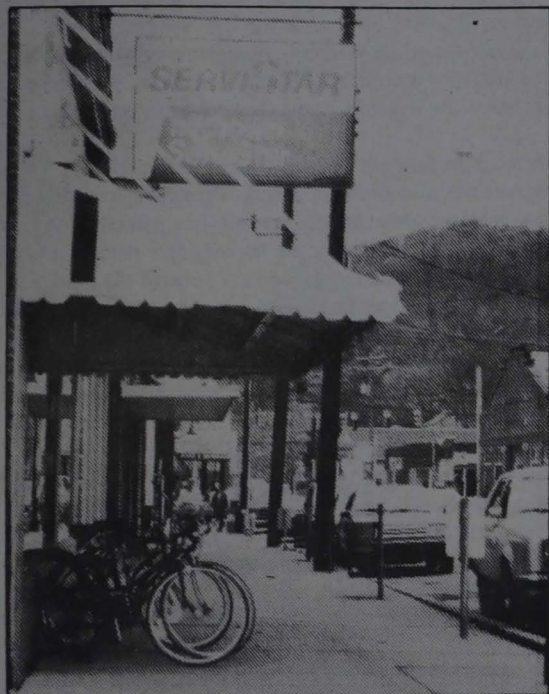

## Will Prison Change Glenville?

Nestled in the hills of Central West Virginia lies a small remote town. A town where nobody knows a stranger. People exchange greetings as they pass on the street; sometimes not knowing one another. There are no strangers in this town, at least not yet.

A river runs past town flowing softly over rocks whistling the sounds of a clear mountain stream rushing down the mountain on a cool Spring morning. The water rises and falls as the rains come and go. The water flowing softly down the river can be heard clearly on Main Street by townspeople, at least for now.

This town lies at the hands of a controversy: an issue that could change the lives of the townspeople forever; the controversy of a prison being built a few miles outside of town. What does this mean to Glenville?

A prison coming to Glenville will mean new jobs, more stores, new restaurants, more people, and many other economical opportunities. As for Glenville State College it will mean a larger enrollment, more classes offered, and the possibility of more major areas of study. The prison could mean more students or fewer students. A recent poll of 40 Glenville State College students showed that 33 were in favor of the prison. Of the students surveyed,

31 of them said they would still attend GSC. Twenty three people aren't worried about their safety or the safety of the correctional facility.

One student interviewed who wishes for his name to be withheld stated, "I would still come to school here, but if I were a parent, I would think twice about sending my child." Many people believe that the prison will benefit Glenville economically and destroy it socially. Some students believe the community is too small and there is no physical room for growth. Some students have been misinformed. One student stated, "I don't like the thought of having to sit beside a convict in class." It has not yet been determined if prisoners will attend class at GSC or at the correctional facility.

As for now Glenville will remain a quiet little town on the verge of death, gasping for air. If Glenville passes this opportunity up it may be their last shot at economic survival or if they take it, people believe it could be headed towards social destruction. Will Glenville lock the door and throw away the key or will they hand the key over to the prison and give the town and the college a chance to add life?

