Nominations are ught for those who have intributed in the public, as well the academic realms. Past winners ave included Dr. Otis Rice, for his contributions to research in West irginia history; Dr. Ancella ickley, an independent scholar hose work in the history of minorities has made major contributions to an understanding our rich and diverse heritage; d Senator Robert Byrd, whose ublic support, in conjunction with he publication of his voluminous work on the history of the U.S. enate, is representative of the best ample of the "citizen -scholar," ot only in West Virginia, but the ation, as well.

(4) provided sustained support for humanities programs? or (5) contributed to the public sphere, such as in government, civic organizations, or traditional and non-traditional institutions of learning?

The Board of Directors will consider all nominees who meet one or more of the above criteria. Other contributions will be considered, based on the supporting evidence of the nomination letter. In addition, the individual must be a resident of West Virginia. Current members of the Board and staff, and their spouses, are ineligible for nomination.

Nominations may be made by individuals or organizations on behalf of an individual, or individuals may nominate themselves. Letters of nomination should be no more than three pages in length and include a vita (no more than five pages in length), or other documentation lo accomplishment. No other special form is required for submission.

All nominations will be reviewed, and selected by the Humanitics Council's Board of



#### Grass Headed For Nationals

GSC harrier, Mickey Grass, competed in this past weekend's Chambersburg Half Marathon in Chambersburg, PA. Grass finished third overall out of a field of 167 runners. He finished the course in 1:15:30 sec.

Grass finished behind John Oschemacur of Chambersburg, PA who had finished with a time of 1:12:11sec. The course at Chambersburg, PA is extremely hilly. Saturday's weather conditions didn't help the runners as they had to run in a hard snow with the temperature at about 33 degrees.

Grass's performance qualified him for the 26 mile plus NAIA Marathon at the Outdoor Track and Field Championship. The Championship will be held at Tartleton State University in Steborsville, TX, May 24-26. Grass

by Jayson Scadden will run at 6:00 a.m. on May 26. He is the first GSC runner to qualify for nationals this year.

Grass is a two time WVIAC winner in cross country. He finished third in last fall's cross country meet. He also competed in the National Championships three times

The rest of GSC's Track Team traveled to Huntington, to compete in the Marshall Early Bird Relays. Upon arrival, Marshall officials informed competitors that the meet had been cancelled. It has not been determined if the meet will be rescheduled.

The men's and women's teams will compete this Saturday in the Pitt Panther relays. The meet will be held at the University of Pittsburgh. Starting time for the meet is scheduled for 1 p.m.
