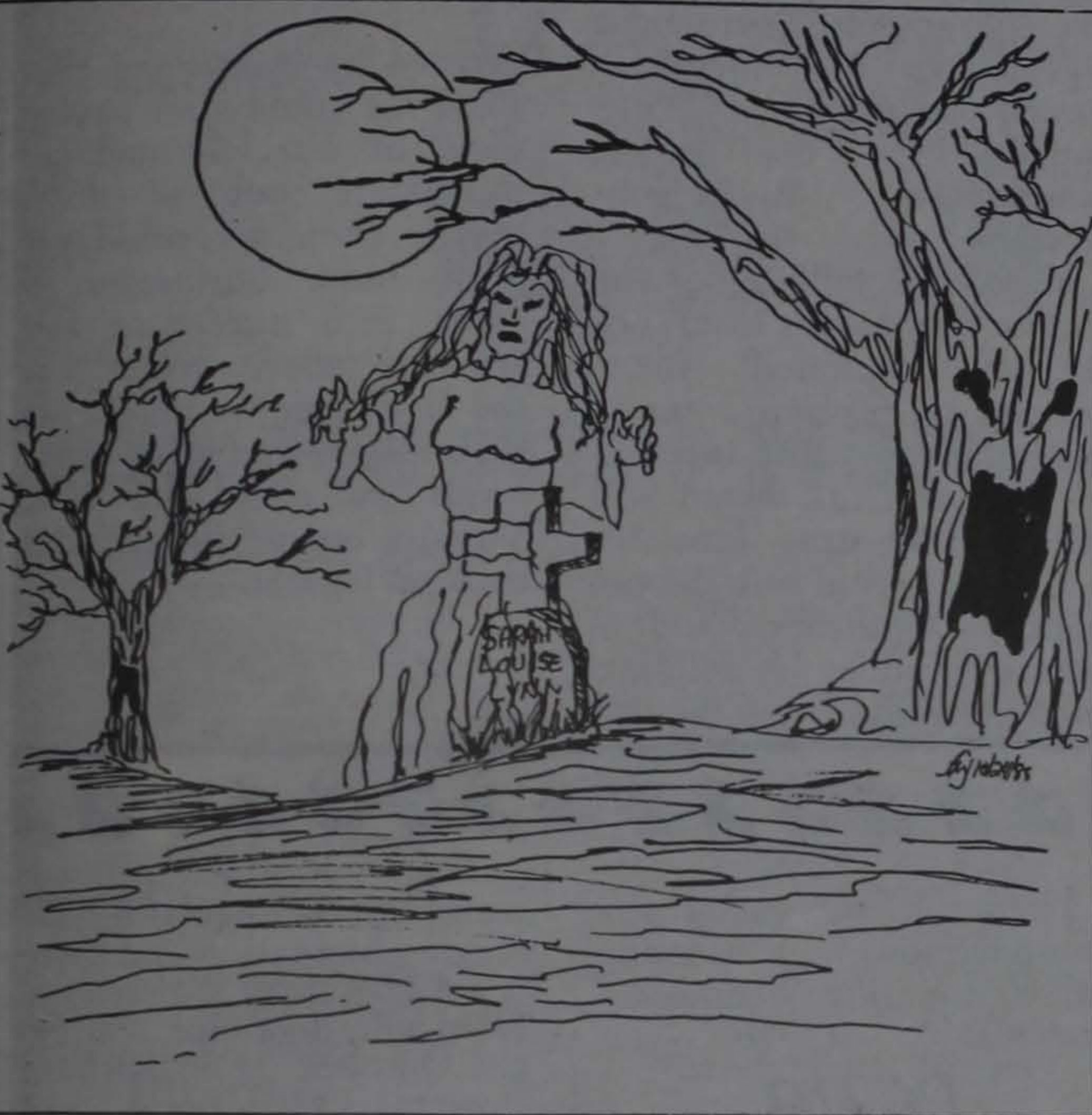

Clark Hall's Ghost

The legend of Sis Linn has grown to epic proportion on the campus of Glenville State College. Especially around Halloween, tales are told of a woman who was raped and killed, of a tower bell which rings thirteen on Halloween night, of fleeting contact through the use of a Ouija Board.

