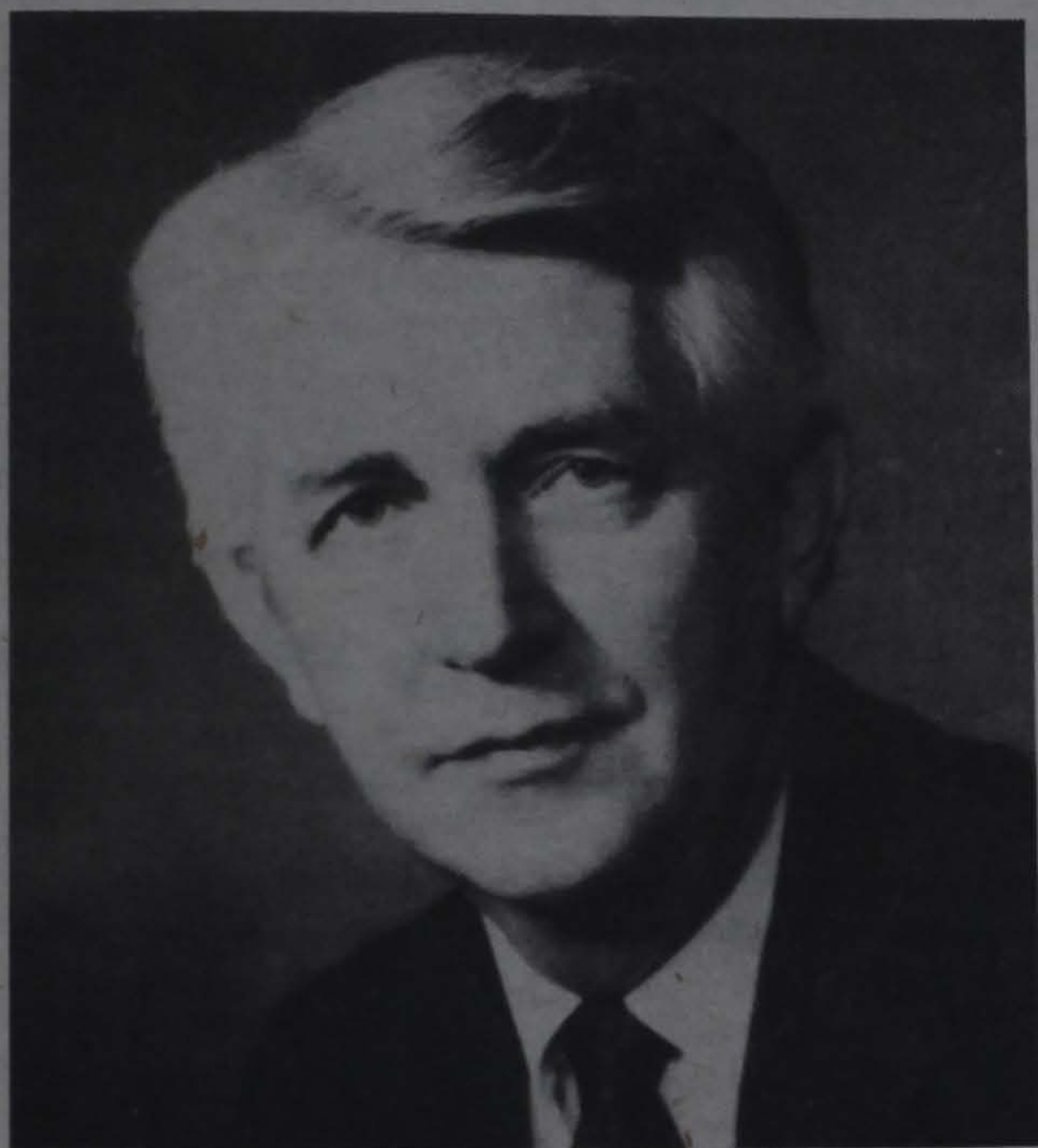

Maze Alumnus of Year

Clarence Maze, Jr., former Academic Dean, has been selected Glenville State College 1989 Alumnus of the Year. Dr. Maze is currently president of Richard Bland College in Petersburg, Virginia.

