Nancy Wemm is designing the set and Dennis Wemm is the lighting designer. Costumes have been donated by residents of Gilmer County.


Anyone interested participating in the play is more than welcome to do so due to a vacant role to be filled in by a female, preferably.

Financial Aid Declining

A recent editorial discussed the State's Higher Education Grant Program. We, to inform the students, will elaborate further on this program at Glenville State College.

For the 1989-1990 school year, the State Agency received eighteen thousand applications, out of which they awarded only 5,400 and placed 3,890 on a waiting list because of a lack of funds. The total budget for this agency for the 89-90 school year is 5.3 million. The agency needs an additional 3.8 million to award the remaining eligible students. The student funding for this school year was at a 70% level, meaning the grant awarded 70% of what tuition costs. From 1982 to 1987 the agency awarded 75% of the tuition costs; however, earlier in the late 70's the awards covered 100% cost of tuition. Presently, 13 million dollars is needed to award those students who are eligible to receive Higher Education Grants at 100% of tuition costs. This amount is above the 70% of the monies that have already been awarded.

Over the past twenty years, the amount of monies awarded has steadily declined. Without some preventive action taken by college students, this amount is likely to decline even further. The State Legislators are the persons who we students need to contact about this matter. West Virginia students could and should vote out of office those legislators who are not in support of increasing the funding for our state's Higher Education Grant Program.

GSC Women Aim For 20

Glenville State's Lady Pioneers raised their record to 19-6 overall and 17-3 in conference play, as they routed rival West Liberty 85-69 Wednesday night. The Lady Pioneers, which boasted a wellbalanced scoring attack, posted four players in double figures. Nikki Cale led all scorers with 20, Tammy Pence-Hughes added 17, while Tami Simmons and Marcia Moore scored 16 and 14 points, respectively.

Breaking a three-game losing streak, the Lady Pioneers played their final road game of the season. The Lady Pioneers play their final regular season game February 15 as they try to avenge an earlier loss to the University of Charleston.

West Liberty, which fell to 6-16 overall and 4-12 in the West Virginia Conference, was led in scoring by Jennifer Sofko with 20

Pence-Hughes Breaks School Record



Tammy Pence-Hughes All-Time Leading Scorer

Tammy Pence-Hughes, a senior from Strasburg, Virginia, surpassed Monique Johnson to become the all-time career scoring leader in women's basketball at Glenville State College.

Pence-Hughes, who came into the season with 1262 points has scored 570 points to date, bringing her total to 1,832. Leading the

Lady Pioneers in scoring the previous two seasons, Pence-Hughes has steadily improved her average. As a freshman, Pence-Hughes scored 384 points while averaging 13.7 points per game, as a sophomore she scored 332 points and averaged 13.8, as a junior her point total raised to 546, while averaging 21.0 points a game.

Along with a near 23 points per game average this year, Pence-Hughes set the single game record with 43 points against West Virginia State on January 15.

As Glenville State enters into tournament play, look for senior leadership and a strong performance from the leading scorer in Glenville State history as she attempts to lead the Lady Pioneers back to a conference championship.

Senior Melvin Smith poured in 29 and William Jackson added 22 to lead Glenville State to a 95-57 conference victory over visiting Davis and Elkins Monday, February

During the early part of the first half, the lead changed hands seven times. With the Pioneers leading 31-30, they went on to a 23-3 run to go up 54-33 at the half.

The sharp-shooting of Smith guided the Pioneers to their first victory in the last six attempts, breaking a five-game losing streak.

Glenville State was successful on 12-of-17 three-point attempts, while defensively they held Davis and Elkins to 20-of-72 from the field for the game, a percentage of

Davis and Elkins was led in scoring by Scott Tweedy with 20 points, while Josh Peasak had 10.

The Pioneers improved to 7-16 overall and 6-11 in the West Virginia Conference, while the Senators of Davis and Elkins fell to 8-15 overall and 4-11 in conference