A boarding house used to stand where the Clark Hall parking lot is now. It was run by a fairly well-to-do lady named Sarah Louise (Sis) Linn.

One cold, dark, winter's night in 1919, Sis and a friend were alone in the house. All the college kids were home for the holidays and the boarding house was empty. Sis and her companion had spent an evening trying to frighten each other by playing pranks. Sis's companion retired for the night and Sis decided to walk downtown. As she let herself into the darkened house, she was attacked by several young men. Sis's companion thought she was just trying to frighten her with her screams. She did not stir from her room until

the next morning. When she opened her bedroom door, she found Sis laying dead in the hall.

According to legend, Sis fought back well before her death, biting off her attacker's earlobe. That night, a one-eared man was seen on the streets of Glenville. No arrests were made.

The boarding house was torn down to allow for the building of a residence hall, Verona Maple Hall, which was soon after torn down.

The ghost moved into Clark Hall. There are reports of doors opening and closing, lights flipping on and off, strange, unexplained noises, all when no one could possibly be in the building. The teachers, custodial staff, and students have all adjusted to the ghost over the years, even begun to bask in the light of her notoriety. What choice do they have, you may ask? Well, none as far as that goes. After all, I'm not going to be the one to tell Sis Linn to leave, are you?

Violinist Glenn Basham will perform in concert at Glenville State College on Monday, October 31, at 8:00 p.m. in the College auditorium.

Mr. Basham, the Fort Wayne Philharmonic's new concertmaster, is a native of Washington, D.C. He is a graduate of the North Carolina School of the Arts, and has recently received a master's degree with high distinction from Indiana University's renowned School of Music. His teachers have included Alexander Prilutchi, Vartan Manoogian and Yuval Yaron, with extensive coaching in chamber music with members to the Juilliard Quartet, and with Josef Gingold.

