Dr. Miller Chosen Parade Marshal

Dr. Espy W. Miller, highly respected former GSC English professor, has been chosen as Parade Marshal of the 1989 Glenville State College Homecoming.

Dr. Espy Wallace Miller is a native West Virginian, born at Mill Creek in Randolph County. He graduated from Concord College with an A.B. degree in English and Social Studies in 1937. Dr. Miller taught in Randolph Co. at the Pickens High School from 1937-42. During that time, he completed an M.A. from Northwestern University in Ohio and married Elkins native Rosalce Poling.

During World War II, Dr. Miller served four years, from 1942-46, in the Pacific Theater. He was a Naval Communication Officer at sea.

In 1946, Dr. Miller began teaching at Glenville State College. Until 1954 Dr. Miller inspired many students as a professor of English. After 1954 until his retirement in

1976, Dr. Miller served as chairman of the Language Division. Not an English major during those years escaped Dr. Miller's careful guidance and scrutiny.

Dr. Miller, along with Dr. J.P. Brawner (West Virginia University), Dr. William B. Robertson (Concord), and Dr. Knox Wilson (Davis & Elkins) organized the West Virginia Association of College English Teachers (WVACET) in 1951.

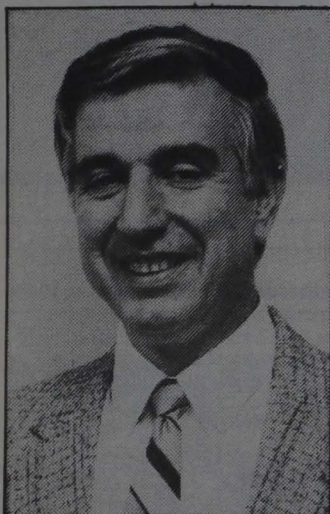
Dr. Miller was the 1st President of both the Glenville State College Faculty - Administrative Organization and the GSC AAUP affiliate. He founded and served as advisor of the Literary Society and was faculty advisor for the Mercury Staff.

Dr. Miller has been President of WVACET and is currently President of the GSC Advisory Board. He was also Lord Espy in the Madrigal Dinner held last Christmas.

Peterson Resumes Duties

In an interview with Dr. James Lowell Peterson, Vice-President of Academic Affairs of our institution, it was determined that being acting President was a very rewarding and challenging experience. "It gave me a better over-all insight into the affairs of this institution; however, it is good to get back into my position as Vice-President in Academic Affairs. This is where the foundation for meeting the educational needs of the students are laid and this is the office from which the direction for this institution is given."

To the question of "Have you noticed any changes in this position since you filled it?" Dr. Peterson said, "There are some new programs, i.e. the nursing program is growing and we feel great pride in it. There have been some programs eliminated. It was felt that the social services program was no longer as effective as when it was first conceived. And there have been some cultural changes."

When asked, "Do you have any major changes in mind?" Dr. Peterson said, "Not immediately, I do have plans, but I want the institution to look at our needs and to change as needs occur. We need to do this periodically to keep up with the requirements of our students. Change is necessary to keep our institution growing and healthy."

"How does it feel to sit in the 'judgment seat' with regard to the final decision as to whether or not a specific student will be put on academic suspension," was asked. This query was answered, "Really this is just administering the policy of the institution. If the student feels the action is unfair, he can use

the grievance committee. But the policy is usually the follow-up on the instructor's decision. For me it can be rather difficult since I have to balance the needs of both the student and the institution."

"What redress does the student have if she/he feels the attendance policy of any instructor is too stringent? It has been said some instructors will cut grades for absences for any reason other than the death of a student."

"I haven't examined the absence policy recently, but I believe it is mainly left to the instructor. The institutional policy should carry precedence. The business of excused and unexcused absences has been a sore spot for years. I don't remember anyone filing grievances on this matter. Many times a student will drop out of a class or classes without filling out the proper forms. This can cause a long term process to be reinstated. When dropping one class one should go through the proper process. This is why attending classes, informing the instructor of unavoidable absences and consulting one's advisor before taking any withdrawal action is important."

