GSC Advisory Board Holds Meeting

A meeting of the Glenville State College Advisory Board was held December 14, 1989 in the Pioneer Center Conference Room. The following agenda was addressed: BUDGET REDUCTION-- Business Manager William Osborne presented information regarding the budget reduction which totals \$145,000. Most savings were taken from vacant positions. These are important positions which need to be filled as soon as possible.

ROLE AND MISSION STUDY-- GSC President William K. Simmons reported on the progress of the role and mission study. The following committees have been selected to study the various aspects of the college: Academic Programs, Admissions Advisory, Community College and Community Service, External Affairs, Facilities Planning and Finance, and Student Services. The committee chairmen along with representatives of the Board of Advisors will serve on a Steering Committee to come up with a statement by early April. This statement will be submitted to the Board of Directors who will incorporate it into a Master Plan by July 1. A short, abbreviated

statement with some insight as to where GSC will be going with education, prison relocation, and regional jails has already been submitted.

Academic Vice President Dr. Lowell Peterson reported that the institution was looking at the different aspects of its baccalaureate-level programming to see where it will need further focus. In order to look at things realistically, three scenarios will be developed as to how GSC can most effectively deliver quality programs with the level of resources available: take drastic cuts to keep alive, keep constant by reducing or expanding, and expanding. The institution should know more about the programming early next semester.

A letter with an intent to plan a criminal justice program has been submitted to the Board of Directors, and a program combining psychology, sociology, and interdisciplinary studies is being created to accommodate the prisons. (Even if the Lorton Prison does not relocate in Gilmer County, GSC will be responsible for supplying the higher-education needs for the regional jail to be located in Flatwoods.)

Admission Standards Increase

Mack K. Samples, Dean of Records and Admissions reviewed the new admission standards for incoming freshmen this Fall--two years of higher math and two years of laboratory science. Only 15-20% of new applications do not meet the guidelines. However, those students may be admitted to the community-college component and take remediation classes after which they can be transferred to the baccalaureate programs. As a result, more sections of Math 100 and

College Algebra will need to be offered. One of the main problems with this procedure is getting the prospective students to understand it.

The West Virginia Higher Education System has been converting to a new computer system called Banner. Although other colleges have been experiencing nightmares in its implementation, GSC pre-registered on the new system and it went smoothly compared to the other schools.

Trillium Accepting Contributions

The campus literary magazine, TRILLIUM, is accepting original stories, poems, and sketches from students. The deadline is Thursday, February 1.

Students may give their typed contributions to Mark Romano, editor, or Dr. Barbara W. Tedford, advisor (313 Administration Building). Line drawings, etchings, block prints, and photographs will also be considered. The staff consists of upperclassmen Chris

Jamison, Traci Probst, Sally Smith, Carmen Wager, Arson Workman, and Rose Yoak; and freshmen Billy Hardman and Kimberly Varney. They will help select the material and do editing and proofreading. In addition, Kris Rogers is designing the cover.

Publication is scheduled for April. There are still copies of the 1989 edition available in the Language Division Office.



Construction of the Art and Music Building is scheduled to be completed in February. An elaborate dedication ceremony is set for the beginning of the Fall 1990 semester.

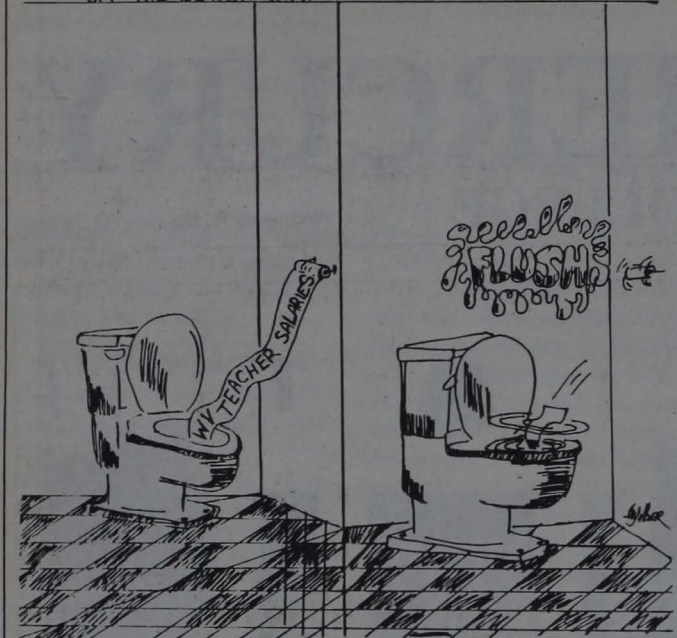

Career Assistance Available

Director of Career Planning and Placement, Jennifer C. Nottingham, announces that plans are being finalized for Operation Native Talent which will be held in Morgantown at the WVU Coliseum on Wednesday, January 24.

Operation Native Talent is a combined effort of the West Virginia College Placement Association (including GSC) and business and industry to help West Virginia's graduates gain employment following graduation. Over 50 different employers--including business, education, health care, and social service--will be available to interview interested students.

