## Camilletti Joins GSC Staff

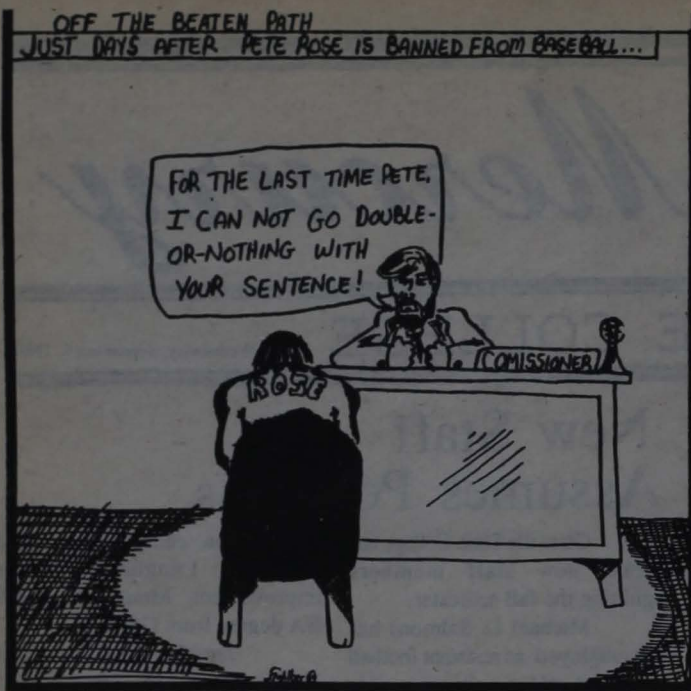

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### As the Editor Sees It

The big issue on campus since school began seems to revolve around text books. The cost of textbooks seems to steadily increase causing astronomical prices. Inflation would seem to be a contributor to this escalation. Unfortunately, GSC students cannot do much about inflation.

Faculty seems to change textbooks too often. When a textbook is changed every other semester it is hard to establish a book exchange when books are discontinued. Instructors should become aware that students cannot afford to buy books each semester.

One activity that everyone has probably noticed, and has had to contend with, is the buying and selling of used books. To see the bulletin boards on campus cluttered with papers advertising books for sale, to see people running everywhere creates a chaotic, unattractive mess. The whole ordeal is a hassle.

The campus co-op does sell used books; however, most students do not partake in the store's services.

From an interview with Cinda Echard, faculty sponsor of the co-op, the following ideas arose: Upper classmen, who know of the faculties, tend to keep textbooks that deal with their course of studies. Lower classmen, on the other hand, are enrolled in general studies classes that everyone must have. Many students who do buy and sell second hand books may not be aware of the co-op. The location of the store may also be unknown. These reasons could explain the low volume of sales in the store.

To be more beneficial to the students the co-op could buy used books so they could be resold. Having a central location would eliminate the bulletin board clutter and shuffle. Selling books at one location would standardize prices eliminating unscrupulous salesmen. Advertising and promoting the co-op would help the store be successful. A good book exchange would save GSC students money and time.

# Write Poetry!

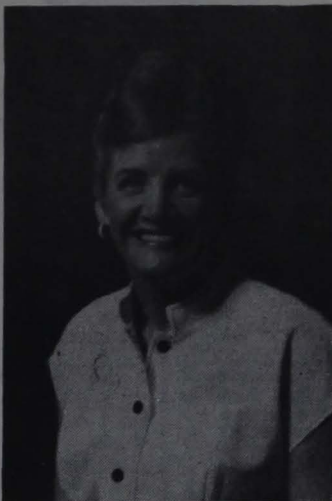

The Grand Prize is \$1,000 and the First Prize \$500. Other prizes include cash awards and publication. "Students walked away with 24 prizes in our last contest," said Robert Nelson, publisher for the Association. "I urge every student who writes poetry to enter now -- before studies and exams take up your time. Young people with talent should get encouragement and recognition while they are still young."

Poets may enter the contest by sending up to six poems, each no more than 20 lines, name and address on each page, to American Poetry Association, Dept. CT-70, 250-A Potrero Street, P.O. Box 1803, Santa Cruz, CA 95061-1803. Poems must be postmarked by December 31. Each poem is also considered for publication in the American Poetry Anthology, a leading collection of contemporary verse.

During seven years of sponsorship the American Poetry Association has run 32 contests and awarded over \$145,000 in prizes to 3,040 winning poets.