Educationally, Dr. Maze has his Ed.D from Indiana University, 1962; Masters from WU, 1956; and AB Glenville State College, 1953. He was a graduate of Calhoun County High School in Grantsville, WV, 1948.

His fields of study have been Business Education, Business Administration, Economics, and General Professional Education.

Maze began his education career in a one-room rural school in Calhoun County and the superintendent's office. He served a 2 year stint with the Army in Korea, then became Chairman and Assistant Professor of Business Education at GSC. He next headed the Commercial Education Program, Ohio University, USAID Project,

Technical College, Ibadan, Nigeria.

He was the Assistant Director of the Center for International Programs, O.U. He was Professor of Business Education and Office Administration at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville. He then became Academic Dean of GSC until 1975 when he went to Richard Bland.

Dr. Maze has many publications and activities to his credit.

Maze is married to Marlene Dotson Maze who holds an M.A. from Indiana University. She is a school librarian. The Mazes have two children; John Marshall (20) and Thomas Charles (18).

Singers in Concert

The Concert Choir and Chamber Singers will present a joint program on Sunday April 30, 1989. This concert will be presented in the GSC Auditorium and will feature student conductors Kristi Barnard, Kevin Burroughs, Mike Fling, Debbie Jozwick, Patricia Parkulo, Shelly Walkup, and Lewis Woodard.

President William K. Simmons does just this. As he looks past his office window, he sees the roles that he has portrayed during his life time.

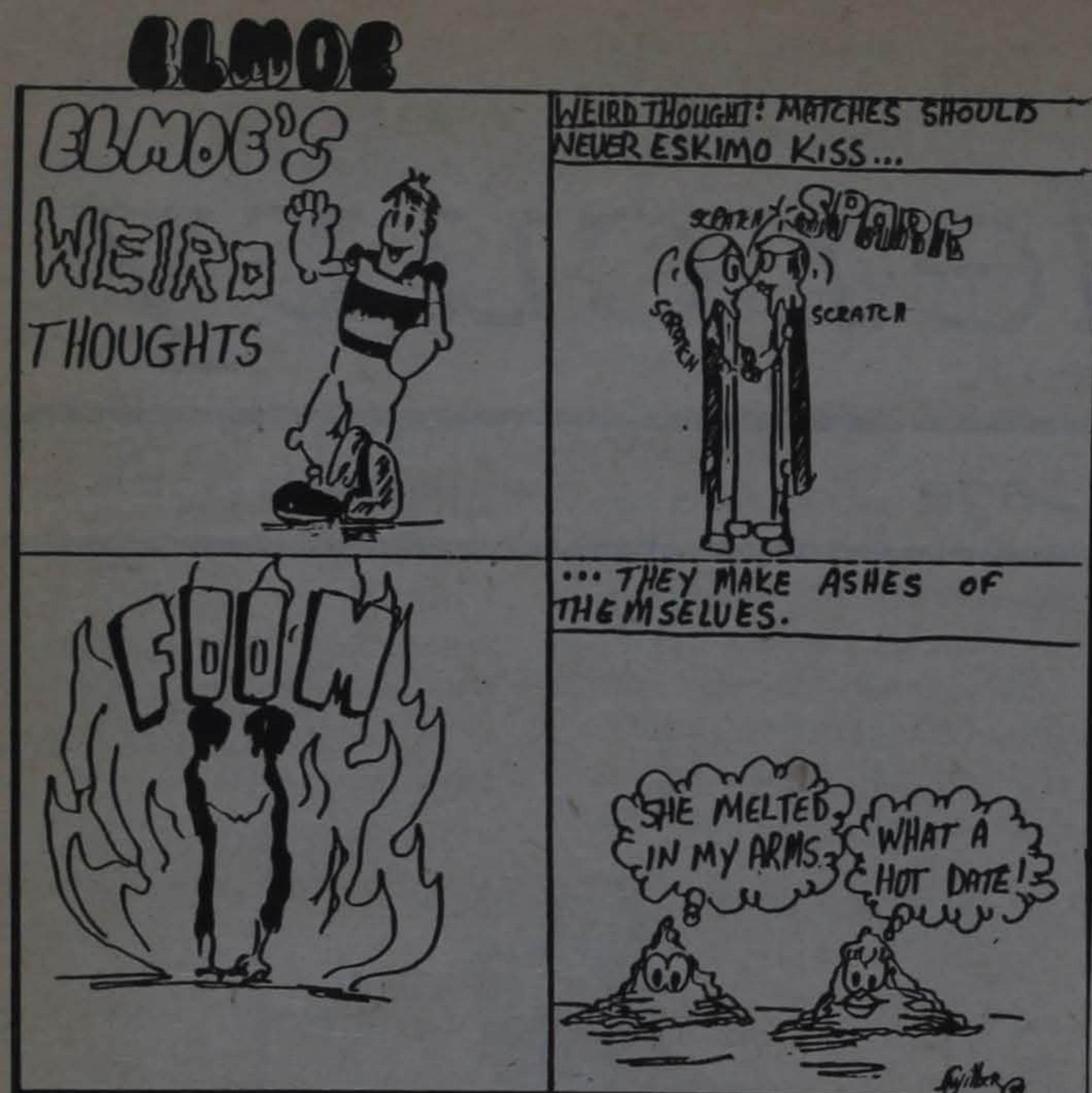
President Simmons remembers his younger years here at Glenville when he attended; first, second, and third grades in the Administration Building. He remembers his undergraduate years, and his role as the Pioneer. He remembers his position as an English professor and as Academic Dean.