"Dr. Peterson, about curriculum changes to better meet the needs of commuting students, do you see any improvement in the near future?"

"There are three problems which make scheduling classes difficult: classroom space - every class is filled during the hours from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m.; parking spaces - we try to schedule our classes during the busy portion of each day to allow for those commuting to have space but since our space is limited, I see no way to solve our problem. Then there is a shortage of instructors as well as a shortage of classroom space to meet the needs of all students."

When asked if there were anything particular he wished incorporated into this interview, he stated, "The direction of this institution in the future is the important thing. I foresee growth as never before both here and at the Nicholas County Extension. I am very pleased with the progress we have made and are making. Without the good educators, which we are providing, our state will not be able to compete tomorrow. We are building for tomorrow's challenges."

Tragedy Claims GSC Student

I observed and learned a great deal from her which aided my transition. Hopefully, that knowledge, combined with my own experiences and training, will enable me to develop my own identity. I am looking forward to putting some of my creative tasks to work since creativity is appropriate for this position."

As for her goals for this office, she said, "My goal is to fulfill my job responsibilities in a professional, proficient and courteous manner while creating a 'warm' feeling about the office. Mrs. Smith was good at creating the 'warm' feeling and I do not want people to feel intimidated about coming into the President's Office at any time."

Rolanna's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Roland Coberly and she has spent most of her life growing up in Gilmer County, although she was born in Ohio.

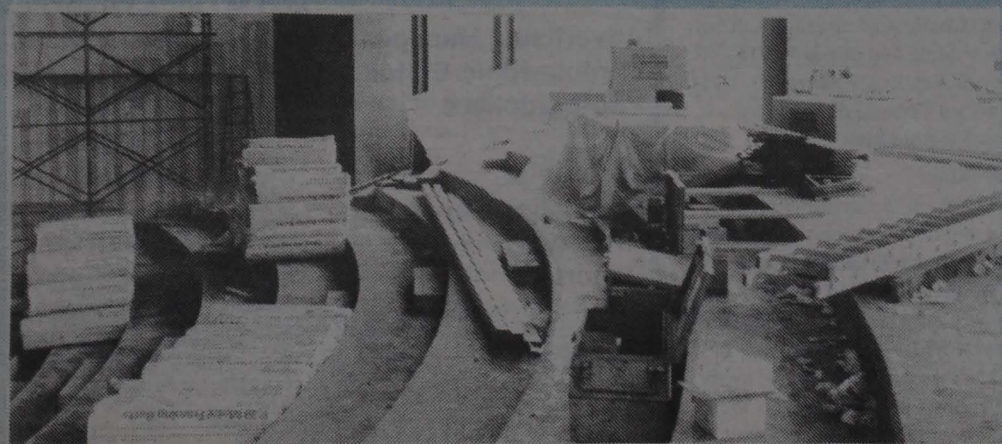

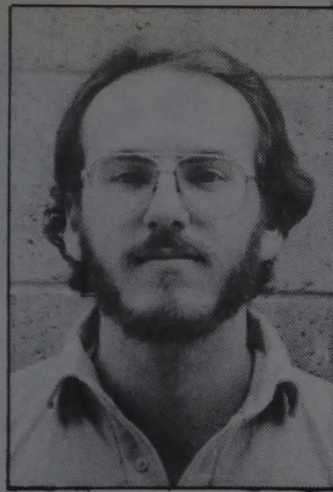
They are also having trouble adjusting to our calendar, for they go by the Gregorian calendar and we go by the Julian calendar.

An interesting note--due to their following the Gregorian calendar, their new year will fall on the 11th of this month. However, it will only be 1982 in Ethiopia.

Time Capsule Buried On Campus

Everyday you see people around campus taking advantage of the scenic surroundings of GSC. Perhaps you have sat on one of the many benches located throughout campus to talk with a friend, study, or maybe just relax. But, did you ever take time to think about what you may be sitting on? Unless it's gum, or some other gift someone or something has left behind you probably never thought about it. Well, chances are that you may have just been sitting on history.

