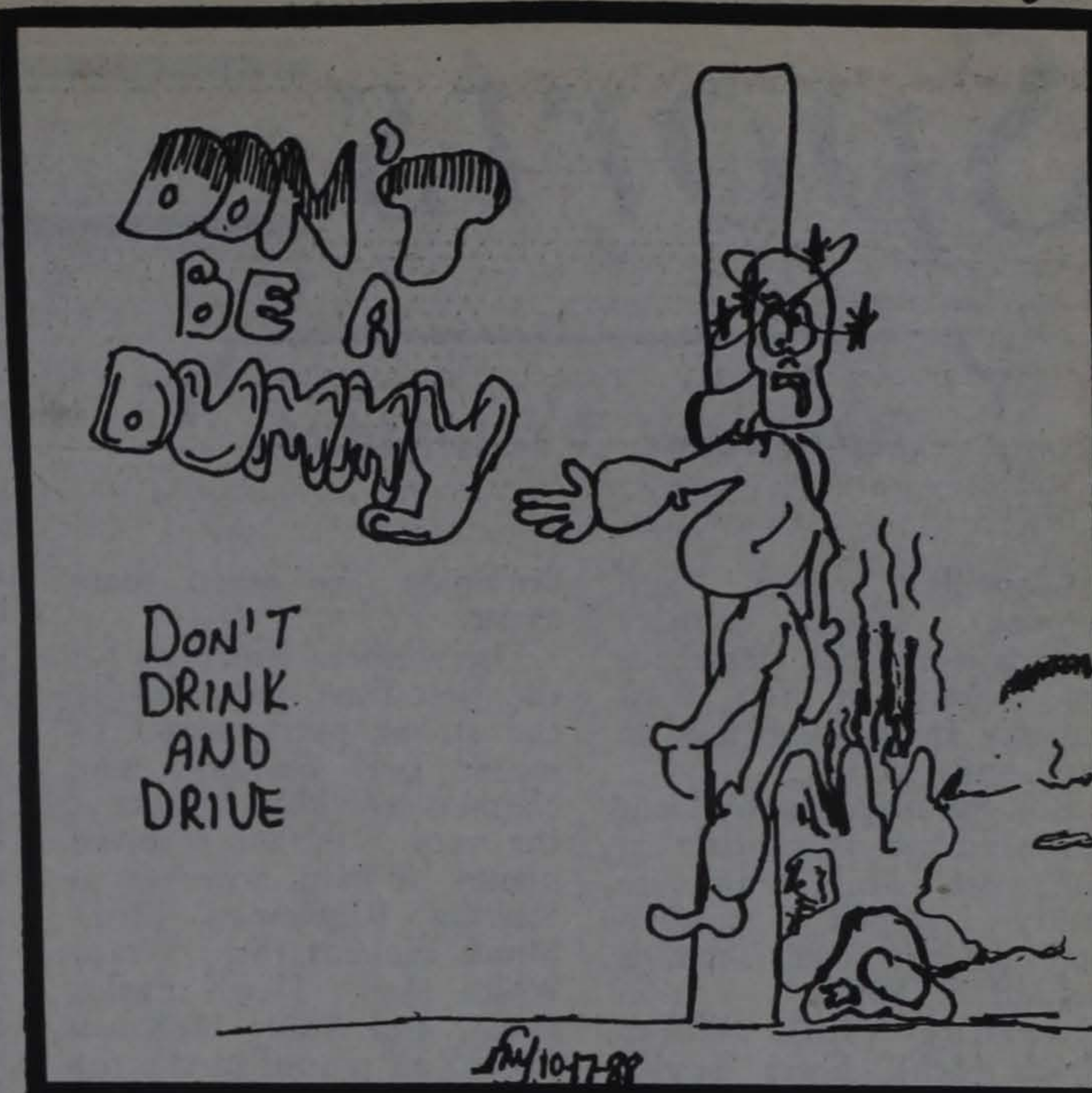
"The closing of WGSC can be linked to many different reasons," explained Dr. Billips. "The major problem was that they couldn't get a division to head the project. The best part of the station was that they got practical experience even if they didn't get classroom teaching," Dean Billips went on to say. "They learned enough that a few of them were able to go on and get jobs in broadcasting."

In April, 1987, twenty students, along with Dennis Wemm, started meeting to form a Radio Club in hopes of reviving WGSC. They hoped to offer it as a non-degree program, but things didn't work out as planned.

