organizations. She has been listed in Who's Who in Colleges and Universities and was Outstanding Young Woman in 1983. Dr. Nicholson, referring to her new position in the governor's office, said she 'enjoys the new challenge and being busy, but finds the pace more intense than teaching, though not more intellectually challenging." She is "looking forward to informing the public about the governor's policies and positions on the issues." Her responsibilities will include arranging for video tapings and press conferences for Governor Caperton. Dr. Nicholson and her husband, Gregory, also a 1973 graduate of Glenville State College and current Vice-President of the GSC Alumni Association, are continuing their residence in Glenville until "this summer, when in fairness to the Admininistration and the Language Arts Department" she will decide whether she will return to teaching at Glenville State.

Attention Education Majors

The West Virginia Board of Education requires all candidates who seek to be recommended for West Virginia teacher certification to take one or more Content Specialization Tests. These tests for 44 teaching and school personnel fields will be administered on Saturday, March 18, 1989 at six sites in West Virginia. The registration deadline for the March 18 administration is Saturday, February 11, 1989. The next test administration will be conducted on June 24, 1989.

Harper's Work Exhibited

An associate professor at Glenville State College, Harper has been educated in all aspects of art. He holds a M.F.A. in painting from Ohio Unversity, and a BA in art education from Glenville State College. He possesses a strong background in two dimensional art, especially painting and drawing; however, in recent years, his unusual landscape pottery has gained international recognition. Harper's ceramics result from the combination of his painting and pottery throwing skills. Each pot is hand-built or wheel-thrown, then decorated with colored oxides, slips and underglasses. Harper's approach to decorating grew from his fascination with pottery of the late 1800's. Each piece is signed and dated, and no two are alike.

Harper's works deal mainly with colors and shapes and man-made structures. His paintings, currently on display in the Paine Gallery, come from photographs or his imagination.

"I'm fascinated with light and dark patterns in their natural surroundings," Harper said. "The light and dark patterns are something you find. The colors are what I bring to it."

Glenville Nips Concord

On Saturday (Jan. 14), the Pioneers hosted Concord, a team that nipped Glenville 77-75 on Dec. 10th. However, 6'6 David Hall, who pumped in 27 points for GSC that night, was still suffering from a back injury which had caused him to miss four of the last five games. His only recent appearance was a brief five minutes in the Bluefield contest and his status was questionable for the Concord outing. Despite limited playing time for the Glenville power forward, Coach Nottingham's squad proved from the onset that they had many other weapons in addition to Hall. With five minutes left in the opening half, Clinton Hinton muscled inside for a five footer giving Glenville a 20-15 lead. At the half, the score was knotted at 25. To spark the Pioneer offense in the second half, Coach Nottingham inserted reserve guard Matt Dawson into the lineup. Dawson, who played the final two minutes of the first half, promptly made his presence felt when he pick-pocketed Concord's point guard and drove the length of the court for the lay-up giving

Glenville a 29-28 advantage.

After four lead changes during the next fifteen minutes, Glenville found itself down 59-57 with just over two minutes to play. Patiently, the Pioneers looked for a good shot until the 45-second shot clock showed two seconds. Bernie Rees then passed inside to Hinton who hit a crucial five footer, although the shot clock had mistakenly been reset. With only 33 seconds left in the game, William Jackson tipped in a missed Glenville shot for a 63-59 lead. Following two free throws by Concord, Paul Grier sealed the victory when he sank two free throws of his own with two seconds left for a 65-61 thriller. Glenville, 7-8 overall and 3-4 in the conference, received 19 points and 11 boards from Hinton, while Grier netted 17, and Jackson landed 12 markers. The Pioneers return to action today (Jan. 18) when they play at WV State. On Saturday they host Salem at 7:30 p.m.

Cagers Go 2-2

While most college students were celebrating the beginning of a new year, the Glenville men's basketball team was participating in the Indiana University (Pa.) Tournament on January 2nd and 3rd. In the opening round, Glenville faced Longwood, which entered with a credible 8-2 record.

After a close first half ended with the Pioneers holding a slim 25-22 advantage, Glenville pulled away in the final period to take a 59-49 victory over the Lancers. Paul Grier led all scorers by notching 17 points, Clinton Hinton added 16 points and 6 rebounds, and Bernie Rees landed nine markers. Thanks to their win against Longwood, GSC faced host Indiana (Pa.) in the championship, Although the Pioneers led 26-24 at the intermission, the Indians grabbed a missed Glenville free throw with 15 seconds remaining in the game and scored to tie the contest at 47. In the overtime period, Indiana (Pa.) outscored their guests 8-6 to take a 55-53 squeaker over Glenville. Paul Grier was the game's high scorer with 26 points, including 4 three point goals. Clinton Hinton chipped in with 13 points and 8 caroms.

On January 7th, Glenville, which entered with a 5-7 overall record, returned to conference play when it traveled to Wheeling to meet the undefeated Cardinals. Wheeling jumped out to O quick 9-0 lead before the Pioneers had even attempted a shot. At the half GSC had pulled to within five, trailing 32-27. However, the Cardinals remained perfect as they went on to capture a 63-55 victory. William Jackson and Clinton Hinton both posted 15 points for Glenville, while Bernie Rees added 11, and Paul Grier