On September 22, 1971, a centennial time capsule was dedicated and sealed here on campus as part of a long centennial celebration in honor of Glenville State College's one-hundredth year of operation.

The time capsule committee, which included Mary Jean Barker-chairman, Erma Edwards, Pearl Pickens, and Elizabeth Turner, decided to include the following: messages from the President of Glenville State, Governor of West Virginia, Mayor of Glenville, Chancellor of WV Board of Regents, President of Student Congress, and President of the Faculty-Administrative Organization. Anyone interested could contribute a message for a fee of 25 cents per line.

A roster of faculty, student body, and staff as of September 1971, copies of the Glenville Mercury, Confrontation, Glenville Democrat, and Alumni Bulletin, programs of the Centennial celebration, copies of the freshman handbook and residence hall regulations were included. Also added was a statement of the purpose of the college, schedules of athletic events and cultural events for 1971-72, and The History of Athletics at GSC, compiled by Dr. Robert Dollgener. Other articles added to the capsule were a map of GSC campus, as well as of Glenville, a

class schedule for 1971-72, a Faculty-Administrative Organization constitution, a Student Congress constitution, a brief history of GSC, a list of all former presidents and principals of Glenville Normal School, and a list of all social and honor organization on campus. Also, a copy of the original deed, a list of "Alumni of the Year" recipients, and a "Faculty Wives' Handbook," a cafeteria menu, Folk Festival activities list, names of 100 outstanding alumni, copies of the Alma Mater and the school song are among the items sealed. Other articles that were placed in the time capsule include the original Governor's Proclamation, information concerning the Wesley Foundation, enrollment form copies, as well as a grade slip, a permanent record card, a copy of a 1971-72 diploma, a parking ticket, and Centennial souvenirs. Yes, this hidden history is right under your nose, and you did not even notice. Next time you are relaxing on a bench somewhere on campus take a look at what you are sitting on, it could be someone you know. Come back in 82 years and find out.