This year they are again attempting to bring back WGSC. When asked what it would entail to get the radio station back on the air, Mr. Wemm said, "A check of the equipment and access to outside lines to go from the studio to the transmitter, all of which cost money."

The group is trying many different ways to raise money for the project. "If they want to get this project off the ground," said Mr. Griffin, "then they are going to have to get the faculty involved." "The student body can take an active part," stated Wemm, "in that they can give suggestions and support."

The target date for WGSC sign-on is late spring.

FALCONS SOAR PAST PIONEERS

As the temperature rose to a comfortable sixty-four degrees, the sixty-fourth football clash between Glenville and Fairmont was getting started at Pioneer Stadium.

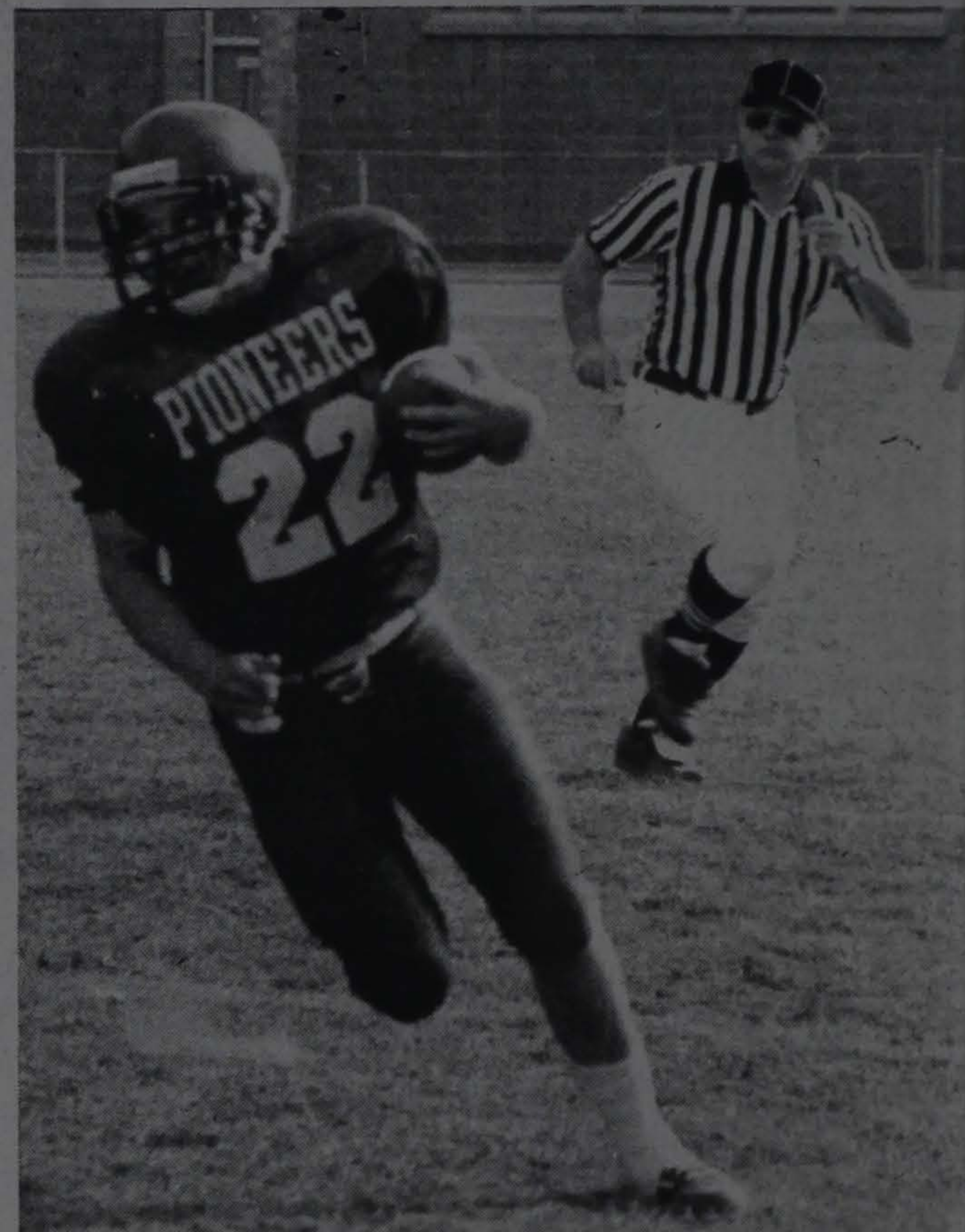
Following a Jeff Swisher interception on the Falcons' first play from scrimmage, Coach Nocida's offensive squad began their first series at their own twenty-four yard line. Alan Baughman found flanker Lonnie Hosby on two thirteen yard pass plays, helping the Pioneers gain three first downs. Chuck Wharton's fourth down punt was downed by Terry Donnell at the Fairmont five yard line.

