Dr. James L. Peterson, Vice President for Academic Affairs of Glenville State College, released the Dean's List for the 1988-89 spring semester.

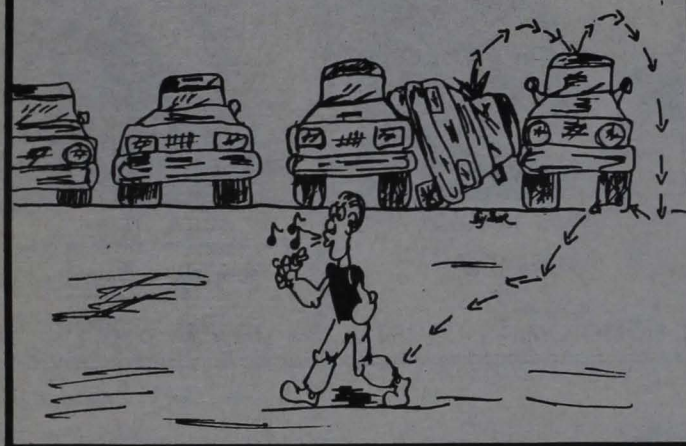

Certain uncouth remarks have been straying aimlessly around campus. These comments have been at the top of complainers' lists since the project started. In order to gain something better, there is always something of less importance left behind, referring to none other than the new Fine Arts building. Regardless of how much complaining and griping is done, the mess and inconvenience is not going to go away until the building is complete, so the complaining may as well stop. Presently roads are blocked, parking is limited, dirt and noise are a hindrance, but it will all come to pass. When all the dust settles, a new Fine Arts building for the college and its students will bring opportunities to the campus.

Upon completion of the building, the problem of no space and too few classrooms will have been eliminated. Moving the art and music students into the new classrooms will free up rooms in the Administration Building, allowing workers to renovate and remove asbestos. The Administration Building will then comply with safety and health regulations which it does not do presently. His interest in saving the college money on fuel bills in the new building led him to drill another gas well on the Verona Maple parking lot. This will require little space and will not take up any parking places.

I have one last comment about the parking issue: parking, even before construction on the new building began, was limited; therefore, the college needs a two level parking structure on the lower Administration lot. This structure will hold twice the number of automobiles and shelter them from the weather. The location is central to all campus buildings. Could it be possible that the students will pay for the privilege of sheltered parking, conveniently located near all college buildings?

Dorm Phones Available

West Virginia's Major Harris is the most exciting quarterback in college football today. At 6-1 and 207, Harris has an exciting style of play mixed with a strong arm and quick feet. Harris, often called "the Master of the broken play," last year gained 2,525 yards (1,915 passing and 610 rushing) and accounted for 20 touchdowns. Every time Harris touched the ball, he averaged 7.9 yards. No other quarterback in Division I-A had a higher pass-efficiency rating than his 167.4 in 1988, though he fell a mere five attempts short of the minimum required to qualify for NCAA ranking.

Harris has led the Mountaineers to 13 consecutive regular season victories, including a 2-0 record this year. I would just like to know when the respect begins? Who are these sports writers who are picking

Penn State as a top ten team and the Mountaineers as number seventeen? Last weekend Penn St. was defeated by a lowly rated Virginia Cavalier football team. Virginia, being more known as a basketball school, wasn't even predicted to have a winning record. WVU may not go out on the field and blow teams away like the University of Miami or Nebraska, but they get the job done. It took a lot of character to come from a 10-0 deficit at Maryland to win 14-10. Maryland is always a tough team to beat, especially at College Park. I see only two teams standing in the way of another WVU undefeated season, that being the Pitt Panthers and the ever present Syracuse Orangemen. I just wonder when the day will come that the Mountaineers will get the respect they deserve.

A young Pioneer squad will bring their 0-1 record to Shepherdstown, W.V., this Saturday to battle the Shepherd College Rams. The kickoff is set for 1:30. Shepherd is coming off of a fine 6-4 campaign last year, but talent-wise Shepherd may not compare to last season. The Rams head coach Monte Cater feels a lot of his players are going to have to rise to the occasion this season. Shepherd has lost three offensive starters, including last season's leading rusher Billy Adams and NAIA All-America second team punter: Mike Sipe. Returning for the Rams will be NAIA All-America First Team, and WVAC defensive player of the year; Steve Borlie.

The Rams, which posted a 6-1 conference record last year will likely employ a split end back veer option this year to improve on a week passing game. Thus having a lot of question marks at punter and placekicker spots, Shepherd seems

to be having a rebuilding year. But with 32 returning lettermen - 14 starters, look for a well-balanced and experienced Shepherd team to take the field to take the field against the Pioneers.

Glenville's strength of their team seems to be their defense with their ability to rush the passer. The key to a Pioneer victory will be to pressure the quarterback and take advantage of a weak Ram passing game. On offense, the Pioneers need to establish a solid running game. Rushing is the heart of the Pioneer offense, with senior runningback Gordon Stevens and junior fullback Frank Myers leading the way.

I look for the game to be a low scoring defense struggle, but being a Pioneer faithful, I predict a score of Glenville 14 Shepherd 7.