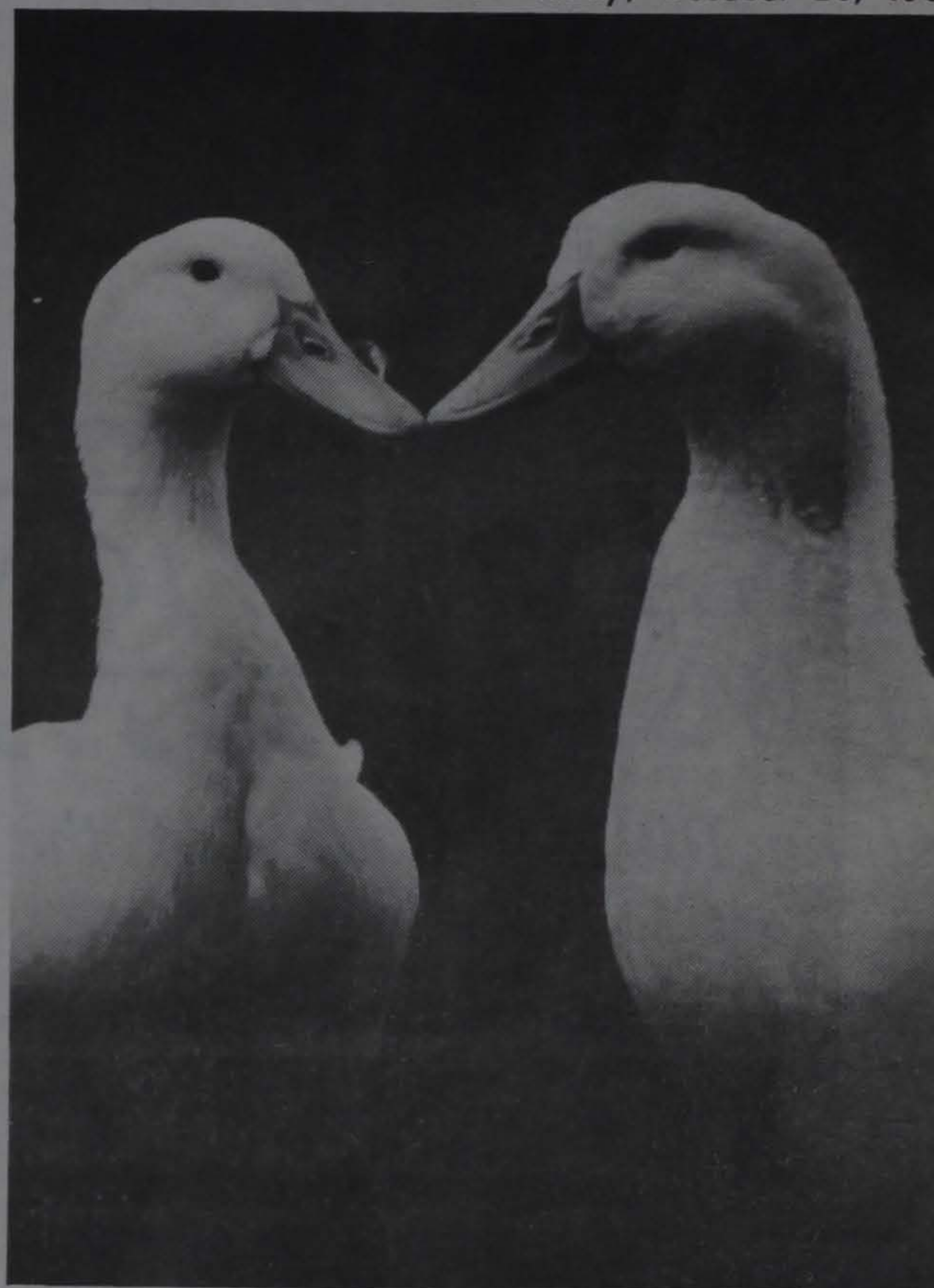
Until 1982, Basham was a member of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra under Maestro Antal Dorati. He then served for three years as Minister of Music at a large non-denominational church in Lansing, Michigan, during which time he pursued his interest in composition.

In addition to church music, Basham has also composed music for orchestra, which was premiered by the Fort Wayne Philharmonic in a recent concert in Ohio. Commissioned by the Beckett Corporation, "Bach at Beckett" is a unique musical tour through a modern manufacturing plant, complete with drills, compressors, and sirens, all included in the score.

Among the more recent awards received by Basham are a University Fellowship at Indiana University, first prize at the 1986 National Young Artists Competition hosted by the Lansing Symphony, and a television appearance with Pianist Ralph Votapek. In addition, award-winning Indiana composer David Canfield has recently dedicated his second Violin Sonata, SIGHTS AND SORROWS, to Mr. Basham.

West Virginia is now a credit card state. An article in last Friday's Parkersburg News stated that the next governor will face bills of \$213 million. Fifty million of which was for a loan approved this year and eight million for an installment on another loan. The other \$155 million was for: \$110 million for the Public Employees Insurance Agency, \$16 million for the Teachers Retirement System, and \$14 million for Social Security and \$15 million for the Public Employees Retirement System.

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AIDS AWARENESS WEEK

An estimated one and a half million people, nationally, are infected with HIV (Human Immunodeficiency Virus), a virus which attacks the white blood cells that are important for normal immune function. HIV causes AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome) by impairing the immune system, whereby the system breaks down, rendering the body unable to fight against infection. The virus can remain inactive in the human body for months or even years, but eventually it will begin reproducing, destroying the white blood cells and weakening the immune system. Once this begins, the individual then becomes susceptible to other infections, known as "opportunistic infections," which can eventually kill them. The most common "opportunistic infections" are Pneumocystis Carinii, a form of pneumonia, Kaposi's Sarcoma, a large lesion-like type of skin cancer, or various other neurological diseases.

