

She is certified as Water Safety Instructor for the American National Red Cross and is currently Aquatic Director for the Gilmer County Red Cross Chapter.

The Advanced Lifesaving course will be offered to individuals who can swim 440 yards American Crawl Stroke (freestlye) in a time of 11 minutes or less.

The Lifesaving course will be designed to train individuals in life-guarding skills and prepare them to hold a lifeguarding position. Prerequisites for this course include: current advanced lifesaving, CPR and First Aid.



Mention Clark Hall, Room 101, and Pepsi at Glenville State, and most education majors would smile and respond, "Dr. Young". And it is very common to hear students say, "Wait until you have Dr. Young, you are going to love him."

My goal in a recent interview with this very popular teacher, was to give students an opportunity to know him better. Dr. Young began teaching at Glenville State after receiving his Ph.D. in Special Education from Peabody College at Vanderbilt University, Nashville. His previous Bachelor and Master Degrees in Psychology are from California State, San Francisco and Long Beach, respectively. Before he came to Glenville, Dr. Young taught pre-school and kindergarten, emotionally disturbed students in San Francisco, and in Nashville he taught severe emotionally disturbed adolescent students. The interview proceded as follows:

Question: Tell me about your family.

Dr. Young: I am married

and live in Buckhannon with my wife, Joyce, a daughter Juli, age 22 and daughter Layla, age 13. There is also a son Randall, age 21 in the Air Force in San Antonio, TX. My wife graduated second in her class with a degree in Language Arts Education from Glenville State and teaches middle school in Buckhannon.

Question: Will you always teach?

Dr. Young: Yes, I enjoy the summers off and the fact that it starts and stops twice a year. The transition is always kind of built-in. If you have a good semester, it's great, if you have a bad one you always have the next one to look forward to.

Question: What is the greatest challenge for you as a teacher?

Dr. Young: Staying current with trends and changes. It's real easy to get locked in to going to the text book and not looking to outside sources.

Question: What do you like most about teaching at GSC?

Dr. Young: The academic freedom and the lack of cont. on page 3

As a student teacher who will be entering the school system, as a future parent, as a human being—this terrible violence deeply concerns me.

Since Purdy killed himself after his rampage, it seems we must find someone else to carry the blame. In the search one naturally thinks of gun control officials. The buying of a semiautomatic

weapon like Purdy obtained requires filling out a federal form. Purdy filled out this form, but he used an assumed name. If a background check would have been done on Purdy, it would have exposed his long rap sheet (which indicated that he was a drug abuser). But since this crucial investigation was not performed, the gun was easily purchased.

Who else can take part of the responsibility?? Did Purdy have any friends who may have noticed his so called unusual obsession

with the military, any strang behavior or possible cries to help? Should the securit have been stronger at the school? Is society in general condoning violence (to example, in T.V. shows)?

There are too many questions. Placing blame is senseless (as well a impossible). The factoremains that this disturbing act of violence occurred. There is no way of knowing what triggered Purdy' unexplainable actions. This has been a distressing even which saw the cry of society echo across the United States.

We must do all we can as individuals, teachers, and parents to create a more peaceful world. Lextend my prayers and deep felt sympathy to the Stockton community.



Lady Pioneers #1 in Conference

For the Lady Pioneers basketball team last week, business was as usual in conference games - two opponents and two victories. On Tuesday (Jan. 17), Glenville defeated West Liberty 91-85, and on Thursday the Ladies in Blue dealt Salem a 101-76 loss.

Although West Liberty came into Tuesday's contest at Glenville with a mediocre 6-6 record, the Lady Hilltoppers hoped to catch the hosts by surprise and steal a big conference victory. From the start, it was clear that West Liberty was ready for battle as they opened in a full-court press. Despite gaining a 24-18 lead with eight and a half minutes to go in the first half, Glenville trailed at the intermission 45-40.

While the opening period was filled with spurts, the second half proved to be a seesaw affair. After several lead changes, the Lady Hilltoppers led 79-75 with four minutes left to be played. However, Coach Shepherd's finely trained unit went into its own fullcourt pressure defense.

Glenville capitalized on West Liberty's costly turnovers against the press, to outscore their guests 16-6 over the last four minutes for a 91-85 victory. Tammy Pence poured in

32 points and grabbed 18 rebounds to lead the Lady Pioneers, who were an amazing 21-22 from the foul line. Tami Simons added 13 points, while Kim Creel chipped in with 12 points and 10 boards.

On Thursday (Jan. 19), it was the Lady Tigers of Salem who came to Glenville upset-minded. After jumping out to a 17-12 lead seven and a half minutes into the game it appeared the Lady Pioneers might have been preparing for a blow-out. However, the Lady Tigers hung tough, trailing just 43-39 at the half.

Behind the strength of a complete team effort, the Lady Pioneers lit up the scoreboard in the second half for a whopping 58 points, to gain a 101-76 thrashing over Salem. Glenville, which went over the century mark for the first time this year on Karen Holloway's three point goal, placed five players in double figures. Tammy Pence led all scorers with 25 points, Monique Johnson landed 18, Karen Holloway and Tami Simons both had 16 markers, and Kim Creel had 12 points and 14 caroms. The Lady Pioneers, who ran their league leading conference record to 7-0, received 13 assists from Niki Ranaolph.

