

Former Instructor Passes Away

Bessie Boyd Bell Scott, a retired teacher of Glenvile State College, died Monday, October 31, 1988 at the age of 97.

Born on July 5, 1891 in Glenville, where she had remained as a life long resident. She was the daughter of the late Floyde Warren and Lora Bower Bell also of Gilmer County.

Bessie Boyd Bell was married to Ray Scott. She was widowed on January 20, 1972.

Bessie graduated from Gilmer County Normal School in 1908. She later enrolled at WVU, where whe earned her AB degree in 1913.

She taught at Cabin

Creek District High School from 1913 to 1916. She then taught at St. Mary's High School until she returned to teach at Gilmer County in both the Normal School and at the college, until she retired in 1957.

Upon retirement, she founded the Gilmer County Historical Society.

She was a delegate for the Democratic National Nominating Convention in Chicago; chosen Daughter of the Year in 1961 by the West Virginia Society of the District of Columbia; and was honored by Glenville State College when they named the added portion of Pickens Hall, "Scott Wing",

She was a member of the Association of University Women, Farm Bureau, West Virginia Historical Society, all teachers' organizations, a member of the Woman's Club and the Trinity United Methodist Church of Glenville.

In 1981, Scott was the 118th person chosen as the West Virginia Ambassador of Goodwill by A. James Manchin. She is listed in "Personalites of the South for 1975-76."

Scott is proceeded in death by two brothers and one sister.

Services were held on Friday, Nov. 4th by Reverend Robert Nicholas and Reverend Margaret Huributt.



The senior student recitals fulfill partial requirements for graduation from the GSC music curriculum.




Letter From Billips

Lady Pioneers Perfect

The 1988 Lady Pioneer cage campaign began Nov. 19th and 20th when Glenville participated in a four team tournament at Frostburg, Md. In the first round, GSC defeated Trenton St. 80-66 as several players contributed. The Lady Pioneers, which had five players reach double figures, were led by Monique Johnson's 16 points.

In the championship contest against host Frostburg, Glenville ran into a very talented Bobcat squad. At the half, the ladies in blue and white held a slim 51-49 advantage. However, in the second half, the Lady Pioneers gradually pulled away en route to a 93-79 championship victory. Kim Creel posted 22 points and 9 rebounds for the winners and was selected to the alltournament team. Tammy Pence added 18 points and 8 boards, and was named the tournament MVP, in addition to joining Creel on the all-tournament squad.

Playing in front of their own fans for the first time this season, the Lady Pioneers

came out fired up on Nov. 29th for their game with WV State. After jumping out to a whopping 51-24 mark at the half, Glenville never looked back, winning 90-68. Kim Creel was the game's high scorer with 23 points, while Tammy Pence added 16.

Following the WV State blow-out, the Lady Pioneers came out somewhat flat on Thursday (Dec. 1), and as a result found themselves down 35-31 to Bluefield at the intermission. However, the veteran Glenville squad survived an uncharacteristic number of turnovers to come from behind, and then hold off a pesky Lady Blue team in an 83-72 heart stopper. Tammy Pence paced Glenville with a season high 26 points, while Monique Johnson added 22.

Having to play their third game in four days, Glenville went up against upsetminded Wheeling Jesuit on Friday (Dec. 2). Clinging to a 42-39 halftime advantage, the Lady Pioneers could never shake the Lady Cardinals until the last few Lady cagers cont. on pg. 5

The Glenville men's basketball season began on Nov. 15th and 16th when they played in the Joe Manchin Memorial Tournament held at Salem. The Pioneers were pitted against Alderson-Broaddus in the first round and came away with an 80-74 victory over the Battlers. Paul Grier pumped in a game high 38 points to pace GSC, which owned a narrow 33-32 advantage at the half.

Because of their victory over A-B, Glenville faced Salem in the championship contest. At the end of regulation play, the Tigers and Pioneers found themselves deadlocked at 55, thanks to a Clinton Hinton layup with nine seconds left. In the overtime period, Salem outscored GSC 8-7 to take a narrow 63-62 win. Paul Grier was the game's high scorer once again, as he poured in 23, earning the tournament's MVP award in the process. Hinton added 18 points for Glenville and was also named to the All-Tournament team.

While many students were searching for a trophy buck on Nov. 21st and 22nd, the GSC cage team was in North Carolina for the Rotary Dixie Classic. In the first round, the Pioneers were nipped by Penbroke 83-78. Paul Grier and David Hall were the high scorers for Glenville with 26 and 25 points respectively.

In the consolation game, GSC faced a talented Livingstone club and came away with a well-deserved 82-78 victory. David Hall was the game's high scorer with 23 points, while Clinton Hinton chipped in with 20 points and 11 rebounds.

With their record squared at 2-2, Glenville returned for their home opener with Ohio-Belmont on Nov. 26th. The Pioneers who were ready to play, coasted to a 113-69 victory. GSC, which led 57-27 at the half, placed seven


and USC. Of course all of this controversy can be thrown out if WVU wins and Nebraska upsets Miami. Go Cornhuskers!

Harriers Finish Strong

The Glenville State College cross country squads completed a very successful season over the Thanksgiving break when they participated in the NAIA National Cross Country Championships on November 19, held at Kenosha, Wisconstn. The Pioneer men finished 19th out of a total of thirty-seven teams--the highest finish ever by a WVC school. The Lady Pioneers, meanwhile, grabbed a 25th place finish from the field of thirty-six schools in their first season with a complete team.

By placing three of its runners in the top ten, Adams State College from Alamosa, Colorado, captured the men's title for the ninth time in the last ten years. Leading the way for Glenville was co-captain Bubby Dent, who finished 37th overall out of a strong field of 342, with his 25:45 Dent's fellow cocaptain, Andy Jarrell, was next for the Pioneers with a 26:07 time (65th). Mickey Grass followed with a 26:55 effort (141st), while freshman Tony Taylor ran a solid race for a 27:27 mark (204th). Ed

Lamp completed the scoring for GSC with his 27:52 race, which was good enough for 236th.

The women's title went to Pacific Lutheran University, Washington, which landed four of its runners in the top ten. Kat Riggleman paced the Lady Harriers from GSC, with her 19:55 time, which finished 115th out of the field of 300 runners. Lori Barker's 20:47 race earned her a 177th finish, while teammates Tracy White 21:14 (203rd), and Mindi Pickens 21:27 (215th) followed closely behind. Dawn Farley 23:12 (272nd) and Stacy McKown 24:22 (286th) rounded out the Glenville scoring.

Second year head coach Jesse Skiles was very pleased with this season's teams and commented, "In September, I never thought we would have done so well. As a group they practiced very hard, and a a result we had some overachievers at nationals." After such an impressive season, it is encouraging to note that Coach Skiles will only lose one member from this year's team to graduation.


