Students to Rally at Capitol

GSC students and students from other colleges and universities throughout the state will congregate at the Capitol in Charleston to protest the lack of funding for the WV Higher Education Grant Program. The rally will be held Wed. Feb. 21 at 11 a.m. on the Capitol building steps.

The students will unite in hopes of getting the legislators to allocate funds for the WV Higher Education Grant Program and raises in teacher salaries. Currently, the program is approximately \$7M underfunded and seventy-five percent of the

people who apply are turned away. In the past, student fees have been increased, but we have seen no increase in grant money. Students at the rally will support the increase in student fees only if the WV Higher Ed. Grant Fund is replenished. It was the state government's idea to come up with this grant program. Now, they use the money for non-educational purposes leaving many students unable to further their educations because of a lack of sufficient funds.

The protestors will listen to speeches and then break into groups to talk with the legislators. Chris Jamison, GSC Representative of the Advisory Council of Students, expressed that students plan to have a "peaceful rally and hopefully many of the legislators will talk with the students." Jamison encourages students to support the attempt to get funds for higher education. "If you can't attend the rally, voice your opinions and let the local legislators know we are not going to vote them back in if they do not support funds for higher education."

Glenville State College will be sending students to show support for this rally. The first fifteen to sign up in the Pioneer Center Director's office will have free transportation to Charleston. The van will leave at 8:00 a.m. Feb. 21. Show your support for allotment of funds for higher educational grants for WV students. It will not only affect you as a student, it will affect the entire state of WV. We need to let our legislators know that something totally ignored in the State of the State address is important to us!

House Considers Education Bills

While the House Education Committee has endorsed several measures which have been passed by its body and now are committed to the Senate Education Committee, other bills that have left the committee have a second House committee reference.

One of these remove the ceiling on teachers' and school personnel salaries. This bill would require county boards to establish salary schedules which are above the present rate and be uniform throughout the county. Another piece of legislation would allow for up to 200 teachers to be relocated in another county should the state Board of Education see the need to supply an understaffed county. The Board would incur certain expenses

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Renowned Pianist Appears

James Tannenbaum will perform a piano recital Sunday, February 25, 1990 at 3:30 p.m. in the Glenville State College Auditorium. The recital is free and open to the public.

Mr. Tannenbaum is a renowned teacher and has performed extensively in this country. His versatility manifests itself in performances of all kinds including concerto appearances with symphony orchestras, chamber music recitals, song recitals, and solo piano recitals each season.

Mr. Tannenbaum teaches at the Cleveland Institute of Music on the Conservatory and Preparatory/Adult faculties and at Case Western Reserve University and Lakeland Community College. In 1986, he was named Resident Pianist in Performance and Instruction at The School of Fine Arts. He is a member of Phi Kappa Lambda, has won

numerous solo and concerto competitions, and was awarded the Beryl Rubinstein Memorial Scholarship for study at The Cleveland Institute of Music. Along with doctoral studies, Tannenbaum received his B.M. and M.M. degrees from the Cleveland Institute of Music.

Critics praise the work of Mr. Tannenbaum. Dr. Paul Martin, Director of Cultural Affairs at Edinboro University of Pennsylvania, says, "Mr. Tannenbaum has developed a solid reputation as one of the most outstanding artists to have appeared on our stage."

This program is being brought to the public by the Glenville State College Cultural Affairs Committee. The program to be performed on February 25 includes works of Mozart, Milhaud, Debussy and Chopin.