AIDS itself cannot be detected by a test, but there are tests available to screen donated blood for the HIV virus. These tests, the ELISA and the Western Blot, are used by identifying antibodies to the virus in the blood stream. Blood samples are first tested using the ELISA test, and those samples that test positive repeatedly are then tested by the Western Blot. Since the ELISA test can give false-positive results only the samples that also test positive by the Western Blot are considered positive for HIV. By combining the results from both of these tests, the degree of accuracy is usually greater than 99%.

Many people avoid taking these tests; however, for various reasons; the most common of which is fear: fear of being infected, fear of being told not to become pregnant, and/or the fear of losing a partner. Those who consider themselves at risk of having the virus frequently avoid the test as well, because they feel that knowing they are infected will not help them. By ignoring the drastic possibility though, they only assist in spreading the epidemic (particularly if

they continue to be sexually active-exposing multiple partners to this deadly disease).

This epidemic is not only spread by ignorance, as to say, but it is also transmitted by intimate heterosexual, bisexual, or homosexual contact with an infected partner, sharing contaminated needles by intravenous drug users, transmission from an infected mother to her infant during pregnancy or childbirth, and through contaminated blood transfusions received from 1978 to mid 1985. As documented; however, AIDS cannot be transmitted through casual contact like the use of public restrooms, shaking hands, hugging, coughing, sneezing, or social kissing. This does not necessarily mean that deep kissing cannot transmit the virus, although it has been isolated in saliva. It is also reported that insects are not able to transmit the disease and that donating blood poses no risk.

Although there is still no known cures or vaccine for AIDS or the HIV virus there are precautions which can be taken against the transmission of HIV. Absolute protection can only be achieved by limiting the number of sexual partners, using condoms during intercourse (this is not necessarily the safest method-although protection may prove more effective when used with nonoxynol-9 + a chemical shown to kill the HIV virus), avoiding sexual contact with members of high-risks groups or a partner who's history is unknown, and by avoiding use of alcohol and drugs which may impair your judgement.

In a time when considerable caution should be taken when engaging in sexual activities, in non-monogamous sex- this being a high factor in the transmission of this deadly disease. Is the abandonment of caution really worth your life?

Pioneers Fall to Mountain Lions

Heading into Saturday's contest with nationally ranked Concord, few people expected the Glenville gridders to threaten the Mountain Lions. After all, Concord was 5-1-1 and fresh off a 21-0 shut-out win over Georgia Southwestern.

However, the Mountain Lions might have been looking ahead, because the Pioneers struck first for an early lead. Junior fullback Frank Myers

powered through the defense for a seven yard touchdown run. The extra point attempt was blocked, but GSC owned a 6-0 advantage with seven and a half minutes remaining in the first quarter.

The early score seemed to awaken Concord, because the Mountain Lions wasted no time in answering. Behind the running of Lane Lowery and his fellow backfield teammates, Concord marched to the one yard line. Lowery capitalized the drive with his one yard dive for the score. After the extra point, the Mountain Lions had taken a slim 7-6 lead with just over four minutes remaining in the first quarter.

The remainder of the first half was a defensive struggle. The only other scoring occurred when Concord's Tracy Gravely

returned an interception twenty-seven yards for a touchdown. The extra point failed, but Concord had opened a 13-6 lead at the half.

In the second half, freshman quarterback Ronald York led the Mountain Lions to another score. With just under seven minutes remaining in the third period, York scampered twenty-four yards for the touchdown. The point after was good as Concord went on top 20-6.

Once again, both defensive units proved to be quite stingy, preventing either team from additional scoring. Concord was limited to only ten first downs on the day. Glenville managed eleven first downs, despite being held to only thirty-seven yards of total offense.

With the 20-6 win in Athens on Saturday, the Mountain Lions moved to 6-1-1, 4-1-1 in the WV conference. Glenville, meanwhile, slipped to 2-5 overall and 1-5 in the conference.