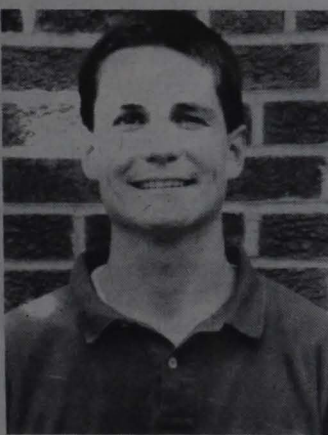

### Wesleyan Defeats Glenville

On the wake of yet another college football season, there continues to be talk of such ideas that would turn college football into an NFL farm system. A couple of these such are: keeping Proposal 42, and the fact of paying college athletes. Proposal 42 is a new measure inacted for 1990 to replace proposal 48. Proposal 48, which has been in effect for the past three years, and states that entering freshmen must have a minimum college test score or a 2.0 GPA in high school to be eligible for financial aid. Proposal 42 is to take the place of Proposal 48 and states that freshmen must meet both requirements of college entrance exam and the 2.0 requirement. The issue of paying athletes is absurd, but some believe to provide them with a modest weekly allowance may remove the temptation that leads to many NCAA violations. The storyline on Proposal 42 is a good one, it keeps high school teachers from giving invalid grades to students for athletic purposes. Glenville State's football team opened their 1989 season opener by bowing 14-6 to a very seasoned West Virginia Wesleyan ball club. The game was a struggle throughout its course, with the Pioneers maintaining a lead most of the way.

From the outset of the game, there was much speculation of the inexperience of a young Pioneer Squad who only returned six letterman; four of which were starters.

From the starting kickoff, the Pioneer's defense was immediately tested. It was going to be proven if they could replace such defensive starters as the likes of Todd Layhew. On the opening possession, Wesleyan took the ball from the 39 yard line and drove 36 yards on 7 plays down to the 25 yard line, where they looked to be strong. But on the eighth conversion from scrimmage, the Bobcats fumbled and turned the ball over to the Pioneers.

As Glenville State took the ball from their own 25 yard line, Pioneer hopefuls cheered for the offense to move the ball. But four plays later, the Pioneers found themselves punting the ball as they faced a very stubborn Wesleyan defense.

Late in the first quarter, Wesleyan once again showed their ability to control the ball, taking the ball into field goal range. But a 37 yard attempt fell short when blocked by the Pioneers. Wesleyan

again came up empty. The first quarter came to an end with penalties and miscues keeping both teams off the board.

The second quarter began much like the first ended, with Wesleyan banging out yardage and pushing back the Pioneer defense. Shortly after a time out Bobcat quarterback Dan Ritter attempted a short screen pass only to have Pioneer senior Ed Toman step in front of the intended receiver and race 53 yards to the Wesleyan 17 yard line. Five plays later Rick Lewis went in from the one yard line on a quarterback sneak - the two point conversion failed. The first half ended when both coaches decided to call it a half with 46 seconds left due to a Bobcat player having to be carried off the field with an injury.

The second half began with Wesleyan showing thier dominance and proved to be the much more experienced team. In the third quarter Ritter connected with Bino

Ramirez with a 20-yard touchdown pass. Doug McMillen kicked the extra point to give Wesleyan a 7-6 lead and what proved to be all the points they would need. In the fourth quarter Wesleyan's Mose Rochelle ran 13 yards to give the Bobcats a comfortable 14-6 lead with McMillens second extra point of the day.

The Pioneers showed some strong offensive running by junior Frank Myers and senior Gorden Stevens. The defense showed some ability with strong efforts from Ed Toman, Brian Hill and Lonnie Hosby. The difference in the game was the second half where the Pioneers were not able to put together some solid drives.

As the season progresses look for the Pioneers to leave their inexperience behind them and put together a solid campaign. The team is young, but there are a lot of bright spots that should shine through.

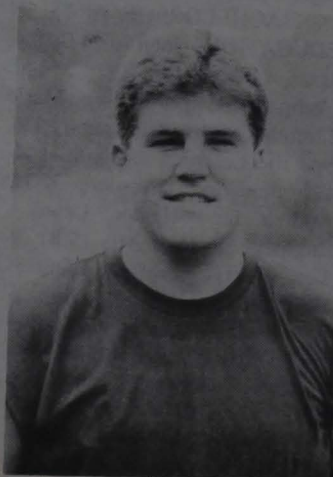

Few people realize how important blood donations are unless they know someone who has had to have a transfusion. Every day throughout West Virginia, Kentucky and Ohio, hospitals use hundreds of units of blood for accident victims, surgeries, cancer treatment and as treatment for blood disorders.

In order to meet these needs, Tri-State Region Blood Services must collect at least 300 units of blood very day. With only 5 percent of the eligible population actually donating, this goal is often difficult to reach.

Donating blood is a safe, simple and relatively painless procedure that takes about an hour of the donor's time. Anyone between the ages of 17 and 70, weighing at least 110 pounds and in good health may donate.