Future Bleak For State Education

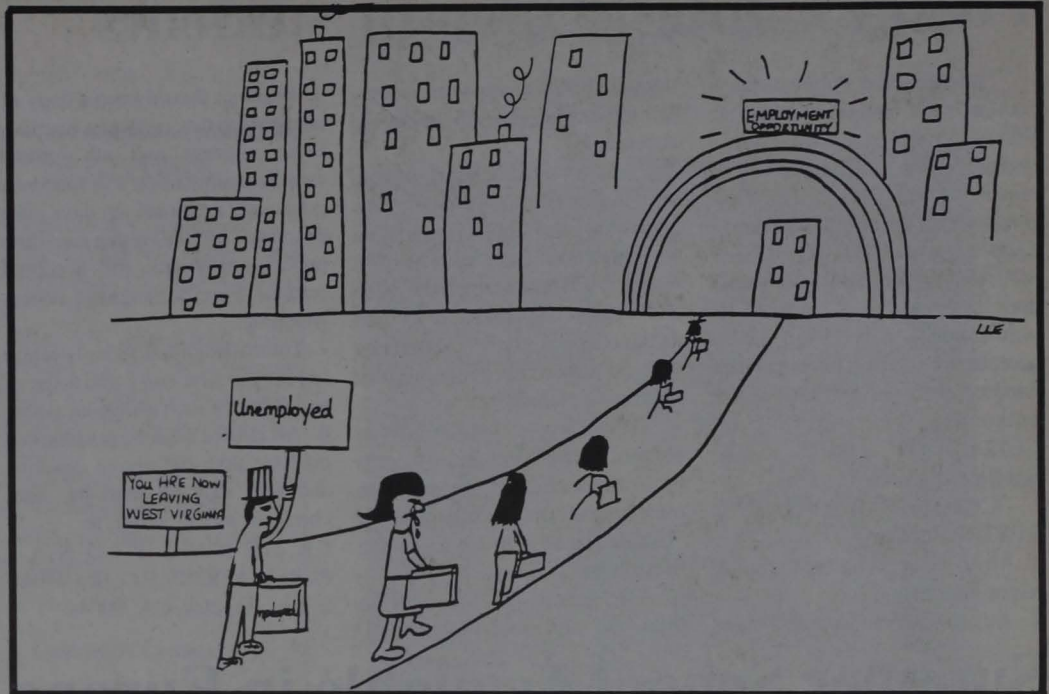

Our higher education system is declining, a slump attributed to the loss of our investment pool (under Manchin's tenure as State Treasurer), the general economy of the State, and the State's decreasing population.

College enrollment rates in West Virginia increased slightly over the last five years; however, West Virginia, already among the lowest college enrollment rates nationally, will soon see declining rates according to all predictions. The coming decreases result from our population decline statewide, from both the Bush and Caperton Administrations' cuts in higher education budgets (Pell Grants, WV Higher Education Grants, etc.), and from placing a possible enrollment cap on the number of students admitted into our colleges. Shepherd College has already placed a cap on its enrollment. The impact of these measures on Glenville State College is negative.

The next few years will be financially lean, according to President Simmons. We will see more reductions in budgets as well as losses in positions on campus, but President Simmons has pledged that teaching positions will be the last to go. Teachers' work assignments will increase without extra pay, and from time to time administrators may need to go into the classroom to fill the gaps. For example, the staff will study the college curriculum to determine which low enrollment classes will be eliminated or will be taught on yearly rotating schedules. Among other results from necessary cut-backs is a halt to the plans for renovating the Administration Building. Major building and remodeling projects are planned for the future, but for a time, the administration will channel some money into completing the new Fine Arts Building and furnishing it with equipment. Remaining money will be to keep up the sidewalks and for general repairs as required.

The Federal and State Governments' hope of having a balanced budget is honorable. When, however, funds are taken from our educational system, the only hope for our nation, what good is accomplished? When the budget is balanced and the nation is illiterate, what is going to happen? The education budget must remain the priority in both our Federal and State Governments.

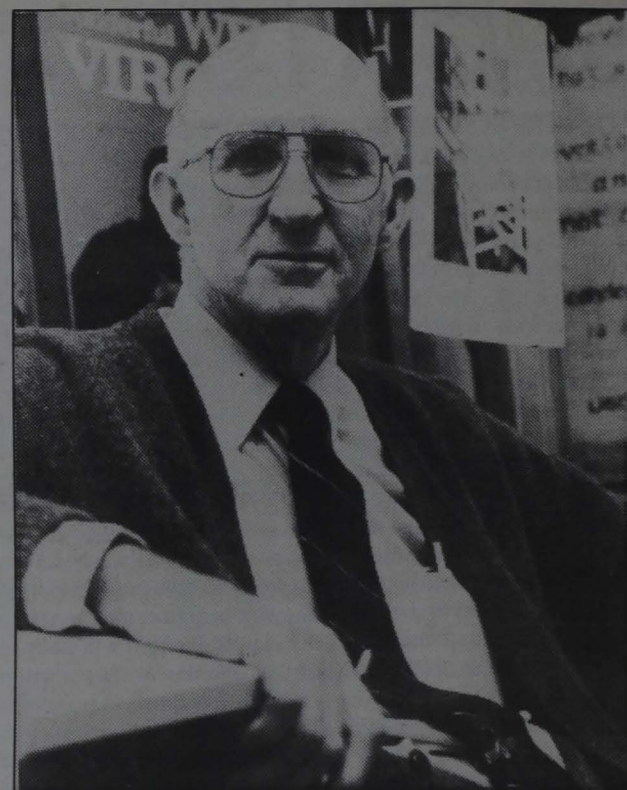
4. There are no restrictions on form or theme. Length of poems up to fourteen lines. Each poem must have a separate title. (Avoid "Untitled"!)