Nottingham, Coach Shepherd, and GSC's players would be encouraged by your support. Currently the men are on a four game win streak, while the women own a 10-2 record. The men play tonight (Jan. 25) at 7:30 p.m., while the women play Thursday (Jan. 26) at 7:00

Here are some basketball stats through Jan. 14th: Tammy Pence is second in scoring in the WVC. (20. ppg) Niki Randolph leads the nation in assists. (9.78 pg) Kim Creel leads the conference in field goal percentage. (61%) Bernie Rees leads the WVC in three point field goal percentage (52%), while Paul Grier is fifth. Glenville's men's (47%) team defense leads the conference giving up just 69 points a game. The Lady Pioneers lead the conference in scoring, averaging 86.9 points a contest.

Pioneers Win 4th Straight

Heading into its game with WV State at Institute on Wednesday (Jan 18), Glenville had failed to capture a conference victory on the road in three attempts. However, the Pioneers wanted to prove that they could win away from home. Following a close first half, Glenville had established a 33-29 lead over the Yellowjackets.

The second half was equally as close as the first, when both teams picked up the tempo. In the end, the Pioneers had gained their first conference road win in the fashion of an 83-75 downing of WV State.

Paul Grier fired in 25 points, grabbed 8 rebounds, and dished out 7 assists to lead Glenville, which shot 65% from the field. William Jackson added 19 points and 8 boards, while David Hall contributed 17 points, and Bernie Rees netted 14.

With their season and conference records squared at 8-8 and 4-4 respectively, the Pioneers hosted Salem on Saturday. The Tigers, who nipped Glenville 63-62 early in the season, were playing a team that had won three in a row.

After a William Jackson slam gave Glenville a 10-8 lead at the 16:00 minute mark, the Pioneers led the remainder of the opening half. At the close of the well played first twenty minutes by John Buser

of action, Glenville was ahead 35-31.

The first eight minutes of the second half featured Pioneer sharp shooting guard Bernie Rees display ing his talents from three point range. The Ravens wood native nailed five three-pointers in this span to help Glenville pull away from Salem. With 11:48 left in the game, Rees hit his sixth three point goal of the night to give GSC a 60-46 advantage.

Thanks to Rees' exploits the Pioneer crowd awakened to enjoy an exciting second half of basketball. With 1:24 to play, the Tigen had trimmed the deficit to 75-69, but that is as close as they would come. William Jackson's break away slam at the buzzer gave Glenville an 83-74 victory for the Pioneers fourth consecutive win.

Bernie Rees finished with a career high 18 points, si assists, and six rebounds to lead GSC, 9-8 overall and 5-4 in the WVC. David Hall landed 18 points as well, while William Jackson added 14 markers, and Paul Grier posted 11 points.

Glenville will try to win its fifth straight contest tonight (Jan. 25), when it hosts W Tech at 7:30 p.m. On Monday (Jan. 30), the Pioneers host Fairmont at

SSU Nips Ladies

Anticipation was high on Saturday (Jan. 21st), when the Lady Pioneers hosted non-conference foe Shawnee State University, the only team to defeat Glenville this year. On December 10th, the Lady Bears dealt Coach Shepherd's ball club a 94-83 However, Kim Creel, Glenville's powerful center who sat out in the first clash between the two teams because of an ankle injury, was healthy and eager to play.

With the sunlight glaring on the court in the afternoon contest, both teams started with full-court pressure defenses. The fast pace of the opening minutes resulted in easy baskets by both squads. While the clock showed 12:20 remaining in the first half, Niki Randolph intercepted a pass and went coast to coast for the lay-up giving Glenville a 20-15 advantage. Two and a half minutes later, Randolph's outlet pass to Monique Johnson yielded another lay-up for a 26-17 lead. The Lady Pioneers led the remainder of the half, although the Ohio based

team had closed to within two points, trailing 43-41 at the intermisison.

Picking up where they left off in the closing minutes of the first half, SSU erupted for 10 points in the first 1:15 of the final period to take a 51-47 lead. At the sixteen minute mark, the Lady Bears had widened their advantage to 57-47. Trailing 68-60 with just under nine minutes to play, Glenville's Karen Holloway scored a rare four point play, and 45 seconds later added another three point goal, to trim the deficit to 71-67.

After an exchange of a series of baskets, Shawnee State led 79-75 and had a player at the foul line with five seconds to play. However, it was not over yet because the Lady Bears had called their sixth time-out of the game, which resulted in a technical. The Shawnee State player missed her free throw, and Karen Holloway made one of the technical shots. Tami Simons' three point goal attempt at the buzzer fell short, which Tammy Pence put in, allowing SSU to escape with a 79-78 victory.

On Monday, January 23rd Spain laid to rest the last of its great artists that have emerged in the Post-Modernistic era. Along with Miro, Braque, and Picasso, Salvador Dali was revered as one of the most influential Spanish artists of the 20th Century. Although his beginnings can be found in

the realms of so-called

marxist cubism, Dali is best

known for his emphasis on

and his contributions

towards the surrealist

movement. In the conven-

tional term surrealism is a distortion of reality and in a sense attempts to reveal a new and higher reality of daily life, hence the namesurrealism. Dali predominantly used the interpretations of dreams; and through the use of quite recognizable subject matter simply placed out of context or presented in a somewhat distorted distraction, he can be credited for the personification of the surrealist movement. Two of his most famous paintings are The Sacrament of the Last Supper and St. John of the Cross. Appearing in many of his paintings, and often depicted as the