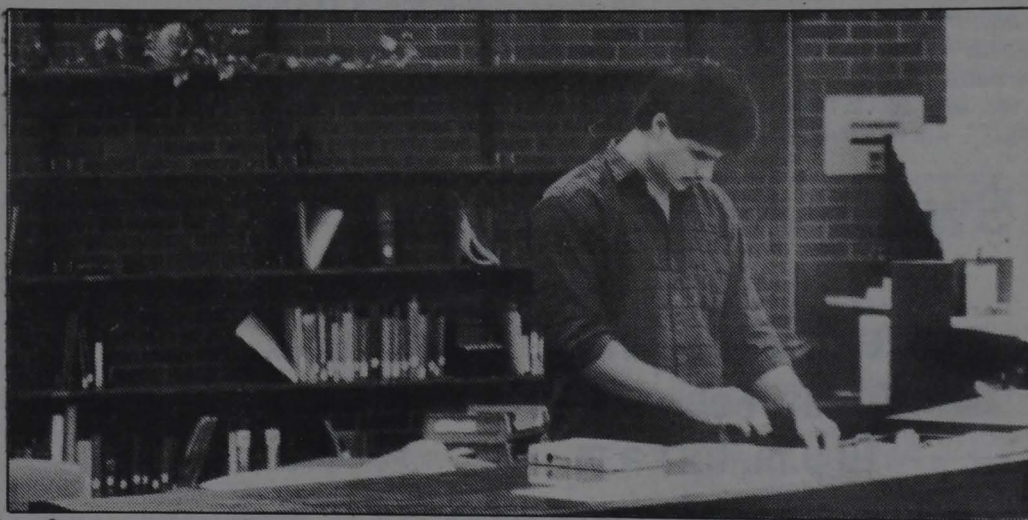


## Rehearsals Begin For Upcoming Play

## Controversial Budget Discussed

Budgeting, always a big issue, is becoming more controversial as funds remain stagnant or decrease. One objective of our 1990 Legislature is to increase funding for higher education. They propose to increase the salaries of college teachers by five percent. Everyone seems to complain when teachers are to receive pay raises. These complainers need to understand that, without competitive teacher salaries, good quality teachers go to other colleges outside West Virginia for better salaries. Not only are teachers underpaid, but non-faculty and non-administrative positions are also underpaid. Public school custodians and secretaries are paid more than similar workers at our College. Unfortunately, some of our workers could get more money if they went on welfare. That may not surprise anyone, but the fact that some faculty salaries fall below the federally designated poverty level is shocking and absurd.

An increase in funding for the West Virginia Higher Education Grant Program has also been proposed. Presently, awards from this program are being awarded at only seventy-five percent of the level of actual eligibility. The reason for the seventy-five percent award is to assure that all eligible students receive a portion of the money.

The practice of budget flexibility is on the upswing. This will involve the combining of all college fees into two fees instead of several different fees. Money can be appropriated where it is needed most. During this school year budget flexibility is being practiced and watched closely to see if it really works. Budget flexibility seems to be very effective, and it may become a permanent practice.

The proposals mentioned above are some ideas which can improve higher education, but they are not enough. GSC students who have ideas or suggestions for improvement should contact their legislative representatives. After all, these changes are for the benefit of us students.

We will be sponsoring a bike-a-thon for the St. Jude hospital. The bike-a-thon will be Saturday, April 28. More information will be given at a later time.

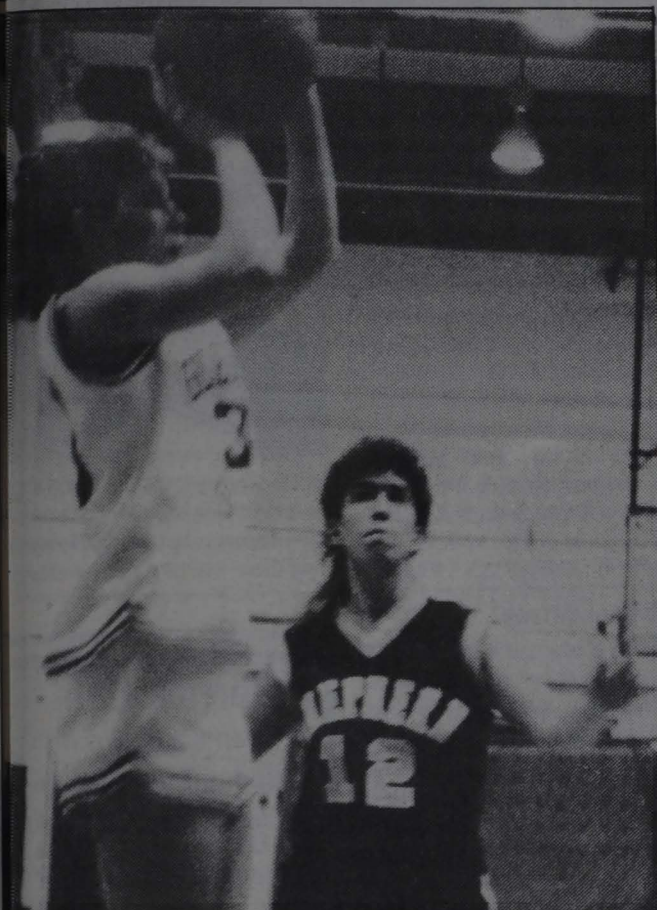

### Lady Pioneers Overwhelm Tech.

Glenville State's Lady Pioneers led by the scoring of Tammy Pence-Hughes and Nikki Cale, posted a 76-66 West Virginia Conference women's basketball victory over West Virginia Tech Wednesday in Montgomery.