Summer School Available in Europe

Susquehanna University will once again be offering students the opportunity to gain an international flavor to their education this summer with its 1990 Susquehanna at Oxford program.

The Oxford Summer Session, July 2 through August 4, composes the majority of the program and gives students a chance to take credit courses taught by British professors while living at Oxford's Corpus Christi College.

Students interested in business and economics courses normally enroll in British management and economic history. Students interested in liberal arts, meanwhile, enroll in two courses ranging from British literature, to politics, to history and culture.

Participants are encouraged to

join the summer-session group early for a three-week Pre-Oxford excursion, June 13 through July 1, throughout England with extended stops planned in London, Stratford, Edinburgh, and York.

They may continue their European travel following completion of their Oxford course work with a Post-Oxford excursion. This 6-day tour, August 5 through 11, will involve a detailed excursion to Paris, France under the guidance of the Susquehanna faculty leader.

An alternate six-day excursion, August 7 through 13, to Paris is also available.

Another Susquehanna at Oxford program is a course on British Theatre in London, May 28 through June 26. *Students will attend 16 plays, take backstage tours

of current productions and attend seminars on the history of British theatre and its current issues.

Costs for the Susquehanna at Oxford programs are \$1,275 for the British Theatre course; \$3,250 for the Oxford Summer Session; \$950 for the Pre-Oxford Excursion; \$450 for the 6-day Post-Oxford Excursion to Paris. Airfare is estimated at between \$600 and \$700 extra.

The application deadline is March 1 with a maximum enrollment of 50 students for the Oxford Summer Session and 15 students for the June mini-term.

Teacher Feature - Charles Scott

Mr. Charles Scott, originally from Athens, WV, began his adventurous teaching career 33 years ago at McAdory High School in Alabama. While teaching only one year in Alabama, he received a call asking if he would teach summer school at Glenville State Teachers College, and for economical reasons he decided to do so. After this, he went to teach at Marshall Laboratory School for two years; during weekday nights and Saturdays, he taught at the Huntington Art Gallery.

Mr. Scott was educated at Concord College and Ohio University, where he received a MFA in painting. "Most of my family have been educators;" this influenced his decision to teach and he enjoys it, teaching year round. His aunt Margaret Christie taught at GSC in 1935-1938. She married an architect, Frank G. Williams, who studied with Frank Lloyd Wright at Taliesin West in

Scotsdale, Arizona.

Mr. Scott has a photograph on his wall of his aunt Margaret with Amelia Earhart, who stayed with her when she came to GSC in the late 1930's for a speaking engagement.

Mr. Scott said, "I've taught at GSC full time during the summer and winter since 1959, excluding 1985-86 when I taught at Southport College of Art and Design in Southport, England on a Fulbright teacher exchange through the U.S. information agency."

When I asked Mr. Scott about special honors he had received, he replied, "I won a National Merit Award on ceramics in 1966, in a competition sponsored by American Crafts Council at the Museum of Contemporary Crafts in New York City." He went on to say, "There were only 300 awards given and the contest was open to those

After the news last week from Morgantown of Major Harris' departure, Mountaineer fans are left in limbo. Will there be life without Harris?

Coming off their best recruiting year ever, look for the Mountaineers to put some players on the field to make you forget about Harris in a big hurry.

With the lack of speed being one of the Mountaineers' biggest problems, WVU recruited seven players who can run the 40 yard dash in under 4.5 seconds.

Along with an excellent recruiting class, the Mountaineers have several fine players who sat out last season but will have a major impact this Fall. Included among those who had to sit out last season is former Maryland running back, Mike Beasley, Maryland's number one running back last year who transferred to WVU last Fall.

