Something Needed to Relieve Registration Chaos

Once again students have managed to endure registration. Each semester the system for registering classes changes, but each new system entails the same problems time and time again--long lines, closed classes, conflicts in schedules, students begging teachers to let them in class, and dwindling numbers of upper level courses. All of the problems seem avoidable in a college the size of GSC, but they manage to appear every semester. Since GSC is a small college with only eight divisions, why not put all the classes listed in our catalogue into semester sequences which will then be fed into a computer? The computer could prevent required courses from being scheduled at the same hour, it could use the same index numbers each year, and students could access semester requirements in their majors without the hassle of new schedules printed every semester.

To help eliminate the problem of long lines, why not let students register according to class rank? In doing this, juniors and seniors are able to get the classes they need in order to graduate on time. Since there are so many classes which freshmen and sophomores can take this would not be unfair.

So many sections of general studies requirements are offered each semester that not enough upper level classes are offered to juniors and seniors. So few sections of required education classes are offered that they always seem to conflict with the times the few upper level classes are offered. Why can't the faculty solve these conflicts before the schedules are printed? Since few sections of some classes are offered, they fill up quickly, and classes are closed. Students then beg teachers to get into classes. If teachers do not admit them, students may be required to attend another semester or year.

Do these problems occur because of a lack of communication among the small number of teachers and administration? When a much larger college can offer hundreds more classes each semester without the general confusion, GSC should be capable of conducting our registration of limited course offerings more efficiently. Our registration problems need to be noticed and acted upon by our administration.




Glenville shot 42% from the field, while going 4 for 7 from the three-point line.

"Ernest Saves Christmas" - A Movie Review by Jim Shock


