## Three Faculty Members Depart From GSC

Three faculty members have resigned from their positions at Glenville State College effective January 1, 1990.

GSC, known as one of the state's leading "teacher" colleges, has lost two of its top education instructors. Larry E. Keaton, Associate Professor of Education, resigned after a thirteen and a half year tenure. He taught Theories of Learning and Intro. to Special Education.

Dr. Clifford C. Young, Associate Professor of Special Education, has also resigned his position at GSC. He was hired in

August of 1981 and taught Human Development, Intro. to Teacher Education, as well as other Special Education courses.

Dr. Gary W. Snyder, Associate Professor of Biology, resigned his post after seven years at Glenville State. He was hired in August of 1982 for a one year appointment. Snyder spent a year at Miami University of Ohio obtaining his doctorate and was rehired in August 1984 to instruct Biology 101 and 102 and upper-level biology courses.

No replacements have been hired to fill these positions.

## Operation Native Talent Scheduled

More than 60 companies will be on hand at the two 1990 Operation Native Talent job fairs to interview college seniors. The fairs will be held from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Wednesday, January 24 on the campus of West Virginia University and Wednesday, January 31 on the campus of Marshall University to match college seniors in the state with entry level or managerial jobs. The fairs are open to students from all colleges in the state who are invited to attend one or both fairs.

Invitations were mailed to select companies who expressed an interest in interviewing West Virginia college seniors. Bruce Cox, AT&T District Manager and chairman of the Operation Native Talent steering committee said the purpose of the job fair is to provide West Virginia employers with an opportunity to interview "the best and the brightest West Virginia has to offer", and to show college students that quality job opportunities exist in the state.

Among the companies interviewing at the job fairs will be AT&T, Bell Atlantic, Charleston Area Medical Center, IBM, Pepsi Cola Company, EDS Corporation, PPG Industries and many others.

The companies are looking for employees from a wide range of majors.

The 1989 ONT fairs held in Charleston and Morgantown attracted over 1,000 students and 75 public and private sector employers. To date 169 graduates were hired as a result of the 1989 job fairs, surpassing the 1988 mark of 109.

Operation Native Talent is a joint program of the WV Chamber of

Commerce, WV Roundtable, Inc., WV Dept. of Commerce, Labor and Environmental Resources and WV College Placement Association.

## Should Students Be Penalized?

The Federal Government, as everyone is well aware, is continually reducing budgets and trying to reduce the amount of money wasted each year. One way this reduction of wasted money will affect students who receive financial aid here on our campus is that, when a student lowers (drops) the number of hours that he is taking, he will receive no refund. For example, if a student drops from a full time student to a part-time student during the semester, he will not be refunded the difference in tuition costs for the fewer hours. Presently, if the student pays his own tuition and drops from a full to a part-time student, he receives a refund.

Other schools in the state, Marshall University and Shepherd College for example, do not offer a refund for reduced hours regardless of whether the student receives financial aid or not. The rumor at GSC is that, starting next semester, nobody will receive a refund for a lightened schedule. What if a student must reduce his schedule for medical reasons? Should these people be entitled to a refund? Those students who withdraw from school will not be affected.

Another issue of the new policy that could affect students at GSC deals with Guaranteed Student Loans. When a student qualifies for a GSL, he will receive two disbursements. If money is borrowed for the entire year no problem should arise; however, if money is being borrowed for one term only, a problem could arise. Since money is disbursed in two payments, students will obtain half the money at the beginning of the semester and the other half at mid term-- a date which exceeds the time to have tuition paid.

The reason for the new policy is to reduce the default rate. The default rate is the amount of money which students do not pay back on school loans. Should students with legitimate excuses for dropping classes or starting school in the middle of the school year be penalized for someone else's irresponsibility?

## Minorities Eligible To Attend Grad Management Institute

ST. LOUIS-- College makes a lot of demands on students. But this summer, 30 specially selected college seniors will be able to find out about a career where the biggest demand will be for them.

The first GMAC-AACSB Minority Summer Institute, a six-week program intended to increase the number of minority students pursuing the Ph.D. and careers as business school faculty, will be held June 10-July 20, 1990, on campus of the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor. The talented black, Hispanic and Native American students selected to participate will have all related expenses paid, will receive a stipend of \$2500 each and will be granted six hours of credit from Michigan.

The program is structured to introduce students to the challenges and rewards of the career of a business professor. Included are classes that focus on the quantitative and analytic methods of business study, lab sessions for hands-on experience with the library and computers, and seminars that answer questions about doctoral study and academic careers in management education. All classes will be held in the School of Business. Extracurricular recreational activities also are planned.

Applications are being considered from a variety of disciplines, including economics and other social sciences, education, engineering and business. Previous study in business is not required. The minority Summer Institute comes at a time when business schools continue to reel from the effects of a persistent and critical shortage of doctorally qualified professors, where the current

vacancy rate is stalled at 15 percent. The lack of minority faculty remains as one of the pronounced and disturbing dimensions of the shortage. Recent statistics on doctoral graduates indicate that 1.7 percent were Black, 0.6 percent Hispanic, and 0.1 percent Native American. Statistics on new doctoral candidates do not point to a more promising future.

The institute, which is being funded by the Graduate Management Admission Council, is the latest among a variety of initiatives launched by AACSB and GMAC in recent years in attempts to increase the shrinking pool from which business schools draw future faculty. The University of Michigan was selected over a number of AACSB member schools submitting proposals to host the program.



## Heflin Student Center To Be Named