President Simmons has served as president at Glenville State College for

nearly 12 years. He has enjoyed watching Glenville State become stronger, its higher enrollment, its improvement and the quality of education it presents. Dr. Simmons has been very pleased with the variety of activities that have occurred on Glenville State College's campus.

President Simmons remembers his terms of acting as Chancellor for the Board of Regents in 1983-84 and again in 1988-89. His duties have been to carry out the policies of the board and the laws of the state of West Virginia with regards to higher education. He has worked with college presidents, various councils, and the members of the Board of Regents. He has represented the board to external groups; such as, the Governor and the legislature of the State of West Virginia; with such things as the budgets and the legislative programs which concerned education.

RESTLESS HEART COMES TO RAVENSWOOD

A sellout crowd is expected to attend the May 27th out-door concert at the Ravenswood High Football Stadium to be presented by Restless Heart, recently nominated as one of the country's top five vocal groups at this year's Academy of Country Music Awards.

Since the release of its break-through album *Wheels* in 1986, Restless Heart has become a hot, new group that plays tailor-made sounds to match the spirit of our times in heartland America.

The group's guitarist/vocalist Greg Jennings describes their fans as, "A new age of country listeners—people who grew up listening to both country and rock music in the sixties and seventies. I think it's this sort of hybrid listener that our music particularly appeals to because it's got country harmonies, but with sort of a rock edge to it."

Since *Wheels* became a phenomenal hit, Restless Heart has toured with other top performers: Hank Williams, Jr., Randy Travis, Bruce Hornsby and Alabama. Single hits from that album include, "Why Does It Have To Be," "New York," and "I'll Be Loving You." The long-playing album was certified gold for sales over half a million.

The title of their new album *Big Dreams In A Small Town* aptly describes the concert setting in Ravenswood, a picturesque small town situated on the banks of the Ohio River, between

Parkersburg and Huntington, where people, as everywhere, dare to dream big dreams, and where the natural beauty of springtime is expected to attract exuberant fans from the tri-state area.

The varied collection of songs on *Big Dreams In A Small Town* provides a perfect showcase for Restless Heart. They include the rock-charged "Eldorado," the up-tempo dance tune "This Time," and the haunting lament "The Bluest Eyes in Texas," all of which are expected to be performed at the May concert.