The following are ten of the Mountaineers' best recruits for the 1990 Fall season: Jonathon Allen,

QB 6-2 185 from Ohio, was rated the 4th or 5th best quarterback in that state; Tom Briggs, OLB 6-5 230 from N.Y., a former junior college all-American; Maurice French, TB 5-9 185 from Florida, was the best running back in Dade County in 1988; Richard Jones, DL 6-3 275 from PA, was rated as second best nose guard in the nation; David Mayfield, 5-11 185 from West Virginia, was rated as one of the top 3 overall to play safety in the nation; Thomas Orr, DB 5-11 175 from New Jersey, was rated as high as the second best defensive back in the nation; Steve Perkins, OLB 6-3 225 from Florida, was rated as one of the nation's top 5 defensive ends; Allen Johnson, 6-3 225 QB from Washington D.C., was rated as the number one pass-run quarterback in the nation in 1988; Ray Staten, 6-3 200 WR, came from the same junior college as Reggie Rembert; Cecil Doggett, 6-1 190 DB, was a junior college all-American.

Glenville St. Falls To Salem

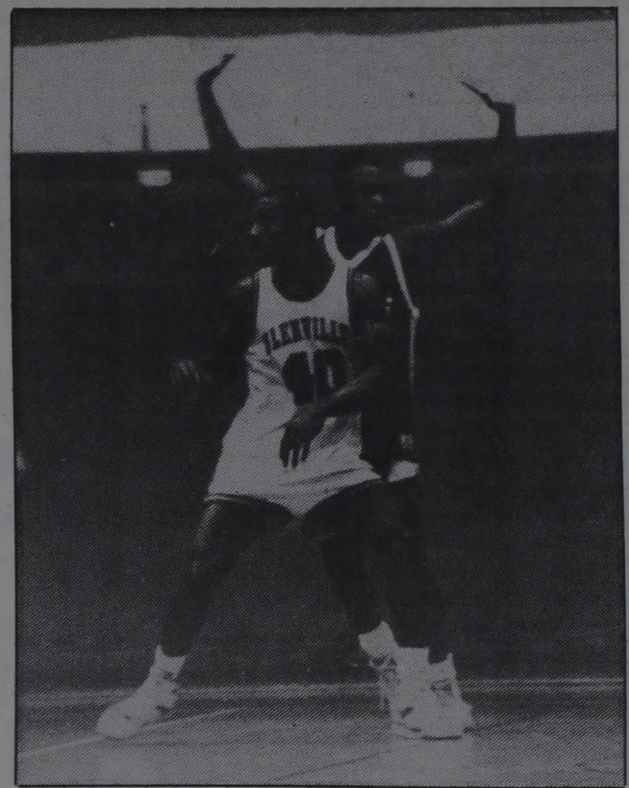
Glenville State, in their last season game, fell victim to a visiting Salem team 88-77 Saturday.

All four seniors got the starting call and kept the game close, but Salem used a 26 point sprint from the foul line to give the Pioneers their nineteenth defeat of the season.

William Jackson led the Pioneers in scoring with a 21 point performance, while Melvin Smith scored 16, and Bernie Rees added 10.

In the first half, there were seven ties, with neither team having more than a four point lead. The halftime score showed both teams tied with thirty-three points.

Pioneers Rout Fairmont

William Jackson scored 22 points and pulled down 11 rebounds to lead Glenville State to a 70-52 West Virginia Conference victory over visiting Fairmont State on Wednesday night.

Jackson, a 6-5 junior from Woodbridge, VA, was 8-of-17 from the field and 6-of-10 from the free-throw line, and helped spark a 13-2 scoring run for the Pioneers.

The victory was the seventh conference win of the year for the Pioneers and avenged a January 29th loss to the Falcons at Fairmont.

Also scoring in double figures for Glenville State was senior Melvin Smith with 19 points, while junior Bernie Rees added 14.

The Pioneers held a slim 31-30 halftime lead and battled to a 38-all tie with 15:16 to play, when Jackson laid up a basket. Glenville State then went on a run that put them up 51-40, and the game was never close again.

Fairmont State was led in

scoring by Terrence Coleman with 18 points, while Herb Davis added 12 points and Alfonso Davis scored 10.

The Pioneers improved to 8-18 overall and 7-13 in conference play, while Fairmont State fell to 14-12 overall and 11-9 in the conference.