Pence-Hughes and Cale together combined for 50 of the Lady Pioneers' 77 points, scoring 28 and 22 points, respectively.

Charlotte Massey led WV Tech in scoring with 27 points, while grabbing 10 rebounds.

With 19 rebounds, Pence-Hughes led both teams on the boards, while Ami Simons pulled down 12 rebounds for the Lady Pioneers.

Glenville State improved to 16-3 overall and a conference leading 11-1 in the WVAC, while winning their sixth consecutive game. The Lady Pioneers are a perfect 16-0 at home, with their three defeats all coming on the road.

WV Tech dropped to 5-16 overall, and 4-8 in the WVC.

The Lady Pioneers of Glenville State College won their seventeenth game of the year as they rallied to an 82-76 West Virginia Conference women's basketball victory over visiting Shepherd College on Friday evening.

After playing a poor first half, and being down 35-33, the Lady Pioneers rallied to win their seventh consecutive game.

Senior Tammy Pence-Hughes led the Lady Pioneers with 25 points, while also adding 10 rebounds, and three steals.

Others scoring in double figures for Glenville State were Jackie Myers with 14, and Mary Jo Ellyson with 12, while Nikki Cale and Marcia Moore added 10 points each.

Karen Smith led Shepherd College in scoring with 18 points, while Tracy Hodges was the game's leading rebounder with 19.

## Hart's Headlines

Well, Super Bowl XXIV is over and the San Francisco 49ers more than covered their spread, as they routed the Denver Broncos 55-10 for the most one-sided game in Super Bowl history.

The San Francisco 49ers could do no wrong in the contest, while the Denver Broncos could do little right. In the first half, the 49ers had the ball just under 21 minutes to the Broncos' 9 minutes, while the 49er defense held Bronco quarterback John Elway to 10 completions in 26 attempts for 108 total passing yards and two interceptions.

The game, which featured less action than the Bud Bowl, took little time in turning into the Joe

Montana Show. The 49er quarterback broke nearly every Super Bowl passing and scoring record on his way to earning a third MVP award in four Super Bowl attempts. Montana owns records for most touchdowns in a Super Bowl game--5, all-time Super Bowl record for most completions--83, all-time consecutive completions--13, most Super Bowl MVPs--3, most all-time total yards--1,142, most all-time touchdown passes--11, and the list goes on.

Sure enough, without a doubt the San Francisco 49ers have proven that they are World Champions. As for the Denver Broncos, well there is always next year.

## Tech Throttles Pioneers

Glenville State dropped to 6-13 overall and 5-8 in the West Virginia Conference with an 87-69 defeat by West Virginia Tech in a game played at Montgomery on Wednesday night.

West Virginia Tech, the 17th-ranked team in NAIA Division I, was led in scoring by Michael Merritt and Rusty Risher with 19 and 18 points, while Joe Sharpe added 9 points, respectively.

The Pioneers, who committed 18 turnovers in the first half and shot a dismal 25 percent (6 of 24) in the first 20 minutes of play, never posed a serious threat to conference leader West Virginia Tech.

Senior Melvin Smith led the Pioneers in scoring with 22 points, while William Jackson added 15 points and pulled down 9 rebounds.

Glenville State attempted to slow down Tech's well-balanced scoring attack, but their attempt proved to be unsuccessful as they were faced with a 48-22 halftime deficit.

WVIAC leader West Virginia Tech improved to 16-3 overall and 9-1 in conference play.

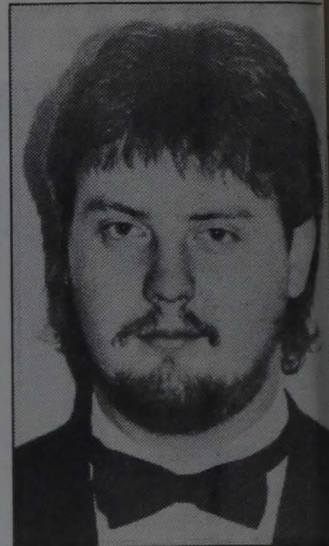
