OVERALL GSC ENROLLMENT DECLINES

Unofficial figures at the Glenville State College main campus and the Summersville Center showed strong growth this fall, but the uncertainty over the future of the Glenville Center at Parkersburg caused the enrollment there to fall significantly. As a result, the overall enrollment for the college dropped slightly to 2,153, a decline of 2.2 percent.

The on-campus freshman class was up 46 students from last year and the Summersville Center enrollment is around 400. It would appear that the Summersville enrollment is limited only by the amount of resources that are allocated to the center. Every class that is effered at Summersville attracts a full complement of

Main campus enrollment is surprisingly strong with some classes enrolling seventy or more students. Such class sizes are highly unusual at Glenville. Residence hall occupancy is also up. There are more students in the residence halls currently than during any other semester since 1984.

Glenville students at Parkersburg are faced with the uncertainty of Glenville's future there and apparently are taking a "wait and see" attitude. Approximately 180 Glenville students are enrolled at Parkersburg, compared to 269 last fall. This drop represents the only downward trend in Glenville's enrollment.





Shepherd "Rams" Glenville

Glenville State, in their West irginia Conference opener, fell (0-2) overall and (0-1) in the onference with a 33-00 loss at the ands of the Shepherd College ams. Shepherd, (1-2,1-0) last ear's WVIAC co-champions reeived their first victory of the young eason at the expense of the visit-

With both Shepherd and Glenille being strong defensive teams nd with the game at Shepherdtown being played in a downpour, tappeared as if the crowd of 1,300 n attendance would see a lowscoring efensive affair. Although the game t first appeared to be so, Shepherd ater went on an offensive surge hat would score 33 points. Sheperd quarterback Jim Signora passed or 231 yards and two touchdowns, while Kurt Minifield ran for two nore scores on touchdown runs of and 2 yards. Shepherd, on the day, amassed a total of 466 yards of offense. With 238 yards passing and 228 yards rushing, the Rams offered a well-balanced offensive attack. While defensively, the Rams neld the Pioneers to 155 total yards (65 rushing, 90 passing).

Scoring began in the first quarer with Dean Pyzik kicking a field goal of 26 yards that put Shepherd n the board and in the lead 3-0. In ne second quarter, Pyzik again dded a field goal, this time for 38 ards and a 6-0 lead for the Rams. ater in the second quarter Sheperd went up 20-00 on touchdown uns by Minifield, who ended the ay with 41 yards on 7 attempts. In he third quarter, Shepherd opened



Hill was a one-man wrecking crew and is no doubt a strong candidate for WVIAC defensive player of the week. Luther Toney also had a fine day defensively for the Pioneers with 16 tackles (9 solo, 7 assists) and a quarterback sack.

Next weekend is an open date for the Pioneers. The next game for Glenville State will be September 30th, a homecoming date against West Liberty State College.

Glenville State finished fifth overall in the men's division with a team score of 180. Other finishers besides Dent for the men were: Mickey Grass (35th), Jason Quick (8157), Richard Clark (112th), and Jesse Giles (124th).

HART'S HEADLINES

Football, which has vastly become the sport of fall, has placed a footnote to its college play this season. Rules makers have decided to eliminate the tee, which placekickers have been permitted to use since 1948. Now, instead of the tee, the ball must be kicked from the surface of the field, be it natural pass or artificial

In 1940, Coach Lou Little of Columbia University proposed that the crossbar be lowered from it height of ten feet. Little's proposal failed, but in 1948 the one-inch tee for placekickers was introduced. Later the tee was raised in height to

Kicking in college football has suddenly become a new game. Now instead of field goals and points after touchdown (PAT) being so commonplace, things will be more strategic. Before this new ruling was established, point-aftertouchdown attempts have been as exciting to watch as dog sledding or four square. Without the tee in PAT conversions, attempts will be more challenging and will decrease in percentage.

I believe that the new ruling will make the kicking game in college football more enjoyable to watch. There should be more blocked field goals this season, because without the kicking tee, the kicks trajectory will be lowered and the ball won't be as quick to leave the foot. Until specialists develop advantages to snap the ball and position it, look for PAT and field goals converted

Well, the Mountaineers have cracked the top ten and are slowly gaining respectability. WVU raised their record to 3-0 after defeating South Carolina 45-21. In the game, the Mountaineers were never challenged shutting down Todd Ellis and the heralded S. Carolina passing attack. Next week the Mountaineers will be on the road at Louisville, where the Cardinals are a much improved team. On the year, Louisville is 2-0 and very hungry to take on West Virginia. Although Louisville will prove to be a strong test for the Mountaineers, WVU will pass the test and defeat Louisville 31-20.