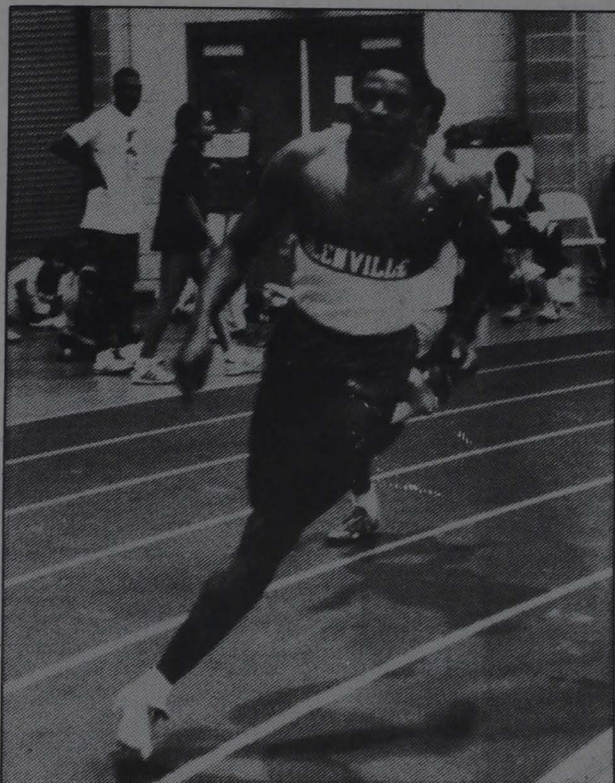

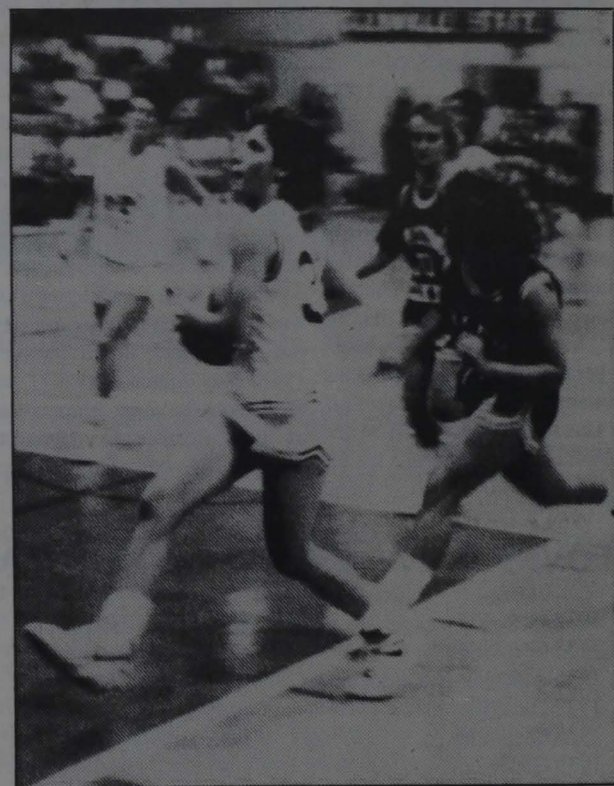

Senator Wolfe Introduces Bill

Gilmer Countians should make the decision as to whether a private prison is established in that county. That is the contention of Senator Jay Wolfe (R-13th) and he is trying to get something done about it.

The Harrison Countian has introduced Senate Bill 361 which would authorize counties to hold referendums in order to determine whether private prisons or corrections facilities may be constructed and operated within their geographical boundaries. The bill has been referred to the Committee on Government Organization.

"This is another one of those strange cases where, for some reason, we refuse to let the people speak," he declared. Wolfe's bill provides that the local option prison referendum shall not be held within 60 days of a general or municipal election.

The measure specifies that the county commission shall call such an election upon the filing of a petition signed by not less than five percent of the qualified voters within the county.

should the measure be approved. A third bill would waive fees and tuition for senior citizens for certain noncredit classes.

All of the above measures are now in the House Finance Committee.

Another bill endorsed by the House Education Committee and sent to the House Finance Committee for further consideration relates to fair and equitable property taxation. The bill would give county assessors an additional \$18 million over three years so they can update property values within the state.

The Senate Education Committee debated two measures and sent them to the floor for the consideration of the full body.