This Saturday the Pioneers will host West Virginia Tech. The West Virginia conference school enters the contest with a 1-7 mark, and are tied with Glenville at 1-5 in the conference. Game time is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. at Pioneer Stadium.

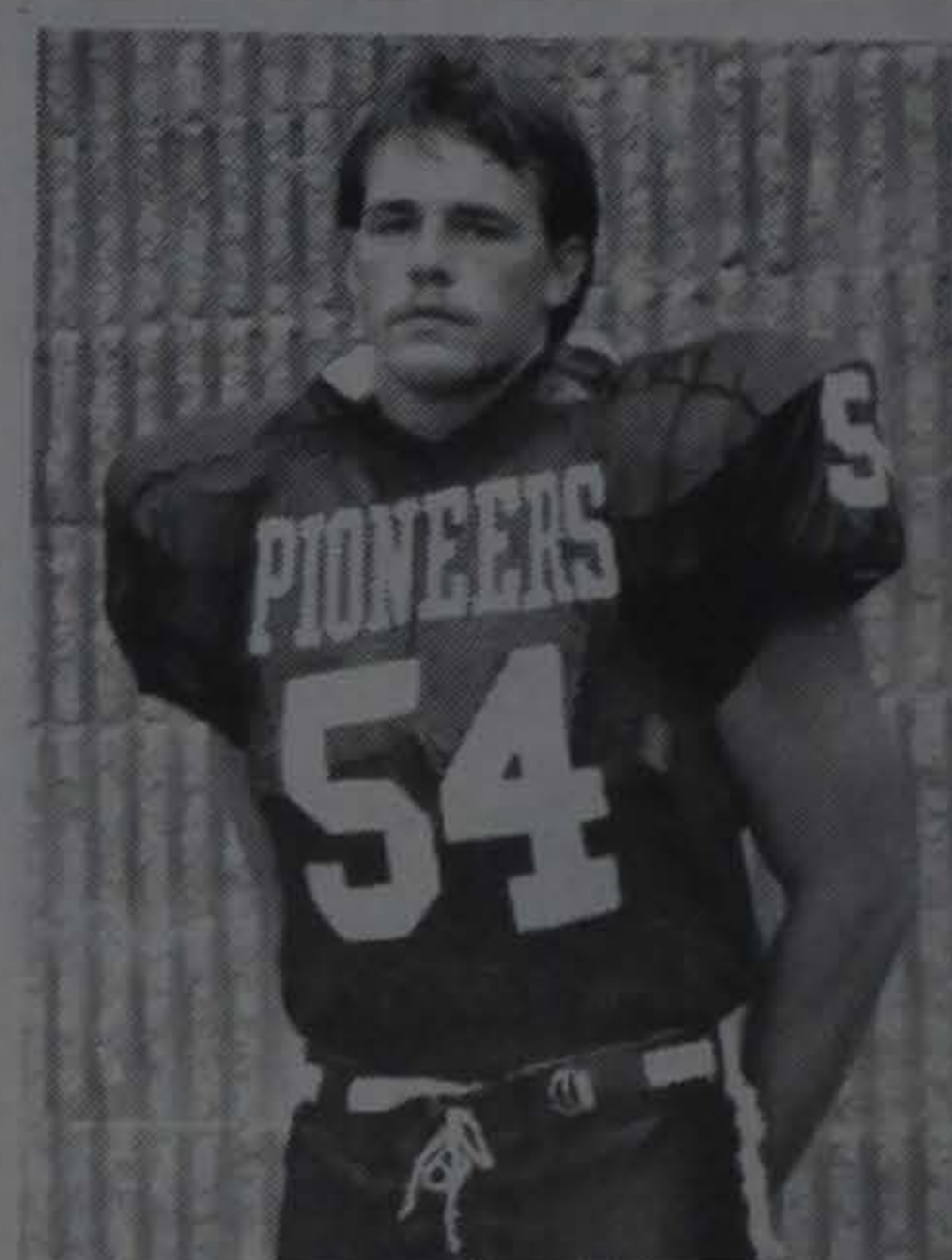

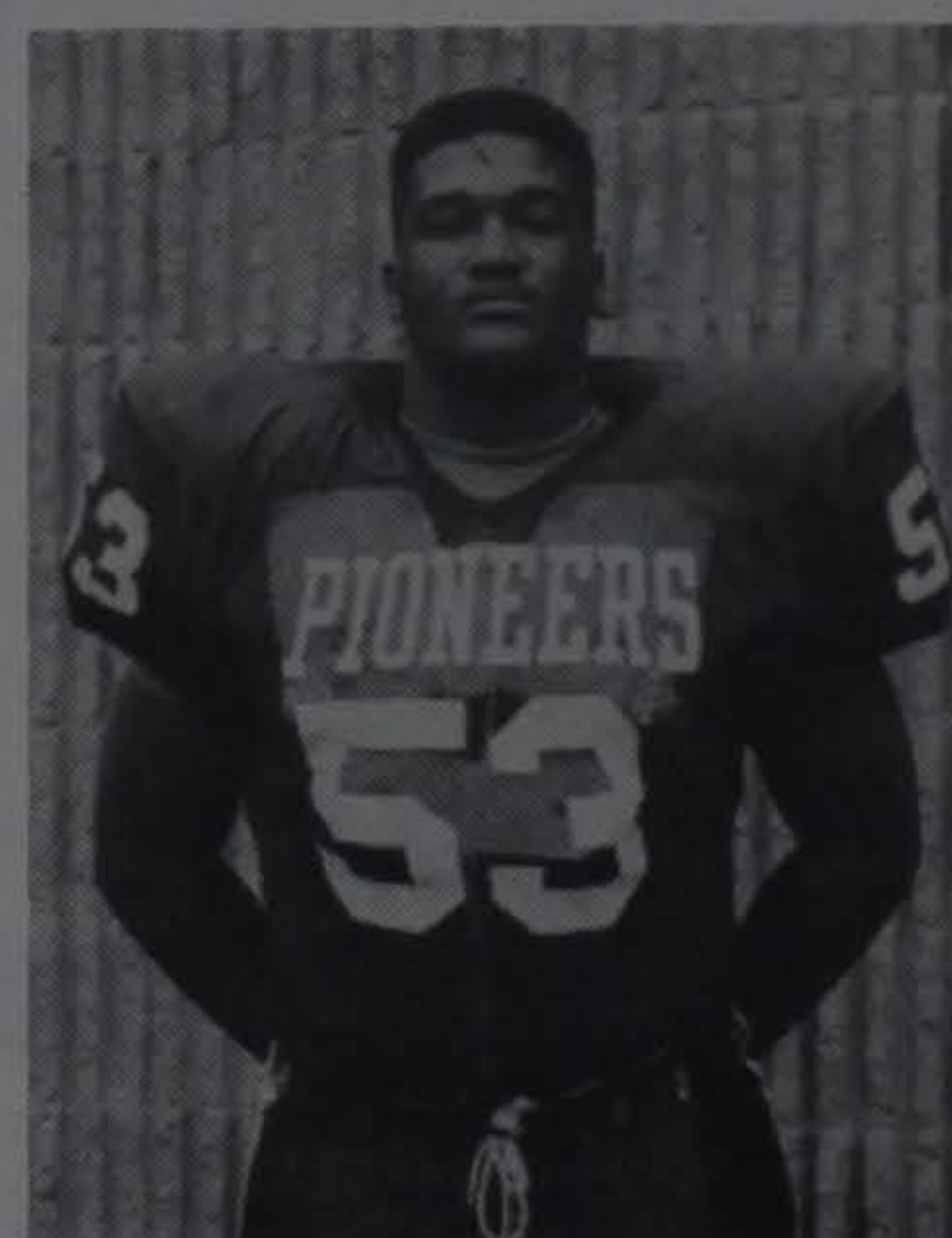