Advance tickets are now on sale at \$10 each and may be ordered by sending a money order, or cashier's check, (no personal checks) to Concert Tickets, Jackson County Development Authority, 212 Walnut St., Ravenswood, WV, 26164.

The concert is being sponsored by the Ohio River Festival Committee to raise funds for this year's festival. The committee requests that those planning to attend should bring along lawn chairs, or blankets for seating on the field where over-flow seating will be provided after the bleachers are filled.

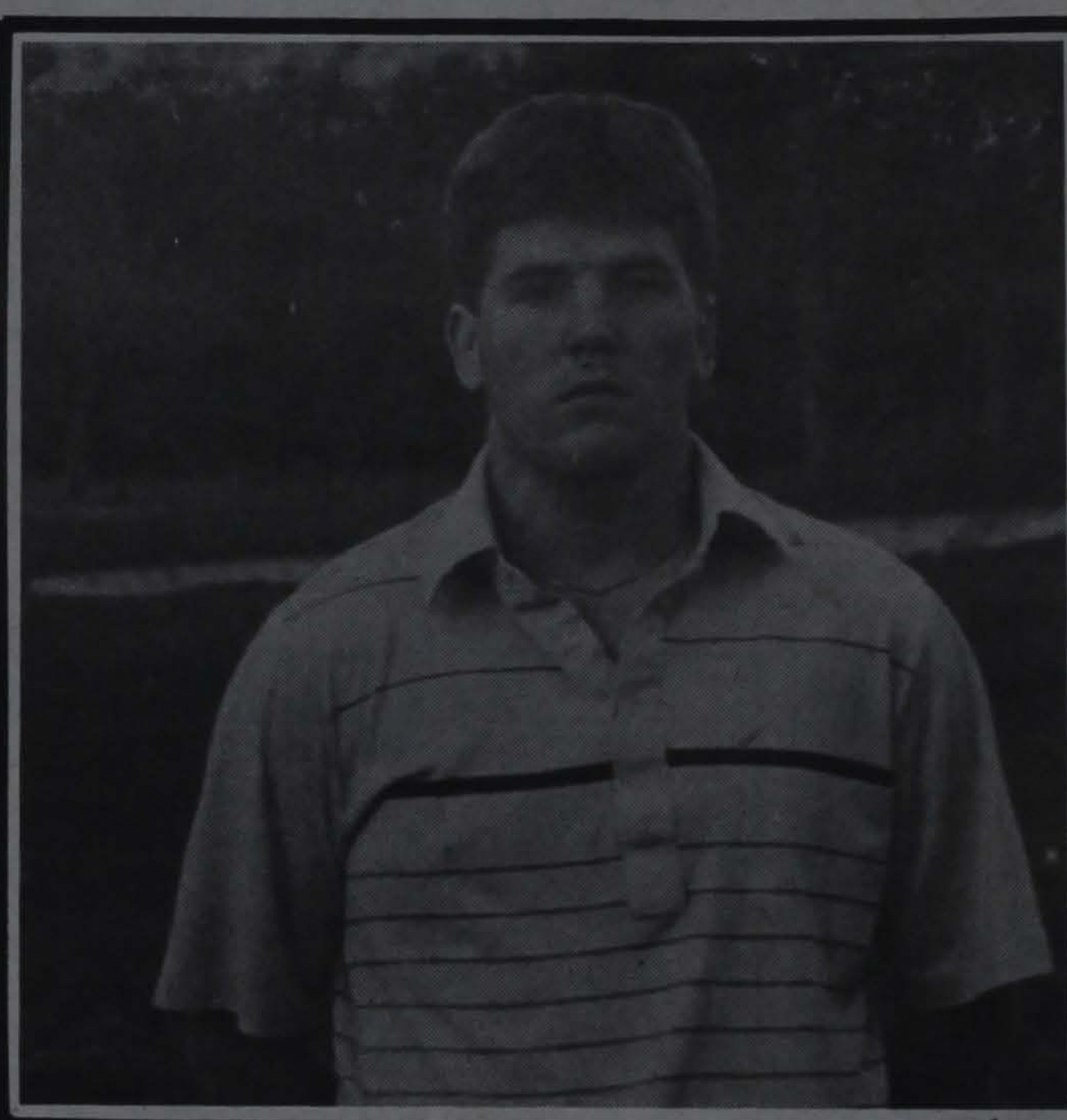

Golfers Third at Spiedel, Tallman Ties for Fifth

Hoping to rebound from a disappointing performance at Pipestem, Glenville's golf team traveled to Wheeling to play in the Northern Regional at Spiedel on Sunday and Monday (April 16-17).

Despite plenty of sunshine, which had been absent in recent tournaments, only three players in the seven team field managed to shoot in the 70's on Sunday. However, one of those was Pioneer Greg Tallman who stood at third place individually after carding a 79 on the difficult par 71 track.

As a team, GSC's 337 total was the fourth best, trailing third place West Liberty by

only two shots entering the final round, as Charleston (315) and Fairmont (324) were first and second, respectively.

Led by Bob Sowards' brilliant 74 on Monday, the low round of the tournament, the Pioneers easily passed West Liberty to capture third place in the Northern Regional. Charleston, behind its depth and experienced line-up, claimed the team title by outdistancing Fairmont.

Individually, Tallman's two day total of 160 tied for fifth place. Had he not been edged in a playoff, the transfer from Methodist College would have made the All-Tournament Team.

With Sowards' 74, the talented junior gained the lead for WVC player of the year honors.

In an effort to find the right combination of players to defeat rivals Charleston and Fairmont, Coach Tim Carney inserted sophomores Jason Sutton and John Buser into the line-up for the Central Regional at Canaan Valley on Sunday and Monday (April 23-24), but the results were unavailable by press time. The linksters from Glenville return to action on Sunday, April 30 when they play at Cacapon in Berkeley Springs, WV, for the three day WVIAC District 28 Championship.

Chancellor Simmons had three primary goals: 1. reorganizing the board, 2. getting supplementary funding for higher education to handle a budget shortfall, and 3. bringing the issuance of governance in our higher education system to a close.