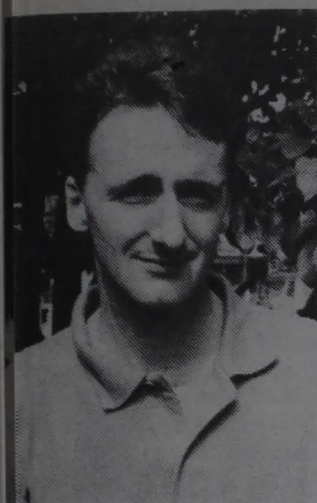

CROSS COUNTRY

On September 2nd, the Glenville State Cross Country team traveled to Huntington to compete in the Marshall Cross Country Invitational. Both the men's and the women's teams had strong showings and completed their objective. The Pioneers used the Marshall Invitational as a time trial to find out where their level of conditioning was after one week of training at Glenville and an entire summer of conditioning on their own. Except for the Pioneers and Rio Grande, all teams competing were NCAA Division I. Coach Bowman was pleased with both the men's and women's performances. Bowman felt "the meet was a good test of the runner's fitness for this point in the season." "Things will build as the team begins to progress," said Bowman.

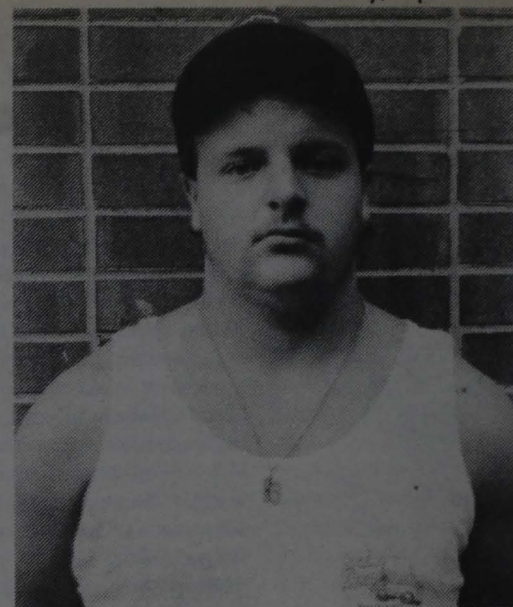
populations with regard to land leases for hunting.

Professor of the Year to be Chosen

The Faculty Merit Foundation of West Virginia is now accepting applications for its \$10,000 Professor of the Year Cash Award. The Award, given each year, recognizes an outstanding professor based on his or her teaching experience, academic credentials, community service and interaction with students. Applicants may be nominated by their peers, students, or themselves. The Professor of the Year is chosen from applicants throughout West Virginia. Nominees are then narrowed by the Faculty Merit Foundation Board to a group of less than ten. From that group, the recipient and two runners-up are selected for cash awards, each runner-up receives \$1,000.

The deadline for applications is October 2, 1989. Application forms will be available at state colleges and universities or by writing the Faculty Merit Foundation in care of Elaine Childs, 300 Kanawha Boulevard, East, Suite 310, Charleston, WV 25301. Selection of the Professor of the Year and two semifinalists will be made by November 1. The awards will be presented at the annual Faculty Merit Foundation banquet in December.

The Faculty Merit Foundation recognizes and rewards outstanding innovation and creativity in teaching and professional leadership among the faculties of the West Virginia public and private institutions of higher education.

Through application of contributed funds, the Foundation undertakes projects and activities calculated to encourage and develop the highest possible faculty performance in the 25 public and private colleges and universities of West Virginia.

In making the selections, the Foundation invites students, faculty and administrators of each of the 25 eligible colleges and universities to submit nominations. Comprehensive and specific information must be presented on the candidate(s) proposed by the nominator(s). The Foundation Board then screens and selects on the basis of the information presented, other input secured independently and interviews.

Last year's winner of the \$10,000 cash award was a West Virginia University Professor of Law, Forest "Jack" Bowman. The award was first made in 1985.

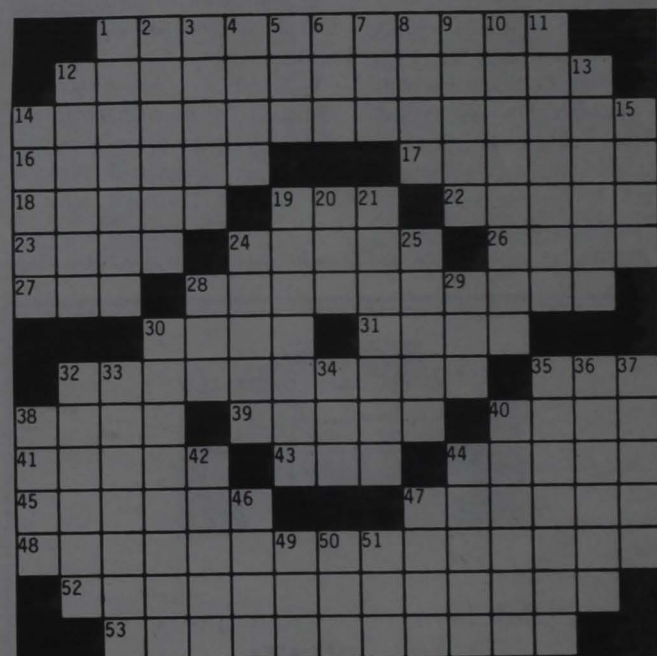