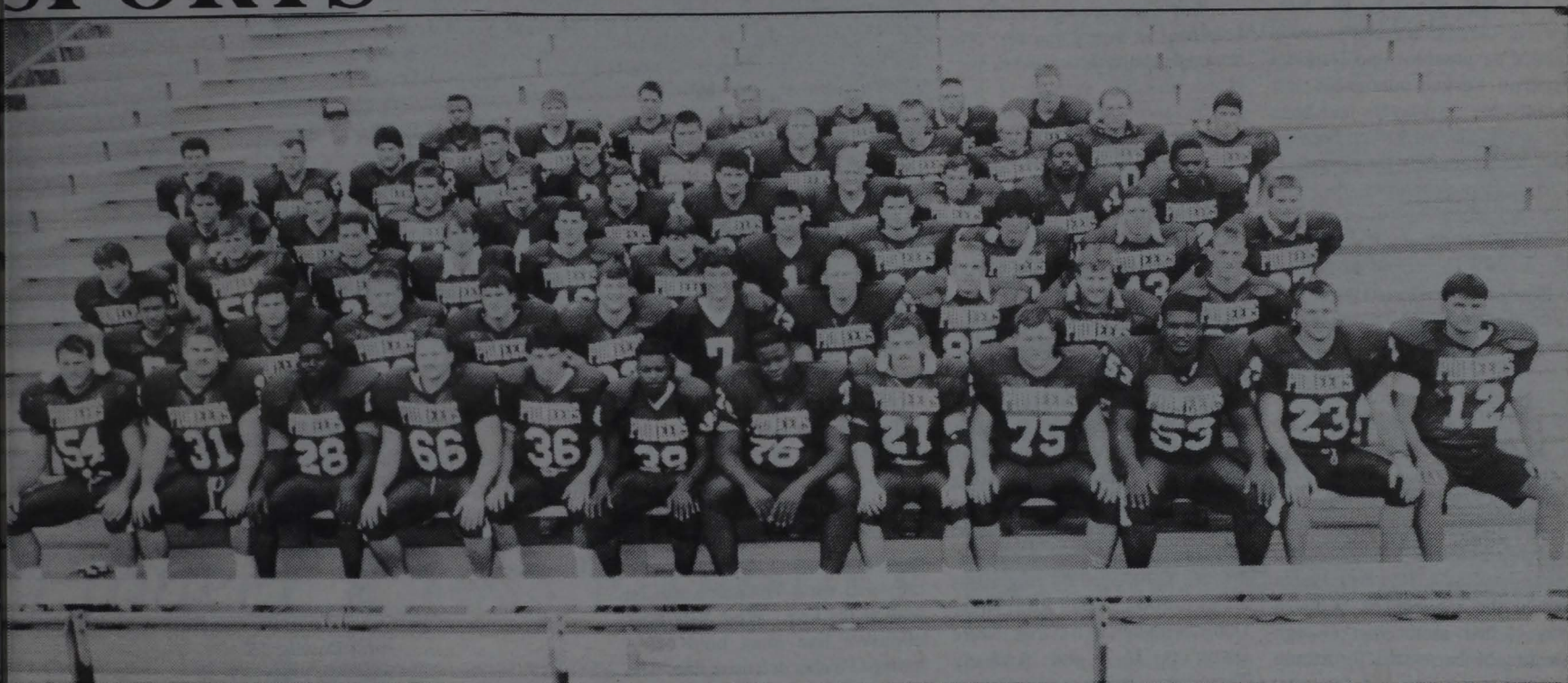

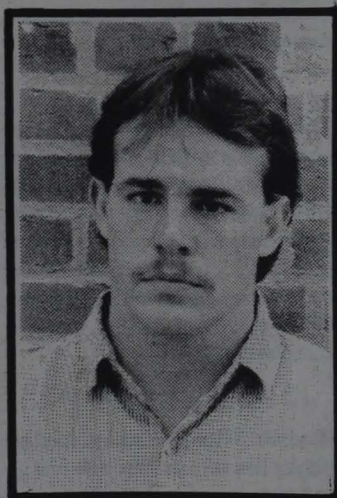
The Glenville State College Hilltoppers have a Homecoming date Saturday against the West Liberty State College Hilltoppers. The Hilltoppers, who finished 4-6 last year, will invade Pioneer Stadium this Saturday with what looks to be a very evenly matched confrontation.

West Liberty returns 48 letterman, 18 of which are starters from a campaign which defeated Glenville 7-0 last year at West Liberty. The Hilltoppers, which lost seven top players from last year including their starting quarterback Doug Karas, return even all conference players. Returning are 1st Team All WVIAC players: Todd Green at Guard, Gary Brown at Middle Guard, and Rich Elias at Split End; 2nd Team WVIAC: Emilio Traversa a Defensive Back, and Ted Gorman a Defensive End. Other All-Conference returners for West Liberty are Jerry Williams at Fullback and Daryl Dabney at Defensive Back.

West Liberty as a team has many unanswered questions. They lack depth at the inside linebacker position, and they have had to find replacements for the offensive tackles. West Liberty has a weakness in their perimeter running attack as well as in their kicking game. Veteran Head Coach, Larry Shank feels that the Hilltoppers are better than a year ago, but still feels they "will be challenged each and every week."

HART'S HEADLINES

How far do sports authorities have to go to rid athletics of steroid users? Many of us feel that they can go too far. I am a firm believer in the banishment of steroid use for fair athletic competition, but I also feel that certain efforts are taken too far.

Despite efforts by the NFL Players Association to block steroid-related suspensions, the National Football League announced last month that 13 players had been banned for at least 30 days because they tested positive for steroids, a performance-enhancing drug, in training camp. The league went on to explain that harsher first time suspensions for steroid users were enforced because of "the competitive edge that steroid users can obtain on the playing field."

