## WVHC Seeks Nominations

The West Virginia Humanities Council (formerly the Humanities Foundation of West Virginia) is seeking nominations for its 1990 Humanities Award. The award is presented each Fall as part of the Council's annual Humanities Conference, this year scheduled for October 18-19.

The Humanities Award was established in 1987 to recognize those persons who have significantly contributed to the humanities in West Virginia. Nominations are sought for those who have contributed in the public, as well as the academic realms. Past winners have included Dr. Otis Rice, for his contributions to research in West Virginia history; Dr. Ancella Bickley, an independent scholar whose work in the history of minorities has made major contributions to an understanding of our rich and diverse heritage; and Senator Robert Byrd, whose public support, in conjunction with the publication of his voluminous work on the history of the U.S. Senate, is representative of the best example of the "citizen-scholar," not only in West Virginia, but the nation, as well.

To determine an individual's eligibility for nomination, the following questions may prove helpful: Has the individual: (1)

demonstrated appreciation for intellectual pursuits in the humanities? (2) contributed time and resources to the humanities? (3) contributed to scholarship in the humanities? (4) provided sustained support for humanities programs? or (5) contributed to the public sphere, such as in government, civic organizations, or traditional and non-traditional institutions of learning?

The Board of Directors will consider all nominees who meet one or more of the above criteria. Other contributions will be considered, based on the supporting evidence of the nomination letter. In addition, the individual must be a resident of West Virginia. Current members of the Board and staff, and their spouses, are ineligible for nomination.

Nominations may be made by individuals or organizations on behalf of an individual, or individuals may nominate themselves. Letters of nomination should be no more than three pages in length and include a vita (no more than five pages in length), or other documentation of accomplishment. No other special form is required for submission.

All nominations will be reviewed, and selected by the Humanities Council's Board of

## High School Art Exhibited

The 13th Annual West Virginia High School Art Show is now on exhibit in the ballroom.

George Harper, the director of the art show, stated: "The quality of the art exhibits are as good if not better than last year-even though we are lacking in the number of schools participating."

Kristin Rogers and Craig Drennen assisted one another in the judging of the exhibits.

Craig Drennen stated, "The

participants deserve all praise. May they continue to prosper in their artistic pursuits."

The judges dispensed two types of awards, highest being the Merit Awards. These awards came with a \$20.00 check, blue ribbon, and certificate. Honorable mention awards were also given. Every student received a participation certificate.

The overall winner will be presented with a tuition waiver to Glenville State College. This decision will be based on the student's quality of art work, GPA, and CTBS scores.

"The range of styles certainly add to the variety of the show and will ultimately provide this year's viewers with a most interesting collection," Rogers stated.

The show will be open for viewers until Friday, March 30.

The interesting front and back

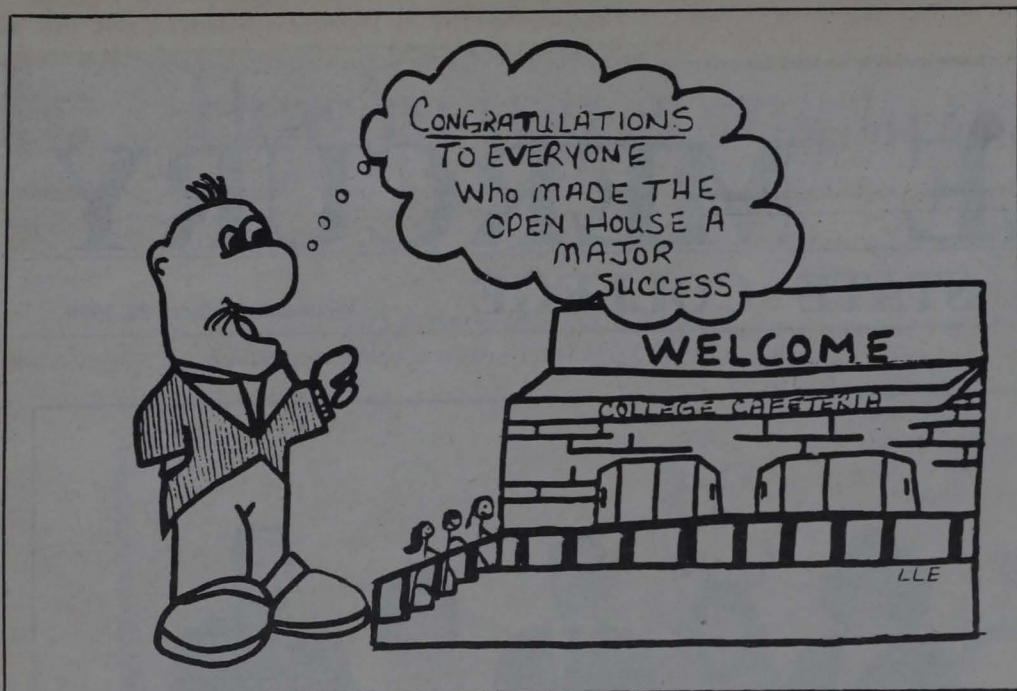

The dream has come to an end. The Runnin' Rebels of UNLV brought Loyola Marymount's title quest to an end Sunday as they defeated the Lions 131-101.

The Lions head home a winner on their quest to honor the memory of their fallen leader Hank Gathers, as they made the final eight for the first time.

The victory sent UNLV (35-5) to their third Final Four appearance in the last 14 years. Still searching for their first national championship, the Runnin' Rebels will be opposed by the Lethal Weapons of Georgia Tech (28-6).

game, the Duke Blue Devils (28-8) will be making their third final four appearance in the last four years, and their third straight. Duke's opponent will be the Arkansas Razorbacks (30-4) of the Southwest Conference.

### Grass Headed For Nationals

GSC harrier, Micky Grass, competed in this past weekend's Chambersburg Half Marathon in Chambersburg, PA. Grass finished third overall out of a field of 167 runners. He finished the course in 1:15:30 sec.

Grass finished behind John Oschemacur of Chambersburg, PA who had finished with a time of 1:12:11sec. The course at Chambersburg, PA is extremely hilly. Saturday's weather conditions didn't help the runners as they had to run in a hard snow with the temperature at about 33 degrees.

Grass's performance qualified him for the 26 mile plus NATA Marathon at the Outdoor Track and Field Championship. The Championship will be held at Tartleton State University in Steboville, TX, May 24-26. Grass

will run at 6:00 a.m. on May 26. He is the first GSC runner to qualify for nationals this year.

Grass is a two time WVIAC winner in cross country. He finished third in last fall's cross country meet. He also competed in the National Championships three times.

The rest of GSC's Track Team traveled to Huntington, to compete in the Marshall Early Bird Relays. Upon arrival, Marshall officials informed competitors that the meet had been cancelled. It has not been determined if the meet will be rescheduled.

The men's and women's teams will compete this Saturday in the Pitt Panther relays. The meet will be held at the University of Pittsburgh. Starting time for the meet is scheduled for 1 p.m.
