

Lady Pioneers Rout W.V. State

Four GSC players broke into double figures last Tuesday night as the Lady Pioneers posted a 104-62 rout over visiting WV State.

Glenville State's Marcia Moore led all scorers with 20 points, while Monique Johnson poured in 15 points and pulled down 10 rebounds. Other GSC players who broke into double figures were Tammy Pence-Hughes with 18, Leslie Cloonan 14, and Nikki Cale added 11 points, respectively.

The Lady Pioneers were successful with their strong press defense, opening up an 18 point lead just six minutes into the contest. Glenville State led 47-28 at halftime and ended up over the century mark for the first time this season.

Lady Pioneers Go 4-0

Glenville State's Lady Pioneers raised their record to 4-0 and remained undefeated as they defeated pre-season WVIAC favorite Bluefield State 95-80 on Thursday night.

Seniors Monique Johnson and Tammy Pence-Hughes each poured in 25 points to land visiting Bluefield their second loss of this young

Glenville was 3-5 from threepoint goals, with Johnson going 2-3, Cale 1-1 and Ellyson 0-1. Leading in assists with 9 was senior Monique

With the Lady Pioneer enforcing their full-court press, they forced 29 Bluefield turnovers and four blocked shots.

Pioneers Blow Out Bluefield

Glenville State, paced by senior Melvin Smith, routed Bluefield State 88-68 in the consolation game of Invitational Concord Tournament last Tuesday. Smith poured in 34 points and brought down 10 rebounds. He also contributed five three-pointers and went 7-for-7 at the free throw line.

Junior guard Bernie Rees helped Glenville's cause with 18 points, including four three-pointers and five assists. Also in double-figures for the Pioneers was junior Dwayne Williamson. Williamson scored 16 points and pulled down nine rebounds.

Paul Gravely scored 17 points and pulled in eight rebounds for Bluefield State, while Willie Hanna and Tony Boyles had 14 and 12 points, respectively, for Bluefield.

The Pioneers, which lost to host Concord 93-72 in the first-round

game, led Bluefield 45-41 at halftime. Using an 18-4 run early in the second half, the Pioneers blew the game open. Over the final 10 minutes of play, GSC held Bluefield State to a mere seven

With the victory, the Pioneers improved to 2-4 overall and 1-1 in the West Virginia Conference. Bluefield fell to 1-4 overall and 0-1 in league play.

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
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


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