Beginning from deep in their own territory, Fairmont promptly marched to their own forty-two yard line. On first down, charging John Batten delivered a crushing blow on the scrambling Fairmont quarterback, jarring the ball loose in the process. Brian Hill recovered the second Falcon turnover at the Glenville forty-eight yard line.

Although the Falcons forced GSC to punt after three running plays, Coach Hood's team was not long in holding the ball on their third possession. On second down, a mixup between the Fairmont signal caller and one of his backs caused their third turnover in the first quarter.

After the recovery, Glenville began at the Fairmont twenty-four yard line. However, the Pioneers took a page from the Falcon playbook when the option pitch was bobbled and eventually lost to a defender on second down. Fairmont began from their own twenty-seven yard line, but was unable to gain a first down. On fourth down, a bad snap allowed the big, blue defensive unit to sack the Falcon punter for a large loss.

Following a personal foul penalty, Glenville faced a first and twenty-five situation, thirty-six yards from the goal line. Baughman's sixteen yard toss to the speedy Hosby, together with two running plays, moved the ball to the fourteen yard line. A field goal attempt by Marc Ferris was blocked on fourth down, which was recovered by the Falcons at their own twelve yard line.

As the first quarter came to a close, Fairmont was faced with second down and twelve. A questionable pass interference call enabled the Falcons to gain a first down. However, the turnovers continued for the white and maroon when tailback Don Overton coughed up the ball, and the Pioneers recovered. Starting from their own thirty-six yard line, GSC drove to the Falcon thirteen yard line. On fourth down, the second Pioneer field goal attempt of the day was also blocked by a hard rushing defense.

The next eight minutes of the second quarter continued to be plagued with turnovers, as both teams committed two. Fairmont recovered the third Glenville fumble at the Pioneer five yard line. On second down Overton scored from two yards, and Scott Lewis added the extra point allowing Fairmont to open a 7-0 lead with just two minutes remaining in the first half.

After a short Glenville punt, the Falcons started from the Pioneer nineteen yard line. Although his first and second down tosses fell

incomplete, Fairmont quarterback Pat Burson found split end Bruce Lang on third down for the score. The extra point was good, which made it 14-0 at the half.

Unfortunately for GSC fans, the second half saw the Pioneers unable to score. Fairmont found the offensive firepower it displayed in previous weeks, by scoring on its second, third, and fourth possessions of the half. Two field goals, Overton's second touchdown run, and a two point conversion made it 28-0, the final score.

Glenville, 2-4 overall and 1-4 in the WV Conference, goes on the road this Saturday to play Concord. The Mountains Lions are fresh off a 21-0 shut-out win over Georgia Southwestern, and enter the game with a 5-1-1 record, 3-1-1 in the WV Conference.

Buser's Briefs

With the recent completion of the 1988 Summer Olympics, many Americans have become familiar with the stand-out track performances of Jackie Joyner-Kersey and Florence Griffith-Joyner. Although these accomplishments of these ladies are outstanding, one of the most inspiring athletes in history was Wilma Rudolph. For starters, she became the first American woman ever to win three gold medals in the Olympics, winning gold in the 100- and 200-meter runs as well as the 400-meter relay in the 1960 Olympics. This is amazing when you consider that illness left her unable to walk until she was eight years old. Then she not only learned to walk, but became one of the greatest runners in the world.

Who was the youngest coach ever to win the national championship in major college football? The answer is Danny Ford whose Clemson Tigers won the national title in 1981 when Ford was thirty-three years old.

This year Clemson is having another banner season as the Tigers are 5 - 1 and ranked eleventh in the nation. Their lone defeat came at the hands of the fifth ranked Florida State Seminoles. Keep your eyes on Coach Ford's bunch while they climb up the rankings.

Of all the men who have ever played in the National Football League, which one scored the most touchdowns in a career? The answer is Jim Brown, who in nine seasons from 1957 through 1965, scored 126 touchdowns, in the NFL.