In order to participate, stop by to register at the Office of Career Planning and Placement, 204 Pioneer Center. Transportation will be provided to and from the Job Fair at no cost to participating students. All students who are interested must do is register with the Placement Office, complete placement credentials, and prepare to interview on the 24th. The Placement Office staff will assist you in preparation of placement

credentials.

To participate (and be assured transportation), students must register with Placement Office no later than January 15.

Ms. Nottingham will be holding a workshop on January 17 at 3:00 p.m. in the Verona Maple Room of Pioneer Center to assist students in their preparation for Operation Native Talent.

The staff of the Office of Career Planning and Placement has also prepared a Résumé Writing Guide and a Letter Writing Guide for use by graduates in their job search. The booklets, which are available in the Placement Office, incorporate the most current methods for letter writing and résumé preparation. A packet of information is available for any interested student in the Placement Office. The packet contains forms which enable students to easily compile their most promising assets for the job market in their chosen field. State Causes Decline in Education

We need to make our voices heard. There has been a hiring and spending freeze placed on higher education in our state. As students we need to take a stand against the freeze.

Training and educating students to become productive, self-supportive citizens will improve our state and keep people off welfare roles. Therefore, supporting higher education strengthens the state financially and socially. Presently at GSC there have been several classes cancelled due to the lack of teachers. Two of these classes are in education, a highly recognized program at our school. How then can our school maintain a reputation as an accredited school when we are not permitted to replace teachers who have gone? When accrediting agencies come to our school in 1991, how will our image look when our college does not offer classes that are absolutely essential in obtaining a degree?

Other state's legislatures, as well as West Virginia's, establish the funding per student in four year colleges. Glenville State College students are funded \$735 less than the average fund for other students living in our region of the nation. The average rise in funding for our region was 92%. West Virginia rose only 51%. It is apparent that GSC is falling further and further behind each year, and our legislature must stop our decline.

In a future article I will be informing the student body which legislatures support higher education and which ones do not. This information may help students decide which legislators they will support in the upcoming election. Then, as a student body, we need to inform our representatives in the state legislature that money for higher education is the first priority. Secondly, West Virginia students deserve as much funding as students receive in other states. Finally and most importantly to our state legislatures, we will not vote for politicians who do not support funding for higher education.

Are corporate investments in employee fitness programs worth it? The costs can be very high, while the benefits are intangible and difficult to measure. If you are management, how do you measure the worth of such programs?

Employees who stay loyal to exercise programs, improve their health and thus cut costs to employers. People who don't exercise have 36% higher health care costs than people who do. Overweight people have 7% higher health care costs, while smokers have 25%.

Those companies which have

been involved in employee fitness, report a significant drop in heart attacks among employees. Reduction on medical/insurance costs and absenteeism has also been seen by companies with health and fitness programs. Good fitness programs also aid in good employee morale and can improve productivity.

Employers do not have to open their own fitness center, but can subsidize memberships for employees at local health clubs. Fitness can benefit the employee and help keep the company fit.

Pioneers Overpower Wheeling

Glenville State, led by senior Melvin Smith and junior Bernie Rees, overpowered visiting Wheeling Jesuit 87-72 on Saturday, January 6.

Smith, with 24 points and Rees with 23, helped the Pioneers jump to an early lead and take control of the game from the tip-off. Wheeling never challenged the Pioneers, as they were charged with five fouls in the first six minutes of play. Glenville State took advantage of the Wheeling miscues and coasted to a 41-28 half-time lead.

Wheeling Jesuit, last year's WVIAC champions, never came closer than six points to the Pioneer lead. With sloppy play in the second half, neither team seemed to get into their game plan. Glenville State accumulated a total of 26 turnovers to Wheeling's 12, but was able to win the game at the line. Wheeling intentionally sent the Pioneers to the line in a final effort to win. The Pioneers answered the call successfully, however, as Keith Gilliam went 10 for 11 from the line, including eight in the closing minutes of the contest.

With the victory, Glenville State improved to 4-9 overall and 3-4 in conference play. Visiting Wheeling Jesuit fell to 5-8 overall and 3-5 in the WVIAC.

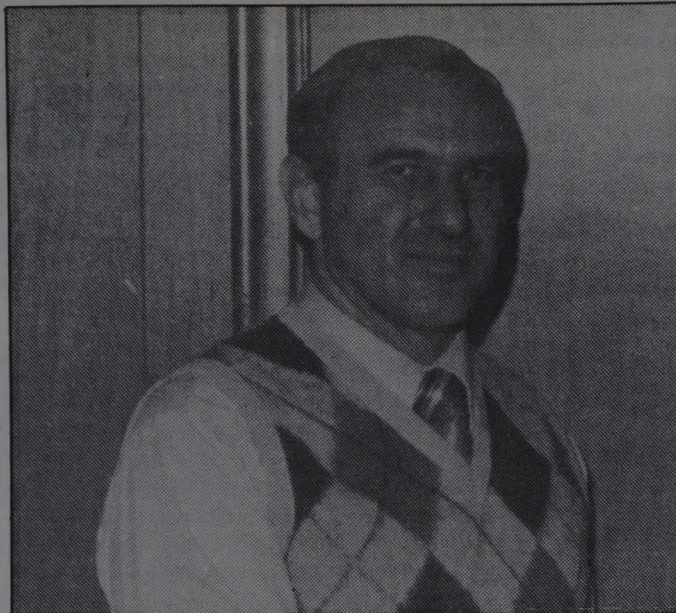

Coach Nocida Steps Down

After compiling an 8-20-1 record as head football coach at Glenville State College, Lou Nocida has stepped down from his coaching post for the Pioneers.