His major objectives were fulfilled in seeing that the Board of Regents have been dissolved into two boards: a. The Board of Trustees for major universities and b. The Board of Directors for small college and community colleges. His goal of supplemental funding was met by having \$55,000 provided for social security benefits.

As President of Glenville State College, President Simmons has been concerned with the increasing enrollment at Glenville State College, strengthening teacher education, promoting Glenville State College as a four-year institution, enlarging the Nicholas County Center in Summersville to meet the needs of the growing enrollment, seeing the new Fine Arts building being completed, and the drilling of a new gas well.

As the economy is going down in West Virginia, the Board will be needing support from the legislators. President Simmons has been very pleased with the accomplishments that the Board of Regents has made within the past year.

President Simmons will be acting as Chancellor for three days out of a week and as president at Glenville State College for two days out of a week. He is very pleased with the progress that has occurred at Glenville State College.

President Simmons will be experiencing a new beginning in playing his role as president as he will be starting over again with new perspectives in mind. He will be facing an in service like none other he has ever experienced.

President Simmons is

looking forward to the challenges that he will be facing at Glenville State College. He will be re-examining the college role in its four year programs, by building up our strengths and improving them, by bringing in members for the advisory boards, by adjusting the curriculum, and specializing in more content. Plans for drilling a third gas well is included in his projects for the future as are new developments for the Summersville Center in Summersville. To meet the rise in tuition costs, he plans to initiate activities for funding more scholarships and relocation of funds to meet any shortfalls that may occur within the next few years.

He feels that the new Fine Arts Building will be playing an important role in Glenville. Its effect will be immeasurable. It will provide public schools and the community of central West Virginia a better access to both teaching and cultural opportunities.

President Simmons has dealt with three legislative sessions during his term as Chancellor for the Board of Regents and is looking forward to getting back and moving Glenville State College forward. It will provide a unique challenge for all of us.