The players' association claimed that the accuracy of the National Football League's testing procedures was "highly questionable," and asked U.S. District Judge Thomas Hogan to issue a temporary restraining order stopping the league from executing such suspensions. However, Hogan denied the request, he believed players had more than enough warning of the penalty for testing positive to steroids.

I feel as if the National Football League's actions are necessary. Steroid use must not be tolerated in sports, especially at the professional

level where players make their living. The actions the league takes should be positive though, not to blemish the game itself. These athletes are not drug addicts, and they should not be branded as felons. These players made a mistake and they are paying for it.

Some players use steroids to help heal an injury quicker. The steroid that builds speed and strength is an anabolic steroid, it is a performance enhancer. This Saturday the 4-0 Mountaineers again play another undefeated team, the Pittsburgh Panthers who are 3-0. Pittsburgh is fresh off of a 30-23 upset victory over the Syracuse Orangemen. Last week I predicted West Virginia to defeat Louisville 31-20, the Mountaineers won 30-21. This weekend the Mountaineers have the home field advantage over the Panthers. If they play a better game offensively than at Louisville, they will win. The game will be won at the line. West Virginia's offensive line must hold off a talented Panther defensive line. The Mountaineers will have another tough game but the home crowd will cheer WVU to a 27-24 victory over the Pitt Panthers.

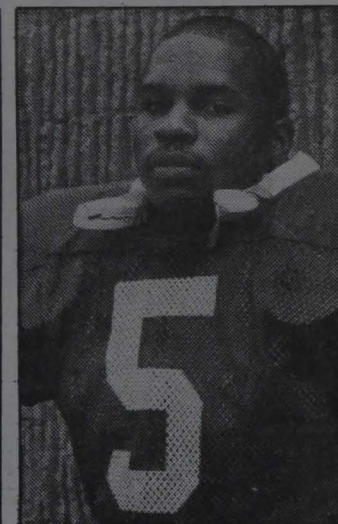

Pioneer Cross Country

Canton Ohio - Last Saturday Glenville State's men and women's cross country team competed in the largest cross country invitational in the midwest, with over 3,000 runners and several nationally ranked teams in competition.

The Invitational was divided into two divisions, a Red Division and a Blue Division with Glenville State competing in the Blue Division. The Pioneers were led once again by Bubby Dent. Dent finished first in the Blue Division and fourth overall with a time of 1:40, finishing just behind Dan Maas of Adams State College. Maas was 9th in the NAIA National Cross Country Meet last year and was the 1989 NAIA 1500 meter National Track Champion. Taking top honors overall was two-time national champion Rick Robirds, also of Adams State. Robirds owns the best time ever in the NAIA National Cross Country Meet with time of 3:47 which he set in 1987.

Other placers for the men were Mickey Grass with a time of 34:59, Richard Clark 37:52, William James 38:05, and Jesse Giles 44:37.

Leading the way for the

women's team was Tammy Taylor, finishing 26th overall and 6th in the Blue Division with a time of 21:18. The women Harriers finished the day in second place, with a team score of 56 pts., 36 pts. behind the first place finish of the University of Findly. Other finishers for the women were Lori Barker-Gardner with a time of 21:31, Katie Riggelman 21:43, Tracy White 22:21, Jane Hoffman 23:41 - her personal best, and Dawn Farley 26:18.

With a very tough field of competition, the Pioneers performed well. They are preparing for the NAIA District #28 meet which will be 5 1/2 weeks away. The Crush Crew will again be in action. Saturday September 30th at the Ohio Bobcat Cross Country Invitational at Athens, Ohio.

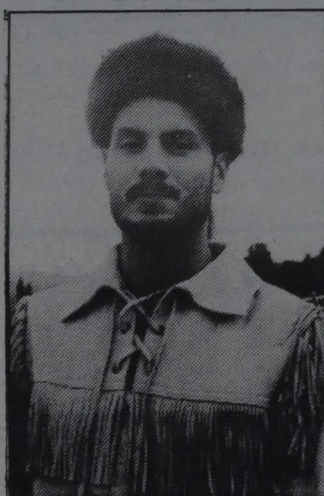