Nocida, 47, went 1-8 this season, defeating only Newport News Apprentice, a school not recognized as a four-year institution. The Pioneers played in six WVIAC games in 1989, and were outscored 236-14, while losing their last two games by scores of 56-0 to West Virginia Tech and 55-0 to West Virginia State.

Choosing to return to his alma mater and coach, Nocida wanted to try something different so he did not accept the head coaching job at Marietta (Ohio) in 1987. Nocida soon found out that on the college level there is more than coaching, there is recruiting, also. He never seemed to enjoy recruiting and left the job for someone else, which

showed by the decline in Glenville's record. The Pioneers went from 4-5-1 in 1987 to 3-7 in 1988 before going 1-8 in 1989.

Nocida, who operated all of last year without a full-time assistant expressed several factors for his resignation. One reason is the lack of tuition waivers Glenville's football program receives compared to other NAIA schools.

As a high school coach at Sistersville High School, Nocida won 104 games and lost just 18. His teams made the Class A State championship game seven straight years, winning five titles.

Nocida is now out of coaching, leaving Glenville State's football program in turmoil. He realizes now that coaching on the college level was a mistake. Too bad he had to realize that at the expense of the Pioneer football team.

Pioneers Triumph Over Concord

Glenville State, behind the 27 points of senior Melvin Smith, raised their record to 5-10 overall and 4-1 in the WVIAC with an 86-76 triumph over visiting Concord College on Saturday evening, January 13.

Junior Bernie Rees supported Smith, as he tallied 22 points, including five three-point goals. The Pioneers also received performances from Dwayne Williamson and William Jackson of 14 and 12 points, respectively.

The Pioneers took an early lead on a pair of free throws by Kevin McCulley with 2:37 expired in the first period. With the score 39-37, Glenville State went on a 10-3 run, including a three-point goal by Williamson at the buzzer, to give them a 49-40 halftime lead.

The victory was the Pioneers' second in three games, and helped them surpass Concord in the West Virginia Conference standings.

As a team, the Pioneers shot near 50% from the three-point range, going 13 for 27. Glenville State outrebounded Concord 41 to 29, with Smith and Jackson pulling down eight rebounds each.

The loss dropped Concord to 7-7 overall and 3-5 in conference play.

Cale Leads Lady Pioneers in OT

Glenville State's Nikki Cale poured in a game high 35 points, in powering the Lady Pioneers to a 2-89 overtime victory over visiting West Liberty State College Wednesday, January 10.

Cale, was successful on six two-point goals, and finished with seven three-point goals. The former standout at West Preston connected on a 25-foot jumper with six seconds remaining in regulation to go into a 78-78 tie and force overtime.

In overtime, Cale connected on

two three-point goals to put the Lady Pioneers ahead to stay. Glenville State converted six free throws in overtime to secure the victory.

Also scoring in double figures for the Lady Pioneers were Tammy Pence-Hughes with 19 points and Jackie Myers adding 13.

Mary Jo Ellyson and Marcia Moore, added seven points and six points for Glenville State.

The Lady Pioneers raised their record to 10-2 overall and 8-0 in conference play.

Fines Enacted

Beginning January 11, 1990 a new library fine policy will be enacted. All material borrowed after Jan. 11 will be affected. After that date for material returned late, there will be a fine of .10 per item, per day, including weekends, holidays, and days the library is closed. On days the library is closed material may be returned in the out side book drop, to the left of the entrance. For example: a book, a record and a kit are 7 days late; that is .10 times 3 items=.30 x 7

days=\$2.10. Unlike some libraries that have two or three copies of a book, the Robert F. Kidd Library has but one copy. The policy's intent is not to make money, but to bring that one copy back to the library so another student can use it.

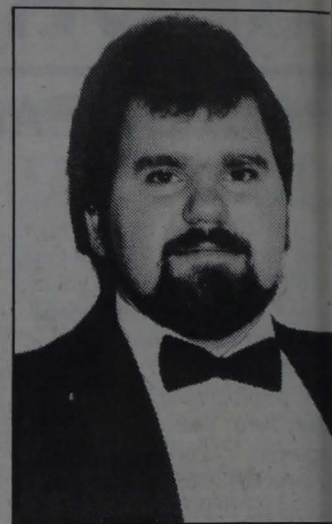
