

Jeff Swisher Leads Pioneers To Victory

Swisher, defeated Newport News 68 yards on seven carries. of Virginia 18-7 on Saturday. Swisher threw for two touchdowns intercepted the Newport News as well as running for another.

Newport News (3-5-1) held a 7-O halftime lead behind quarterback David Riddle's 3-yard touchdown pass to John Davis and Jerry Call's

With 8:22 left in the third quarter, Swisher ran 45 yards up the middle for a touchdown. The two-point conversion failed, and the score stood at 7-6 in favor of the visitors. Early in the fourth quarter, Swisher connected to wide receiver Rick Lewis on a 2-yard scoring pass. The conversion again failed, but the touchdown put the Pioneers up for good. With Glenville holding a 12-7 lead, Swisher once again hit Rick Lewis for a touchdown. The touchdown pass covered 25 yards and ended the Pioneer's scoring.

On the day, Swisher was 12-of-25 passing for 137 yards and an interception. Lewis caught nine passes for 123 yards and two touchdowns. The leading rusher

Defensively, the Pioneers quarterback six times, with Linton Turner having two pick-offs.




